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In Memoriam

J. Frank Goodwin

1873-1949

J. Frank Goodwin, son of John W. and Susan J. Goodwin, was born in Shapleigh, Me., August 2, 1873. He received his early education in the Springvale schools.

Mr. Goodwin came to Wolfeboro December 20, 1893, and engaged in the contracting and building business. He also operated at this time, a candy and periodical store and the first telephone office in town. Later he conducted a coal and wood business for several years. In 1923 he entered into a partnership with Andrew F. Doe, and it was at that time that Goodwin & Doe built the Carpenter School and the Huggins Hospital.

Mr. Goodwin was active in town affairs and served as a member of the State Legislature for two terms, 1917-1919. He served the Town of Wolfeboro as Selectman for four years, 1942-1945. He was deeply interested in Huggins Hospital and was president of the Board of Trustees until a short time before his death.

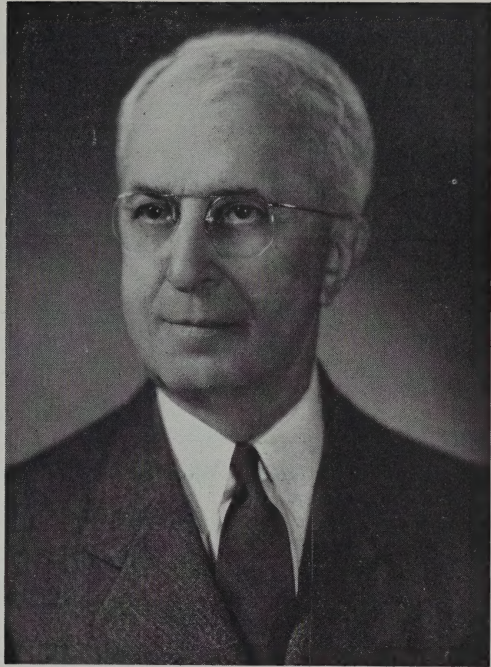
Mr. Goodwin was a 32nd degree Mason, Past Master of Morning Star Lodge, No. 17, F. & A. M., of Wolfeboro, High Priest of Carroll Chapter, No. 23, R. A. M., member of Warren Chapter, No. 10, O. E. S., a fifty-year member of Fidelity Lodge, No. 71, I. O. O. F., member of the Wolfeboro Rotary Club and attended the Congregational Church. He was married twice. His first wife was Ada Brown of Springvale. His second wife was Helen C. Webster of Wolfeboro, and of this union two sons were born, Webster, and J. Frank, Jr.

Mr. Goodwin was a good citizen and a man of fine, moral character. He had an unusually pleasing personality and possessed a gift for making friends and for extending friendliness which was recognized and appreciated by all who knew him.

In Memoriam

Carroll Durgin Piper

1880-1948



Carroll Durgin Piper was born in Wolfeboro, N. H., May 19, 1880; attended the public schools; was graduated from Brewster Academy in 1897 and from Harvard College in 1902.

To him public office meant an opportunity to serve and this he did well and faithfully as Town Auditor in 1916 and 1917 and as Town Clerk from 1918 to 1921. Appointed as Fire Commissioner in 1931 and succeeding to that office by election until his resignation in 1944, he gave his finest service and through his cooperative efforts the Fire Department was brought to its present high state of efficiency. A member and officer of many fraternal organizations, it is as "Dad" that he left a lasting monument for good in the hearts and lives of the youth he so unselfishly served.

He began his teaching at Brewster Free Academy in 1920, gifted with many talents, a "Magna Cum Laude" from Harvard, with an active civic and business background, and a sympathetic interest in all sports and other extra-curricular activities. He stimulated his pupils to keen, clear thinking, and was truly a great teacher. He was highly respected by fellow teachers, alumni, and undergraduates. In 1948 Mr. Piper resigned his position because of ill health, having served Brewster faithfully as teacher and Dean for twenty-eight years.

The good opinion of honest men, wherever they may be born or happen to reside, is the only kind of reputation a wise man would ever desire. This Carroll D. Piper possessed to the fullest extent.

ANNUAL TOWN MEETING, 1950

Warrant

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Wolfeboro qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Brewster Memorial Hall in said Town on the second Tuesday of March next, from twelve noon until eight P. M. for the casting of ballots, and at seven P. M. to act on the following articles:

ARTICLE 1. To choose a Town Clerk, two Auditors, Treasurer, Collector of Taxes, and Town Constable for the ensuing year, one Selectman for three years, one Trustee of Trust Funds for three years, one Library Trustee for three years, one Water and Sewer Commissioner for three years, and three members of the Budget Committee for three years.

ARTICLE 2. To select one or more Highway Agents or to instruct the Selectmen to appoint one Highway Agent.

ARTICLE 3. To choose all other Town Officers and Agents.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to sell any property taken by tax title or otherwise.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will approve and adopt the recommendations of the Budget Committee and raise and appropriate the various sums contained in the report and listed in the Budget which includes the following special appropriations:

No. 1.	For Moth Extermination, Blister Rust and tree care	\$1,200.00
No. 2.	The sum of \$400.00, which is 1/100 of 1% of the assessed valuation of the Town, to the Lakes Region Association for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the Town, in cooperation with other Towns in the Lakes Region	400.00
No. 3.	For Town Libraries	1,350.00
No. 4.	For Harriman-Hale Legion Post, No. 18, for Memorial Day	150.00
No. 5.	For the purpose of relief of needy persons and their families	11,000.00

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Moderator to appoint a committee of five citizens to study the desirability of consolidating Town, School and Precinct reports into one volume, and present their recommendations to the 1951 Town Meeting.

