THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE [L. S.]

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Barnstead in the County of Belknap in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Barnstead on Tuesday, the 11th day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same, as recommended by the Budget.

3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

4. To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount on property taxes paid on or before the first Saturday of July next.

5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to buy Liability Insurance on Town Labour and pay the same out of the Highway Department.

6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the

Selectmen to purchase an oil burner for the Library, estimate \$250.00, and appropriate money for the same.

7. To see if the Town will vote to rescind previous vote on grader, as to Austin & Weston type, and authorize the Selectmen to purchase smaller grader in \$6,000 to \$10,000 class and appropriate money for the same.

8. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

(B) REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT

Your schools have been conducted in a commendable manner during the past year. The trip by the fifth and sixth grades to Duxbury and Plymouth under the supervision of Mrs. Grau, Mrs. Cotton and Mrs. Alden was a worthwhile educational venture and has proven very beneficial in every way. The tour of the University of New Hampshire by the seventh and eighth grades, under the direction of Mr. Mattsson, was similarly received. The minstrel show, the operettas and the Christmas programs have enabled your children to develop other talents not learned in the classroom. The spelling bee that was presented to your growing P. T. A. provided an opportunity to recognize the accomplishments of some individuals that otherwise might go unnoticed. The open house during American Education Week was warmly received and the attendance was very gratifying to your teachers.

Through Parent-Teacher conferences, many individual problems are being worked on jointly by the home and the school. Your children are learning to work and play together. By so doing, they will be better informed citizens and better equipped to take their places in the community. Mr. Mattsson is to be commended for the work he is doing both in school and in the community. All of your teachers deserve your earnest support.

The fine new bus being operated by Mr. Henry Knirsch is providing your elementary children with excellent transportation and at the same time is making available a safe means of transportation to high school for those students who have no transportation of their own.

When the history of education is written for this last year, two items will no doubt have a prominent place. The first might be entitled, "NOW IT CAN BE TOLD."

For several years a number of organizations have been publishing and distributing material harmful to our schools. Some of these materials have been prepared by persons known to be subversive by the F. B. I. while other materials have come from individuals who have for years made their livelihood by attacking some special group. In September, 1951, the McCall Magazine published an article by Arthur D. Morse entitled "Who's Trying to Ruin Our Schools?" which exposed the great movement against our public schools.

This should serve as a warning to all of us. While we all know that good schools are necessary in a democracy, sometimes we take them for granted. Constructive criticism is always desirable, but material which attempts to destroy must not be tolerated. New Hampshire citizens have been receiving their share of this material.

Toward the close of the year, the second thing happened. The National Association of Manufacturers announced a program which they would carry on for the support of our public schools. The cooperation of this powerful organization should be a distinct help to public education. The resolution passed recently by this group sums up the responsibility of business men in these words: "Business enterprises must find a way to support the whole educational program effectively, regularly, and now."

The supply of teachers continues to decrease and the demand grows greater each year. No less an authority than the United States Chamber of Commerce reveals these facts in their December, 1951, bulletin, "News and Cues." "Teachers' colleges suffered the largest over-all decrease—11%—and the largest drop in freshman enrollment—16%. These figures suggest that teaching continues to be less attractive to young people than other professions. All citizens who believe in compulsory public education should be concerned about the continuing shortage of elementary teachers which, as this survey shows, may grow worse." Satisfactory pay and pleasant working conditions are the only things which will change this trend.

Your continued support of your schools is essential to their success.

PART V. AUXILIARY ACTIVITIES AND SPECIAL REPORTS

(a) REPORT OF SCHOOL HEALTH WORK

To the Townspeople, School Board and Superintendent of Schools of Barnstead:

The following is my first report of the school health work of Barnstead:

Since school started last fall, we have had no epidemic. However, one case of pneumonia and some cases of the flu and the common cold have been scattered throughout the schools and have caused the majority of absent children. A medical inspection of the school children is planned in the spring by Dr. George Quinn of Farmington.

The hearing and vision tests are going to be made right after New Year. Classroom visits and classroom inspections have been made whenever necessary for routine health work or to give individual advice to pupils regarding personal hygiene, or whatever seemed important at the moment. Home visits have also been made regarding ill children or to interview parents. Clinic visits have been made with children as needed.

The following is a statistical report of the school nursing work during the year 1950-1951, as submitted by Mrs. Venita Hardy:
