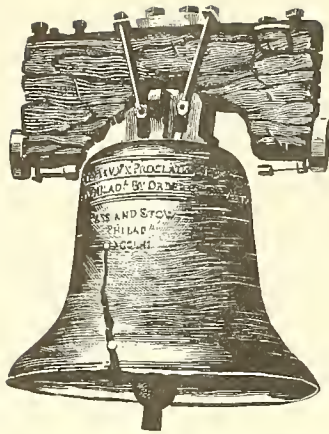

## PUBLIC SERVICE

Commenting on Lee Mingledorff's intention not to seek reelection as Mayor of Savannah, Georgia, Judd Arnett in his *Savannah Morning News* column of March 2, 1958, made some sage observations on public service which are worth wider distribution. After praising Mayor Mingledorff for having done "a sterling job under adverse conditions," the columnist continued:

"In politics, as in civic affairs in general, it is one thing to sit on the sidelines and carp and hoot, but it is something else again to offer your time, your energy and perhaps some of your hardearned pelf to the cause of public betterment.

"Getting away from politics for a minute, let us say that no matter where you go in America, there is always a 'hard core' of the civic-minded doing the bulk of the work which, in the long run, aids the public at large. It seems to be human nature for the majority of us citizens to 'let George do it,' and as a result a mere handful of stalwarts run themselves bowlegged in behalf of community welfare and advancement while the rest of us blandly permit the world around us to go hang.

"The worst of it, however, is that those who serve year in and year out in various capacities seldom receive public acclaim for their efforts. Some of the most unpopular men we have known were among those who did the most to aid their communities.

"What, then, prompts even the few to serve? Well, we are told that there is a good deal of personal satisfaction to be gained from making a community blossom, but chiefly the urge to be of benefit strikes either those who are in business, and thus being in hock up to their eyebrows must make the mare go or wind up in bankruptcy, or afflicts those who are in love with the communities where they have decided to spend the rest of their lives.

"In either case the reaction is the same. The faithful servants persevere and absorb the slings and arrows of criticism, or withstand the worst indictment of all—public apathy—because they know that no community stands still. It progresses or dies on the vine, and take your choice.

"It requires an endless number of proddings, coaxings, pleadings and alarm-rings to lead a community inch-by-inch along Progress Pike, especially when many of the people are dragging their feet. Fortunately, there are always men and women, the cream of our citizenry, who are willing to lead the way, even though they know in advance that they aren't likely to receive an ovation in the court house square for their efforts."

# Town Warrant

## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Hooksett in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Hooksett Memorial School Auditorium, in said Hooksett on Tuesday, the tenth (10th) day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to cast your ballots for Town Officers. Polls close at 6:30 P. M., action on remainder of warrant starts at 7 P. M.

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To choose two (2) delegates to the Constitutional Convention. (Separate ballot).

3. To vote on the question "Shall Sweepstakes tickets be sold in this town?" (Separate ballot)

4. Shall the Town of Hooksett continue to maintain its existing Municipal Court, so long as its present Judge remains in office? (On bottom of Town Ballot.)

5. To see if the Town will vote to give a discount of two (2%) per cent on all taxes, except poll taxes, paid on or before the fifteenth (15th) day of July, and to grant the Selectmen authority to extend this date if unable to get tax rate from State Tax Commission as of July 1st.

6. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of 1964 taxes, to be repaid therefrom.

7. To hear the reports of the Selectmen, Town Treasurer, Agents, Auditors and Committees, or other officers heretofore chosen or appointed, and to pass any vote relating thereto.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred thirty-seven dollars and seventy-four cents (\$537.74) the State to furnish three thousand five hundred eighty-four dollars and ninety-four cents (\$3584.94) the same to be expended

under the State Highway Department for Class V Town Road Assistance, or take any action thereto.

APPROVED BY BUDGET COMMITTEE

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed sixteen thousand eight hundred dollars (\$16,800.00) for the purchase of a new Class A 750 gallon per minute pumper for the South Hooksett Fire Department. This sum to be borrowed on the credit of the Town and amortized over a period of six (6) years. Yearly payments to be withdrawn from the Capital Reserve Fund of the Town. Inserted by petition.

APPROVED BY BUDGET COMMITTEE

10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize its Board of Selectmen to file, on behalf of the Town, an application, in form and manner required by the United States, and in conformity with Public Law 560, 83rd Congress, as amended, and to enter into such negotiations and do whatever else may be required for an advance, in an amount not to exceed sixty-one thousand dollars, (\$61,000.00), to be made by the United States to the Town of Hooksett to finance the cost of engineering, surveying, design and plans for construction drawings and specifications for sewers, interceptors, sewage disposal facilities and appurtenant works, as laid out in the "Report on the Proposed Interceptors, Sewer Extensions and Sewage Treatment Facilities for the Town of Hooksett, New Hampshire," and to furnish the United States with such other documents and information and to take such other action as may be required for this purpose.

APPROVED BY BUDGET COMMITTEE

11. To see if the Town will vote to accept the Budget, as submitted by the Budget Committee, or take any other action in relation thereto.

12. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following ordinance, relative to burning rubbish.

1. PROHIBITION. It shall be unlawful, at all times, for any person, persons, firm or corporation to burn, or incinerate, any rubbish, refuse, garbage or other waste material

within the limits of any residential or commercial district of the Town of Hooksett, as defined by the Town's Zoning Ordinance, except as herein provided.

2. Permits; Where special circumstances exist whereby such burning or incinerating will not be obnoxious to the neighborhood because of smoke, odor or other reason and will not constitute a health or fire hazard in the opinion of the Health and Fire Departments, the Board of Selectmen, may, upon application showing the above facts, grant a permit for such burning or incineration. Permits so issued shall be valid at such times and for the burning of such materials as are specified therein.

3. PENALTY; The violation of any provision of the Ordinance shall be punishable by a fine of not more than (\$10.00) dollars for each offense.

13. Any and all materials, of which more than \$200.00 worth is bought in one year by any department, precinct, or district of the Town of Hooksett, shall be advertised for bids, in the Manchester Union Leader, and, whenever possible, by five (5) suppliers of materials involved, in Manchester, Concord and especially in Hooksett. Whenever possible, materials of like nature shall be bid on separately. (INSERTED BY PETITION)

14. All vehicles, including trucks, tractors, graders, etc., shall be advertised for bids in Manchester Paper. Specifications set up shall include any and all extras or options. Bids shall be sent to at least five (5) potential bidders.

(INSERTED BY PETITION)

15. Annual fuel supply of any and all buildings, able to take bulk shipments, shall be lumped together and advertised for bids. All buildings using 2,500 gallons of oil or more shall have bulk tanks installed, if feasible. All buildings that can be converted to burn #4 Fuel Oil shall be converted if it can be done at a reasonable cost.

16. Assessment of property shall be printed every five (5) years in Town Warrant or separately, using format used by State of New Hampshire in reassessing property in 1956.

(INSERTED BY PETITION)

17. No equipment, owned by the Town of Hooksett, shall be used for or on private property, except for churches or community property.

## TO ALL RESIDENTS OF THE TOWN OF HOOKSETT

It is with pleasure, that your Board of Selectmen submit herewith their annual report covering the status of the official business of the Town of Hooksett for the year 1963. The year past has been marked, as have previous years, by steady progress in the field of municipal affairs. The ability of the various departments comprising the government of this town have shown during the past year a marked facility and ability to adapt themselves to rapidly changing times and conditions.

The economic growth of this town has remained constant and is consistent with the growth of the previous five years. Nearly \$600,000 dollars of new property evaluation was added to the tax roles in 1963. This fact alone would indicate to some extent the importance of adaptability by the officials who are responsible for the services provided by the Town.

Last years' Town Meeting was the most heavily attended in the memory of this Board of Selectmen. As the meeting progressed, and as each article was presented for consideration, the discussion became more spirited and searching. This type of meeting was of course desirable because the interest of the people in their Town affairs was fully demonstrated and also the basic concept of democracy in action was completely exemplified.

All articles voted upon in the affirmative at the 1963 meeting have been implemented according to the provisions of the same. Article eight authorizing the purchase of a new truck resulted in the town's acquiring a new Mack dump truck at the purchase price of \$5,475.00 plus trade. This truck has already proved its worth especially in the winter maintenance of our highways as it has replaced the town grader as a method of plowing and has resulted in a considerable saving and at the same time has accomplished a much more satisfactory job.

Article ten, the provisions of which, created a recreation commission has been implemented. The Selectmen appointed the following men to this commission: Roland Casey, Merle Blakeley, Armand Cote, Donald Botsford and Hendrik Kate. Needless to say, these men face a difficult task, but if the citizens of Hooksett are really interested in a program of recreation for our young people and are willing to give this commission their support and cooperation the task of the commissioners will be lightened and within a short space of time it will be possible for us to have a recreational program in which we can all take pride.

The articles pertaining to the restraint of dogs and those covering changes and additions to the zoning ordinance have been incorporated into the Towns' list of permanent ordinances and have been enforced according to the provisions of the articles.

Construction work on the new Town Garage and Fire Station #1 has been completed. It should be in everyone's interest to inspect these two facilities. We believe that these fine structures are a very definite indicator of the town's growth and progress. The installation of the bulk salt bin and gasoline pump at the new garage should at the present time result in a savings of at least fifteen hundred dollars a year and this sum will undoubtedly increase in the future.

As many of you already know, The Palazzi Corporation (heavy construction) has chosen Hooksett as a base for its New Hampshire operations. We are indeed very happy that Mr. Palazzi has decided to locate with us. Mr. Palazzi has expressed his warm appreciation to the Town and notably to the members of the Selectmens' Industrial Advisory Council for their thoughts and assistance in the establishment of his project.

