TOWN WARRANT

The State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Henniker in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

(L. S.)

You are hereby notified to meet at Cogswell Memorial Auditorium in said Henniker on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.
- 2. To hear and act upon the reports of Town Officers Library Trustees, Trustees of Trust Funds, and other Committees.
- 3. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year.
- 4. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repair of highways and bridges, and purchase of machinery.
- 5. To see what action the Town will take in regard to the Public Health, and raise money for the same.
- 6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray the expense of observing Memorial Day.

- 7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise or appropriate for the support of the Tucker Free Library.
- 8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of the Fire Department.
- 9. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for maintaining hydrant service for the ensuing year.
- 10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for street lighting for the ensuing year.
- 11. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 12. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to prevent the spread of white pine blister.
- 13. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for State Aid Construction of Class V Roads.
- 14. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the Merrimack Valley Region Association.
- 15. To see what action the Town will take relative to maintaining a Town Dump, raise money for same, or take other action relative thereto.
- 16. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Old Age Assistance.

- 17. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the plowing of sidewalks in the Town.
- 18. To see what action the Town will take in regard to installing a traffic light on Western Avenue for the protection of the School children.
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to install another street light on Hall Avenue.
- 20. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the painting of the two Steel Bridges in Town, or take any other action relative thereto.
- 21. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Street and Road signs in the Town.
- 22. To see what action the Town will take relative to the re-assessment of taxable properties by the State Tax Commission and raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$997.00 for the support of Concord Hospital.

24. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

RECORD OF AFFIRMATIVE VOTES AT

ANNUAL MEETING 1956

Article 3. Voted, that Town Officers' salaries for the ensuing year be fixed at following rates:

Selectmen	\$6.00 per day
Supervisors of Checklist	6.00 per day
Ballot Clerks	8.00 per day
Moderator	15.00 per day
Town Clerk	100.00 per year
Town Treasurer	300.00 per year
Tax Collector	1% of taxes collected

- Article 4. Voted, that we raise and appropriate the sum of \$20,000.00 for repair of highways and bridges and the purchase of machinery; and the sum of \$250.00 for tree spraying under the direction of the Tree Warden.
- Article 5. Voted, that we raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 for the District Nurse, and \$300.00 for use of car for ensuing year.
- Article 11. Voted, that the Selectmen are authorized to borrow money in anticippation of taxes.
- Article 18. Voted, that we raise the sum of \$100.00 for additional pay plus the regular sum of \$150.00 for the Municipal Court, making a total sum of \$250.00
- Article 19. Voted, that we raise and appropriate the sum of\$3,500.00 to finish the construction of the Engine House basement, stairway, and office equipment.

Article 20. Voted, by a two-thirds vote, that the Trustees of Trust Funds are authorized to pay to the Town Treasurer a sum, not to exceed \$3,500.00, to be taken from the accumulated income of the Proctor Fund to finish the reconstruction of the Engine House, and that they pay the annual income of the Proctor Fund to the Town Treasurer each year, beginning with 1956, to be applied as payment on the notes issued in 1955 for the reconstruction of the Engine House until said notes are paid.

Article 21. Voted, that we raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000.00 for the purchase of a Fire Truck, the sum of \$1,000.00 to be paid this year and the balance of \$9,000.00 to be paid at the rate of \$1,000.00 per year.

Article 21. Voted, by a two-thirds vote, that the Selectmen are authorized to issue notes in an amount not exceeding \$9,000.00 to pay the balance of purchase price of the Fire Truck authorized under this Article.

Article 21. Voted, that a committee of seven, consisting of the Board of Selectmen, the Board of Fire Engineers, and the Chairman of the Planning Board, is hereby appointed to purchase the Fire Truck authorized under this Article.

Article 22. Voted, that we appropriate the sum of \$7,500.00 for a new Town Truck; that the sum of \$2,000.00 we received from the Carter Lot be the down payment and the balance be paid off at the rate of \$1,000.00 per year from the income of the Straw Fund.

Article 22. Voted, by a two-thirds vote, that the Selectmen are authorized to issue notes, in an amount not exceeding \$5,500.00, to pay the balance of the purchase price of the new Town Truck authorized under this Article.

Article 22. Voted, that a committee of five, consisting of the Board of Selectmen, the Highway Agent, and the Chairman of the Budget Committee, is hereby appointed to purchase the new Town Truck authorized under this Article.

