WARRANT FOR THE ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

The State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Tilton, in the County of Belknap, Qualified to vote in town affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Tilton-Northfield High School in said town on Tuesday, March 7, 1972 at 10:00 o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Town Clerk for a term of three years, one Road Agent for the ensuing year, one Trustee of Trust Funds for a term of three years, two Auditors for the ensuing year, one member of the Park Commission for a term of two years, one Selectman for a term of three years.
- 2. To see if the Town will vote on the adoption of the amendments to the existing Town Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Planning Board and by the special ballot prepared for same.
- 3. (A) To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of the Municipal Budget Act. (RSA 32:1)
- (3) If "A" above is in the affirmative, to see if the Town will vote that the budget committee consist of six members-at-large, the term of the office for one third of the members-at-large to be for one year, one third for two years, and one third for three years, and each year thereafter one third shall be elected for a term of three years until their successors are elected or appointed and qualified. (RSA 32:2)
- (C) If "A" above is in the affirmative, to see if the Moderator shall appoint the members-at-large for the budget committee, and thereafter one third of the members-at-large shall be elected by ballot at the annual town meeting.

- (D) If "A" above is in the affirmative, to see if the Town will vote that each of the elected or appointed members-at-large shall receive an annual compensation of fifty dollars.
- 4. To see if the Town will appropriate the sum of \$6600.00 for Salary and Expenses for the employment of one full time Selectman.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to change the existing boundaries of the Tilton portion of the Tilton-Northfield Fire District to the boundaries of the Town of Tilton. (by Petition).
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1500.00 for the use of the Winnisquam Fire Department.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3350.00 for the use of the District Nursing Association.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5400.00 to be used by the Road Agent in a program to resurface streets and roads in Tilton. This program to be planned and administered by the elected Road Agent of the Town with the advice and consent of the Selectmen.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$7956.75 to continue the services of the Lakes Region Disposal Company, Inc. to collect Town rubbish.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4750.00 for the Tilton-Northfield Recreation Council to maintain a year round program. (A duplicate article appears in the Northfield Warrant).
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$149.97 to obtain Town Road Aid, the state to appropriate the sum of \$999.78.

- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to be put in an existing Building Fund savings account. This fund to be contingent on the motion and amendment of the 1962 Town Meeting. (A duplicate article appears in the Northfield Warrant).
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for the control of White Pine Blister Rust.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for partial participation in the Lakes Region Association, this money to be spent for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages, as well as conservation of natural resources of the Town, in cooperation with the other towns in the Lakes Region.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for secretarial, printing and related office expense of the Tilton Planning Board.
- 16. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day Expense.
- 17. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of Cemeteries.
- 18. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for use of Hospitals.
- 19. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Civil Defense.
- 20. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of the Housing Authorities Law.
- 21. To see what action the Town will take in regard to the care of trees and stumps and raise money for same.
- 22. To see if the Town will vote to have the State Tax Commission conduct a yearly audit of the Town books,

when this service becomes available and to appropriate money for same.

- 23. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the New Hampshire Humane Society.
- 24. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Selectmen to appoint a Town Tax Assessor and appropriate money for same.
- 25. To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount on early paid taxes as follows: Two percent if the Tax Bill is paid within thirty days from date of bill.
- 26. To see if the Town will vote to allow Selectmen to administer or dispose of any property acquired by Tax Deed after proper advertising.
- 27. To see if the Town will vote to continue its membership in the New Hampshire Municipal Association.
- 28. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for new equipment.
- 29. To see if the Town will vote to adopt a Dog Leash Law. (by petition).
- 30. To see if the Town will vote to increase the amount of exemption upon dormitories, dining rooms and kitchens of the Tilton School from \$150,000.00 by assessed valuation to \$1,000,000.00 of assessed valuation in accordance with the provisions of New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated, Chapter 72, Sec. 23 (1v). (by petition).
- 31. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 32. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Conservation Commission under the provisions of RSA 36, and that the Selectmen shall appoint said Commission,

to consist of (three to seven) members, within ten days of the said annual meeting, and that said Selectmen shall also designate, for the purpose of calling the first Commission meeting, a temporary chairman.

- 33. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for all purposes for ensuing year.
- 34. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the road known as Cottage Drive near Oriole Cabins and to revert land back to abutting owners.
- 35. To see what action the Town will take in regards to the reports of its officers and agents.
- 36. To choose any other officers and agents for the year ensuing.
- 37. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The polls shall be closed not earlier than six o'clock in the evening.