The financial condition of the town appears to be in excellent shape. It is of interest to note that the long term debt of the town will decrease to \$3,000.00 in 1964. This has been brought about by the establishment of and the judicious use of our capital reserve fund. A study of the financial statement of the town will also show that the town closed the fiscal year 1963 with a budget surplus of \$4,000.00

As usual our Fire Department and Police Department have fulfilled their duties and obligations in an admirable manner. May we extend our appreciation and thanks to the Chiefs and men of these respective departments.

We would certainly be remiss if we failed to note the excellent performance of duty by appointed officials of the Planning Board and the Board of Adjustment, again may we say "Well done".

Elsewhere in this Town Report you will find a summary of the activities of the Cemetery Commission, we believe, this report will speak for itself. Also included elsewhere you will find a summary of the Sewer Survey as conducted by Morgenroth Associates, Civil Engineers of Boston, Mass.



May we close this report by extending our heartfelt thanks to all elected and appointed town officials whose help and cooperation have been instrumental in making 1963 a successful and progressive year in the record of our town.

## ABSTRACT OF ACTION ON ARTICLES IN WARRANT

MARCH 12, 1963 TOWN MEETING.

Meeting called to order by the Moderator Geroge A. Cook at ten o'clock in the forenoon at Memorial School Auditorium and that portion of the Warrant calling this meeting read. Reading of the balance of the Warrant deferred until seven o'clock in the evening.

Voted that the polls remain open until the conclusion of voting on articles in the Warrant.

ARTICLE 1. Officers chosen in open meeting not on the ballot: SURVEYORS OF WOOD AND LUMBER - Stanley Spiewack, Alfred Rousseau and William Courser. WEIGHERS OF COMMODITIES: Homer Enderson, Rutger Broek, Leslie M. Pike, John Bates, Roland Casey, James Gilbert and Edward O'Connor. FENCE VIEWERS: George A. Cook, George Blakeslee, Vernon Robinson and Edward DuDevoir. Those chosen were duly sworn in with the exception of Edward DuDevoir, since deceased.

ARTICLE 2. Voted to give a discount of 2% on all taxes except poll and head taxes if paid on or before the 15th of July and to grant the Selectmen authority to extend this date if unable to get rate from the State Tax Commission as of July 1st.

ARTICLE 3. Upon motion duly made and supported, it was voted to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of the 1963 taxes to be repaid therefrom.

ARTICLE 4. Following clarification of a specific item in Town Officers expense of \$177.00 requested by a voter, which information was furnished by Selectman Pike. Motion was made and duly seconded that this article be adopted.

ARTICLE 5. Voted the sum of \$532.17 be raised by the Town, the State to furnish \$3,547.81 the same to be expended on Class V Town Road Assistance.

ARTICLE 6. Motion made and carried that the salary of the Town Treasurer be increased from \$300.00 to \$400.00.

ARTICLE 7. Moved and supported to increase the annual salary of the Selectmen from its present \$600.00 for the Chairman and \$550.00 for the other two members, to \$700.00 and \$650.00 respectively.

ARTICLE 8. Voted to raise and appropriate \$5, 500.00 for a new dump truck. The sum to be borrowed on the credit of the Town and amortized over a period of three years the yearly payments to be withdrawn from the Capital Reserve Fund of the town.

ARTICLE 9. Following considerable discussion relative to this article which called for appointment of the Road Agent by the Selectmen instead of being elected by ballot, Moderator called for a standing vote for and against adoption of the article following which the article was defeated, and so declared by the Moderator.

ARTICLE 10. Voted to establish a Recreation Commission as outlined in State Statutes 1955 Section 31-44 to 3:-48 and section 31-47.

ARTICLE 11. Moved and supported that the all-night parking ordinance be amended, which amendment forbids parking between the hours of eleven P.M. and 6 A.M., under penalty of \$20.00 fine.

ARTICLE 12. Following motion by Bradley Berger, duly seconded that the dog ordinance covered by this article be adopted, three separate amendments were offered from the floor, all of which were voted on in the negative, following which Moderator called for vote on the original motion and declared the article adopted on voice vote. The ordinance reads as follows:

1. PROHIBITION:--No owner or keeper of a dog, or dogs, shall permit such dog, or dogs, to remain outside his home, whether confined or not, between the hours of 10 o'clock P.M., and 5 o'clock A.M., if such dog or dogs shall disturb the peace of the neighbors by reason of loud barking or other undue noise. All kennel owners shall keep their dogs confined indoors between the hours specified herein.

2. WARNING:--Any person disturbed by the failure of any owner or keeper of a dog, or dogs, to comply with the provisions of section one hereof, may petition the Board of Selectmen, in writing, to require such compliance. Upon receipt of such petition the Board of Selectmen shall cause the Police Department to serve a written warning on the dog owner or keeper so complained of, ordering compliance with this ordinance.

3. PENALTY:--If any person upon whom a warning has been served, as provided in section two hereof, shall refuse or neglect to comply with the order contained in said warning for forty-eight hours after such service, he shall be fined ten (\$10.00) dollars for each such offense.

4. TAKES EFFECT:--This ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.

ARTICLE 13. Upon motion duly made and supported, it was voted to dismiss this article which called for the Selectmen to refuse the use of town owned equipment on any private or business property without express permission and a charge being made for use of the same.

ARTICLE 14. Moved and seconded that this article having to do with fencing trailer parks be not adopted, Discussion. Put to a vote, Moderator declared article defeated.

ARTICLE 15. Motion to adopt this article was made and duly seconded. Selectman Follansbee offered information relative to the expense of printing property valuations in the Town Report. Put to a vote, Moderator declared article defeated.

ARTICLE 16. This article, having to do with setting up a committee for use of land for recreation purposes, not being approved by the Budget Committee, was passed over by the Moderator without action being taken.

ARTICLE 17. Upon motion made and duly seconded, it was voted to adopt the budget as printed.

The following amendments to existing Zoning Ordinances, presented under separate articles, were voted on in the affirmative:

ARTICLE 18. Voted to amend Article 111, Section B, of the line thereof and substituting the words "One year" so that the first sentence of said section shall read as follows:

"No owner or occupant of land in any District shall permit fire, or other ruins to be left, but shall remove the same to ground level within one year, except in case of hardship an extension of time could be granted."

ARTICLE 19. Voted to amend Article 111, Section H. by striking out the Heading thereof and the whole of Paragraph 1 thereof and substituting therefor the following new heading and new paragraphs.

#### H. MOBILE HOMES:

1. Every mobile home occupied as a dwelling in the Town of Hooksett shall be located in a licensed Mobile Home park, except as provided in Paragraphs 2 and 3 below.

2. The provisions of this section shall not apply to the continued use and occupancy of any mobile home used as a dwelling as of the date of the passage of this Section, nor to a mobile home hereafter acquired as a replacement by the owner of a mobile home so used. Provided, however, that if a mobile home

occupied as a dwelling as of said date shall be moved from its present location, the subsequent use of such mobile home must comply with the provisions of Paragraph 1 of this section.

3. Any property owner or lessee may accommodate the mobile home of a non-paying guest for a period not exceeding thirty (30) days in any one year. Provided that in cases where hardship would otherwise result the Board of Adjustment may make extensions of time for such occupancy for a period not to exceed six months for each such extension, upon a finding that such extension will not be detrimental to the neighborhood.

ARTICLE 20. Voted to further amend Article 111, Section H. as follows:

A. Insert the following new heading before Paragraph 2 of said section so that Paragraphs 2 through 7 shall be a part of said new heading.

#### I. MOBILE HOME PARKS.

B. Add the following new paragraph under Section I as inserted by the preceding amendment.

1. Mobile Home Parks may be located in a commercial district, and in no other district in the Town, provided they meet the requirements of this Ordinance.

C. Delete the whole Paragraph 4A and substitute the following new Paragraph therefor.

A. Each mobile home space shall contain a minimum of 10,000 square feet and shall have a frontage of not less than one hundred feet on a roadway of not less than 40 feet, if off-street parking is provided, otherwise 50 feet. Such spaces shall be clearly defined and mobile homes shall be so parked as to comply with the front yard, side and back yard requirements for residences in a Residential district.

D. Delete the following sentence beginning on line 11 of Paragraph 3, "Sewage disposal by means of individual septic tanks for each mobile home is prohibited unless the space provided for such mobile home shall not be less than 10,000 square feet, with a frontage of not less than 100 feet."

E. Delete the words "Trailer and/or" where-ever they appear in Paragraphs 2 through 7 of said Section.

F. Add the following new Paragraph at the end of said Section.

#### 8. LICENSES.

A. No Mobile Home Park, whether newly constructed or presently existing, shall be operated after the date of the passage of this amendment until it shall first have been licensed to operate by the Board of Selectmen.

B. Mobile Home Park licenses shall be issued, without fee, by the Board of Selectmen, upon application of the owner of the Park, annually, and shall expire on the 15th day of March following their issuance. Such licenses must be posted in a conspicuous place on the premises at all times.

C. Applications for licenses shall be made annually and shall show the name and address of the owner of the Park, the location of the Park, the number of mobile homes presently located there, the number of spaces available and such other information as the Selectmen may require. The first such application shall be accompanied by a plan of the park drawn to scale, showing the location of streets, mobile home spaces, drainage, sanitary and water facilities and all renewal applications shall be accompanied by information as to any changes in the original plan, or in the discretion of the Board of Selectmen, a new plan when such changes are numerous.

ARTICLE 21. Voted to amend Article VI of the Zoning Ordinance by adding the following new Section at the end thereof:

#### F. LOT AREA REQUIRED.

1. The lot area, where a public water supply is available, shall not be less than 10,000 square feet and the frontage of such lots shall not be less than 100 feet.

