#### TOWN WARRANT

#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the town of New Durham, in the county of Strafford, in said state, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at town hall in said New Durham on Tuesday, the 9th day of March, next, at 10 of the clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to hire money on the credit of the town to pay its just debts.

Article 2. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the town through tax collector's deed.

Article 3. To see what per cent, discount the town will vote to allow on property taxes and on what dates such discount shall be allowed.

Article 4. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the control of white pine blister rust. By request.

Article 5. To see if the town will vote to accept the budget estimates as recommended by the budget committee.

Article 6. To see if the town will vote to accept state aid for construction of Class II roads and raise and appropriate for said purpose the sum of \$604.50, the state to give \$1,208.00, or will accept state aid for construction of Class V roads and raise and appropriate for said purpose the sum of \$570.02, the state to give \$2,280.09.

Article 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$40.00 to the Lakes Region Association of New Hampshire for the issuance and distribution of printed matter calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the town in cooperation with other towns in the Lakes Region. By request.

Article 8. To see if the town will vote to accept the following article in accordance with state law.

Sixty days after presentation or mail delivery of a

poll tax bill if same is not paid the tax collector may send a notice to the delinquent of said taxes for which notice a fee of twenty cents will be added to said tax bill. After fourteen days the tax collector may proceed to restrain. By request.

Article 9. To take the sense of the qualified voters on the following question: Is it expedient to revise the Constitution?

Article 10. To see if the town will vote to buy a light road grader that can be used behind a truck and raise and appropriate money for same.

Article 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for painting and refinishing the interior of the town hall.

Article 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$100.00 salary for janitor of town hall.

Article 13. To see if the town will vote to accept the Legislative Special House Bill No. 165 and raise and appropriate \$1,000.00 for construction of Class II roads known as the Merrymeeting Pond Road, the state to give \$4,000.00, this money to be expended in widening, shaping and tarring the road so that state will accept and maintain it.

Article 14. To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year.

#### Part I. Educational Policy

It has been the policy of your superintendent to raise as rapidly as possible the standards of the schools under his supervision to that point that is generally accepted by modern schools as attainable and desirable. By the use of modern standard tests it is now possible to measure quite accurately the achievement of pupils in all of the fundamental subjects: reading, arithmetic, spelling, geography, history, language usage, literature and physiology. By using such tests as much as time will permit the pupils' progress in these subjects have been kept track of, weakenesses isolated, and strengths discovered. Thus each pupil is treated as an individual and helped with his personal problems.

But the teaching of reading, 'riting, and 'rithmetic is not the whole story. The boys and girls who are attending the schools must be developed into law-abiding, self-governing, cooperative citizens. This is a task where the steps of progress are far more difficult to measure. In this regard we assume that a child in school, who makes improvement in his attitude toward his fellow pupils and his teachers and in his habits of conduct in his association with them, is headed in the right direction along the path of respectful citizenship. Experience has shown that children can be happy and their hours in the school as well as in the home can be full of joyous living if they will but open their minds and allow that truth to but touch their souls. Your superintendent and teachers are employed to do what they can to lead the young lives under their guidance into worthy citizenship and it is their sincere desire to meet that great obligation. school is a social group in which each individual has his rights but it is the teacher's duty to insist that a pupil's assertion of his rights does not detract from the rights of the others. It is the teacher's duty also to insist that each child in the school shall act cooperatively with the rest of the group for if he does not act with them, he will act against them, and that cannot be permitted any more in the school than in the adult community.

### Part II. Progress in Administration and Organization (a) Pupil Record System

A famous doctor once said that when he was called to the bedside of a sick person it was as necessary for him to know who had the disease as it was for him to know what disease the patient had, meaning that diseases do not work the same on different individuals. In the same way it is necessary for teachers and superintendent to know as much as possible about each individual pupil. In order to meet this need there has been established throughout this supervisory union a very complete pupil record system. Complete reports of the scholastic progress of the pupils are made regularly by the teachers to the superintendent's office, also the admission or discharge of any pupil is reported promptly by the teacher to the superintendent.

On each pupil's permanent record card there is recorded in addition to his regular subject marks the results of the standard achievement and intelligence tests he has taken. There are two copies of each said record card, one in the superintendent's office and one in the classroom where the child is in attendance. This detailed information, always at hand for reference by the superintendent and by the teacher, enables them to better understand each individual pupil and for that reason makes them more able to help each pupil with his individual problems.

#### (b) Report Cards

Closely tying in with the permanent record system is the system of regular reports made to the parents. After a careful study of modern practices regarding the use of report cards a new form was adopted for use beginning in the fall of 1935. These cards carry to the parents not only the pupils' traditional marks on the usual subjects but also the teacher's opinion of the way the child is getting along as a citizen of the school. Many favorable comments have been received from parents about this new report card.

