Brett School in said Tamworth on Wednesday, the fifteenth of March, next, at 7:00 o'clock in the afternoon for the deliberative session of the Town Meeting at which time action will be taken upon the remaining articles of this warrant.

FINANCE COMMITTEE REPORT

The Finance Committee met with representatives from the various agencies and organizations seeking town funds. For each request we reviewed the actual amount and value of service provided to Tamworth residents, future plans of the organization, the viability of its operation as seen in its financial accounting, other funding sources, and its overall contribution to the quality of Tamworth.

A majority of the Committee opposes the request for funds from the Bearcamp Valley School and Children's Center. This does not deny the need for the services provided by this child care center. In fact, the committee feels that child care is a vital service for this town. The entire committee is concerned with the apparent fragileness of the Bearcamp Valley Center enterprise. We recommend that the Town study the issue of providing child care service for residents in need and develop a plan for ensuring a quality, cost effective system that the Town could help support.

The full Committee abstained on the Meals on Wheels article, although in favor of the program presented by its representatives. At the time of our meeting (January 20th) they announced a reduction in cost per meal from \$1.50 to \$1.00. The Committee favors funding the article at this cost which totals \$12,240.

The Finance Committee supports a future full time police department. The current part time officers perform a valuable service, however it is not enough. A full time department would give the town wider, more consistent coverage. The increased cost will be more than offset by the increased service. Partial funding may be available for the Town. We believe it is time for a selectmen's advisory committee to plan the implementation of this full time department for next year.

The Town's liability when plowing driveways and private roads continues to come to our attention. There is a distinction that needs to be drawn between driveways and private roads. Note that a majority of the committee opposes plowing driveways yet favors plowing private roads.

Finance Committee thoughts: We feel it would be to the Town's advantage for the Cook and Chocorua libraries, as well as the Brett School library, to mesh services as much as possible. Future funding of 4th of July celebrations might best rely on donations solicited during the parade, family-day activities, and evening fireworks. The town operations have expanded to the level where the possibility of a Town Administrator/Manager needs to be explored.

TREASURER'S REPORT

During 1999, all funds under the jurisdiction of the Treasurer's Office were invested so that the town would receive the maximum interest available at the time of the investment. Citizen's Bank and the Municipal Deposit Investment Pool both offered excellent yields, along with safety through full collateralization.

We borrowed \$1. million in tax anticipation notes in April, at a cost of \$27,441.67, for the use of this money until December 31. Citizen's Bank was the low bidder. However, investments earned a total of \$72,441.21, so the town gained \$45,029.54 in interest while using this money.

I welcome any questions concerning the office of Town Treasurer at any time. After all, this is your money. I also welcome any comments, concerns, or suggestions relative to the Treasurer's duties.

Special thanks go to Selectmen's Assistant Janet Conner, Town Clerk/Tax Collector Theresa Boewe, Selectmen John Roberts, Mariette Ross, and Lanette Goodson, and the staff at Bank of New Hampshire, Citizen's Bank, Fleet Bank, and Municipal Deposit Investment Pool for their help and support. TAMWORTH FIRE DEPARTMENT REPORT

The Tamworth Fire Department had 103 runs in 1999.

Members put in over 531 hours of training this year. Training included radiological emergencies, self-contained breathing apparatus, safety, lighting, ladders, small engines, radio procedures, incident command system, road rules, road names, infectious disease policy, safety policy, forestry tools, backflushing dry hydrants, vehicle extrication, scene management, inspections, swift water rescue, pumping with portable pumps, responding to the terrorist threat, CPR, walk through of Barnstormers Theater and sprinkler explanation, State sawyer class, forest fire pumps and advanced wilderness first aid.

The number of chimney fires has stayed about the same for the last four years. We are still finding an occasional chimney without a cleanout at the bottom. Without a cleanout, it is impossible to clean all of the creosote out after the chimney has been cleaned. If something hot drops into this built-up creosote, you can have a real hot fire. If the fire gets hot enough, the chimney liner will crack and the fire can spread to the structure. For chimneys with cleanouts, make sure the cleanout door closes tight so hot embers will not fall into the room, also that cold air does not enter the open or loose door cooling down the chimney which causes creosote buildup.

We have had an increase in false alarm runs over the last several years. This is due to more alarm systems being installed in homes and public buildings connected to a centralized alarm center. They can be set off by thunderstorms, wind, power surges, dirty detectors, and burning food on the stove.