2. The lot area, where a public water supply is not available, shall not be less than 22,500 square feet and the frontage of such lots shall not be less than 150 feet.

ARTICLE 22. Voted to amend Article XV, Section B. of the Zoning Ordinance, by adding the following sentences at the end thereof:

"The term public right-of-way, as used herein, shall include any private right-of-way which is not less than 40 feet in width and which is in a location approved by the proper Town authorities, so that it could, by compliance with the Town's Ordinance regarding new streets and extensions of existing streets, become a public street at some time in the future."

ARTICLE 23. Voted to amend Article XV of the Zoning Ordinance by adding the following new Section at the end thereof:



## REPORT ON PROPOSED SEWERAGE SYSTEM

### AND TREATMENT FACILITIES

The voters of Hooksett at the annual town meeting in 1962 voted to authorize the Board of Selectmen to file, on behalf of the Town, an application, in form and manner required by the United States, and in conformity with Public Law 560, 83rd Congress, as amended, and to enter into such negotiations and do whatever else is required for an advance, in an amount not to exceed thirteen thousand (\$13,000.00) dollars, to be made by the United States to the Town of Hooksett to aid in defraying the cost of surveys, reports and plan preparation for sewerage and sewerage treatment facilities for the Town of Hooksett.

This article was approved by the town budget committee and they said the following in their report. "The committee is definitely in favor of this article due to the manner in which this loan is made available. It is our understanding that once this survey is completed and if it is the desire of the Town not to pursue this problem any further, the amount of the loan need not be repaid. However, if it is decided to go ahead with the construction of such a system the amount of the loan automatically becomes part of the overall construction cost. Taking into consideration that the cleaning up of our waterways will be a must in the not too distant future the Committee believes that this is a wise undertaking."

In mid summer of 1962, the Selectmen of Hooksett, Pembroke and Allenstown decided that by hiring the same engineering firm each town could save a considerable sum. The three towns interviewed seven firms and unanimously voted to hire Morgenroth & Associates, Inc. of Boston, Massachusetts to conduct the sewer survey for the three towns. The cost for Hooksett's survey was \$7,800.00. Numerous meetings were held with the engineers in the office and field. On November 14, 1963 the report of the survey was reviewed and accepted by the State of New Hampshire, C.W. Metcalf, Director of Municipal Services. The report contains 52 pages, 21 charts and plans. We plan to have all of this material displayed at this year's Town Meeting plus the aerial survey that was taken. Three copies of the survey are available at the Selectmen's Office for anyone desiring to borrow them. We are printing what we believe to be the highlights of the report.

Excerpts from the Report On The Proposed Sewerage System and Sewerage Treatment Facilities for the Town of Hooksett, N.H. by Morgenroth & Associates, Inc., Consulting Engineers, Boston, Mass.

O. MOBILE HOMES: Any vehicle or structure so designed or constructed in such manner as will permit occupancy thereof as living quarters for one or more persons and so designed that it is, or may be mounted on wheels and used as a conveyance on highways or town streets, propelled or drawn by its own or other motive power.

Following the voting on articles in the Warrant, Selectman Oscar Morin, Jr. introduced George A. Cook who, having served a period of thirty years as the town's road agent, retired as of January 1st 1963. Cook was given a standing ovation by those present in appreciation of his services, and responded fittingly.

Previously sworn in as Assistant Moderator, Wilfred Buck conducted the business session of this meeting which was closed following the ovation to Cook.

Those having a majority of votes cast as well as those unopposed were declared by the Moderator to be elected, and were duly sworn to office in open meeting except Library Trustee, who qualified before Charles R. Hardy, Town Clerk on March 18th.

Following counting of the ballots and declaration of the result in open meeting, upon motion to the Moderator, meeting declared adjourned at 9:45 P. M.

## II. THE PROBLEM

The built-up area known as Hooksett Village, is almost completely sewerred. The sewers are so-called combined sewers, that is they carry the combined sanitary and storm flow. There are three outfalls on the east bank and four outfalls on the west bank of the Merrimack River, all of them discharging raw sewage into the river.

South Hooksett has three lines which carry surface run-off and untreated sewage into open ditches or swampy areas.

Therefore the problem is:

1. To lay out an overall sewer system, a sewer master plan which covers the entire town area.
2. Within the frame work of this master plan, to lay out the facilities needed to eliminate pollution in Hooksett Village.
  - a. To design and lay out the interceptors to intercept the existing outfalls.
  - b. To design and lay out such other appurtenances as are needed to carry the sewage to the sewage treatment plant.
3. Within the frame work of this master plan, to lay out the facilities needed to eliminate pollution and the odor nuisance in South Hooksett.
4. To design and lay out the sewage disposal facilities.
5. To establish the costs of construction, operation and maintenance and make recommendations as to the possible ways of financing. The layout has to be so flexible that it can be extended to serve in the future any area where expansion of any kind - residential, commercial or industrial - may take place.

## XIII. SUMMARY AND RECOMMENDATIONS

### a. Technical Data:

That the entire Town including South Hooksett, with the exception of a small area bordering on Manchester, should be drained towards a central sewage treatment plant, that it is economical and advisable to drain this small southernmost area bordering on Manchester by gravity towards Manchester, but that the sewage could be pumped into the South Hooksett system, should the necessity arise;

That the treatment plant should be located near the Merrimack River, just north of the proposed Industrial Park;

That the central part of the Town-approximately between the intersection of Routes 3 and 28 in the south and Route 3 and Main Street (Hooksett Village) in the north, and including the Industrial Park, can be sewerred by gravity, while the wastes from Hooksett Village and from South Hooksett, must be pumped into the main system;

That the location, the design and the layout of the sewer treatment facilities are so, that the Town can accept any industrial wastes and possibly very few with pretreatment of certain process wastes;

That it is more economical to separate the existing combined sewers than to carry the combined storm and sanitary flows to the treatment plant.

### b. Financial Data:

The total costs of the project are estimated at \$1,514,000.00. Federal and State Grants would amount to \$804,600.00, contribution by developers to \$34,000.00, while the Town's share would be \$675,400.00. If the money is raised by general taxation, the tax rate would be increased an average of \$2.88 per year for a 30-year bond issue and an average of \$3.75 per year for a 20-year bond issue.

If the yearly payments for amortization and interest were raised by general taxation while the cost of maintenance and operation were paid by the users as a percentage of the water rent (not including the amount raised by precinct taxes), the payments would amount to an average increase of the tax rate of \$2.20 and an additional 37% of the water bill paid by the users for a 30-year bond issue or an average increase of the tax rate of \$3.04 and an additional 43% of the water bill paid by the users for a 20-year bond issue.

### c. Recommendations:

We recommend

1. That the Town adopt a systematic program of sewerred the built-up areas and the development areas, not yet serviced by a sewer system.

2. That, as the first phase of construction, those interceptors and those facilities be built, which are needed to eliminate the present pollution.

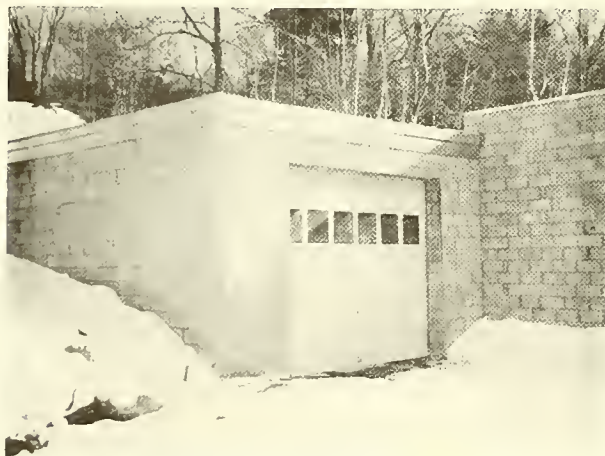
3. That the Town negotiate with the City of Manchester, that Manchester accept at reasonable terms the wastes from the southernmost area bordering on Manchester and including Arah Street and Bartlett Street.

4. That-subject to an acceptable agreement with the City of Manchester-those pipe lines which will cross the proposed Interstate Highway, be laid prior to or as a part of the construction of the Interstate Highway.

5. That the Town finance the construction by General Obligation Bonds and raise the amount needed by a combination of general taxation and sewer service charge.

6. That the Town take advantage of the Federal Advance available for Public Works Planning and apply with the Housing and Home Finance Agency for an interest-free loan to have the construction drawings and specifications for the first phase of construction worked out, so that the Town is ready to invite bids and to secure Federal and State Grants any time the Town Meeting authorizes construction of any part of the proposed system.

We urge every one to view the display of charts and maps at Town Meeting.