REPORT OF FULL TIME SELECTMAN

The year 1971 was a very busy one. The increased work load included issuing forty building permits. These were broken down as one accessory building, one store building, three private garages, twenty-five additions and alterations, two new signs, two mobile homes and six new houses.

Forty-four Septic Systems were inspected which included five that were old systems that had ruptured. We in Tilton now can replace old systems due to a ruling and approved plans which were designed by Roland Boudreau.

On November 15, 1971 I spent one day with Mr. Maxwell Roby of Franklin. We perambulated or walked the lines between Tilton and Franklin and marked in white lead all the granite markers of which there were nine. This is a must which has been done every seven years. Even though I had been on the Board of Selectmen for eight years I did this for the first time, as we had no previous record of the date this was last done.

Two hundred and sixty-eight (268) transfers of property came through in 1971 to make a new high total of one thousand and sixty-nine (1069) parcels of land in Tilton. Two parcels which were missed in 1966 were added to the tax list this year.

1971 was not without incidents. As the records show we had a Police problem which erupted at Town Meeting, as well as an officer being suspended in January.

The work load of a normal day increased by fifty per cent during the year. Many people have commented on the Selectmen's office being at their convenience on a full time basis.

There are a minority who feel this job is not needed

but when you are dealing with more than one half of a million dollars (\$500,000.00) budget, I am sure no one would want a part time board to administer this office.

Like any board we had our differences of opinions which sometimes makes for good government. We did however work together to get the Town Offices set up in a short time after our bad fire in December.

Everyone did more than was expected of them under adverse conditions. I feel that this Full Time Selectman job should be continued whether I am in office or someone else has it.

This is a service the taxpayers, voters and people in general deserve in Tilton. The office door is open for your advice, or questions or whatever service you request.

There are at present 29 volunteer firemen enrolled in the Department. A Regular Meeting, Officers' Meet-

ing and a Drill are held once each month as well as attendance at Mutual Aid Meetings and Fire Schools.

Four (4) members attended the two day fire school held in June at Lily Pond Fire Training School.

Five (5) dry hydrants have been installed in the area covered by the Winnisquam Fire Department. Three (3) of these were installed by the Department at its own expense and two (2) were installed by home owners. Two (2) more have been requested by owners.

Two hundred feet each of 1½ inch and 2½ inch new hose was purchased and two (2) new nozzles.

A new electric hose reel was installed on Engine No. 1.

Two (2) new oxygen inhalator masks were purchased making a total of three (3).

A total of 20 Plectrons or radio alert monitors are in use in the homes of Department members resulting in a faster response to alarm calls.

Approximately 160 children in the Winnisquam Area attended this year's annual Carole Davis Children's Christmas Party on December 19th, met a real Santa Claus and were given presents, candy and ice cream and a ride on the Fire Truck.

The Department built a 36 by 50 foot addition, with separate heating plant, to the Fire Station to be used as a public meeting hall. This building was paid for out of the Department's own funds, a donation from the Ladies Auxiliary and private donations. The labor was furnished by the members of the Department and by private donations of time and use of equipment by friends of the Department.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

Lest we forget — It can happen here.

Disastrous forest and brush fires that destroy hundreds of homes are more prevalent on the west coast with their dry seasons and strong dry hot winds but 25 years ago this fall is the anniversary of a disaster that devastated large areas of northern New England leaving villages in ashes with rows of cellar holes and chimneys in a number of summer vacation home locations. Many lives were lost on that destructive day of October 23, 1947; nothing could stop the wind driven flames.

It is true such conditions are unusual for New Hampshire but they happened once, they can happen again. The fuel for fires is all around us. All it takes is a firebrand. Only by cultivating a habit of carefulness with fire at all times can we meet the challenge of protection when dry conditions prevail. Please let these reminders be your guide:

- 1. Never, either when walking, riding or driving, discard a firebrand a lighted match or a glowing cigarette.
- 2. Always obtain a permit for any outside burning. The burning of household rubbish is not permitted if your town has rubbish collection. Burning of grass or garden litter can be dangerous. See your warden first.
- 3. If you camp or picnic, be sure open fires are allowed and if they are, put them *dead out* when leaving.
- 4. Most important instruct your children in the danger of the lighted match. A lighted match and dry grass or forest litter is a dangerous combination which leads to destructive loss and can lead to tragedy.