We should all remember to check our homes with safety in mind for both adults and young children. Put dummy plugs in unused electrical outlets, do not overload an outlet with too many electrical cords, clean (vacuum) smoke detectors and change the batteries if they have one, at least once a year. Be sure to test smoke detectors once a month. They save lives.

REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

To aid your Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department and State Forest Ranger, contact your local Warden or Fire Department to find out if a permit is required before doing ANY outside burning. Fire permits are required for any open burning unless the ground is completely covered with snow where the burning will be done. Violations of RSA 227-L:17, the fire permit law and other burning laws of the State of New Hampshire are misdemeanors punishable by fines of up to \$2,000 and/or a year in jail. Violators are also liable for all fire suppression costs. To obtain a permit in Tamworth call 323-8833.

There are eleven Forest Rangers who work for the New Hampshire Division of Forests and Land, Forest Protection Bureau. Durning the 1999 season Forest Rangers were busy assisting communities with suppression of difficult and remote multi-day fires. Forest Rangers have also investigated numberous complaints regarding violations of the timber harvest and forest fire laws, and taken enforcement action to ensure compliance. If you have any questions regarding forest fire or timber harvest laws, please call our office at 271-2217.

There are 2400 Forest Fire Wardens and Deputy Forest Fire Wardens throughout the state. Each town has a Forest Fire Warden and several Deputy Wardens who assist the Forest Rangers with forest fire suppression, prevention, and law enforcement. The 1999 fire season was a challenging but safe year for wildland firefighters in New Hampshire. The severe drought conditions throughout the spring and summer months combined with residual effects of 1998 Ice Storm, resulted in a dramatic increase in wildland fires. In addition to burning in excess of 452 acres, 35 structures were also impacted by wildfire. Wildland fires in the urban interface is a serious concern for both landowners and firefighters. Homeowners can help protect their structures by maintaining adequate green space around them and making sure that houses are properly identified with street numbers.

The State of New Hampshire operates 15 fire towers, 2 mobile patrols and 3 contract aircraft patrols. This early detection and reports from citizens aid in the quick response from local fire departments. This is a critical factor in controlling the size of

wildland fires and keeping the loss of property and suppression costs as low as possible.

TAMWORTH RESCUE SQUAD REPORT

I would like to thank the Tamworth community for its support during the past year. Through donations to the squad we were able to purchase a special training dummy that is capable of practicing heart monitoring, blood pressures, endotracheal intubations, IV insertions, and performance of CPR. This equipment will enable us to become more proficient at these skills and use them effectively when needed.

I also thank the members of the Tamworth Rescue Squad for their dedicated response to calls 24 hours a day and the hours of training they have volunteered for the town. The members of the Tamworth Rescue Squad have had a busy year training and responding to calls in 1999. We currently have 12 members, 2 of which are EMT – Intermediates, 7 are EMT – Basics, and 2 more have recently tested to become EMT – Basics. We expect that we will have a few more members attending additional training to become EMT – Intermediates this year. Our plan is to have a highly trained diversified group of rescuers available to respond in an emergency.

We were able to continue our participation in other community activities during 1999 including sponsoring a Bike Safety Rodeo at the KA Brett School, educating the students at KA Brett and Bearcamp Valley about EMS during EMS week, and Baskets of Warmth over the holidays for elderly and others in town.

We are also planning to continue working in the community this year by offering a community based CPR course. Those in need of CPR are best helped when assistance begins with a call to 911 and immediate CPR. As always we are looking for those in the community that would like to help those in need. We have medical and non-medical members.

AGENCY INFORMATION

Tamworth Community Nurse Association continues to function as a licensed community health agency. Our annual inspection by the NH Bureau of Health Facilities was deficiency free once again. Board policy, operating procedures, patient charts and documentation were reviewed for content and accuracy.

John Patten, M.D. continues to serve as the Medical Advisor to TCNA. His willingness to donate his time, knowledge, and efforts has been greatly appreciated.

TCNA continues to function as a non-charging agency which receives no reimbursement from insurance companies. Hence, referrals to other agencies for supplemental services continue to be an important function we provide as well as overseeing and collaborating these services. Supplemental services of physical, occupational, speech, and IV therapies, social workers, home health aides, homemakers and hospice care have all been provided to Tamworth residents by other area agencies. We are grateful for the cooperative efforts extended to us by Carroll County Health and Homecare Services. Northern Carroll County VNA and Hospice, and VNA and Hospice of Southern Carroll County. All have provided valuable assistance for Tamworth residents enabling them to remain in their homes.

