STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Littleton, in said State, qualified to vote in Town and State affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall and Police Court Room in the Town Building, on the 13th day of March next, being the second Tuesday of March, at eight o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE 1. To choose a Town Clerk, one Selectman for the term of three years, a Town Treasurer, a Collector of Taxes, an Overseer of the Poor, an Agent to prosecute violations of the Liquor law, three members of the Board of Trustees of the Public Library, one Trustee of Trust Funds, a Constable, and two Road Agents.

ARTICLE 2. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of Chapter 171-A of the Revised Laws relative to playing games of beano in the Town of Littleton, and that the following question be placed upon the ballot to be used at said meeting, "Shall the provisions of Chapter 171-A of the Revised Laws relative to playing games of beano be adopted in this Town?"

ARTICLE 3. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the laying out, construction and repairing of highways and bridges, for town building maintenance, for election and registration expenses, for Memorial Day, for Municipal Court expenses, for the Police Department, for the Health Department, for vital statistics, for the Community House, for advertising purposes, for miscellaneous expenses, for street lighting, for band concerts, for cemeteries, for Town Poor, for Old Age Assistance, for damage and legal expenses, for protection of the premises on the

Ammonoosuc River from flood and other water damage, for White Pine Blister control, for payment of the Town debt and Interest, for the Community Nurse, for the Skating Rink, and all other Town charges.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will vote that its Road Agent or Agents, Tax Collector, and Overseer of the Poor, or any of them, shall hereafter be appointed by the Board of Selectmen instead of being elected.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will authorize the Board of Selectmen to sell all or any portion or portions of certain land now owned by the Town and situate on Pine Hill and bounded in part by East Street.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) and authorize the Board of Selectmen to borrow the same on the credit of the Town, for the purpose of defraying the additional cost of the reconstruction of Cottage Street.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of Eighteen Thousand Dollars (\$18,000.00) for the revaluation and reassessment of the taxable property in the Town by an independent firm of appraisers to be chosen by the Board of Selectmen.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of Eight Thousand Dollars (\$8,000.00) for the revaluation and reassessment of the taxable property in the Town by the State Tax Commission.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will authorize the Board of Selectmen to appoint a committee of three (3) voters to look into the advisability of having a revaluation and reassessment of the taxable property in the Town, and to report to the Town Meeting of March, 1952.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will vote to accept Social Security coverage for the employees of the Town if the State of New Hampshire accepts Social Security coverage for the Town employees under the 1950 amendments to the Social Security Act.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will authorize its Board of Selectmen to borrow monies, from time to time, for current indebtedness of the Town for the ensuing year, in anticipation of taxes to be collected for the year 1951, and to be paid therefrom.

ARTICLE 12. To hear the report of Agents, auditors, committees or officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

ARTICLE 13. To choose any other necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year and to choose or elect any Agents or Committees which may be necessary to carry into effect any vote that may be passed under this warrant.

ARTICLE 14. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual audit and examination of the accounts of the Town of Littleton for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1950, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the Town. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

Scope of Audit

Included in the audit and examination were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Trustees of Trust Funds and Municipal Court. The accounts of the Water and Light Department and the Village District were also audited and separate reports are being made for each of these divisions.

Financial Statements

Comparative Balance Sheets—Dec. 31, 1949—Dec. 31, 1950: (Exhibit A)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1949 and December 31, 1950, are presented in Exhibit A. As indicated therein the Net Debt decreased by \$1,087.49 in the year 1950.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit B)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the Town during the year is made in Exhibit B, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These were as follows:

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures — Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits C & D)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1950, are presented in Exhibits C and D. As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit D), a net overdraft of appropriations of \$9,197.23, less

a net revenue surplus of \$4,139.17, resulted in a net budget deficit of \$5,058.06.

Statement of Long Term Indebtedness: (Exhibit O)

A statement of long term indebtedness as of December 31, 1950, showing annual debt service requirements, is contained in Exhibit O.

Summary of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit E)

A summary of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1950, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit E. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of December 31, 1950, is indicated in Exhibit F.

Parking Meter Account: (Exhibit H)

A summary of the Parking Meter account is presented in Exhibit H.

Audit Procedure

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source insofar as possible and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements obtained from depository banks. Verification of uncollected taxes was made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpayers as indicated by the Collector's records.