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Moderator to appoint a committee of four citizens together with the Water and Sewer Commissioners, to draft and place in effect new rules, regulations and rates for the Water and Sewer Department.

(By petition)

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Moderator to appoint a committee of four citizens together with the Water and Sewer Commissioners, to make a long range plan for extensions and improvements to the Water and Sewer Systems.

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to install parking meters in the business district, the cost of the meters to be defrayed from revenue from the meters. The meters to be in operation from May 1st to October 31st.

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will adopt and place in effect a long range plan for the business district of the Town, as submitted by the Planning and Building Commission.

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to request the State Tax Commission to make a complete reappraisal of all the taxable property within the Town, to equalize valuations in accordance with the law, and to raise and appropriate money for this purpose.

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will approve including in the Town Report an inventory of assessments, including taxes paid, and divided as between residents and non-residents.

(By petition. Not approved by the Budget Committee.)

ARTICLE 13. Shall the provisions of Chapter 171-A of the revised Laws relative to playing games of Beano be adopted in this Town?

(To be voted on by ballot)

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to adopt and place in effect revised regulations governing Zoning and Building agreeable to suggestions as submitted by the Planning and Building Commission and published in the Granite State News, March 3rd, 1950.

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen after purchasing the Boston & Maine property now being negotiated, to remove the Railroad Station and grade the land for use as a public free parking lot.

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town will vote to extend the limits of the Village Fire Precinct to include all the area within the following boundaries:

Starting at a point where Belknap, Strafford and Carroll Counties meet, thence running in a westerly direction along the Alton-Wolfeboro Town Line to the junction of Carroll and Belknap County lines, thence turning and running northeasterly along the Wolfeboro-Tuftonboro Town line to a point on the shore of Lake Winnepesaukee where said line meets the present Precinct line, thence following the present Precinct line to Route 109A, thence continuing in the same direction across Route 109A to a point 500 feet northerly of Route 109A, thence turning and running in an easterly direction, parallel with Route 109A and 500 feet from it, to a point 500 feet westerly of Beech Pond Road, thence turning and running northerly parallel with the Beech Pond Road and 500 feet from it to a point 500 feet northerly of the Trotting Track Road, thence turning and running easterly parallel with the Trotting Track Road and 500 feet from it until it strikes Hersey Brook, thence following Hersey Brook easterly to the railroad track, thence turning and running southerly along the railroad track to the northerly shore of Whitten's Neck, thence turning and running easterly along the shore of Lake Wentworth to the Heath Brook, thence easterly along Heath Brook to the Pleasant Valley Road, thence turning and running southerly along the Pleasant Valley Road to Hill Camp Road, thence turning and running easterly along Hill Camp road the entire length of Rust Pond, but in no case approaching Rust Pond closer than 500 feet,

until it strikes Perry Brook, thence following Perry Brook easterly to the New Durham line, thence following the Wolfeboro-New Durham line southerly to the point of beginning.

Excluding all the islands in Lake Winnepesaukee and Lake Wentworth.

ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to hire a sum of money necessary to pay expenses in anticipation of taxes.

ARTICLE 18. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

THE SELECTMEN'S REPORT

Several projects were authorized by the 1949 Town Meeting which have been carried out as far as possible.

Libby Museum: Under Article 10 it was voted to take over the Libby Museum from the present Trustees if approved by the Court. The arrangements for taking over the Museum have not been fully completed; however, we were able to make some temporary repairs and open the building for a part of the summer under the able supervision of Charles "Pop" Davis. A large number of people visited the Museum and many have expressed their appreciation of its again being open.

Boston & Maine Railroad Station: Article 7 authorized the purchase of the railroad station and adjoining property. Several conferences have been held with the officials of the B. & M., and it is expected that the purchase of the railroad property will be completed early in 1950.

Clark Park: Under Article 11 the Selectmen were authorized to divide Clark Park into lots and sell them to private individuals for house lots. Some work has been done on this project. We have not sold any lots because we believe that it would be unwise to try to take care of sewage from this area with septic tanks, and we think we should wait until we can be sure of a sewer before we permit building there.

Reconstruction of Sewall Road, Article 6: Sewall Road has been widened and drained from Pleasant Street to Ralph Carpenter's, and this section will be resurfaced during the coming season.

Work was done on several Town roads as authorized under Article 5, including the laying out and widening of a portion of Lakewood Avenue and Pleasant Street Extension, connecting Pleasant Street with North Main Street. A new water main and hydrant were installed here. It has been suggested that the name of Lakewood Avenue be changed to Lucas Avenue in commemoration of the Lucas family which resided in that neighborhood for many years.

Last spring the State Tax Commission made a spot check of valuations in Wolfeboro as they did in other towns all over the State. Some people are under the impression that their valuations were raised as a result of this spot check. This is not true; the Selectmen have used their own valuations and not those of the Tax Commission.

