

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hinsdale qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall, on Tuesday, the 11th day of March, 1941, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects:

- Article 1. To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.
- Article 2. To see if the town will vote to accept and adopt the report of the Selectmen, Auditors and other town officers.
- Article 3. To choose a member of the Board of Selectmen for the ensuing three years.
- Article 4. To choose a member of the board of Library Trustees for the ensuing three years.
- Article 5. To choose five members of the Budget Committee for the ensuing year.
- Article 6. To choose a member of the Water and Sewer Commission for the ensuing year.
- Article 7. To choose all other necessary town officers and agents for the ensuing year.
- Article 8. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the payment of ordinary town charges, for support of the poor, for maintenance of the fire department, for lighting the streets and for all other necessary expenses arising within the town.

- Article 9. To see what action the town will take in regard to refunding \$688.88, the cost of replacing the water pipe across the Ashuelot river at Northfield Street.
- Article 10. To see what action the town will take in regard to refunding \$182.14, the cost of National Youth Administration the past year.
- Article 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$384.56 to which the State will contribute \$1,538.22 to be expended on Class 5 roads.
- Article 12. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to borrow on the credit of the town a sum not to exceed fifteen hundred dollars (\$1,500.00) for the town's share in any work project that may be available from the government, or act in any manner thereon.
- Article 13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred dollars for the purpose of graveling, tarring and providing suitable drainage on the road from residence of Albin Carlberg and continuing north, then east, towards Oak Lawn Cemetery or act in any manner thereon.
- Article 14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to paint the Depot Street bridge, or act in any manner thereon.
- Article 15. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the town through Tax Collector's deed, or act in any manner thereon.
- Article 16. To see if the town will vote that on any future extension on water mains, that the extension will not be constructed until there is a guaranteed income to the town, from the users of water on the proposed extension, sufficient to pay the interest on the cost of the installation of the proposed pipe line and hydrants.

Article 17. To see if the town will vote to extend the water main on Highland Ave., to the residence of Mrs. Percy Stewart, and raise and appropriate a sufficient amount of money for same, or act in any manner thereon.

Article 18. To see if the town will vote to borrow a sufficient sum of money to construct a water supply distribution system from the George E. Robertson paper mill across the river to Glen Street, to the property of Blazey Matuszewski, on Depot Street, or act in any manner thereon.

Article 19. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sufficient sum of money to lay a 2-inch water pipe from the hydrant in front of Corkery Place on Canal Street, as far as the Carey Bentley Place.

Article 20. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate or borrow a sufficient sum of money to extend the water pipe line on Northfield Road from Wright's corner, to the residence of W. N. Pike, or act in any manner thereon.

Article 21. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT OF THE WATER AND SEWER WORKS

To the Water and Sewer Commissioners and Citizens of Hinsdale:

I herewith submit the following report.

The state helped out in laying the new pipe line across the Ashuelot River at the Northfield Street bridge. They had to dig a ditch three feet below the river bed and about four feet wide. We used Universal 8 inch pipe which comes in 6 foot lengths that make it easy to handle and no joints to pour with mineral lead. The joints are made with a bevel and drawn up tight with two bolts. The pipe was placed from two to four inches from the bottom of the ditch and then boxed in so there was a solid block of cement around it which was three feet thick and two and one-half feet wide.

The town's share of expenses for this work was the cost of the universal pipe and for the laying of it which amounted to \$688.88. I think this will give us good service without any expense for a long time.

I have attended several Water Works meetings in Boston and also several held in different parts in New Hampshire. They have proved to be instructive and helpful. I expect the New Hampshire Water Works Association will hold one of their meetings here in the spring.

Anyone wishing to visit the Purification Plant is cordially invited to do so by getting in touch with me.

The nursing service has been busy throughout the year. A large amount of corrective work has been done among school children, and together with control of communicable disease has necessitated a large number of home visits to school children.

A Pre-school and Diphtheria Immunization Clinic was held at the Town Hall in May. Sixty children were examined and forty-three received diphtheria immunization. This clinic was sponsored by the State Department of Health, and was conducted by Miss Hazel Waite, State Department of Health nurse. Both local physicians examined the children and gave the Toxoid.