General Comments

Current Surplus:

The Current Surplus increased from \$7,407.19 to

Accounts Payable:

As of January 23, 1951, the Auditors examined the 1951 paid invoice files to ascertain the amount of 1950 bills which were unpaid as of December 31, 1950. This examination indicated that as of January 23, 1951, the total amount of 1950 bills which have been paid in 1951, represented December charges which are normally paid in the following month and charged to the next year's appropriation. Consequently there were no "Accounts Payable" items in the balance sheet of December 31, 1950.

Tax Collector's Warrant:

It was noted that in accordance with the recommendation which was made in our two previous audit reports, the regular form of Collector's Warrant Book was used in the commitment of the 1950 property taxes to the Collector and the use of the card system, which had been adopted in place of the Warrant Book, discontinued.

The 1950 Poll Tax Warrant was made up on sheets of legal size paper, but the Auditors were assured that the 1951 Poll Tax Warrant will be committed to the Collector in the regular prescribed form of Warrant Book.

Conclusion:

The accounts of all town officials which we examined were found in good condition and the accounting procedure conformed to prescribed methods.

The provisions of Section 31, Chapter 211, of the Laws of 1939, require that this report or a summary of its essential features shall be published in the next annual town report.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Town of Littleton for their assistance during the course of the audit.

To the Board of Trustees of the Littleton Public Library the Annual Report of the Librarian is herewith Submitted:

The number of books borrowed in 1950 remained about the same as in the previous year, nearly maintaining the large gain of 1949.

An especially full Book Week program was carried out in November with events for children from the first through the sixth grade. A story hour was held for the first two grades, sound movies for grades three and four, and a book illustration contest and book game for the fifth and sixth grades. Several of the lower grades visited the library as classes, an activity designed to introduce new borrowers.

This is the second year the library has acted as co-sponsor for the Great Books Discussion Group. The only activity of its kind in Littleton and one of four in the state, it is open to all adults and has drawn people interested in reading the great authors, arguing their meaning and exchanging ideas suggested by the selections.

Books were presented to the library in memory of Claude N. Martin and Miss Harriett Bickford. Book plates are used in the memorial books and it is planned to start an album containing the titles of the books, the names of the donors and the persons remembered. Other gift books were also much appreciated.

Books on unusual and specialized subjects account for the greater part of our extensive borrowing from the N. H. State Library, but some of these requests we should be able to fill without help. To do this the local collection must be built up and improved. An adequate book budget is the only answer.

A problem that will eventually face the library is connected with the completion and occupation of the new

elementary school building in Apthorp. The location of the new school will make the library much less accessible to its pupils. It will be too far for the children from the rural districts to come at noon two days a week as they have been able to do. Children living in the town itself will find it a long distance to come after school to borrow their books for outside reading connected with school work and for recreational reading. One possible solution would be for the library to supply classroom collections for each room at the new school as in the past it has supplied the Apthorp School. This plan would involve several difficulties. Transportation and supervision of the lending of the books for home use would not be impossible to arrange; the most serious problem would be to provide the large number of books needed to take care of all the grades. In order to do the job effectively each classroom collection should contain at least one book per child and should be changed every two or three months. Even the comparatively small number of books the library has been lending the present Apthorp School has taxed the juvenile collection almost to the limit. A more than doubled demand will mean buying additional books on the correct grade levels.

We must not neglect the need of the school children for reading or let it become too hard for them to get the books they want. It would be unfortunate if the good reading habits that have been developed in many Littleton children should be broken through lack of foresight. There may be some other means of providing on the spot library service than the plan outlined above. Whatever it is, the town can and should allow the library to do as good work with the children in the new school as in the old, and make it possible by supplying extra book funds even if it means an increased appropriation.

During the summer months there are many enthusiastic and flattering compliments from out of town visitors on the resources and service of the library, but far more important is the quality of the year round service offered to town residents. The library should be praiseworthy for its local work first, and not least for its usefulness as a source of information and pleasure to the children. It is hoped that this new situation will be seriously considered and that some constructive action will be taken.

Report of Board of Education

To the Citizens of Littleton:

We herewith submit the annual school report. The report includes budgets and estimated receipts for this year and next year; report of the Division of Municipal Accounting of the State Tax Commission for the fiscal year July 1, 1949 to June 30, 1950; and written reports of the superintendent of schools and principal of high school.

Continued rising costs make it necessary to increase the budget this year over that of a year ago. Items primarily responsible for the increase are teachers' salaries, scholars' supplies, fuel, teachers' retirement and insurance.