The wharf area has been "spruced up" a little more by painting the woodwork of the structure white and installing lights. One

new public telephone was installed on the wharf, and the one formerly located on Main Street was moved to the board walk near the Arts and Crafts building.

The Wolfeboro Town Report has won first place in its class for several years in the Annual New Hampshire Town Report Contest, and has received Honorable Mention twice in the New England Municipal Reports Contest. The Selectmen welcome suggestions for improving the report.

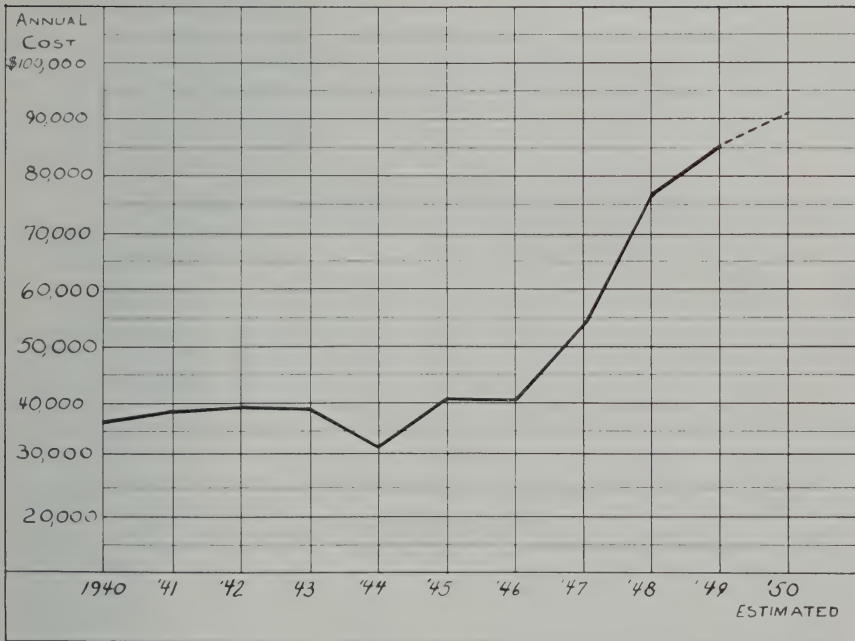

BUDGET COMMITTEE'S REPORT

To the Legal Voters of the Town of Wolfeboro:

The Town of Wolfeboro experienced an unusually high tax rate for the year 1949 caused almost entirely by: 1, an act of the Legislature withdrawing state funds formerly appropriated for aid to schools; 2, increased tuition at Brewster Academy; and 3, an action on the part of the State Tax Commission in adjusting the valuation of Wolfeboro from \$3,900,192.00 to \$7,033,335.00 so as to equalize county valuations for tax purposes.

Members of the Budget Committee, in common with property owners generally, are keenly aware of the heavy burden of taxation to meet not only local requirements but, also, the excessive demands of the federal government. Consequently, the committee again has made a thorough study of both the income possibilities and estimates under the heading of necessary expenditures for the town.

The Budget Committee's responsibility is to recommend to the voters at the Town Meeting expenditures for the wise maintenance and development of the town's property and facilities, keeping in mind a long-range perspective, and also, to assure an economical use of the town's funds and other assets.

Public Hearings of the Budget Committee were held at the Carpenter School on January 11 and 13 agreeable to notices in the Granite State News.

Your Budget Committee, accordingly, submits and recommends the following report and Budget items for the Town of Wolfeboro for the year 1950 to be acted upon at the Town Meeting, March 14, 1950.

TOWN ROADS

The Budget Committee recommends town road construction only for drainage on Pleasant Street, Bay Street and Green Street, not to exceed a total amount of \$500.00.

We received a petition from residents of Pleasant Valley to spend a sum not to exceed \$500.00 to widen the curve on the Pleasant Valley Road opposite the entrance to Hill School Camp. After due consideration, the Committee feels that at this time it would be inadvisable to make any appropriation for this purpose. Action on the project should be deferred until the town can more readily afford to meet the higher cost of a satisfactory job.

SCHOOLS

While continuing to meet the desired standards at Carpenter School, the School Board has been able by efficient management to keep their requests for the fiscal year June 30, 1950-June 30, 1951, at the same level as for the preceding fiscal year.

However, the costs to the town for high school education have increased considerably. The School Board estimates an enrollment from Wolfeboro of approximately 150 pupils at a per capita tuition of \$150.00, for which an appropriation of \$22,000.00 has been recommended.

To meet the total school budget, the Budget Committee recommends an appropriation of \$91,500.00.

The Trustees of Brewster Academy cooperated by submitting the Academy's total budget, which convinced the Budget Committee that the tuition as stated above is necessary to maintain a high standard of high school education.

BOSTON AND MAINE RAILROAD PROPERTY

The Selectmen are about to close an agreement with the B. & M. Railroad for the purchase of the station property, which includes the B. & M. right of way on Railroad Avenue, for the amount (\$5,000.00) that was voted for this purpose at the last

Town Meeting. It was voted also that, when the Town obtained possession of this property, the Selectmen were to lease the building to prospective occupants. In view of the fact that large amounts of money would be necessary to make the building tenable, the Budget Committee recommends that the building be removed, and the lot graded for free public parking.