#### Part III. Instruction

#### (a) Teachers

There were no changes in the teaching force during the school year nor at the end of the year. The following is a list of the teachers for the present school year:

#### (b) Textbooks

Last year in my report I spoke of the plan which had been initiated "to provide in the primary grades reading practice with a vocabulary so chosen that children will be led gradually into an understanding of the words and terms necessary for satisfactory progress in the various subjects." Definite progress has been made in carrying forward this plan. Extension readers in health have been adopted for use in the third grade and in social science in the first grade. These two sets of social science readers, one a primer and the other a first reader, that have been adopted for use in the first grade are designed to extend the pupils' vocabularies into the field of social relations and to give them an understanding of the simple social concepts. Through instruction tving up with these books these little folks are learning a better appreciation of the family relationships, the responsibilities of parents and children in the home, and the duties of the home circle as well as the service rendered to the individuals in the community by such people as the mailman, grocery man, farmer, iceman, garage man and many others. As has been recommended in my previous reports all pupils are equipped now with textbooks in arithmetic, so that each pupil from the first grade to the eighth grade has a textbook for his own individual use. This statement is true now for textbooks in science also. Beside the textbook additions, already mentioned, the following adoptions were made this fall: dictionaries for the three upper grades. geographies for grade three, geographies for grade four, and supplementary pre-primers for first grade. There is an immediate need for twenty more dictionaries: extension readers in art for grades one, two and three; language textbooks for grades three, four. five and six: social science textbooks for grades two. and three, and health textbooks for grades four, five and six. The budget for next year has been prepared with these needs in mind.

#### (c) Eighth Grade Tests

Last June standardized general achievement tests were again given to the eighth grade. The results were far more encouraging than they were the previous year. Whereas in June, 1935, only two of the seven eighth grade pupils were up to standard, four of the six taking the tests in June, 1936, were up to the standard expected of the normal freshman in high school. The other two were somewhat below standard. It is interesting to note that the eighth grade class last June was six months ahead of the

normal eighth grade in reading ability, whereas the year before, when they were seventh graders, they were sixteen months behind in that fundamental school subject. When a class learns as much about reading in one school year as they are normally expected to learn in the average school throughout the country in three years, it speaks well for the quality of the instruction the pupils of the New Durham schools are receiving.

#### Part IV. Finance

Anyone giving the matter serious thought will readily realize that it is impossible to make up in February for the school year beginning the next July a budget that is sure to be an accurate schedule of the actual expenditures. One cannot, of course, foresee many of the emergencies that arise to make claims on the budget. New Durham has had several such emergencies this year. Soon after the budjet for the present year was prepared, a demand for transportation came from the lumber camp on the Middleton Road. Its cost for the balance of the school year was absorbed rather easily because some other items demanded less than was expected, but the continuing of that transportation route through this year, together with the furnishing of transportation for two pupils to South Wolfeboro, will increase the transportation item by about \$735 and will be too much to be completely balanced by any savings that can be made in other items. Another development that has taxed the budget still further was the great increase in the enrollment this fall over that of last year. Schools closed last June with forty-one pupils in attendance at the Plains and twenty-two at the Ridge. This year at least sixty-two have been in attendance at the Plains and from sixteen to nineteen at the Ridge. This increase in enrollment of thirty per cent has nearly doubled the item for textbooks and supplies because nearly all of these new pupils had to have new textbooks and other materials purchased especially for them. It is hoped that the voters will not consider the \$200.00 deficiency appropriation being asked for too unreasonable under the circumstances.

#### Part V. The School Plant

As recommended last year the toilets at the Plains have been replaced by modern septic toilets and in addition the toilet rooms have been remodelled to improve the classrooms and make more space in which

to hang coats.

Another important improvement that has been made is the digging of a well for the Ridge School and the equipping of it with a non-freezing pump. The neighbors who have had their kitchens tracked up for a generation by pupils borrowing water should feel relieved.

Next year new shades should be installed at the Plains to replace the present ones which are very badly worn.

#### Part VI. Child Accounting and Statistics

#### (a) Promotion to High School

The following six pupils received certificates of admission to high school in June: Eleanor Baxter, George Bickford, John Hayes, Curtis Meinelt, Geraldine Scofield, Nelson Wentworth. Five of these entered high school last fall: three, Alton High School, and two, Farmington High School.

#### (b) High School Pupils

Ten New Durham tuition pupils, as compared with eight last year and fifteen the previous year, were enrolled in secondary schools last fall as follows:

Alton High School: Christina Berry, Natalie Berry, George Bickford, Lavinia Gooch, Curtis Meinelt, Mabel Wentworth, Nelson Wentworth, and Roy Weldon.

Farmington High School: Eleanor Baxter and John Chase.

## Part VII. Report of School Health Work by Ruth S. Langille, R. N.

The health of the New Durham school children has been remarkably maintained in view of the number of epidemics prevalent in nearby towns. A few cases of chicken pox and several cases of measles crept in, but so far have been confined to very few families. Early in the fall several cases of skin infections were treated in the homes and quickly cleared up.

A pre-school conference and toxoid clinic helped greatly in safeguarding the health of the young members of the community, and in this way helps to keep the school population well. It is hoped that enough children in New Durham are now protected against diphtheria for life so that that dread disease will never get a foothold in this town.

The correction of physical defects still goes on. Dental clinics and tonsil and adenoid clinics have reduced the numbers of physically handicapped children. There are still several who show the need of glasses to do their best work in school. Many new families have moved in town, adding to the number of children needing attention to physical defects. Clinics will be resumed as soon as possible.

Hot lunches were served in the schools through the generosity of the tax payers who raised a generous sum for this purpose in town meeting. This interest in the health of the school children, shown by New Durham, has been an excellent investment of money. Milk was served to all those who needed it. Some was furnished by funds granted by the Federal Government for this purpose, but this small amount was supplemented by using some of the hot lunch money for this purpose.

The Parent-Teacher's Association gave a series of whist parties during the winter to raise money for

dental clinic work. Part of this money has already been spent, but the clinic is not yet completed. As soon as the dentist can continue this work it will be resumed.