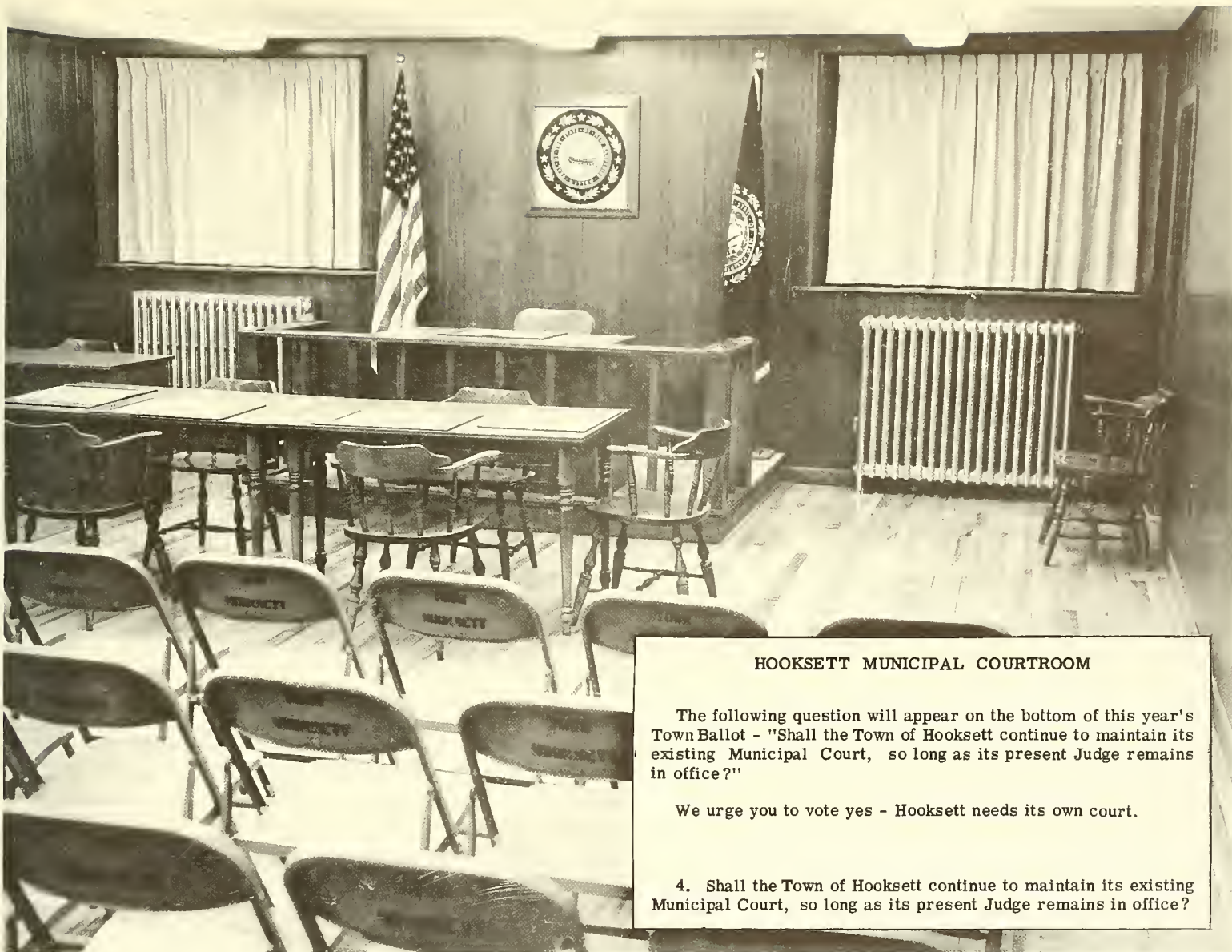
Every fall when our tax bill arrives and I read your little note of explanation, I take a few minutes to reflect on what it means.

## REPORT OF THE BUDGET COMMITTEE

### GENERAL COMMENT

A total of six meetings were required of the Budget Committee for the preparation of the 1964 budgets. The first meeting, January 14th- Town Budget, second meeting, January 21st -Water Precincts, third meeting, January 28th- School District. The Open or Public meeting was held on February 5th with 51 persons in attendance. Due to the work load, two closed meetings were required before the final budgets could be completed and approved.

The total of the approved budget shows an increase of \$41,963.80 over the previous year. Of this increase \$32,908.23 is slated for School purposes and \$9,055.57 for Town purposes.

Due to a new law enacted at the last session of the General Court the Town is required to vote to see if we wish to retain our Municipal Court. If this vote were to be in the negative all cases now handled in our Court would be processed in the District Court at Concord and by so doing would decrease our annual revenues by approximately \$5,000.00. For this amount of income to be raised by taxation would require over \$125,000.00 in extra property valuation. The Committee feels that the loss of this Court would be detrimental to the Town and we wish to urge all to vote "yes" at Town Meeting and thereby retain our Court as presently set up and also the revenue received therefrom.

### TOWN BUDGET

An examination of the 1964 requirements submitted by the various department heads and the Board of Selectmen leaves us with little doubt that these conscientious and dedicated public servants have again, as in previous years, restricted their demands for funds to the very minimum requirements necessary to operate for the ensuing year and thereby resulting in an increase in the Town budget of less than \$10,000.00.

The Committee is aware that this cannot continue much longer. The Town has been showing an increase in assessed valuation of over one-half million dollars per year and with this trend continuing many, if not all of these departments shall be forced to demand increases so as to enable them to furnish the necessary services required of them.

The newly established Parks & Playgrounds Committee submitted an appropriation demand of \$8,809.00. It is felt necessary to reduce this amount to \$2,500.00. This Committee has been in force for less than one year and although it is felt that this is a good committee, it is believed that a long range program should be initiated for the maintenance and improvements of our parks and playgrounds so that fund appropriations can be used to the best advantage for the Town.

## ARTICLE #9

This article pertains to the purchase of a new fire apparatus. From information given to us this proposed apparatus is to replace an engine of the South Hooksett department which has been in continuous service for the past 26 years and is now unsafe to be used as an emergency vehicle. The last new apparatus purchased by the Town is now ten years old and a survey of the existing vehicles of both fire departments indicates that two other apparatus presently in service are now or soon will be in need of replacement.

It is felt that a replacement program should be initiated for the Town fire equipment so as to keep all of this equipment at the required standards necessary for proper and efficient fire protection of the community. As a start towards this goal, the Committee has given approval to this article.

## ARTICLE #10

This article pertains to the borrowing of \$61,000.00 from the federal government for the creation of blue prints and construction drawings for a sewage disposal system for the Town. This loan is made available to the Town in the same manner in which the federal loan was approved and received in 1962. The survey for which the 1962 loan was granted has been completed and the next step is to go ahead with the final construction plans so that we will be ready to start with the actual construction if and when the proper federal grant is made available or that the Town is forced to clean up its pollution problem. As in the previous loan this money is not to be repaid until such time as the actual construction is approved. The Committee has approved this article.

## WATER PRECINCTS

Both the Hooksett Village and the Central Hooksett Water precincts continue to operate in a thrifty manner. The budget increase of each precinct is approximately \$1,100.00 and an examination shows that this is due to normal increase and expansion of their services. It is felt that the budget increases will be offset by an increase in revenue from these expansions and should not require an increase in the precinct tax rate.

Not having accepted the recommendations of this Committee for the past two years it is noted that nowhere does it appear that the Central Hooksett Water precinct has been audited at the end of each calendar year. It is again strongly recommended that the services of the State of New Hampshire, Division of Municipal



Accounting be requested thru an article introduced into the precinct warrant to perform the yearly audit and that audit be published in the annual Town report as required by Chapter 184 of the Laws of 1955.

### SCHOOL DISTRICT

The meeting pertaining to the School budget was held on January 28th with Mr. Moore, Mr. Sanborn and Mr. Buck in attendance. The 1964-65 requirements were reviewed item by item and a comparison was made with the previous approved budget. The total increase in this budget amounted to \$40,363.23. After a careful study and consideration of each item it was felt necessary to reduce the budget in the amount of \$7,205.00. Items decreased include: Salaries \$3,137.00, Fuel and repairs of busses \$875.00, Capital Outlay \$843.00, and the Contingency Fund of \$2,600.00 which was eliminated completely.

### ARTICLE #3

As per our recommendations of the previous year this article pertaining to the purchase of a new school bus to be paid from the School District Capital Reserve Fund was approved by the Committee.

### ARTICLE #5

This article calling for a continuation of the high school study and asking for an appropriation of \$250.00 was approved by the Committee. It is felt that this new Committee consisting of seven members will be able to accomplish much more towards this study than the previous Committee which consisted of 21 members and which we believed to be too large for efficient operation.

The Committee wished to recommend that the School Board investigate the possibility of the construction of two additional stalls to the new highway garage for the storage of school busses now being stored elsewhere at a cost of \$1,260.00 per year. Our preliminary estimates indicate that additional space can be constructed for approximately \$1,700.00 each stall and that these would therefore pay for themselves in less than three years.

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In closing our report may we express our thanks to the Board of Selectmen, Mr. Gordon Moore and the other members of the School Board, and also the heads of the various departments who have been most helpful and cooperative to the Committee during the preparation of this budget.

## CEMETERY COMMISSION

### ANNUAL REPORT

1963

A special meeting of the Hooksett Cemetery Commission was held on June 19, 1963 at the Hooksett Municipal Building. Present at the meeting were Lionel F. LaPlante, Chairman, Clifford Thompson, Commissioner, George Cook, ex road agent, and Martin Ferry, engineer. Pauline T. Seidel acted as stenographer.

It was decided at this meeting that Mr. Ferry was to make up new maps of all cemeteries, and also have index cards made of all the interred. This we hope will be completed during the coming year.

Mr. Ferry and all present at this meeting agreed to a Plan for the New Development at Head's Cemetery. All lots will be made out similar to the Pine Grove Cemetery in Manchester so that each lot can be cut in half or in single graves if people so desire them.

The roads in the New Development are to be ten (10) feet wide and swing to eighteen (18) feet for cars to turn. This year we hope to start building roads here; and we must level and repair our very poor roadways at Martin's Cemetery. We plan to extend and finish construction of our fence at Head's Cemetery. Also, some type of fence must be built at the roadway protecting lots and graves from being run over by cars at the southwest end of Head's Cemetery. This circular roadway needs attention.

Riverside Cemetery will be professionally sprayed this year to remove unwanted brush, and it also needs much fill on the southeast portion.