The Budget Committee joins with the Selectmen and other interested citizens of the town in deriving satisfaction and pride from the fact that the Bureau of Governmental Research at the University of New Hampshire has awarded First Prize to Wolfeboro for the seventh consecutive year for the best town report published by New Hampshire towns of 2,500 to 10,000 population.

The Selectmen would be grateful for suggestions which would further improve and clarify the town report.

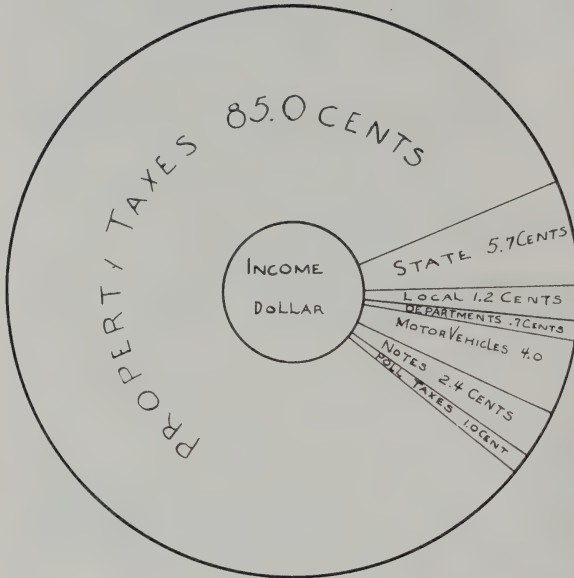

WOLFEBORO AND TUFTONBORO ACADEMY—1820-1924

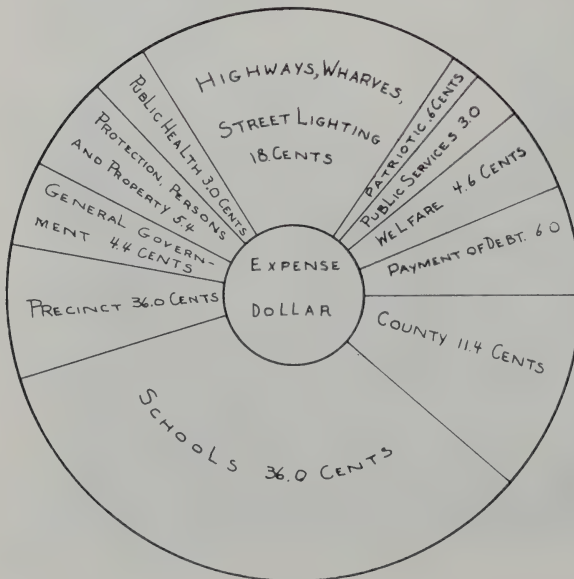
Where the Dollar Came From in 1949

Where the Dollar Went in 1949



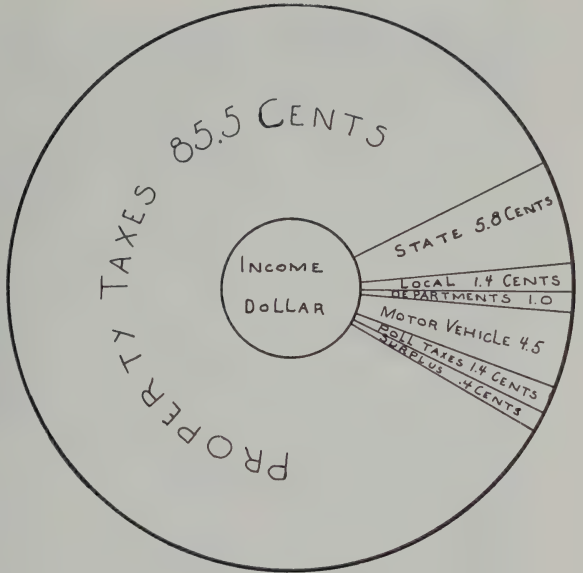

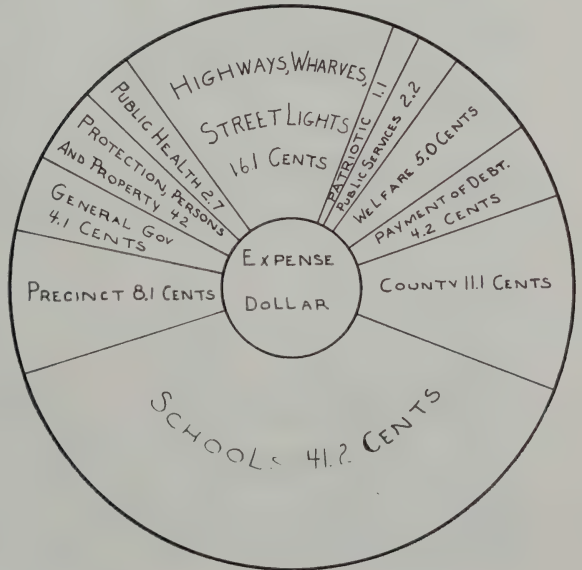

Wolfeboro Water and Sewer Department

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

WATER WORKS

During the past year, much new work has been accomplished in the Water Department.