As mentioned in the School report, a Tuberculin Skin Test Clinic was held at the High School.

In November, February and June, the nursing service was visited by Miss Winifred Bonham, Nursing Consultant, American Red Cross, Washington, D. C. In June, Miss Lucy Massey, Director of Nursing, Eastern Area, American National Red Cross, paid the service a visit. Approval of the standards now used was made by Headquarters.

Plans are now being formulated, and it is hoped that by March first, classes in Home Hygiene and Care of the Sick will be under way. These classes are for adult women and are most urgently advised by the American Red Cross in connection with the defense program. The classes are conducted by the local Red Cross nurse.

Classes in First-Aid for girl scouts will be carried throughout the year. Plans are also being formulated, through which a Standard Course in First-Aid for Adults is to be given.

At this time I wish to thank the members of the Local Red Cross Committee, the Physicians, School Board and Teachers, Health Officer and the community as a whole for the cooperation and assistance given to me in promoting the work of the Red Cross Nursing Service.

LIBRARY REPORT

We consider this the most successful year of the last fourteen, the library experienced. The circulation is 300 under the all time high of 1934, but would have far exceeded it, if in the last few months many of our readers had not found employment elsewhere and many more found full time positions. A few new families have moved here and expressed their appreciation in finding a well equipped library located here.

The library was completely redecorated and cleaned this summer. By the loan of two local girls from a Keene N. Y. A. project, we were able to take care of all extra work and also accomplish many other activities which included help at the playground, making of attractive scrap books, a well written

history of the library, etc. The correction of the shelf list was completed and that of the catalog begun and it is hoped this will be finished this summer.



REPORT OF SCHOOL NURSE Year of 1940

I hereby submit my second annual report on school nursing:

Annual physical examination of all pupils was completed in late fall by Dr. Edmund LaChaine, School Physician, assisted by school nurse.

A large amount of corrective work has been done during the year and, at the present time, the need of proper dental treatment is the chief type of corrective work necessary in the coming months. The dental clinic scheduled for April, 1940, was cancelled due to the inability of the dentist engaged to be here. It is hoped that a properly conducted clinic may be arranged by Spring.

In March, a Tuberculin Skin Test Clinic was held at the High School. Students of the High School and upper grades at that school were given the Tuberculin Skin Test, as were five of the Hinsdale teaching staff. 167 in all were examined. Of this number, ten were found to be positive reactors, and were X-rayed at the Elliot Community Hospital. No active cases of pulmonary tuberculosis were found but positive reactors were advised by Dr. Kerr, the examining physician, and further check-up in indicated cases will be made. This clinic was in charge of Dr. Francis Kerr, New Hampshire State Tuberculosis Clinician, assisted by Mrs. Mildred Aiken, County Tuberculosis nurse, and the local school nurse. Students not then present were given the test by both local physicians at a later date. It is hoped that the upper grades of the Hinsdale schools may receive benefit of this clinic every two years.

Cases of communicable diseases have thus far this year been few. Due to proper care of child, exclusion from school if suspected of any illness, and isolation from other school children, the incidence of contagious disease has been reduced. The cooperation existing between parents, teachers, and school nurse has been very good.

The funds made available by the sponsoring of a Milk Fund by the local branch, American Red Cross, milk is this year again distributed at the Bridge Street School. This work began in November and we hope to continue same through April. The same plan as that of last year is in operation, children paying three cents daily, those unable to do so securing the milk through the Fund.

A small office for the school nurse at the Bridge Street School has facilitated the work, making it possible to examine a child, care for minor injuries, etc., under suitable conditions.

The above figures show a slight increase in enrollment. The significance of Hinsdale High School lies not in its number of pupils but what is being done with them.

The complete revamping of the mechanic arts course has opened at last an opportunity for boys that are in need of vovational training and its first accomplishment in reconstructing the cellar has shown the practicality of such a course. No boy who has worked and figured on that construction can be ignorant of the type of work demanded on a construction job.