Mr. R. W. Page, Commissioner on the Board of Central Water Precinct, advised the Cemetery Commission to be prepared to have water pressure at Martin's Cemetery early this spring. If this is so, and we have no doubt about it, Mr. C. Thompson will be most delighted as we will pipe this water so as to spray that much needed area this year. It is a beginning, and some day perhaps, we will have water pressure at all other cemeteries so as to keep them green and beautiful.

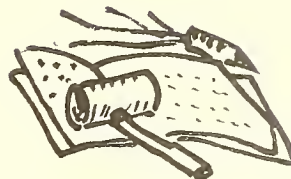

## REPORT OF THE ROAD AGENT

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen and Citizens:

I herewith submit for your approval my first annual report as Road Agent for the year ending December 31, 1963.

### RUBBISH COLLECTIONS

There has been an increase in the number of families throughout the year. We are collecting from over one thousand (1000) families and four (4) trailer parks, not to mention business establishments, twice a week. All collections have been made on days scheduled for the year.

It would be of great assistance, if the townspeople, during the winter months, would use solid containers with covers, and keep the covers on the container, to keep the snow and ice from freezing the contents, thus making a more thorough emptying.

Fire and Police guard, at the dump site, are doing a splendid job of keeping the area clean and burnt, thus reducing fire hazards, especially in the summer months.

We have used 695 tons of gravel and 92 tons of asphalt and have added five new manholes and laid 136 feet of culvert pipe. The town now has 125 manholes and 344 culverts to be maintained. Most manholes have been cleaned this past summer and trees and bushes have been cut along side of roads, so the sunlight will help keep them free from ice and snow.

## SOUTH HOOKSETT FIRE DEPARTMENT

### ANNUAL REPORT

To begin our annual report for 1963 we wish to express our deep sorrow by the passing of William S. Smith. As is generally known, Mr. Smith was one of the original founders of the fire department which was established in 1925. He served as Fire Chief from 1925 until his retirement in 1938. He had been an Honorary Chief since 1945.

Effective June 1, 1963, Lieutenant Roland Levesque was promoted to the rank of Captain and Member Edward Beauchemin to the rank of Lieutenant.

Three new members were accepted to the active force during the year. These men were added to the roster after completing the prescribed training course. New members are, Paul B. Lavallee, Robert J. Silkman and Alfred W. Dyer.

Nine members were enrolled for the State Annual Training School held at the Meadowood Fire Department drill yard at Fitzwilliams, New Hampshire and all were awarded certificates. Members attending were: Lt. Enver J. Silkman, Mbr. Harry R. Schueler, Norman Morissette, Alfred W. Dyer, Edward Meserve, Harlen Nelson, Robert J. Silkman and Paul B. Lavallee.

Deputy Boisvert and myself attended an instruction course on "Fire Department Administration" and were awarded certificates. The course was sponsored by the New Hampshire Fire Chief's Club.

We have introduced an article in the Town Warrant for the purchase of a new pumper. This has become necessary to replace Engine #2 which is a 1937 model and has been in continuous use for the past 26 years. Thru normal wear and tear this apparatus is now unsafe to be used as an emergency vehicle. The new apparatus being considered is a Class A Underwriters Approved 750 GPM pumper. Specifications are in keeping with the requirements necessary towards insurance rate re-classification.

During the year 1963, there were 41 alarms recorded.

Valuation of property involved by fire amounted to \$105,022.50.

Estimated taxable property loss amounted to \$14,750.00.

757 manhours were required of the members in responding to fire alarms.

Three calls for mutual aid assistance were answered, one each to City of Manchester, Town of Allenstown and Hooksett Village.

# REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND YOUR DISTRICT CHIEF

During the past year New Hampshire faced the greatest forest fire threat to its woodlands in more than sixty years. The continued drought brought home to our citizens, as never before, the potential threat of destructive fires to their beautiful and valuable forests, homes and livelihood. In true American tradition of meeting a common threat by volunteer effort, this fire danger was minimized by active prevention, patrol and a relinquishing of personal rights for the common good. It was the greatest demonstration of public cooperation ever experienced by those responsible for local and state fire control. The ready forces of volunteer fire services kept the losses low. For their effort and public response the general fire service expresses its heartfelt thanks for a job well done.

Prevention however, is not just an activity for the bad fire years. It must be practiced until it becomes a part of our public conscience -- a habit. Just plain carelessness with fire causes too many of our fires.

The following practices and suggestions will help:

1. Always have a permit for outdoor burning and burn within the terms of the permit and in a safe place. Burn late in the afternoon when the wind is down or on rainy or damp days. Check your fire and if winds develop extinguish it promptly.
2. Carry your rubbish to the public dump - its safer. A neglected backyard incinerator causes many fires.
3. Never discard lighted cigarette or match. Make this a year round habit regardless of the safety of your surroundings.
4. Children caused fires are now a major concern. Keep matches away from them and teach them to respect fire and not make it a subject of play.

Let's all join with "Smokey the Bear" and "Keep New Hampshire Green" and growing in 1964.

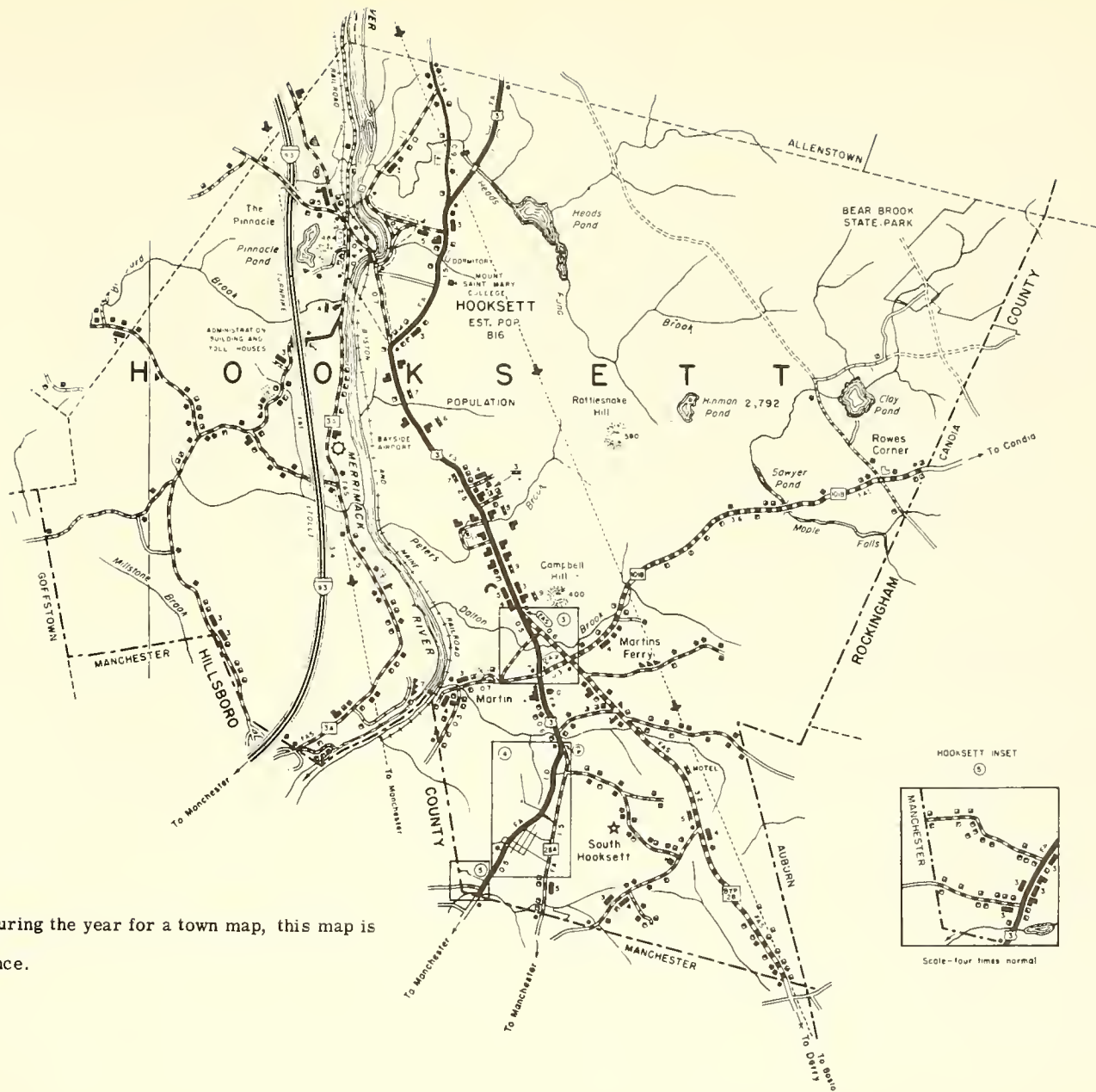

It is a pleasure at this time, as your Local Director of Civil Defense, that I submit for approval, my seventh annual report on Civil Defense.

During the past year we had seven Civil Defense alerts, the alerts as listed, two severe storm warnings, three tornado alerts, one hurricane alert and one state wide communication alert test with the State Civil Defense Agency.

Mount Saint Mary's College at this time is being marked and completely stocked with food and sanitary equipment to shelter 93 persons for a two week period. Also the Corp of Army Engineers are conducting a new survey, which is anticipated that when this survey is completed, we will have an additional six to eight hundred shelter spaces which will be marked and completely stocked with food and sanitary equipment for a two week period. This to the best of my knowledge are the only buildings in the town of Hooksett to qualify under the Federal Governments Shelter Survey Program.

The program papers for Fiscal 1964 were submitted and approved as of Oct. 2, 1963.