AGENCY FUNCTIONS AND PROGRAMS

The Board of Directors of TCNA continues to meet on a monthly basis to direct agency functions and operations and to handle financial matters. The Board members and the Friends of TCNA (formally the summer board) volunteer their time with board activities such as clinics and screenings, special programs and fund raising events. With their guidance and assistance and support from the townspeople we have continued to function as a non-profit, non-charging community health agency.

Monthly blood pressure clinics continue in the TCNA office on the last Wednesday of every month from 12 to 1 PM and on a monthly basis at the Congregate Meal site on the third Monday of each month. Office hours are also available Monday through Thursday 9 to 11 AM and Fridays by appointment for blood pressure checks or other health questions, concerns, and problems.

The Adult Health Screening cosponsored with the Whittier Lions Club and Memorial Hospital was held in the fall this year. This change in schedule was made to determine if offering flu shots at the screening would draw more participants. There were a record number of participants. 181 people came for the screenings and/or flu shot. Screenings for basic vision, glaucoma, podiatry, hearing, blood pressure, blood glucose, cholesterol, hemoglobin, pulmonary function, height, weight and body fat analysis along with nutrition counseling were offered. Also available was information on Living Wills/Advanced Directives, chiropractic advise and Reiki demonstrations. We are very thankful to all the area professionals who donated their time for this valuable service.

The Flu Clinic was held at the office on October 21st. All 350 doses ordered were administered to our homebound patients or those who came to the flu clinic oral health screening.

The dental program at the Kenneth Brett School is offered in the fall and spring to all children eligible for the free or reduced lunch program. Dr. Michael Glick continues as the providing dentist. Children are transported to his office in Ossipee by our board members. We are very appreciative of the Tamworth Foundation for their continued support to all members that drove.

The TCNA office is actively involved with the Tamworth Christmas project (TCCP), a task force dedicated to offering gifts to residents in need at Christmas. The cooperative effort of members and the division of tasks enhances the smooth operations of this project, not to mention the generosity of the townspeople and area businesses. Gifts of sweat suits, hats, mittens, boots, coats, gift certificates, sundry items, books, turkey baskets, and miscellaneous items

were offered to over 70 children in town. Many thanks to those who helped or donated.

The "loaner" closet continues to be of great use by many residents. Wheelchairs, commodes, walkers, canes, crutches, car seats, and assorted supplies are available free of charge. We thank all who have donated items and encourage all residents to use the equipment and supplies.

Our "skilled: nursing care services, offered in the office and at home, as needed,

continue to be directed by the patients physicians. Referrals are received from physicians, hospitals, family members and patients themselves. After an initial assessment is obtained, TCNA can continue visits and collaborate care with their physicians consent. Skilled care procedures include dressing changes, injections, blood draws, suture and staple removal, assessment of vital signs, safety, adherence to medication regime, and monitoring of various disease processes such as diabetes, cardiac and pulmonary disease, stroke, and cancer to name a few. Patient teaching and education are also vital aspects in maintaining the health of the community.

Attending conferences, seminars, networking programs and other meetings is yet another area of necessity for the agency. This includes keeping updated on medical treatments, procedures, and health issues as well as maintaining required continuing education units for RN licensure. Also meeting with area home health agencies providing supplemental services to our patients is of paramount importance.

The Tamworth Community Nurse Association is also this areas Salvation Army Unit Station. Some emergency funds are available for Tamworth or Sandwich residents experiencing a financial crisis when all other financial avenues have been exhausted.

In an effort to identify and meet the needs of the community, TCNA works closely throughout the year with local clergy, the Community Food Pantry and Brett School. The "Journey Thru Grief" support group continues to be offered in the spring and fall. This is a free support group for those suffering a loss. The Tamworth Outing Club is an organization that has been promoting outdoor activities for the members of our community since 1935. Our winter programs represent the crescendo of our activity calendar. A sampling follows:

- The Junior Ski Program. For both alpine and nordic skiers, his program involves multitudes of volunteers and well over 50 children. The alpine program uses the King Pine facility as well as Attitash and Cranmore at our season's end "snow day". A large thanks goes to the Tamworth Foundation for its support. The cross-country skiers stride and skate all over the valley with special emphasis on our locally groomed trails. Speaking of which...
- Grooming for skate and classical skiing. With our snowmobile and grooming drags, we manicure the trails in the Hemenway State Forest (look for the maps on the parking area's bulletin boards) and in the Wonalancet intervale. Please, no dogs near the sheep farm. Do not expect great conditions at all times! We have been expanding the trail system there, so there is plenty of room to move!
- The Tamworth Winter Carnival. The Carnival was reinvented by the efforts of the TOC, the Remick Foundation, and the Town of Tamworth Recreation Department. It is a full day of outdoor activity at the Remick pasture in the village including groomed skiing, sledding, ice skating, horse drawn sleigh rides, fun games and races as well as great food and musical entertainment. There is something for everyone during this late February event.
- The Ned Behr Tower to Town Trail. Another winter endeavor has been the development of "The Ned Behr Tower to Town Trail". As the name implies, it is a backcountry ski trail for Lardy skiers from the Hemenway State Forest to the village. Wo give thanks to the State of New Hampshire and all the private landowners for allowing this to happen. Again, the sweat of our core members is evident. There is more work to do, with bridge building, marking and mapping, so there is plenty of room for interested people to further develop this trail.
- The Tamworth Sled Dog Race. Come watch the most scenic sled dog race in New England, starting on the frozen expanse of Lake Chocorua. The TOC's sponsorship has been a tradition for more than 45 years.

The green grass of spring awakens our **baseball programs**. The Bambino league involves more than 150 children (6 to 12 years old) while the Babe Ruth Program further develops the older kid's talents. We stress the enjoyment of baseball and the camaraderie of getting together with the surrounding towns for the thrill of friendly competition. We appreciate the involvement of the parents and coaches as well as the generous financial support of the town.

Family Day, July 4th, brings the smell of a chicken barbecue, the sight of our TOC float, and the sounds of music and laughter with the beginning of the weekly summer **square dances** on Saturday evenings. We have our picnic and annual meeting at the top of Page Hill in August and the occasional hike and canoe trips. We participate in the state's "adopt a highway" program in May, July and October. Soon it will be time to trim and clear our extensive trail system. We enjoy the energy that fall brings us and welcome others who would like to join in this effort.

REPORT OF THE LAKES REGION PLANNING COMMISSION

Lakes Region Planning Commission (LRPC) is an organization serving the needs of 31 municipalities, the LRPC provides a unique range of services that are not found elsewhere. Your continued support reflects a commitment to regional programs that focus on solving problems related to land use, the environment, transportation, and economic development.

Below are highlights from a list of services we provided on behalf of your community and the region during the past year. Your continued membership assures that vital planning, coordination, and educational efforts will continue in the future.

- provided the town with information regarding the location of a proposed oil storage facility on property that appeared to be mostly wetland;
- met with the Lake Chocorua Foundation and an engineer regarding mitigation measures from road run-off into the lake and discussed future design and funding options;
- offered assistance to the town regarding reviewing drafts of a proposed ordinance which would exclude transfer solid waste facilities;
- researched non-conforming uses for the planning board;
- offered assistance to facilitate local meeting relative to growth and zoning;
- provided information regarding commercial solid waste transfer facilities;
- furnished a copy of the town's proposed zoning map;
- provided the Technical Advisory Committee with traffic count information on Routes 25 and 113;
- assisted the Board of Selectmen on how to obtain sample petitions;
- provided a Tamworth resident with information regarding current use;
- Met with selectmen to inform the community on the results of the design team's efforts regarding Chocorua Lake;
- fulfilled regional efforts, leading to the completion of the *Route 16 Corridor Study*, which includes several innovative transportation and land use recommendations that can benefit all communities;
- in cooperation with the NHDepartment of Transportation (DOT) and the Office of State Planning(OSP), LRPC provided technical and administrative support for a pilot land use/transportation study;
- provided the Tamworth Planning Board with five copies of the 1998-1999
 NH Edition Planning and Land Use Regulations at considerable savings;
- coordinated the 14th annual Household Hazardous Waste Collection Day, the largest multi-site collection in N H;
- co-hosted and organized three public Municipal Law Lectures where practicing attorneys provide a legal perspective on local planning, zoning and other municipal issues;