On King Street we replaced 350 feet of 1¼-inch pipe, which was filled with rust, with a two-inch steel pipe.

On Clark Road Extension we extended the two-inch main 200 feet to the residence of Mrs. Ford.

The six-inch main on Pleasant Street Extension was extended 608 feet. This pipe was connected to the eight-inch main on North Main Street so as to give the water on Pleasant and Oak Streets a much better circulation.

Due to the enlargement of the hospital we installed a new six-inch main. This was done to insure them an adequate supply of water in case they should desire a sprinkler system.

On Pine Street Extension we installed 1,300 feet of 1¼-inch steel pipe to supply the new camps which were built near Crescent Lake.

The "Prescott Shore" pipe was replaced with 1¼-inch steel pipe to the extent of 2,460 feet. This old pipe had been in use many years and was also filled with rust.

Two of the old hydrants were replaced during the past year with new ones, one at South Wolfeboro and one on Pine Street. There was also one new hydrant installed on Pleasant Street Extension.

There were nineteen new services connected to the system during the year which we believe is a record for many years.

Fourteen of the old service pipes were relaid with copper tubing.

There were few breaks and leaks in the Water System, and these were taken care of as soon as possible.

SEWER DEPARTMENT

During the past year there was very little new construction work done in the Sewer Department.

Four new customers were added during the year, making a total of 253 connections to the new system.

Due to trouble beyond our control most of the system at Brewster Academy had to be changed.

As usual the trickling filter bed at the treatment plant had to have two treatments of H. T. H. as recommended by the State Board of Health.

By constant treatments of the Imhoff tanks we have reduced the amount of lime used to less than 200 pounds a year.

We are always glad to welcome visitors to inspect our pumping stations and treatment plant, at any time.

Once more I wish to thank the citizens of Wolfeboro for their splendid cooperation during the past year.

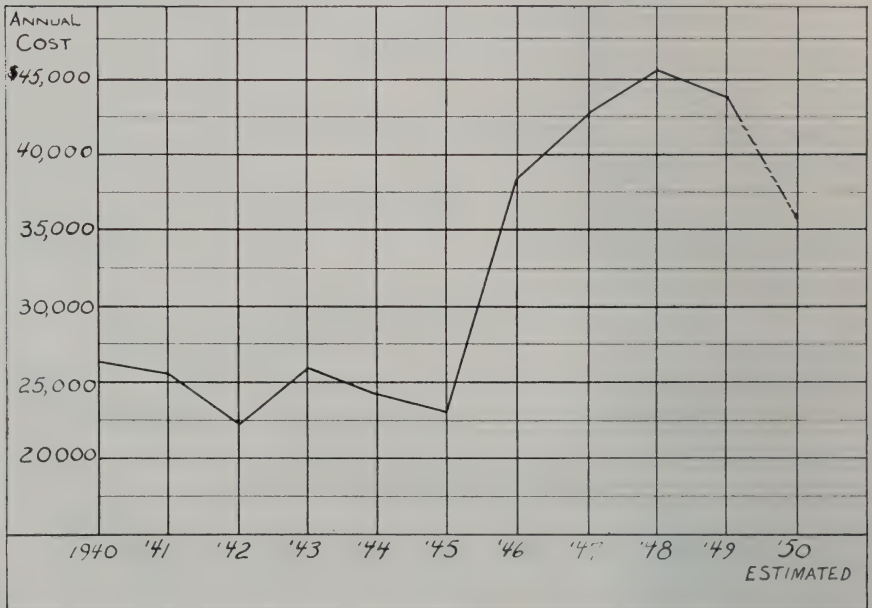

PUBLIC SERVICES

Parks and Playgrounds Commission

BATHING BEACH

The Public Beach on the Brewster Academy property is gradually being enlarged each year to meet the needs of the increasing number of people who use it. The Beach was officially opened and staffed with two lifeguards from July 1st to September 6th. The whole beach area was sprayed last summer thus eliminating all insect pests. Poison ivy has been cleared from the area.

Swimming lessons were given to many children in organized classes, and lifesaving certificates were given to those who qualified.

The Commission has been asked to make some improvements and give some supervision at the Carry Beach on Forest Road, and this will be done so far as funds are available.

PARKS

Lake Front Park has become a very popular spot for our citizens and summer guests, where they may relax and enjoy the beautiful view of the Lake and Mountains. During the year six new settees were added to the Park.

Our wharves are the best on Lake Winnepesaukee to which many summer home owners on the Lake moor their boats while shopping, thus bringing added business to Wolfeboro.

THE SKATING RINK

The Public Skating Rink was maintained as in previous years but a very mild winter resulted in less use of the facilities than usual. The Legion hockey team had a somewhat curtailed but successful season. The Brewster Academy hockey team used the town rink for some of its games last season.

Only minor repair work had been performed on and around the rink since before the war. Last fall sufficient lumber was purchased to replace all broken and missing boards. This repair work is still being kept at a minimum since it will be necessary to completely replace the boards of the entire rink soon.

An addition to the Skating Rink schedule for the 1949-1950 season has been supervised pleasure and figure skating on Monday and Friday afternoons under the direction of Mr. Robert Hawkes.