The Civil Defense Program consists of additional training in the following units, Radiological, Rescue and Engineering, Transportation, Welfare, First Aid, Public Information, Administration, Communications, and Warning Systems. These are our objectives and activities for Fiscal year 1964.

We would like to call to your attention at this time, as of March 7th and the first Saturday of each month thereafter there will be the testing of the Civil Defense warning sirens from the two Hooksett Fire Stations at 11:00 A. M. as instructed by the State Civil Defense Agency at Concord, N. H.

This office will also continue to take advantage of the Federal Surplus Supply Program and make available the Federal list to the Fire Departments, Highway Department, Police Department and local schools.

With sincere thanks to all of the Civil Defense personnel, the Board of Selectmen, the Police Department, South Hooksett Fire Dept. and the Hooksett Village Fire Dept. for volunteering their time and services for this most worthy cause.

### SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Library, Municipal Court and Trustees of Trust Funds.

### FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balance Sheets: December 31, 1962 - December 31, 1963: (Exhibit A-1)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1962 and December 31, 1963, are presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated therein the Net Debt decreased by \$2,389.54 in 1963.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit A-2)

The two year period, which is provided by law for redemptions from tax sales, having expired on unredeemed taxes from the sales on account of the tax levies of 1960 and prior years, the Collector should deed to the Town the properties represented by these unredeemed tax liens.

### Surety Bond of Town Clerk:

The surety bond of the Town Clerk should be increased from \$6,000.00 to \$8,000.00, in order that the amount of the bond may be more proportional to the amount of funds received.

### Conclusion:

The provisions of Chapter 184 of the Laws of 1955 require that this report or the summary of findings and recommendations (letter of transmittal) shall be published in the next annual report of the Town.

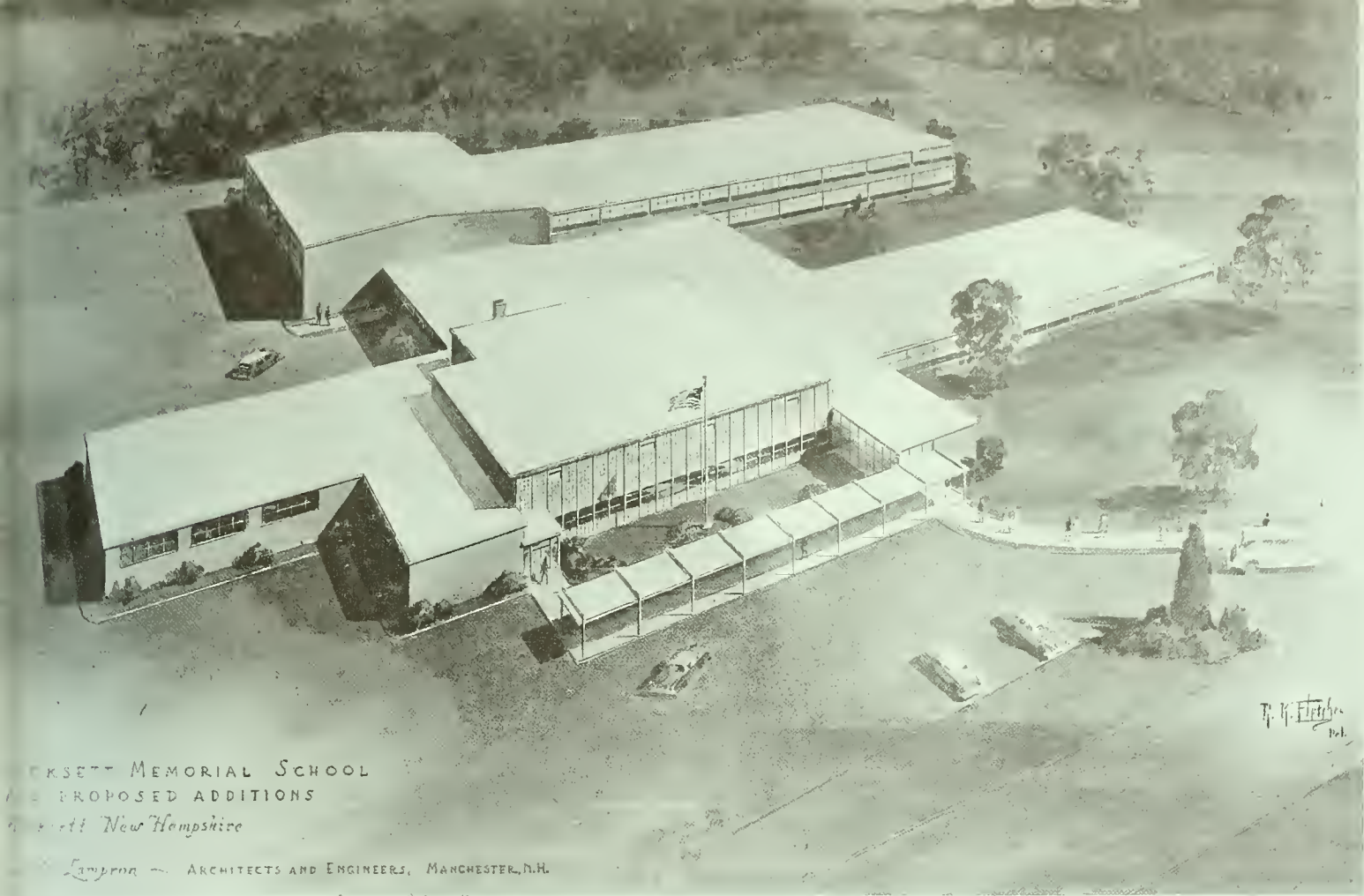

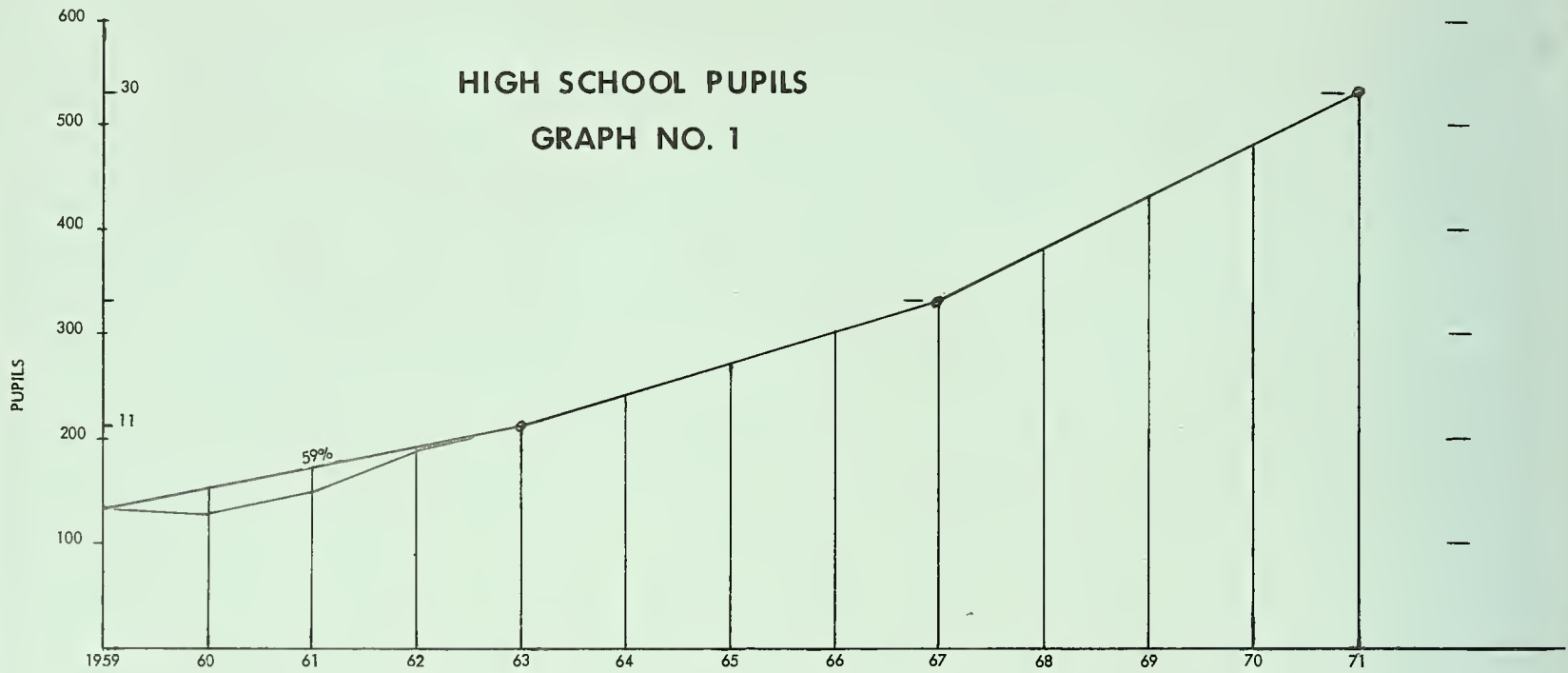

As Requested By School District Meeting of 1963

This report, which is in three parts, shows that there is a definite need for a High School in Hooksett and that the time when it may be needed is of immediate concern to the voters of Hooksett.

#### 1. WHEN WILL A HIGH SCHOOL BE NEEDED IN HOOKSETT?

If the present rate of growth remains constant, grammar school enrollment by 1971 will be approximately 850 and high school enrollment will be in excess of 500. Graph No. 1 shows high school enrollments increasing steadily. We know this increase will continue since two new housing developments are about to start, in addition to two which are expanding. In addition the growth of Hooksett's Industrial Park which has not been rapid should accelerate in the future as the number of people available for employment increases in the Hooksett area. But whether it does or not, we are and will continue to be a bedroom town for the State's largest industrial city with vast areas of land available for home building. This is evidenced by the developers now operating in Hooksett.