This course, widened to a full scope, should produce valuable information in electricity, machining, woodworking, auto mechanics and mechanical drawing, producing as by-products, a shooting gallery and possibly a bowling alley, which may give adults, as well as youths, a chance to use its facilities. Mr. Lerandeau deserves the highest possible credit for having been able to create such possibilities.

The Home Economics Department has likewise undergone a thorough renovation and under the leadership of Miss Hall, new equipment and a greatly increased scope of subject matter has been brought in to this department.

The commercial department with Miss Spanos is now ready to produce far better equipped graduates as the increased opportunities for boys no longer forces seventy percent of the school to take commerce, regardless of desire or ability. This reduction gives those really interested an honest opportunity to make good.

The classical course, under Miss Carnegie's guidance, is producing well-trained pupils. Parents advising children would do well to consider the needs and abilities of these children before demanding that they take the strictly classical course.

The chemistry laboratory and the science department has come in for its share of reconditioning and Mr. Smith is thus building the foundation of efficient scientific instruction in these branches.

Miss Beaudreault, whose social subjects are so vitally necessary at this time, has brought in much to keep these subjects up-to-date and the popularity of these courses testifies as to the efficiency of the teacher.

Miss Shirley Mayhew, with the sixth grade, has been made a part of the functioning school system in so far as she is an accredited teacher for all subjects up through the 10th year, and has on that basis been assigned to teach subjects above grade 6.

Grade 6 has been rotated in teachers and room assignments to accustom them to the high school program.

A system of physical exercise has been installed for both boys and girls.

The school band has thirty-four participants at the present time, either in the band or taking lessons so as to become members. They hope to be able to compete at the state band competition held in the spring.

The Glee Club, with Miss Brinton's direction, is enjoying a pleasant and profitable year.

The Outing Club is as popular as ever and with Mr. Lerandeau and Miss Hall, have enjoyed several evenings of healthy and stimulating exercise.

The Dramatic Club of the senior class, which is run on a voluntary basis, has an active membership of twenty-two out of the twenty-five in school members of the class. All members of the dramatic club will participate in some capacity this year.

Miss Kelley's able assistance has helped our health and attendance records for this year. Her cooperation and interest has done much to improve the physical condition of many of our pupils, especially in respect to vision.

The condition of the High School building is excellent and Mr. Packard is maintaining this situation in an able and efficient manner.

Parents are asked to help us in determining the vocations of high school pupils which will allow us to pick courses and prepare them for such vocations if we know in advance what the interests of the pupils are.

We also would appreciate calls, conferences and visits by any that could find time to see the school in action.

The friendly cooperation of the parents, school board, superintendent and teachers has made the work a pleasure during the past year.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Hinsdale:

I have the honor to submit my third annual report.

Teachers: Six withdrawals took place from the Hinsdale teaching staff during the past summer. The Misses Elizabeth Tarney, Elizabeth MacLalan, Margaret Colby and Mary Ryan all resigned to get married. Miss Louisa Towne and Miss Shirley Haven acepted more lucrative offers in out of state systems.

To fill these positions, the School Board elected the following:

Grade IV, Bridge, Anna T. Moran, Westfield Teachers College Grades I-VI, inc., Monument, Eileen Laurie, Keene Teachers College

Grades I-VI, incl., Plains, Rosetta B. Lowe, Keene Normal

Mr. Morris Smith was appointed by the School Board as an additional teacher in the Science and History departments of the junior and senior high school. This appointment has released Headmaster Johnson from practically full-time teaching and enables him to devote some time to administration and supervision.

The work of all these teachers has been of high grade and the results secured in all departments have been commendable.

Buildings and Grounds: During the summer of 1940, the usual minor and necessary repairs were made in all the buildings, such as general cleaning, painting and varnishing where needed. Some additional work accomplished in the two village schools was as follows:

Bridge Street School: Slate blackboards installed in all of the rooms. The replacement of the old composition blackboards was necessary as writing on them was not visible from any great distance.

Clothing wardrobe built for the pupils of the second grade. This new addition does not only provide space for the hanging of clothes but also enables the second grade children to leave the building without disturbing the third grade by passing through the latter's room.

Small office for the school nurse built in a section of the first grade. This office enables the nurse to have privacy in her duties of health examination. Previously, physical examinations were held in the hallways or vacant rooms, a condition not conducive to the efficiency of this type of work.

