#### AN APPEAL FROM OUR FORET FIRE WARDEN

In these days of constantly rising taxes and wages, any nonecessary expense is an added burden on everyone's cocketbook yours and mine. Forest fires cost money and damage our valuable woodlands. Lightning sets some forest fires, but we have no control of lightning. Children cause many fires. Ninety-eight percent of our forest fires result from human carlessness – our carelessness. This, we you – and I can do something about.

When we require you to obtain a permit for out-of-doors burning or forbid you to burn on days of high fire danger or set up regulations – hours, etc., governing the use of the town dump we are simply protecting yours and the town's interests.

The ever present threat of forest fires is the concern of all of us; the responsibility for preventing them is ours and the costs of extinguishing are ours. We can do something about this problem, by being aware of and alert to the danger and by cooperating with your warden.

Do the things that are required of you -

1. Follow the warden's directions.

2. Secure the required burning permit.

3. Keep your fires under control.

4. Completely extinguish your fires before leaving them.

5. See that your children are properly cautioned.

Everyone will benefit by it.

# TOWN WARRANT THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

#### To the Inhabitants of the Town of Bennington in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Bennington on Tuesday, the 12th day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for highways and bridges.

3. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid for Class V roads and raise and appropriate money for the same. The Town must raise \$242.74 and the State will contribute \$1,618.26.

4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow such sums of money as may be necessary in anticipation of taxes.

5. To see what action the Town will take in regard to real estate taken over by the Town for non-payment of taxes.

6. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 for tarring. (Selectmen).

7. To see what action the Town will take in regard to Memorial Day and raise and appropriate money for the same.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of 151.00 (1/100th of 1% of Town Valuation) to the Monadnock Region Association of Southwestern N. H. for issuance and distribution of printed matter, newspaper and magazine advertising, and by other means calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the Town in coopertion with the other thirty-seven towns of the Region. (Selectmen).

9. To see if the Town will change time of town meeting from 1:00 P.M. to 7:00 P.M. (Silvio Zanga).

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate two thousand (\$2,000.00) to repair Town Garage to store Town truck, machinery and equipment securely. (Selectmen).

11. To see if the Town will adopt Whittemore Beach Ordinances. (Selectmen).

12. To see if the Town will adopt regulation of Water Department as submitted by Water Commissioners.

13. To see what action the Town will take in regard to purchasing a mobile radio unit for the Chief of Police and to raise and appropriate money for same. This item to be purchased with matched funds from Civil Defense and our cost will be \$295.00. (Chief of Police).

14. To see what action the Town will take to install cement foundation floor and ramp in Fire Department small station and raise and appropriate monies for the same. (Fire Department).

15. To see what action the Town will take to install dug outs and loam and seed Little League ball field with assistance from Lions Club and raise and appropriate monies for the same. (Lions Club).

16. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for Statutory requirements and to carry the articles and appropriations of the School District into effect.

17. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

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To the School Board and Citizens of Bennington:

It is a pleasure for me to present my eighth annual report for your consideration.

For the first time since I became your superintendent, we have been fortunate in retaining the same faculty members for a second year. Any school that can continue this practice, during this prolonged period of teacher shortages, is fortunate indeed.

Our enrollment as of October 1st was 104 pupils. This is three more than a year ago and breaks down as follows:

The pupil projection over the next five years indicates that our school population will remain rather constant.

As you know, we combine two classes under one teacher. Last year we had thirty-one pupils in grades I and II, and this year twenty-eight. In the primary area these classes are too large for an adequate learning situation to take place. This is the period of a childs school life when he needs a great deal of individual help and I commend Mrs. Cody's efforts in this area. It does not seem practical to divide this class under two teachers but it may be advisable to give some thought to providing a "teachers' aid."

Space, of course, is the greatest drawback we are faced with when our thinking turns to enrichment programs or any division of classroom responsibility. Your Building Committee will have a separate report on their study of plant enlargement.

As the cost of school operation increases, tuition rates reflect these increases. It is expected that for 1962-63 they will be as follows: Peterborough and Antrim \$457; Hillsboro-Deering \$430.