As new homes are built and sold, families with children to be educated will move into Hooksett. The census figures and the continued rising enrollment in our grammar schools already indicate this. Thus as the number of our children enrolled in neighboring High Schools increases we will reach a point where per pupil tuition costs will exceed the per pupil costs of operating a high school in Hooksett. When this point is reached economics alone will indicate that Hooksett should have a plan ready for implementation and construction.

Graph No. 2 shows how Hooksett's expenditures for tuition have increased in the past, and projects expected increases in the future based upon the increases which Hooksett has already experienced. The amount shown for the 63-64 school year will be inadequate because Manchester has increased its tuition rate by \$50.00 since the last District Meeting when the sum of \$104,000 was appropriated. Concord, Pembroke and Manchester have already announced rate increases for next year. Please note that this projection of future increases indicates a sum in excess of \$200,000 for tuition by 1969 and remember this is an expenditure the voters of Hooksett will have to make and that Hooksett will have nothing to say about how it will be spent.

While statistical predictions are generally made on a National scale they can be important to individual areas such as Hooksett. We would therefore be amiss if we did not include predictions which bear upon this report.

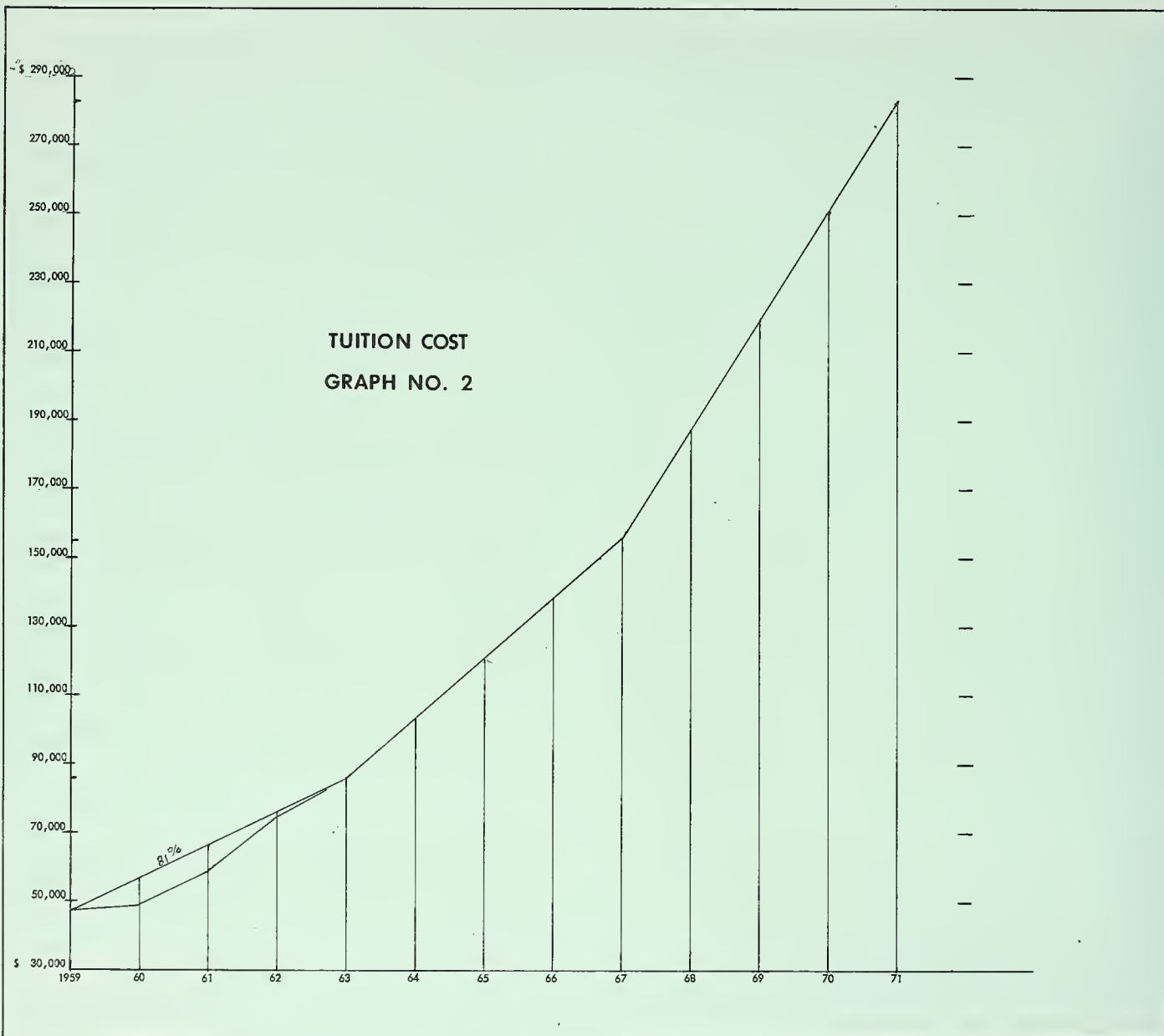
By 1965, the advance guard of youngsters born immediately after World War II will reach marriage age (18) and from then on there will be a swelling trek to the altar. Thus between now and 1970, half of the increase in the nation's total family count will be accounted for by units headed by persons under 30.

This 20-30 age group is scheduled to grow by a staggering 40% in this decade and since the great postwar migration has slowed down most of this population growth will take place where people already are now, not in new regions.

Thus since it is from this age grouping that the majority of new children will come, Hooksett's share will probably be greater than present or projected figures can show at this time.

#### 2. WHAT COURSES OF INSTRUCTION SHOULD BE MADE AVAILABLE WHEN A HIGH SCHOOL IS BUILT IN HOOKSETT?

As we delve into the subject of curriculum for either a Junior High School, a Junior-Senior High School, or a Senior High School, for Hooksett, it quickly becomes evident that there are no hard and fast rules for selection and no pat answers as to what should be taught to our children in the years that lie ahead.



There are certain specifics required by the State Board of Education that provide a common base for all comprehensive high schools within the State.

It seems wise, therefore, to start with what is now, and advance to what may be required five years or more hence.

Twenty standard units and fourteen vocational units, with one unit equaling one year's work, are required in a comprehensive high school with one full time librarian for each 400 pupils. These units are contained within two tracks or divisions--College Preparatory and Vocational Preparatory which subdivides into Industrial Arts, Business Administration and Home Economics. In addition there are Electives such as Art, Music, Physical Education and Languages open to all.

A minimum of twenty-five with a probable thirty teachers are needed to properly staff a 400-700 pupil, grades 9-12, high school with the designated courses listed below:

Since teachers control the educational experiences pupils obtain, they have a great influence upon the curriculum offered. Thus the available teachers, their educational background, adaptability to diverse personalities, and the way they spend their time in school are often the final factor that determines what subjects may or may not be taught. Good teachers of desirable subjects may not be readily available when needed, and must be pirated away from other schools, which is expensive. It is for this reason that funds appropriated for teachers salaries, when staffing a high school for the first time, must be in excess of otherwise normal requirements or the courses offered be curtailed until teachers are obtainable through regular channels.

It is the considered opinion of this committee that if there is to be a high school in Hooksett, it should be a comprehensive high school. One that is adequately staffed so that a wide variety of courses can be offered to the children of Hooksett.

### 3. WHAT ADDITIONAL PLANT FACILITIES WILL BE REQUIRED TO PROVIDE THE SPACE NEEDED FOR A HIGH SCHOOL?

With data obtained by the other committees this committee investigated the size and type of facilities Hooksett would need in addition to the existing land and buildings of the present Memorial School. Since a comprehensive high school for 400-700 pupils will require 15 new classrooms, plus 3 for science laboratories and 4 special rooms for vocational courses and since a shop area, a full size gymnasium and an enlarged administrative area will also be needed, an architect's proposed layout is included as a part of this report. By 1971 when Hooksett may need a high school of its own, changes in the educational requirements may alter these projected needs.

Costs of such a building can only be estimated at this time as they are constantly changing. However, were we to undertake to build and equip such a building today, it would cost \$1,005,000...

From these studies it is evident that Hooksett's future High School needs are closely allied with its future Elementary School requirements and for this reason we are recommending this study be continued and enlarged to include all of our educational facilities.

