TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Bartlett in the County of Carroll in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Bartlett on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing. Art. 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

Art. 3. To see if the voters will authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow a sum or sums not exceeding in the aggregate \$50,000.00 in anticipation of the collection of taxes for the current municipal year, and to issue in the name of the town and on the credit of same, negotiable notes therefor, said notes to be repaid during the current year from taxes collected within current municipal year.

Art. 4. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to distribute the blank inventories at the same time they examine and appraise the property to be taxed.

Art. 5. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the town through Tax Collector's deeds or by any other means.

Art. 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 for the White Mountain Airport in accordance with the petition signed by Ray G. Houle and others.

Art. 7. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate as the town's share toward the operating cost of the Eastern Slopes Regional Airport for 1962.

Art. 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000.00 for a town garage in accordance with the petition signed by Boy H. Sanborn and others

by Roy H. Sanborn and others.

Art. 9. To see if the town will vote to participate in the Federal Urban Planning Assistance Program and appropriate \$2,000.00 as the town's share of the cost in accordance with the petition signed by Anna D. Martin and others.

Art. 10. To see if the town will vote to establish a Planning Board of five members with duties as set forth in Sections 1-15, Chapter 36, N. H. Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955, to make a study of the Town's development and report to the Town appropriate recommendations for the promotion and maintenance of the Town's best development. The Board shall consist of one Selectman, as provided in Chapter 36, N. H. Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955. In accordance with petition signed by Anna D. Martin and others.

Art. 11. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

PROGRAM OF THE WHITE MOUNTAINS REGION ASSOCIATION

The White Mountains Region Association as a voluntary non-profit organization, receives support from the communities of the Region, the state and from individual members so that a program of cooperative promotion and development of northern New Hampshire may be carried on.

The Association publishes and distributes six different folders a vear advertising the many advantages of the Region. It receives and carefully answers about 6,000 letters per year from people interested in a vacation in the North Country. The value of this single service cannot be overemphasized. Recent surveys have shown that the tourists attracted by this mailing service have spent many hundreds of thousands of dollars in the Region. The Association sponsors the annual fall foliage tours, and represents the Region at national travel shows.

Through its board of directors, it is able to speak for the Region's needs at state and national hearings and at important meetings within the Region. It maintains a news release service to local newspapers to help inform the citizens of the North Country of worthwhile activities and economic trends.

This winter the Association is running a cooperative ad program with the chambers of commerce in the ski areas to promote skiing in the White Mountains. It cooperates with private promotional groups, local chambers of commerce, and with the state promotional agencies. It promotes the sale of real estate through the mailing of real-estate purchase bulletins to real estate brokers. It conducts labor surveys for groups interested in industrial development, maintains an award program for the 4-H Clubs, and promotes agriculture within the Region.

In uninterrupted service since 1938, it has helped establish the White Mountains Region as a vacation center as fine as any in the world and contributed in many other ways to the economic betterment of all forty-six communities in northern New Hampshire.

CIVIL DEFENSE

This past year we received from the federal government at no cost to the town, two sets of radiation detection instruments and a radio. With the 2-way radio we have communication with the County radio located in Conway and the Conway town Civil Defense radio. They in turn have a radio which gives them communication with the State Civil Defense department in Concord, N. H. The radio is located at present in my house but is portable and can be moved to the school building in Bartlett village where our generator is located in about one-half hour. I have it at my house because each Tuesday at 7 p.m. the entire network runs a check to see if the radios are working and it saves having someone open the school building and driving up to town.

The latest two sets of radiation detection instruments we received, which are in the custody of Mr. Manna and Mr. Schultz, are much more practical than the other sets we have as they are powered entirely by standard flashlight batteries which are more easily available. The 22-volt batteries required in the old instruments (3 in cach) cannot be purchased nearby unless ordered in advance and are expensive.

If anyone is interested in literature on Fallout Shelters I have some plans issued by the government at my home and can get more on short notice. There has been much talk on the benefit of Fallout Shelters. I feel this is a question each of us must decide for himself as community shelters are not practical in a small town. Under Average weather conditions we are located in the section of the state to receive the smallest amount of fallout if the major cities around us should be attacked. However, if the wind should be from the South or East we could receive a large amount of fallout from targets South and East of us. Under any circumstances each family should have at least a two-week supply of packaged food (either tinned or tight plastic wrapped) on hand and a supply of fresh water available.

I have pamphlets that as to what would be advisable to have ready for an emergency if anyone would like one. It must be remembered that if major cities around us are hit, food will be in short supply until roads and railroads can be rebuilt, and that under the Civil Defense plan for the whole country, all stores, gasoline stations and fuel supplies will be locked and placed under guard by Civil Defense Police until food and fuel can be rationed.

If anyone is interested in seeing the test of the radio they are welcome to call at my home any Tuesday evening at 7 p.m. At the same time I would be glad to show you what the radiation instruments look like as I have several of the old type on hand.

This coming year I would like to acquire for the town three Walkie-Talkie type radios for use in not only Civil Defense emergencies but in other emergencies such as forest fires or plane crashes. They are essential for communication between radiation monitoring stations as chances are there would be no phone service available in an emergency.

Of course, we all hope and pray that we may never need any of these precautions but I feel the better prepared the nation is to survive the less likely the chance will be that we will need them.