Bennington citizens should watch with interest the work being done by the Legislative Interim Committee on education. If the suggestion made by the chairman of the State Board of Education is accepted, it could present Bennington with a serious problem. It has been a pleasure to work with the School Board, Building Committee, pupils, teachers, and citizens of Bennington this past year and I appreciate the fine cooperation given me.

#### **COMMITTEE REPORT**

#### January 11, 1962

Your committee was appointed by the Moderator in accordance with the favorable vote at the last annual School Meeting on Article 9 of the Warrant:

"To see if the district will vote to appoint a committee to study the advisability of an addition to the school plant. This committee to report at the next annual meeting with pertinent data."

The committee, consisting of two members from the general public, two members from the P.T.A. and the members of the School Board, met at various times during the year. At the committee's request Ruth Cody, Principal, and Norman Hartfiel, Superintendent, attended these meetings to give us their advice and assistance. We wish to thank both of them for their help, and Mr. Hartfiel particularly for the information he supplied to assist us in reaching a decision.

We first reviewed with the Principal and the Superintendent needs for additional space. Additional space requirements were considered from two different aspects. First, the need for a multi-purpose room to be used for music, showing of movies, school exercises, indoor recess in periods of bad weather and a lunch room. Second, the possible future need for additional classroom space for possible increased enrollment and/or the possible separation of classes in the future to make the classes per teacher smaller. At present each teacher handles two classes in the same room.

The committee next studied the various possibilities for making additional space available. This seemed to come down to three possible solutions.

The first possibility would be to send out of Town the 7th and 8th grades on a tuition basis in order to make available a classroom in the present school structure which could be converted to a multi-purpose room. It was estimated that the cost to do this, consisting of both tuition and transportation, would be in excess of \$10,000 per year.

The second possibility, along the same lines, would be to buy into the Hillsboro-Deering Co-op and send out the 7th and 8th grades to the Co-op school. This would also, of course, include the sending of high school students to this Co-op school. It was estimated that the annual cost on this basis, including the "buying in," would be in excess of \$20,000 per year. The third possibility would be to construct an addition to the present Pierce School building which would serve as a Multi-purpose room with a stage and food preparation area. This room to be so designed that it could in the future be converted into two classrooms if the need arose. Mr. Hartfiel arranged for an architect, Mr. Irving Hersey, to inspect the plant and give a tentative estimate of the cost of such an addition. He estimated that this addition to the building, including equipment, could be built for a total cost not exceeding \$50,000. Based on his estimate of the construction cost and considering the additional operating costs (not including added teachers) and the interest costs it would appear that this could be done at a cost per year of approximately \$5,000.00 assuming that the building cost was amortized over a period of 15 years.

In considering the need for additional space we reviewed the projected enrollment figures for the period to 1966-67 furnished us by Mr. Hartfiel. This projection indicates that the school enrollment will not increase beyond its present level and probably will decline. We discussed with the Principal and the Superintendent the advisability of separating the present two classes handled by each teacher and adding to the teaching staff. It was agreed that while the present number of pupils per classroom, with two classes per teacher, was too large to be considered satisfactory the enrollment was not so large as would really justify the creation of separate classes in separate classrooms. It would appear that the use of a multi-purpose room for the near future would be for other than classroom space.

It was the considered opinion of the committee that the need for such a Multi-purpose room was justified by the requirements for a better teaching program and a suitable room for lunches, indoor recess, and assembly. It would also be available for conversion to classrooms and construction could be planned so as to allow for the later addition of a second story. This would provide for possible further expansion should the need arise in the longer term future.

It was also the judgment of the committee that the needs for such a Multi-purpose room could best be filled by additional construction at the Pierce School. It was agreed that this solution was both the most ecenomical and the most satisfactory to those responsible for the education of the children of Bennington.

Therefore this committee recommends this solution to the consideration of the voters and suggests that if the voters agree a construction and finance committee be appointed or elected to bring back a complete program for consideration at the next annual School Meeting.