SKI SLOPE

The Abenaki Outing Club operated the Ski Slope in a very

satisfactory manner and have made many needed improvements. They have widened and graded the slope, installed a new tow, served lunches in the Lodge and made the slope a very attractive spot for our young people.

Everyone is entitled to use the slope without charge, but a small fee is charged for use of the tow.

STATISTICS PERTAINING TO THE LAKES REGION

The Lakes Region is the most important of the six New Hampshire regions with respect to the recreation business.

This is shown by the division of assessed values of recreational property, by Regions, from a survey made by the State Planning and Development Commission.

- Lakes Region 32%.
- Monadnock Region 14%.
- Seacoast Region 14%.
- White Mountain Region 18%.
- Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region 12%.
- Merrimac Valley Region 10%.

The valuation of recreational property in the Lakes Region is 15 million dollars, compared to the total of 50 million in the state. In addition to which the valuation of summer homes in the Lakes Region is 12 million dollars, which is one-third of the state total.

Almost one-half of the boys' and girls' camps in New Hampshire are in the Lakes Region. This refers to 70 camps in the Region with a valuation of \$750,000.00.

There are 6,000 motor boats, registered in the Lakes Region, which is more than one-half of all boats in New Hampshire.

The gross income to the Lakes Region from the recreational business is thirty million dollars.

Recreation is the principal industry of the Lakes Region, although we are strong industrially with 15% of the population of the State our manufacturers produce 15% of the valuation of manufactured goods.

The Lakes Region comprises three cities and thirty-nine towns, with a population of 71,887 and assessed valuation of \$112,900,000.00.

The Lakes Region Association was organized in 1936 to promote the growth and prosperity of the Region in every way possible.

During these fourteen years we have published and distributed more than a million booklets and folders throughout the Eastern part of the country, and in many other states. In addition to which we have distributed thousands of local books and folders.

We sponsor each year the 4-H Fair at the Belknap Recreational Area and distributed \$500.00 in cash prizes to the contestants.

We conduct an annual Photo Contest and distribute cash prizes for the best pictures submitted. This project not only attracts many out of state people to our Region, but it gives us splendid pictures for our publications.

We are in constant cooperation with the New England Council, the State Planning and Development Commission, and many travel agencies.

When the Lakes Region Association was formed the Recreation business in the Region was determined by the State as sixteen million dollars. It now is thirty million dollars.

During the years we have been instrumental in attracting several new manufacturers to the Region.

We have assisted several of our towns in solving their problems and are anxious to help any town at any time.

The people of the state recognize by their votes that they approve the Regional setup, as 85% of all of the towns make appropriations to their Association annually and for the last three years every town in the Monadnock Region and all but two towns in the Mountain Region made their appropriation.

Being principally a recreational and residential Region it is interesting to note according to a national survey made by the Curtis Publishing Company that over eight billion dollars is spent each year for Recreation. Which sum is divided as follows:

44% for Hotels, Motor Courts and Restaurants

24% for Transportation and gasoline

22% for Retail Stores

10% for amusements, sports and miscellaneous purposes.

also that in 1949 approximately nine million dollars was spent for advertising and publicity by the several states.

All organizations in New Hampshire spent approximately \$175,000.00

If we are to continue to get our share of the business, which benefits every citizen we must continue to publicize the Region.

Every town has much to gain by cooperation with the Lakes Region Association, which is endorsed by the State and the Governor.

The Lakes Region Association has been able to secure a few new small industries but have lost several large ones owing to the fact that desirable space was not available. If all towns that have vacant space will notify the executive secretary giving full particulars we might be able to find an occupant.

The executive secretary has attended many meetings in the state and New England and has distributed booklets and folders to sportsman shows in Boton, New York and at expositions throughout New England. He has answered thousands of inquiries on all subjects and has distributed to real estate dealers many inquiries that have resulted in bringing to the region thousands of dollars of new assessed valuation.

We ask that our towns call on the Lakes Region Association for assistance at any time.

REPORT OF THE LIBRARIAN

To the Board of Trustees of the Wolfeboro Town Library:

Gentlemen:

The report of the librarian for the year ending January 1, 1950, is herewith presented.

The year brought an increase in the number of adult and juvenile readers with the resulting increase in the number of books circulated, the increase in the number of juvenile books circulated being noticeably greater than for many years. The interest and support of the teachers of both schools contributed to this end.

Although the reduction in the budget for the State Library necessitated limiting somewhat the former service provided by that library, it has neither seriously nor greatly affected the borrowing of books to supplement the books to be found in our library. That service still continues to increase each year.

As will be seen in the report of the treasurer, the library received this year interest from the fund bequeathed to the library by Mr. Greenleaf Clark, a citizen well known for his public spirit in supporting loyally and in a tangible manner the many things in which he was greatly interested.

In November Children's Book Week was observed with a contest in the form of book reviews submitted by the pupils of Carpenter School. In addition to that the librarian told stories to the children in the lower grades, a practice which will be continued throughout the winter months.

A new set of the World Book Encyclopedia was added to the reference department at the beginning of the school year. This encyclopedia is valuable and useful for readers of all ages. Also the five-volume set of the "Album of American History" edited by James T. Adams was completed. This set of books was a gift. For this gift and for the many other gifts of books and money the librarian expresses her gratitude and thanks.

