# TOWN WARRANT

#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Mason in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the 12th day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

To elect delegates at large, alternate delegates at large, delegates and alternate delegates to the national conventions of the various political parties to be held to nominate party candidates for president and vice president of the United States.

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.
- 3. To choose one Trustee of the Boynton Common School fund for five years.
- 4. To choose one trustee of the Stearns Common School bequest for three years.
  - 5. To choose one trustee of the Cemeteries for three years.
- 6. To choose one trustee of the Mason Public Library for three years.
- 7. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for repairs of highways and bridges.
- 8. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for library purposes.
- 9. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for care of cemeteries.

- 10. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for Memorial purposes.
- 11. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for street lighting.
- 13. To see if the town will vote to accept state aid for construction of Class II road known as the Turnpike and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$364.50 (State to contribute \$1,000.00) or will accept state aid for construction of Class V roads and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$364.50 (State to contribute \$2,053.67).
- 14. To see if the town will vote to make repairs to the Town Hall and to raise and appropriate the necessary money or take any action relating thereto.
- 15. To see if the town will vote a discount on full or partial payments of taxes and fix the date of payment of same, or take any action relating thereto.
- 16. To see if the town will raise and appropriate a sum of money to insure employees of the town or take any action relating thereto.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 to the Monadnock Region Association of Scenic New Hampshire for the issuance and distribution of printed matter, newspaper and magazine advertising, calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the Town in cooperation with the other thirty-seven towns in the Monadnock Region.
- 18. To see if the town will raise and appropriate a sum of money for repairing the church horse sheds or take any action relating thereto.
- 19. To see if the town will raise and appropriate a sum of money to equip a fire truck, or take any action relating thereto.
- 20. To see if the town will raise and appropriate a sum of money to purchase snow removal equipment, or take any action relating thereto.

- 21. To see if the town will vote to petition the state tax commission to have an audit made by the municipal accounting division and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.
- 22. To see if the town will vote to establish a planning board of seven members, with duties set forth in sections 3 to 15, inclusive, of Chapter 55 of the Laws of 1935, to make a study of the town's development and report to town meeting appropriate recommendations for the promotion and maintenance of the town's best development, the board members to consist of one selectman and six other citizens appointed by the selectmen, as provided in said Chapter 55 of the Public Laws.
- 23. To hear reports of agents, auditors, committees, and officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
- 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 8. To see if the district will vote to make any alteration in the amount of money required to be assessed for the ensuing year for the support of public schools and the payment of the statutory obligations of the district, as determined by the school board in its annual report.
- 9. To see if the School District will vote to continue insurance and keep in repair Number Six School House or authorize the School Board to dispose of said building.

10. To see if the district will vote to petition the state tax commission to have an audit made by the municipal accounting division and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.

# REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Mason:

I respectfully submit my seventeenth annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

#### SUPERVISION

In my report last year I discussed the early stages of the process of learning to read, covering the work of the first two grades. I pointed out that we make several sections in each grade in order to have each pupil placed at the reading level at which he can do his best work. This procedure is now effective in the third grade as well as in the first two grades.

Sectioning by reading levels in these grades proves to be advantageous and is in itself nothing particularly new. As a given child shows readiness for the next succeeding reading level or stage, he is advanced sometimes with the same group and sometimes into the next group ahead; and of course slower learning pupils are sometimes outstripped by the others in a group and joins the next group that comes along into that stage. Each child is thus enabled to progress according to his own ability and is not forced to take the pace of faster or slower pupils.

It may prove to be more satisfactory, after some further experience with this plan, to designate pupils below the fourth grade according to reading levels instead of classifying them as grade one, grade two, or grade three; and promote from level to level at such times during the year as the children acquire mastery of the reading level in which they have been placed. Pupils would then be promoted into the fourth grade when they were ready to enter upon the study of the content subjects that usually begin in the fourth grade, and only when the pupil is ready to do so with assurance of success, whether the time required to attain such mastery has been three years or four.

Reasonable mastery of the fundamental techniques of reading is essential to success throughout the remaining school years and to permit a child to advance before mastery is attained is to give him a handicap that may later prove disastrous, not only to his success in the content subjects, but to development of his personality or individuality.

In all our plans and procedures we must think in terms of the "individual child" and remember that he grows as a whole. This is true not only of his years in the primary grades but

throughout his school life. All the time that a child is increasing in skill and in understanding, he is also forming attitudes and ideals and interests that will contribute more to the development of his personality than all of the subject matter that he may be able to absorb and retain. The facts a child learns slip away quickly, but the thinking habits he acquires and the attitudes and ideals formed are apt to be permanent.

The type of report card that we have developed in the previous two years for first and second grades is now adapted to the third grade as well. By this means we are trying to give the parent definite information as to the child's growth in reading and to point out the things that may be preventing more rapid growth. We believe this is more helpful to the parent and consequently to the child than the type of report card that merely states the child is "good," "fair," or "poor," because it is more constructive and less critical of failures and establishes a better basis for helpful conference between the parent and the teacher.

#### MEDICAL INSPECTION

The annual medical inspection was made in October by Dr. Karr and the nurse, Mrs. Gilbert, who report as follows:

The tonsil and adenoid corrections indicated were made at a Clinic last August. This is an unusual report in that there are so few defects found and so many corrections made. It indicates the effectiveness of the health supervision and the splendid cooperation of the parents in the corrections of defects.

#### BUDGET

The budget for 1940–'41 is presented in such a manner as to bring into easy form for comparison the cost under the various items, and as a whole, of the two alternative plans with which we are faced because of the fact that the school enrollment has diminished to a figure below thirty. You were advised two

years ago that if and when this did occur the basis of approval on the part of the State Board in determining the amount of state aid allotment would be changed. It is the policy of the State Board to approve two teachers for a school of more than thirty pupils, but only one teacher for a school of fewer than thirty pupils.

Of course the budget item of teachers' salaries is the one item in which there is any material difference in cost, although some slight saving may be effected in the cost of fuel and janitor service and there is a slight difference in the portion of the excess salary charged to Mason by the Supervisory Union, since that apportionment is based in part upon the number of teachers. The difference of \$920 in the assessment required to balance the School Board's budget represents the difference in cost to the taxpayers between the two alternatives of continuing with two teachers or having only one teacher, and the district adopting the one or the other will decide in effect whether we shall continue with two teachers or not.

At first thought it might seem that the assessment should be less having a one-teacher school than was called for in last year's budget for a two-teacher school. The fact is however, that any saving effected in the cost of schools in any district that receives state aid automatically reduces the amount of state aid by the amount of the saving. This is necessarily so, because the district raises only its "\$5 tax" and the state aid supplies the balance of the money needed, and there could be no saving to the district until the cost diminished to some figure less than the amount of the five-dollar tax when there would be no state aid allotment.

The reason for the increase of more than \$400 in the assessment required as compared with last year's budget is to be found in the one item of "payment of tuition in high shools." That figure in last year's budget was \$1,085 and this year is \$1,580; only one of the pupils now attending high school will graduate next June, but we have six pupils in our own eighth grade who expect to enter high school next fall, a net increase of five, and the tuition rate at Townsend is \$100 as it has been for a number of years.