Article 24. Voted, that we raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 to remove or relocate the Proctor Memorial Fountain.

Article 25. Voted, that the Selectmen are authorized to assess sewer rentals sufficient to cover average yearly costs of maintenance, and that, if general provisions of Chapter 252, Revised Laws, are insufficient for this purpose, the Town's Representative in the General Court introduce an amendment to the Concord Sewer Act, so-called, to add the Town of Henniker thereto.

Many people still burn debris around their homes. A large number of such fires get out of control causing unnecessary damage and expense to the burner. Why burn at home? Make use of your town dump and eliminate the hazard of burning. It will be easier for you — personally and financially.

 - Secure a permit from your local forest fire warden — the law requires it.
 - The warden won't refuse you if conditions are safe.
 - 2. Be sure to properly supervise your burning.

In conformance with the vote taken at the Town Meeting in 1956, your Selectmen have established a rate of \$2.00 per year, per unit, as a reasonable rent on a basis of about 90 connections with the sewer mains, representing about 170 units.

- 16 Patients taken to Drs. offices in town, Hillsboro and Concord.
- 9 Patients taken to Dentists in Hillsboro and Concord.
- 2 Patients accompanied to Hospital in ambulance.
- 3 Patients taken to Nursing Homes.

I have worked 6 to 7 hours each day, the Bloodmobile was at Hillsboro. Much time was spent beforehand, in soliciting donors.

Considerable time has been given, in contacting parents, of children receiving the Salk vaccine. I feel well rewarded for the time and effort put into this.

I hope that more people (teenage and middleage), not yet immunized, will avail themselves, of the chance, (through their family physician), to receive the vaccine. One must start the series, of injections right away, to derive any benefit, before the polio season sets in.

- 2. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees or Officers chosen and take action relating thereto.
- 3. To choose Agents, Auditors, and Committees in relation to any subject in this warrant.
- 4. To see what sum of money the district will appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officers and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund and other sources; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

- 5. To see if the district will vote to authorize the school board to make application for and to accept, on behalf of the district, any or all grants or offers for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the State of New Hampshire and or United States.
- 6. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

There have been two teachers added to the high school staff this year. Mr. Dean L. DesRoches is the new Junior High teacher who will also teach the High School music and coach the Junior High basketball team. Mrs. Geraldine S. Gray is the new Home Economics teacher. In the Elementary School, Mrs. Blanche Robinson is the

new third grade teacher replacing Mrs. Ilene Parker who accepted a position in Hillsboro. We were fortunate to have John Quigley as a cadet teacher in the High School during the first semester.

Costs of Education continue to rise with no end in sight. I have been informed by salesmen that school supplies will increase in cost from ten to twenty percent. Teachers' salaries will continue to rise as the shortage of teachers continues all over the country. There has been a slight increase in the number of teachers being trained, but the demand for new teachers has risen rapidly and will continue to rise as more and more children crowd into our schools. This year, as in the past four years, the total number of births has reached a record high.

Young people graduating from the teachers colleges are being sought by Superintendents in this and other states. It is nothing unusual for these young people to have five to ten offers for various positions. Superintendents from the larger cities hire the best prospects in January or February. Superintendents do not really interview teachers any more. The prospective teachers interview the Superintendents and see what they have to offer.

Last year, beginning teachers were accepting positions at salaries ranging from \$3,000-\$3,200. In some special fields, they were asking and getting \$3,500.00 and this coming year, salaries will probably be higher. This situation makes it very difficult for a School Board which has teachers that are experienced and successful who are being paid much less than the beginning teachers receive. If the Board hires a new teacher at more money than the teachers in the system are being paid, the morale of the teachers becomes poor and the whole school system suffers.

The School Board has been making constant improvements on the school buildings. This year, much needed improvements are being made in the Home Making Room. At Christmas vacation, the partition between the cooking and sewing room was removed so that it is one unit now. They hope to install some cabinets and cooking areas. The Public Service Company has agreed to install some new stoves, free of charge. When the work is completed, we should have an efficient Home Making area comparable to what is being installed in new buildings throughout the state.