The circulation for the year has been 26,205 books and magazines of these classes: fiction, 12,896; non-fiction, 5,240; children's books, 8,069. Three hundred and sixty-three new cards were issued. The largest day's circulation was 178 books and magazines, and the smallest thirteen.

This year 544 books have been added to the combined libraries. Of this number ninety-five were contributed.

Report Of The Forest Fire Warden

FOREST FIRES—OUR MOST SHAMEFUL WASTE

Everyone apparently fears fire but too many are careless with it. This is particularly true of fires in and near woodlands. Official figures show that more than 98 per cent of all forest fires result from human carelessness and can be prevented. Consequently, we may say "Forest Fires are our most shameful waste."

Annual forest fire losses are tremendous and their effects far reaching. Such fires destroy the raw products of the forests, the protection forests provide for game and the supply of ground water. They upset local economies by drawing men from gainful employment and requiring the expenditure of public funds to extinguish them.

Our forest fire organization is doing a good job in keeping the size of fires small but the number of fires is increasing. In 1949 there were 100 more fires in New Hampshire than in 1948, but they burned 500 acres less. For the warden and his deputies to do the job they are capable of, they must have the cooperation of the public—YOU!

The primary objective of all fire fighters is PREVENTION—fire stoppage. This is the goal toward which your local forest fire warden and his deputies are constantly working. It can be achieved ONLY if YOU and YOU and YOU cooperate with them. It is worth YOUR effort and can be accomplished by:

1. Being careful with fire in or near woodland, being particularly careful with matches and cigarettes.
2. Securing the required written permit from the warden when the ground is not covered with snow.
3. Insisting that others be careful and comply with burning requirements.
4. Calling the warden promptly when fire is detected and aiding him to extinguish it.

Let's reduce the number of forest fires and eliminate our most shameful waste.

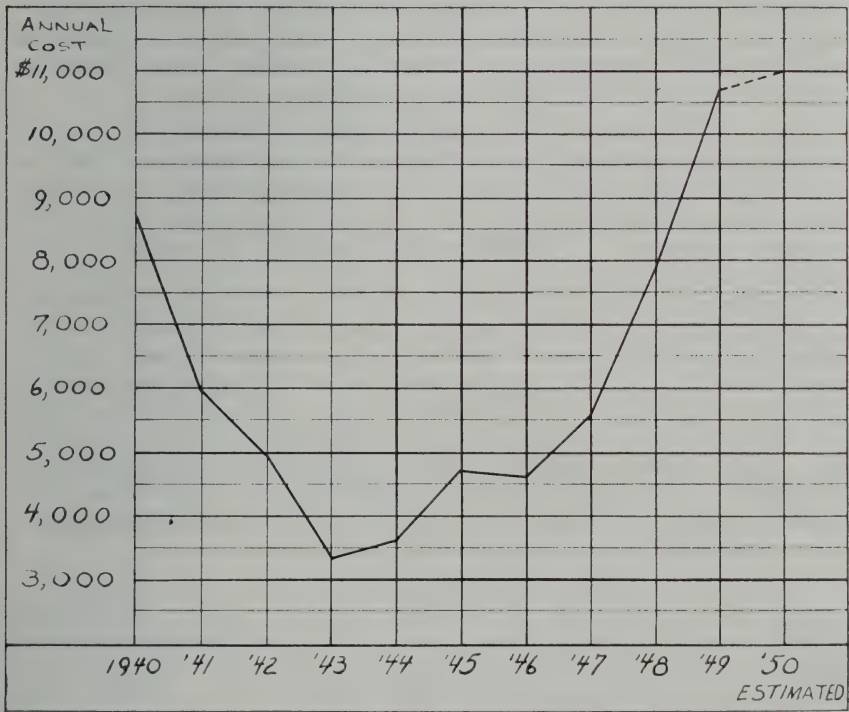
Each year our town, at its annual meeting, votes to appropriate a sum of money for White Pine Blister Rust Control, in cooperation with the State Forestry and Recreation Department. The following, submitted by John H. Foster, State Forester, is a brief outline of the way in which this project is conducted:

During the fall and winter months detailed maps are made of the pine areas where control work is to be conducted the following season. From these maps the limits of control work are set and the lands to be eliminated determined. These surveys have been instrumental in saving a great deal of public money. Prior to the actual control work, the District Leader consults with one or more members of the Board of Selectmen, discussing the season's plans and supply of suitable local labor, and requests that the town's check be sent to the State Forester. On such occasions where the District Leader has been unable to contact Board members, a letter has been prepared and sent, covering the proposed plans, date when control work is to be undertaken, and other matters pertinent to the local project.

The actual destruction of wild currant and gooseberry bushes is accomplished by one or both of two methods. White pine and adjacent areas are scouted to determine the location and abundance of these bushes. Where few in number, they are pulled by the scout, but in the event of large concentrations, or where these

plants are found generally scattered, their location is plotted on the detailed maps and a unit of from three to five men and a foreman works such areas in a definite line-formation. From time to time, district leaders, or their assistants, check over the areas worked so as to determine the quality of the scout and crew work. A record of the work performed in each block, or subdivision of land, is kept and has proved of great value some years later when it becomes necessary to re-check the earlier control work.