- performed substantial research leading to the publication of the *Lakes Region Scenic Byway Corridor Management Plan*. The Plan is a guide for local communities interested in maintaining or enhancing the qualities of a scenie Byway;
- convened a citizen educational workshop on implementing a successful community survey;
- convened a citizen educational workshop on the location of cellular towers;
- completed the 1999 update to the Regional Transportation Improvement Program, which is used by the NHDOT for the biennial update to the Ten-Year Plan;
- in cooperation with the NH Department of Environmental Services(DES), LRPC completed the second year of community outreach that sought priority natural, cultural, and historic resources in all communities. Over 1300 features have been identified;
- maintained the Regional Census Data Center, an extensive database of demographic and socioeconomic data on the region, state, and the U.S.;
- continued area commission meetings to facilitate opportunities for local communities and commissioners to discuss regional projects and priorities, and the role of the commissioner;
- provided information, including local regulatory recommendations, to communities about the National Flood Insurance Program and;
- enhanced LRPC's Web Site, <u>www.lakesrpc.org</u>, for the delivery of timely information on meeting schedules, LRPC activities, and databases providing traffic count and socioeconomic information to our members and the greater public.

TRI-COUNTY COMMUNITY ACTION ANNUAL REPORT

The Carroll County Community Contact office is a private, non-profit Center for Families and Community Services that was established in 1984, operating from our base at 5 Folsom Road, Center Ossipee, New Hampshire. We have nine regularly scheduled satellite office sites located throughout Carroll County.

The Carroll County Community Contact office has provided services for 785 of Tamworth's citizens, processing 189 fuel applications, 49 being elderly and 42 disabled, and linked 505 with other Community Action Programs.

TRI-COUNTY COMMUNITY ACTION HAS SPENT \$56,862.97 ON TAMWORTH CITIZENS BETWEEN JULY 1, 1998 AND JUNE 30, 1999.

Community Contact is depended upon funding from your town and neighboring communities county-wide to provide necessary services for the less fortunate citizens in our communities. The local funds are combined with the Community Services Block Grant, Fuel Assistance, New Hampshire Emergency Shelter Grant, Homeless Programs, FEMA McKinney, and private and corporate benefactors. We also are the conduit through which the USDA Surplus Food gets distributed to the 11 food pantries and 4 Dinner Bells throughout Carroll County in order to serve our residents.

Carroll County Community Contact is known as a family friendly agency. Our staff has the trust of the entire county. We are able to successfully partner with individual families and assist them one-on-one to identify barriers blocking the way to self-sufficiency and the resources to overcome these barriers. We provided information, referrals and assisted with advocacy for more than 11,000 households in Carroll County last year.

We have greatly appreciated the support, cooperation and partnership with your elected officials, staff, and residents, as well as other social service agencies, and our clients.

TRUSTEES OF TRUST FUNDS AND CEMETERY COMMISSIONERS REPORT

As trustees we are currently responsible for the safe keeping and investment of approximately \$575,000 in trust and reserve funds. The details of these funds are shown on the accompanying schedules.

As of December 31, 1997 we are holding \$149,980.94 in permanent trust funds for such purposes as cemetery maintenance, library, park, etc. In addition, we are holding \$425,197.54 in capital reserve funds. These are non-permanent funds established for the purpose of special education, purchasing fire trucks, recycling equipment or highway equipment, purchasing land and/or buildings for town use, etc.

As reported in previous years, we have been in the process of moving our investments from local banks to the NH Public Deposit Investment Pool. This provides us with a favorable return on our investment. For 1997 the average annualized yield was 5.39%.

COOK MEMORIAL LIBRARY 1999 ANNUAL REPORT

The Cook Memorial Library, a public library open 22 hours a week, meets the needs of the Tamworth community by providing a variety of educational, recreational and informational services. Year-round programs, which are free and open to both residents and nonresidents, include weekly storytime for preschoolers, book talks and discussions, poetry contests, the annual book and bake sale, and the ever-popular Summer Reading Program.

In 1999, the library was busier than ever, with nearly 9,000 patron visits and over 14,000 items borrowed, including books, audios, videos, magazines, book tapes and music CDs. Additionally, 784 interlibrary loans were processed, and 139 community meetings (an increase of 37%) were held on the premises.

Library computers were used by patrons of all ages. A total of 474 patrons used the public access Internet computer, up 40% from 1998, and a grant from International Paper purchased a second Internet computer in December. The New Hampshire State Library and NH Jobworks provided an additional Internet computer for patrons to use for job searches. Internet training is free and available to all patrons. Cook Memorial Library maintains a website, with interesting links to explore, designed to be an excellent entry point to the World Wide Web. Our new website address is www.tamworth.lib.nh.us.