Basement exits built from the toilet rooms of the boys and girls to the school yard. Previously, all children, in order to leave the basements, had to go back up the narrow stairs leading to the hall way. These exits now provide a way out in case of fire or other emergency and are well worth the cost of installing them.

High School: Rearrangement of Commercial Department rooms. The transfer of the Manual Training Department from the first floor to the basement permitted the former woodworking room to be used for bookkeeping and shorthand classes. Increased efficiency has been brought by this measure as the typewriting department has been given a larger and less congested room.

Office for Headmaster. The former typewriting room is now used for an administrative office as well as a place for physical examinations and conferences by the school nurse. The general arrangement of this room as well as its furnishings was turned over to the advanced class in general household management under the direction of Miss Marion Hall.

Home Economics room. This room has been redecorated and the furniture rearranged. The room is used by the Home Economics Department. Formerly, it had been used for academic classes during certain periods of the day. The Manual Training Department has been very helpful in making articles such as medium-sized bookcases, new wall ironing board, etc. Several pieces of equipment have been purchased from or loaned by merchants. Two new stoves, one gas, and one electric, have been acquired. These new ranges replaces three very antiquated oil stoves. The Universal electric stove comes as a loan from the Twin State Gas and Electric Company in Brattleboro. The Round Pak gas range has been loaned by Taylor's Hardware Company. A new six-foot Norge electric refrigerator, replacing the box outside of the window, has also been purchased from Taylor's Hardware Company.

New Shop for Manual Training: The building of the new shop for the Mechanic Arts Department may be listed as the major project for the year. This work has been done under the supervision of Mr. Lerandeau by the boys enrolled in the Building and Construction classes of the High school. It has added approximately 1,300 square feet of usable floor space to the building. Practically all the work was done by the boys with the exception of the cement exits and abutments leading from the basement to the yard, as well as some of the electric wiring. It is expected that this room will be finished by April 1, 1941.

Chemistry Laboratory: Mr. Smith reports that the laboratory facilities of the Chemistry room have been improved and supplemented by a reorganization of storage space, cupboards, etc. This rearrangement has nearly doubled the usable space,

thereby making room for more students to do adequate work. A large part of the work of remodelling was done by the Mechanic Arts Department.

Janitor Service: A large part of the fine looking appearance of the two village schools is due to the interest of the two janitors, Mr. Stephen Packard of the High School and Mr. Fred Latham of the Bridge Street School. Not only have they kept the buildings warm and clean but have also assisted in making minor repairs wherever necessary.

Instructional Activities: This report does not permit a detailed discussion of instructional activities throughout the year. There are some, however, which are worthy of brief mention, namely:

- 1. Introduction of the Palmer Method of Handwriting.
- 2. More emphasis on both oral and silent reading.
- 3. Wider use of the radio for special school broadcasts.
- 4. Increased attention on the part of the teachers to the unit or contract plan of instruction.
- 5. Introduction of physical training exercises in the high school.
 - 6. Semi-departmentalization of the sixth grade.
- 7. The strengthening of the courses in vacational work in the senior high school.

Playground Facilities: A new community playground has been made available through the efforts of a number of local residents. This field is located a short distance from the high school and was extensively used during the Fall for baseball and outdoor basketball games.

School Budget: The estimated budget for the next fiscal year is \$31,847. This amount is \$3,400 more than this year's appropriation. In this \$3,400, the sum of \$2,200 is for extraordinary expenses incurred for running the schools this year for which the School Board had not contemplated at this time last year. Such items were the hiring of an additional teacher in the

high school building, the installation of more length of blackboard in the Bridge Street School, the building of fire exits in the same building, and an increase in the cost of transportation made necessary by new rules and regulations issued by the Motor Vehicle Department in Concord.

The School Board calls your attention to a special article in the warrant for an expenditure of approximately \$400.00. This is for a fence at the Bridge Street School to more adequately protect the children from traffic hazards.

In conclusion, I wish to express my appreciation to the teachers and pupils, to the School Board, and to the parents and patrons of our schools for their loyalty and cooperation.
