Warrant for the Annual Town Meeting March 14, 1933 at 9 A. M.

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

2. To see if the Town will vote to accept and adopt the reports of the Town Officers as printed in the annual report, or take any action thereto.

3. To raise and appropriate money to defray town charges for the ensuing year.

4. To raise money for the support of highways and bridges.

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the amount of money necessary to secure State Aid for the permanent improvement of highways.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for snow removal.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for interest on notes and insurance.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 to add to the sum already held by the Town for the purpose of rebuilding Stockman's Bridge.

9. To see if the Town will vote to change the rate of labor on the highways.

10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the Free Public Library including librarian's salary.

11. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through the Collector's deeds.

12. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the poor.

13. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

14. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to deed to the State, the Wm. Collins pasture land to make a State Forest.

15. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to dispose of the Wm. Collins field, reserving that part now used as a ball park.

16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell the stove formerly in the Town Hall.

17. To see what action the Town will take in regard to repairing highway equipment and if necessary to raise and appropriated money for the same.

18. To see what sum of money the Town will

vote to raise and appropriate for the care of cemeteries.

19. To see if the Town will vote to raise money to pay taxes on property bought by the Town.

20. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for re-painting inside of Town Hall.

21. To see if the Town will vote to let the Town Hall to the Four H Club for basket ball.

22. To see if the Town will vote to elect the Librarian at the Annual March meeting each year.

23. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen, with the consent of the New Hampshire State authorities, to transfer to the Town of East Kingston, the State Aid Road Construction money, if needed to complete Route No. 109 to Route No. 108 in Burnt Swamp District in East Kingston with the provision that labor and trucks may be hired from South Hampton, while the sum is being expended.

24. To see if the Town will vote to have all candidates for Town office file their name with the Town Clerk, at least six days previous to the annual town meeting, and a charge for filing made of \$1.00 to cover cost of printing the ballots.

25. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to make a three year contract for Snow Removal.

26. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Report of the Superintendent of Schools

To the School Board and Citizens of South Hampton:

It is my privilege to submit my sixth annual report as Superintendent of the South Hampton Schools.

At the end of this report will be found a report given by the School Nurse.

The number of pupils enrolled last year was forty-two. This number represents an increase of two over the enrollment of the year before. The attendance averaged 93.65 percent of the membership. The state average for this period was 95.3 percent. Five pupils were neither absent nor tardy. Three pupils completed the work of grade eight. Two of these entered high school in September.

The following table shows the enrollment in the South Hampton Schools during the past five years:

Money provided by the Red Cross has been used to provide first aid material for the school.

The schools of South Hampton were in session 350 half-days, the average for elementary schools of the state for this period was 354.8.

The School Nurse, Miss Helen Thomas, has continued her good work in the schools. She has made many home visits as well as the regular school calls in the interest of children's health. She has been generous in furnishing transportation to children at clinics and other remedial work.

Our teaching force is composed of persons well trained professionally and competent in execution of work. The tests which we apply reveal commendable work and a spirit running through the schools which cannot fail to bring satisfactory results. The interest of the pupils which is strong evidence of success in school work is manifest to a remarkable degree. The schools are well equipped for their work.

Electric lights were installed last fall in the halls and classrooms of the Barnard School. The lights have been of much help to the children and teachers on dark days and on late afternoons of the short winter days. The Trustees of the Barnard School Fund have made many improvements in the building during the last five or six years. A building that quite recently had but few of the characteristics of a standard school, has been made modern to a very great extent. We look forward to a continuation of the Trustees' interest in further improvements.

Schools are stressing the following good citizenship traits, cleanliness, cooperation, courtesy, dependableness, honesty, obedience, politeness, promptness, quietness and truthfulness. These characteristics are beginning to receive greater importance in rating elementary school pupils. When-

ever a report card indicates a citizenship habit unsatisfactory or a failure in scholastic work, parents are urged to confer with the teacher and thus cooperate in securing improvement. It is to every child's advantage that the school and the home have a mutual understanding of his needs.

Anything that may be done to interrupt the progress of the schools would have disastrous results. To everyone interested in our national well-being, the welfare and maintenance of our publicly supported schools is a matter of first concern. If our children and young people are given a chance to prepare well and thoroughly for the future our hope and confidence remains unimpaired.

A well-known educator has written the following: "The School Board Member is an important force in shaping the course of education. As such he is also a powerful instrument in guiding the destiny of the state, the nation, and society. A school may add immeasurably to the advancement of human welfare. To do this its administrators must be wise, energetic, and courageous. The compensation which they receive is not in money, nor even in honor, but is in the consciousness of having helped as fully as possible in training young men and women for the part which they are to play in American state and national life, and for that larger part which America is to play in the affairs of the world."

In conclusion I wish to express my appreciation of the fine spirit of cooperation on the part of the School Board, Teachers, Trustees of the Barnard Trust Fund, and the general community.