PUBLIC HEALTH

Health Officer's Report

The year 1949 was especially notable for two things from the health standpoint.

First, there was an epidemic of measles which involved most of the pupils of Carpenter School and a few individuals in the older age groups. This was a mild type of the disease and no particular serious complications, or after effects, have been noted. As yet, there is no inoculation which will prevent measles, although the administration of Measles Immune Serum will minimize an attack if given within a week after contact or just before the onset of the rash. This procedure is advisable if instituted at the right time, since the individual will still have an attack of measles, which gives him an immunity in the future, however, the attack usually will be a very light one.

Secondly, there was a larger incidence of Anterior Poliomyelitis or Infantile Paralysis, in Wolfeboro and the Lakes Region than had been for years. This did not reach epidemic proportions, but all under sixteen years of age were advised to stay away from crowded places as a precautionary measure. The greater percentage of cases occurred in local residents; and with no respect to age groups, children and adults alike being afflicted. Fortunately, there were no deaths from this disease, but a number of the individuals suffered severe and crippling muscle damage. Wolfeboro is fortunate in having the facilities of Huggins Hospital and the services of Miss Hazel Leavitt, skilled Physiotherapist, who has, and is, aiding materially in rehabilitating crippled individuals. This is accomplished by water tank treatments, Diathermy treatments, and graded exercises, under careful supervision. The courage and the will power of the individual, which all cases have shown, materially aids in functional recovery.

Last year impressed upon us that Infantile Paralysis is a serious thing inasmuch as it struck so close home. Individuals afflicted with this dread disease are often temporarily, or permanently, handicapped and they require long and expensive hospitalization and treatment for any possibility of recovery. The local chapter of the National Polio Foundation, under the able Chairmanship of Harold H. Hart, has aided these cases financially and it has also been necessary to call upon the National Fund. As a part of their contribution to this worthy cause, the physicians on the Staff of Huggins Hospital unanimously voted to make no charge for their professional services to any individual needing, or accredited for, aid by the local chapter and National Found-

dation for Infantile Paralysis. The March of Dimes drive is now coming up. Everyone is urged to contribute as much as possible inasmuch as the need is great and the funds are properly administered and spent.

In spite of a very dry summer, which meant lack of water in many people's wells, there were no diseases attributed to water, milk, or food supplies. Routine inspection of these items have always given a satisfactory result from the State Department of Health.

Preventive medicine is continuing to grow in scope and effect. The routine, thorough, physical examinations of Carpenter School children, in the competent hands of Dr. Harold E. Gregory; the Orthopedic Clinics, sponsored by the New Hampshire State Department of Health, Division of Crippled Children's Services, under the able Orthopedic Surgeon, Dr. Philip LaFrance, administratively aided by a Committee from the Wolfeboro Public Health Nursing Association, have been responsible in noting and correcting diseases and physical defects in children.

May all these worthy projects continue to develop and be utilized for the general health now and in the future.

There has been a decrease in the Morbidity Service during 1949. This may be explained by an increase in the number of patients treated at the hospital. It is generally recommended that Public Health Nursing Associations keep their social service work at a minimum, but in a community such as this where there is no Social Service Agency, the Public Health Nurse is the person to whom those needing help automatically turn, and during 1949 there was an increase in the number of Social Service visits.

Since the first of January, 1949, Mrs. Avis MacAuley, R.N., has been working on a full time basis, which has made for more efficiency both with the school and district work. The Nursing Committee were very fortunate to have Miss Florence Little, R.N., substitute during Mrs. MacAuley's vacation.

Early last year, the Nursing Committee accepted, with regret, the resignation of Mrs. Earl Crosby, Physical Therapist. Through the cooperation of the Huggins Hospital, we have worked out a very satisfactory schedule with their Physical Therapist, Miss Hazel Leavitt. She does not have as much time to make home calls but she and Mrs. MacAuley have group exercises for the children at the hospital. Together they set up the program for the Bi-Monthly Orthopedic Clinic. This Clinic is under the supervision of the New Hampshire State Department of Health, Division of Crippled Children's Services, and is planned for individuals under the age of twenty-one. At six clinics last year an average of twenty-four patients were seen at each clinic by Dr. A. Philip LaFranc, Orthopedic Surgeon, of Laconia. Miss Leavitt has also done a lot of very fine work with the patients who had poliomyelitis last year.

We are very grateful to Dr. John Clow for his cooperation with the Dental Clinic. Last year forty-one children were treated with an average over four procedures per child. This clinic is financed by contributions from organizations in Wolfeboro, and by the Public Health Nursing Association.

Four children were taken to the Mental or Child Guidance Clinic at Laconia, and four children were taken to Dr. Hunter to be fitted with glasses. A nine-year old girl went to Camp Kehonka on a month's scholarship generously contributed by Mr. and Mrs. A. C. Ballentine. One boy was sent to a camp for Crippled Children in Maine.

A membership drive was held in the summer with a good sum realized, also adding new members. The annual meeting will be held January 31st at Carpenter School. It is open to the public with Dr. John Wheeler from Concord as speaker.

The Nursing Committee wishes to thank everyone who has helped with this health program and to ask for their continued interest and support.