LIBRARIAN'S REPORT

This year, many new improvements have taken place in our library. We are now open three days a week; Monday evenings, 7:30 to 8:30, Wednesday and Friday afternoons, 2:30 to 4:30. Our book circulation was at an all-time high of 5,103 books. The Bookmobile visited five times and left a total of 737 books.

This year our special project has been to start cataloging the book collection. With the help of volunteers and State Library personnel we started this project last spring. Because of our progress in our work we were granted state aid of \$125.00 in November to purchase some of the needed tools for cataloging. With the aid of volunteers we shall continue this project this year; as a card catalog is vitally needed in the library to function properly. A book cart was purchased this year and is a great help to the librarian in shelving books.

Our special project for 1962 will be improving the childrens' book collection. A weeding of these books is badly needed and many more upto-date books are needed to keep up with the increased demands. An additional \$100 has been budgeted for this purpose.

We hope to see an active "Friends of the Library" started this year. If interested in belonging, contact your librarian or one of the library trustees.

I should like to take this time to remind you that YOUR library stands ready to serve YOU. If the information you are seeking cannot be obtained in this library, the State Library usually can furnish it. So don't hesitate to contact your librarian if there is some information that you are looking for.

AN APPEAL FROM YOUR FOREST FIRE WARDEN

In these days of constantly rising taxes and wages, any unnecessary expense is an added burden on everyone's pocketbook — yours and mine. Forest fires—cost money and damage our valuable woodlands. Lightning sets some forest fires, but we have no control of lightning. Children cause many fires. Ninety-cight percent of our forest fires result from human carelessness—our carelessness. This, we—you—and I can do something about.

When we require you to obtain a permit for out-of-doors burning or forbid you to burn on days of high fire danger or set up regulations — hours, etc., governing the use of the town dump we are simply protecting yours and the town's interests.

The ever-present threat of forest fires is the concern of all of us; the responsibility for preventing them is ours and the costs of extinguishing are ours. We can do something about this problem, by being aware of and alert to the danger and by cooperating with your warden.

Do the things that are required of you -

- 1. Follow the warden's directions.
- 2. Secure the required burning permit.
- 3. Keep your fires under control.
- 4. Completely extinguish your fires before leaving them.
- 5. See that your children are properly cautioned.

Everyone will benefit by it.

REPORT OF SCHOOL SUPERINTENDENT

To the School Board and Citizens of Bartlett:

For the first time since 1951, Bartlett School District has received a substantial Grant in Aid from the State Equalization Fund. This amounted to \$4,125.70 this year and a like amount has been established for next year. Adding the \$1,500 which Bartlett receives from the State for school building aid provides our District with a total of \$5,525.70 from State funds.

The recommended School Board's budget shows an increase over last year of approximately \$7,000.00. The bulk of this increase comes in high school tuition costs. It is interesting to note the excellent attendance record made by Bartlett boys and girls attending Kennett High School. Bartlett shows the least number of student drop-outs of any district in the area. In 1957, the last year that Bartlett maintained a high school, there were thirty-seven students at Bartlett High School and ten more at Kennett High School. This year there are sixty-five Bartlett boys and girls enrolled at Kennett High School and two years hence we expect the high school enrollment to jump to eighty students.

Transportation costs have increased over the years until it now takes about 12% of the total school budget to transport high school and elementary school children. There has never been a clearly defined school policy on transportation which has sometimes resulted in confusion and misunderstanding. Your school board has adopted the following policy concerning school transportation: The School District shall furnish transportation to all pupils who live two or more miles from the school to which they are assigned. Pupils entitled to transportation may be required to walk a distance not exceeding one mile to an established transportation line or school bus line.

Our school district will be losing a truly outstanding teacher at the end of this year when Mrs. Lucille Garland retires after nineteen years of service in the Bartlett Elementary School and we wish for her the best of health and an abundance of happiness in the golden years of her retirement.

Mr. Raymond Walker, who has taught in the Bartlett Schools since 1948 has been awarded the Master of Education degree from Plymouth Teachers College.

Most of Bartlett's teachers have availed themselves of the educational courses offered in Conway. These included courses in Creative Writing and Educational Psychology.

I wish to express my appreciation to the School Board and the teachers, who have worked hard for the improvement of education in Bartlett, and to the citizens of Bartlett for their desire and willingness to support an educational program for the children and youth of Bartlett, and who look upon education as a sound, wise, and lasting investment.

Report of School Nurse

The School Health Program is designed to raise the health standards of all pupils by the formation and extension of desirable practices, attitudes and understandings associated with nutrition and growth, relaxation, rest and sleep, activity, fresh air and sunshine, elimination, cleanliness and care of teeth, body and clothing, importance of, and means of securing medical and dental care, care of eyes and ears, posture, safety, and emotional and social adjustments; to discover and correct, as far as possible, the development of defects; to dispel a child's fear of dentist and doctors examinations and treatments; to help parents to know where they can go for desired help outside the community and to make parents more health conscious.

This program could not be carried on as it is without the splendid cooperation of doctors, dentists, hospital, teachers, parents, superintendent, school board, and many volunteer workers.

In the fall, all of the pupils in grades 1, 4, and 7 go to the hospital in North Conway for their physical examination. Thirty-one pupils were examined. This included height and weight, examination by a doctor, teeth checked by a dentist, and a blood and urine test by hospital technician. A written report is mailed to parents, and a follow-up visit by the nurse wherenever necessary.

Our program is greatly assisted by the State Department of Health Clinics. The number of pupils who went to the Clinics during the year are