Inasmuch as Littleton's school tax this past year was \$13.95 per one thousand dollars of equalized valuation against a state average of \$18.00, we will not be eligible for State Aid under the State Board of Education's equalization formula. School costs must exceed 18 mills or \$18.00 on a thousand before a community qualifies for such aid. The budget this year calls for an appropriation of \$150,796.91. After deducting estimated receipts of \$4,950.00, it will be necessary to raise \$145,846.91 by taxation.

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SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Littleton:

It is with pleasure that I submit my annual report relative to your schools.

Littleton schools were fortunate in retaining eighteen members of last year's teaching staff. No replacements were necessary in the Kilburn School, two were made in the Apthorp School and five in the high school.

Mr. Theodore Stopyra, a graduate of St. Michael's College, with a master's degree from Boston University, and with two years' teaching experience in Darien, Conn., was elected to teach science and coach basketball.

Miss Lois Stinson, a graduate of Husson College and the University of Maine, with experience in the field of business, and seven years experience in Maine was elected to teach commercial subjects.

Miss Joyce Eastman of Ashland, a graduate of Plymouth Teachers College, was elected to teach commercial subjects.

Mr. Arthur Kenney, a graduate of Holy Cross College, and a summer student at the graduate school of the University of New Hampshire for the past four sessions, and with seven years' experience, four of which were as headmaster of Twin Mountain High School, was elected to teach English and Latin. Mr. Kenney was promoted to the principalship of the high school after the resignation of Louis L. Ramsay, who left us to accept the position of superintendent in Union No. 14.

Sheldon Varney, a graduate of the University of New Hampshire was elected to teach mathematics and coach winter sports and track.

Mr. John K. MacPherson, a graduate of Keene Teachers College, was elected to teach the seventh and eighth grades in the Apthorp School.

Mrs. Louise Ross, a graduate of Keene Teachers College, with ten years' teaching experience before leaving the profession, was elected to teach grades three and four in the Apthorp School.

Mr. Leon A. Wiskup, a graduate of Bates College, and with a master's degree in English from Boston University, was elected to teach English and science after the resignation of Mr. Ramsay.

Repairs done in the various buildings this past year include the following:

New inlaid linoleum in the main corridor of the high school.

Redecorating of the Home Economics rooms and the main corridor of the high school.

Recovering of the flashing around the roof of the high school building.

New arch in the boiler of the high school building and new brick lining of the fire box.

Flameproof painting of stairwells of the Kilburn building.

Flameproof painting of stairwells and corridors of the Apthorp building.

Sanding and refinishing of all desk tops in Rooms nine and ten of the high school building.

Minor repairs to desks, toilet facilities and other equipment in all the schools.

The report of the school nurse shows that a total of 569 pupils were examined and the following defects found and reported to parents: Defective vision 38, defective hearing 5, defective teeth 192, heart defects 7, orthopedic 22, nutritional defects 79, and speech de-

fects 2. Of the 569 pupils examined, 565 had been successfully vaccinated and 4 were excused from vaccination. Weekly dental clinics were held at which 152 were treated. Vision clinics resulted in having ten corrections made. Nine children were examined in chest and x-ray clinics and all responded negative. Fourteen children were treated in posture clinics and four in orthopedic clinics.

The penny milk program is being continued. Due to the discontinuance of Federal reimbursements, it has been necessary to request donations to meet the deficit that will result because of the lack of this Federal subsidy. The hot lunch program consisting of one hot dish to supplement the pupil's lunch box, has been continued.

In October, a one day Citizenship Conference was held in Littleton in cooperation with the State Department of Education. All teachers are members of the New Hampshire State Teachers Association and attended the Fall convention of the association in Concord in October. Seven teachers took advantage of the extension course in Art Education which was offered in Littleton this past winter with Dr. Alice Baumgarner of the Department of Education as instructor. One student teacher from Keene Teachers College received eighteen weeks' practice teaching in the Kilburn School under the supervision of Mrs. Mildred Lakeway. Three teachers are members of the Northern New Hampshire School Study Council which is engaged in seeking better practices in Language Arts. Three additional teachers have been attending conferences held by Richard Byrne, Director of Guidance, to improve guidance practices in our schools. Seven teachers attended summer sessions at various training schools this past summer, to improve themselves professionally.