The past year — 1971 was a favorable year for the

control of fires. There were too many fire starts in some towns. We thank those who remembered and ask others to heed Smokey's message.

TILTON-NORTHFIELD RECREATIONAL COUNCIL

1971 Annual Report

The end of '71 completes 16 years of organized activities provided by the citizens of Tilton and Northfield. The accomplishments this year include:

A. Center Activities. The hall (second floor of the Tilton Town Building) was open Monday through Friday (except Thursday) from 6:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m. The junior grades attended from 6:00 p.m. to 7:30 p.m., while high school grades attended from 7:30 p.m. to 9:00 p.m. The Center was also open from 1:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m. Saturdays and 7:00 p.m. to 10:00 p.m. every other Saturday for Teen Council dances. A non-regimented program was pursued, providing a meeting place for the young people to gather. Ping-pong, shuffleboard, pool, tumbling, weight lifting, bumper pool, model building, chess, checkers and assorted card games, boxing, punching bags and wrestling were available.

The Teen Council also sponsored movies, dances and special holiday programs on some Saturdays.

Contests were held in the spring, which concluded with a family supper, and awards presented to the winners.

- B. Swimming Program. Two four-week periods were provided during the summer months. Three two-hour sessions were held daily and included courses from beginners' to junior lifesaving.
- C. *Playground*. For six weeks various arts and crafts, indoor and outdoor games were provided for three hours in the morning daily. Weekly bus trips or special events were usually held on Fridays.
- D. "Neighborhood Youth Corps". A program, designed to employ local teenagers and paid for by the

federal government, was supervised by the Recreation Council. Ten teenagers were approved for various jobs by the Regional Coordinator. The police departments of each town had girls doing office work, while the remainder worked on the summer playground and special town service projects. We have received recognition under this program since we provide a variety of services for the community and the young people employed.

E. Ski Program. The Council sponsored two five-week ski periods at the Highlands Ski Area. A bus left Saturday mornings at 7:45 a.m. and returned by 10:30 a.m. from the elementary school area. The Council coordinates the ski program, thereby obtaining a low cost group rate which the participants pay for themselves.

A ski bus was available during the February school vacation for a nominal 25c charge. The poor response necessitated cancellation after the second day.

- F. Babe Ruth Baseball. The Council sponsored a ball team playing in the Laconia League. The boys had an opportunity to play "under the lights" against good competition; some also had the opportunity to play on the All-Star Team.
- G. Recreation Basketball. A program was set up during February and March, coordinated with the Tilton Preparatory School facilities. The boys also entered the statewide championships, held in Franklin.

H. Special Events.

- 1. Red Sox ballgame and a visit to "Old Ironside" was held in late August. Two busloads of kids had a full day's outing.
- 2. Halloween party, initiated by the Tilton Police Department and selectmen, the Teen Council, Recrea-

tion Council, Northfield Police Department and Tilton-Northfield Fire Department, was an overwhelming success. All took part on this night of spooks and goblins. A costume contest, walk through fun house and parade with sirens and lights brought an estimated group of 350 children to the recreation hall. Various games and contests for the evening were cancelled due to the large crowd. Beverages, apples, doughnuts, masks and candies were distributed to all.

Later in the evening a live band at the Center played to a group of 250 teenagers, who also had free beverages and foodstuffs. Many merchants, companies, individuals and organizations donated funds or products to this happy occasion.

- 3. Christmas Party. The Teen Council provided games and goodies one afternoon during the holiday season.
- 4. Skating Rink. A rink was in development at the Northfield Pines by the Northfield Road Agent and the Tilton-Northfield Fire Department. A leak in the water system, coupled with warm weather, prevented completion of this project.

During Christmas week a fire at the Town Hall curtailed our Center activities, including the special New Year's day dance, sponsored by the Teen Council. We will continue to have our outdoor programs and seek another temporary residence. We are actively engaged in future recreational planning, including building and facility programs, on both State and federal levels.

"Thank you" to those individuals and groups who have helped the Council provide activities throughout the year. Special thanks go to the taxpayers of our communities whose support continues to make recreational programs available.

All interested citizens are welcome to attend our regular monthly meetings, the first Thursday of every month. We do need volunteers.