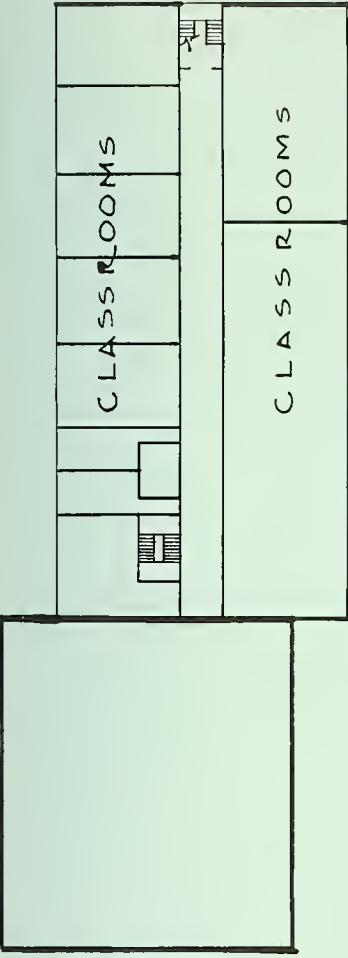

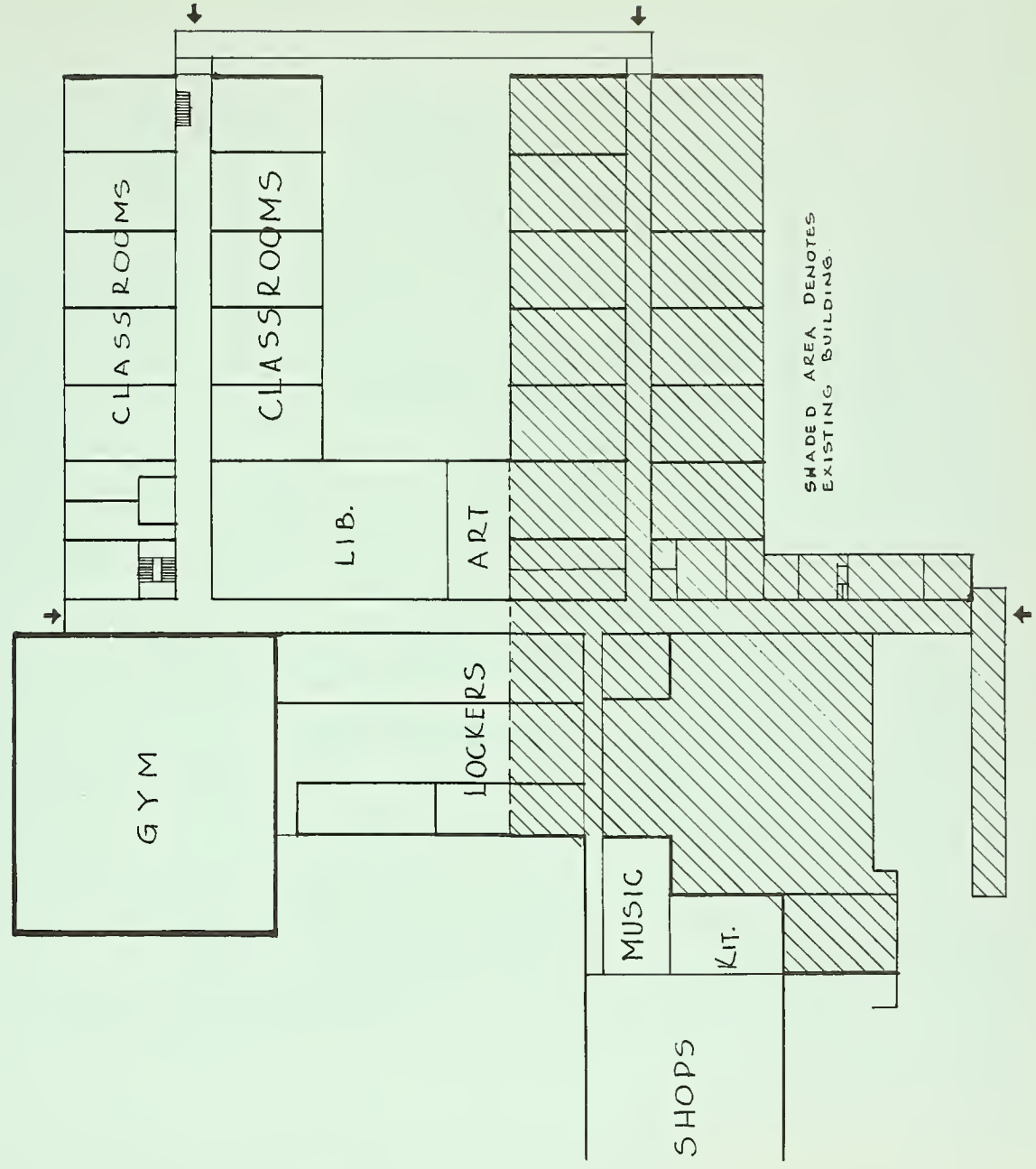

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the School Board and the School District Treasurer.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balance Sheets: (Exhibit A)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of June 30, 1962 and June 30, 1963, are presented in Exhibit A. As indicated therein, the Net Debt decreased by \$30,398.03 during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1963.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit B)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the School District during the fiscal year is made in Exhibit B, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein.

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures - Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits C & D)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1963, are presented in Exhibits C and D. As indicated by the Budget Summary (Exhibit D), a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$4,779.12, less a revenue deficit of \$445.24, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$4,333.88.

Summary Statement of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit E-1)

A summary statement of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1963, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit E-1. Proof of the Treasurer's balance, as of June 30, 1963, is indicated in Exhibit E-2.

Statements of School Lunch Accounts: (Exhibits F-1 and F-2)

Statements of the Village School and Hooksett School Lunch accounts for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1963, are presented in Exhibits F-1 and F-2.

Statement of Building Fund Account: (Exhibit G)

A statement showing the activity in the Building Fund account during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1963, is included in Exhibit G.

Statement of Long Term Indebtedness: (Exhibit H)

A statement of the outstanding long term indebtedness of the School District, as of June 30, 1963, showing annual debt service requirements, is contained in Exhibit H.

Statement of School Tax Account: (Exhibit I)

Exhibit I presents a statement of the School District Tax account with the Town of Hooksett. As indicated therein, as of June 30, 1963, the School District had received from the Town the total amount of the 1962-63 School Tax.

## GENERAL COMMENTS

### Current Surplus:

It is noted that the current surplus (excess of total assets over current liabilities) decreased from \$6,293.01 to \$4,466.88 during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1963, as shown herewith:

Polls close at two (2) o'clock in the afternoon. Action on the remainder of the warrant begins at two (2) o'clock P.M. on the same day.

1. To choose all necessary District Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To see if the District will vote to hold its election of officers by secret ballot on Town Meeting Day, commencing with the Town Meeting of March, 1965. Permission for this action is granted in Revised Statute Annotated (197-la).

3. To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to purchase one School Bus for a sum not to exceed \$10,500.00, said sum to be taken from the Capital Reserve Fund of the District.

4. To see if the District will vote to appoint a study committee of seven citizens; one member of the School Board, one member of the Board of Selectmen, one member of the Budget Committee, one member of the Planning Board, one member of the Village PTA, one member of the Underhill PTA, and one member of the Memorial PTO. This committee to continue the study of Hooksett's needs in the area of High School and Elementary School requirements of the future, and report to the 1965 Annual Meeting of the District or to a special District meeting called for that purpose. The first meeting of this committee to be held at Memorial School on the first Monday of April next.

5. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 to be added to the unexpended balance of last year's appropriation for committee expenses.

6. Any and all materials, of which more than \$200.00 is bought in one year by any department, precinct or District of the Town of Hooksett, shall be advertised for bids in the Manchester Union Leader and, whenever possible, by (5) suppliers of materials involved, in Manchester, Concord and especially in Hooksett. Whenever possible, materials of like nature shall be bid on separately. (Inserted by Petition)

7. All School buses shall be advertised for bids in Manchester Paper. Specifications set up shall include any and all extras or options. Bids shall be sent to at least five (5) potential bidders or dealers who can supply complete bus using Wayne, Superior, Bluebird or GMC bodies. (Inserted by Petition)

8. Annual fuel supply of any and all buildings, able to take bulk shipments, shall be lumped together and advertised for bids. All buildings using 2,500 gallons of oil or more shall have bulk tanks installed, if feasible. All buildings that can be converted to burn #4 Fuel Oil shall be converted if it can be done at a reasonable cost. (Inserted by Petition)

9. To see if the School District will authorize the School Board to accept on behalf of the District, all Federal or State Funds for the aid of Education or School Construction, should any such funds become available.

10. To see if the School District will vote to accept the Budget of 1964-65 as submitted by the Budget Committee, or take any other action in relation thereto.

11. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

We want to thank all the town officials, the two P.T.A. Groups and the P.T.O. and all the local organizations for their cooperation and assistance.

May we take this opportunity to commend the members of the budget committee for their constructive and unbiased appraisal of the school district budget. Their fair and well founded recommendations are acceptable to your school board.

Hooksett schools continue to grow at the rate of two or three classrooms per year and this seems to be a continuous process. It won't be long before we are short of pupil stations. This is especially true in grades 1 - 5. In fact, we may find ourselves short of space in any year immediately ahead, depending on the exact residencies of new people. The whole problem of school expansion needs to be given continuous and thorough study. The bonding capacity of Hooksett is not unlimited and some difficult choices may be ahead of us.

We now know that the Massachusetts minimum salary of \$4500 will be the asking price of new teachers in the spring. If we wish to be competitive in hiring new teachers, we must offer the same as those in the surrounding areas. We are hopeful that we won't need as many new teachers as we did last year. In the last analysis, the success or failure of a pupil or a school system is, in a great part, determined by the quality of the teacher.

In view of other written reports, this particular one is purposely kept as brief as possible.

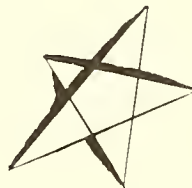

REPORT OF WATER COMMISSIONERS

During 1963 a total of 1750 feet of new main was added to the system, all of it in the Pleasant View Terrace Development, where 850 feet of 8" cement asbestos pipe and 900 feet of 6" cement asbestos pipe, together with two new hydrants were installed. As in the past all of such main extension work was performed and paid for by the Developer, under supervision of the Precinct and all work was guaranteed in writing.

The work of replacing over-aged and under-sized mains was continued this year and a total of 627 feet of 1 1/4" pipe on the old Areline was replaced with 6" cement asbestos pipe. It is anticipated that this work will be continued during the next year with the replacement of several small sections of the old Rowell system.

The old fire station purchased last year has been turned over to the Precinct and the Commissioners expect to make some repairs and install a heating system so that the premises may be occupied this next year.

A total of 18 new services were added during the year.

Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1962 and December 31, 1963, are presented in Exhibit A. As indicated therein the Net Debt decreased by \$9,183.91 in 1963.