A recreational program this year has included feature moving pictures free to all children Saturday after-

noons and evenings in the high school auditorium. The evening program has been followed by dancing for the older pupils. Free movies have been featured each Friday evening in the Apthorp School. A hobby group under Mr. MacPherson has met each week at the Apthorp School. A group under the direction of Mrs. Rutledge has met once each week for recreation and arts and crafts at the Apthorp School. Mr. Smith has held regular meetings with a group of boys in the shop each Thursday evening from 7:00 to 9:00 o'clock. Mrs. Kane has supervised a very interesting group in cooking for boys on each Thursday from 7:00 to 9:00 P. M. in the Home Economics laboratory. Mr. Root has supervised a large group of youngsters each Saturday morning in the high school gym. The program this year has depended on faculty members for the most part for direction and supervision. Experience of this year has shown that the interests of certain special groups have not been met. If this part of the program is to be strengthened, it will be necessary to call on parents and friends to assist with the program. I feel that considerable progress was made this year.

The international situation with the resulting state of emergency is causing much concern among those responsible for the education of our youth. Demands of the government for men and women for the armed forces is once more reducing the number of available candidates for the teaching profession. Prices on school supplies, especially paper, have reached a new high. A thirty per cent increase has taken place since last year. Such is the situation facing education in America today.

Figures released this past week by the State Department of Education show that the median school tax rate for 1950-1951 on equalized valuation for the state of New Hampshire is \$18.71. Littleton's school tax rate is \$13.95 per one thousand dollars of equalized valuation.

Should the State-Aid Bill for Education that has been proposed by the State Board of Education pass in the present legislature, Littleton would not qualify for aid because it does not spend 18 mills on each dollar of equalized valuation for education. Some consideration is being given at this time to an amendment which would provide for flat grants to all communities based on pupil enrollment for tax relief purposes. What our legislature will do with the program is problematical.

This report would not be complete if it did not include recognition of the long and faithful service of one of our teachers. Miss Daisy L. Bronson who will retire in June of this year entered her present position in September 1908. For forty-three years Miss Bronson has been faithful in her task of molding the character of the pupils that have had the good fortune to come under her influence. Miss Bronson's boundless energy, love of children, personable qualities and practical wisdom have endeared her to the profession.

In closing, I wish to express my sincere appreciation to the citizens of Littleton, the school board, teaching staff and other district employees for their cooperation during this past year.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

To the Superintendent of Schools:

My first report as principal of Littleton High School follows:

REGISTRATION

The total registration to date is 272. This is 29 less than last year's enrollment. The senior high school shows a decrease of 23 students while the junior high school has 6 fewer students. Our withdrawals number 13, with the following as causes: Moved 9; to work 2; lost interest 1; sickness 1. This figure represents approximately 5% of our enrollment which is well below the national average.

School attendance is on the increase and a sharp drop off in tardiness has been noted.

CURRICULUM

Our aim is to set up a curriculum which will give our students guidance in dealing with the problems of living in our industrial democracy, and which will develop world-minded citizens able to make the sound judgments and willing to make the sacrifices necessary

to maintain peace. Our objective is to have each student make a contribution to society commensurate with his ability. This requires a curriculum which meets the basic needs of all students and also their special needs.

The field of vocational training appears to need expansion in order to meet special abilities of some of our students. A thorough study of our curriculum is being made in order that we may meet these needs in as far as it is possible. Every effort is being made to expand our guidance program in order that we may provide the service we should for our students. This includes both those who intend to further their education and those who will enter the labor market. To this end we are working closely with the U. S. Employment Office and local businesses in order that we may eliminate as far as possible the "square peg in the round hole." We shall include the responsibilities of labor as well as its rights and benefits in this orientation.

THE TEACHING STAFF

Littleton is indeed fortunate in having an excellent teaching staff whose cooperation with the administration has been on a very high plane. We are working on reorganizations within departments in order to assure continuity and efficiency, and I shall make a report to you on this upon its completion.

EXTRA CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

Our school offers a full program of extra curricular activities which include music, vocal and instrumental, dramatics, athletics, socials and dances, and the school publication THE RECORD, which will appear this year as a year book suitably bound and representative of a school of our size. This year, owing to the loss of the Premier Theatre, we have offered movies each Saturday afternoon for the children and Saturday evening follow-

ed by a dance for the high school students. These programs which have proved to be popular with both groups will stop with the completion of the new community theater. An active physical education program has been carried on under the direction of Mr. Root and with the Saturday morning program has reached most age levels.