I should like to pay tribute to School Boards all over the country. It is a thankless job, at best, and today's conditions are certainly not the best. Each year the problems become more difficult and complex. Anyone who has never served on a school board, would find it hard to imagine the difficulties of the task. The problems seem to become greater with each passing year with more things to do and more problems to solve. I have the greatest respect for all the work they have to do in order to promote the best educational possible for your children and mine.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

To the Superintendent of Schools, members of the School Board, and citizens of Henniker:

Once again the school year started with an increased enrollment of 3 over last year. We graduated ten from the Senior Class and enrolled 26 in the 7th. grade. We lost several students through enlistments, disinterested and transfer. Of the graduates 3 went on to higher education, a drop of about 15% over the 3 previous years.

Many of the points of controversy of last year have been resolved. The hour period instigated last year is proving its worth, the so-called standards have been maintained and more and better work is being produced. The new mark that was introduced during the year for students who could not reach minimum standard for one reason or another has proved its value. This past year 17 students were on the D (no numerical value) mark, but through maturity, social and scholastic adjustment, 7 of this group have been removed and are on the regular system. Although many adjustments have been made in the educational part of the school we feel that many capable students are not taking full advantage of all opportunities offered in the school. Many more students are capable and should be taking an extra course. These capable people are future college prospects and it is to their advantage to get as well a rounded high school education as they can. Henniker High School is prepared to offer that type of education.

Changes in the faculty was held to a minimum. Mrs. Evelyn Woollett, who taught Junior English last year, replaced Mr. Robert Deane in Senior High English and U. S. History. Miss Nancy Philbrick in home economics

and biology was replaced by Mrs. Geraldine Gray, a Keene Teachers' College graduate. The vacancy left in Junior High was filled by Mr. Dean DesRoches, of Plymouth Teachers' College. Mr. DesRoches, with a minor in music, is reorganizing our choral music program within the Junior-Senior High School and further, has started a band in grades 6 thru 9.

In the curriculum itself we have split English 9-10 into two groups based on reading and general abilities. The change has proved fruitful and we hope to continue on that basis next year. We have added sociology at the 10th, grade level to strengthen a weak offering. We are attempting sociology this year on a trial basis, but will survey the results to see if a need is fulfilled. Our testing program at the High School level has been completed, and at the moment, students are being granted conferences on the results. It is hoped that parents will also take advantage of finding out more about their children by coming in and going over the results of the tests with us.

The home economics department is in the process of being modernized. Already the room has been enlarged by removing the wall between the small sewing room and the bigger room. It is hoped that four cooking units will be installed to complete the alterations. Electric stoves have been loaned by the Public Service Company of Hillsboro. The gym is now complete with the second row of bleachers added. Shop is now able to offer both acetylene and electric welding with the repair of the electric welding unit by Mr. Kontinos. A start to increasing our research material in the library has been made by the addition of the last 20 years of National Geographic magazines bound in 6 month volumes. A new stainless steel cabinet has been added to the nurse's room. All the second

floor rooms and the hallways were repainted during the summer.

Mr. Baker continued his graduate work at the University of New Hampshire last summer, while your principal took a course in Educational Finance and Business Management.

Before closing, I would like to extend, once again, an invitation to the parents to visit school during the school day to see the school in action. The teachers are always glad to have teachers come in for conferences in the afternoon. Home and school are attempting to accomplish the same thing. The closer the cooperation the better the child.

I would like to express my thanks and gratitude to the Superintendent, the School Board and to the parents of Henniker for their kind cooperation and understanding during the year.



The School Lunch Program was in operation from October 1955 through May 1956.

A total of 17,466 lunches were served, as follows: 9,478 meals to children in Grade School, 7,292 meals to High School students and 696 meals to adults. The average number of meals served daily during the time the Lunch Program was in operation this period was 124 meals per day to students and 5 meals per day to adults.

The Lunch Program received \$1,850.50 worth of surplus commodities from the Federal Government at a total cost of \$85.21.

During the year the following equipment was purchased for the kitchen: Vegetable Peeler machine, 20 quart Food Mixer, Table-top Salad Mixer, 20 foot Freezer, 200 stainless steel Serving Trays in addition to miscellaneous bowls and kitchen utensils.

Parents and interested persons are cordially invited to visit the Lunch Program at any time during its operation, and I would gladly discuss any special lunch problem regarding children that may require personal diet adjustments.

I wish to thank the Superintendent, the School Board and the Teachers for their help and cooperation.