I am grateful and proud to be associated with a small library, which is used and supported by its community so enthusiastically. Special thanks go to our faithful weekly volunteers, Lois Maxner and Ruth Timchak, and to Jean Ulitz and her genealogy room team. The others who donated books, audios and videos to the library collection for the whole town to enjoy, and/or shared their talents and energy on behalf of library programs are too numerous to mention by name, but are appreciated. The newly reorganized Friends of the Library is eagerly involved in a variety of library projects and the Board of Trustees continues to move forward with plans for the renovation of the library.

CONSERVATION COMMISSION REPORT

DREDGE AND FILL

There have been six dredge and fill applications this year. The Tamworth Conservation Commission (TCC) has made site visits to all and recommended approval to the State, though with some conditions to lessen the environmental impact. The State has already approved five of them. Several are for facilities used by the public, such as: Town of Tamworth Transfer Station, Chocorua Lake project to deter further pollution of the lake, snowmobile bridge across Swift River at Fowlers Mill, and the Barnstormers Theatre for drainage from the basement.

TRAILS

The trail to the Great Hill Tower from the parking lot on the west side of the hill has been cleared twice, once to clear debris from the January '98 ice storm, and again to clear slash after it was lumbered for salvage timber from the ice storm. This trail became a responsibility of TCC at the time the Town accepted the gift of the Tower from the State of New Hampshire. There has been some vandalism on the trails around Jackman Pond.

LAND USE CHANGE TAX

TCC is requesting an article in the 2000 Warrant that funds received by the Town from Land Use Change Tax (i.e. the penalty for changing land from current restricted use status with its lower tax rate, to regular use for purposes such as development) go to the Town's Conservation Fund, managed by TCC primarily to protect valuable land resources which might otherwise be developed. January issue of Tamworth Civic News has an article by John Mersfelder, which explains the proposal in detail.

EASEMENTS

One new easement has been accepted by the Town – on the former Mabel Evans land off Old Route 25, now owned by Hayfield Trust – to protect this prime agricultural land, which is part of the Bearcamp River Watershed and has open space and scenic values. Easements must be documented and monitored, a responsibility of TCC. Work is being done by TCC members and other volunteers, but more help is needed, so the task doesn't fall too heavily on one or two people.

TOWN TRANSFER STATION

Bergeron Civil Engineers representative, Martin Risley, made a full presentation of the proposed Town Transfer Station to TCC at its November meeting, with maps and full opportunity for discussion. Land for it is a 94 acre plot on new Route 25, with only 14 acres needed for the transfer station. This offers other uses for 80 acres, possibly for a town forest. The plan is designed to meet all State requirements; TCC voted to approve it as submitted, as far as its wetland impact goes, without any further conditions.

NH LAND & COMMUNITY HERITAGE COMMISSION

As reported last year, TCC has endorsed the report of this commission to propose legislation for permanent funding for a land protection program. This year TCC has further supported the proposed program, urging the Senate and House Budget Committee to vote in favor. However the legislature voted not to fund it this year; search is being made for funding. The Lakes Region Planning Commission is developing a list of lands needing protection. Ten have been suggested for Tamworth so far.

MEETINGS

TCC have attended a number of meetings this year, among them – Lakes Region Planning Commission for a permanent site for household hazardous waste collection, over a month or more; Route 16 corridor study and NH Association of Conservation Commissions Annual Meeting. TCC held a public meeting on black bears, with Chairman Kris Bontaites as speaker.

OTHER

"Tamworth Today". TCC is asked to send a copy of the trails map, and an article on easement protection including maps for "Tamworth Today", a profile and guidebook for the town to be published by the Tamworth Civic Association.

Tamworth Family Day. This year TCC set up a both with informational material, staffed by three of its members. A questionnaire was distributed and a map of protected areas displayed with a request to public to pin point additional areas needing protection.

Dredge and Fill Minimum Impact. There have been 8 applications for minimum impact work in wetlands. These are automatically approved by the State so work may begin immediately, unless the application is incomplete or TCC reports to the State that the project will have more than minimum impact.

Household Hazardous Waste Collection. TCC gives annual support to this program, which is sponsored by the Lakes Region Planning Commission.

Chocorua Lake Conservation Foundation. The Chairman of the Foundation spoke at the August meeting of TCC about pollution problems in the lake and outlined a berm/swale project, and effort to secure easements along Chocorua River to combat the problem. TCC offered some suggestions on the berm/swale work and voted to approve the project to the State.

Biosolids. The Town Committee on Biosolids, on which TCC is represented, and which was formed last year, made its report to the Selectmen this spring with a proposal that the report be adopted as a health ordinance.
