### TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Bridgewater in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Grange Hall in said Bridgewater on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Selectman for three (3) years, and all other necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year. Polls open to six p. m.
- 2. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for General Government for the ensuing year.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$351.97 for T. R. A., providing the State contributes \$2,346.45.
- 4. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for maintenance of Class V Highways and Bridges (Dirt Roads).
- 5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for maintenance of Class V Highways (Black Top Roads).
- 6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to maintain the Town Dump.
- 7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Winter Sand and Snow Removal.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$115.00 for Workman's Compensation Insurance.
- 9. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Regional Associations.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$650.00 for Old Age Assistance.

- 11. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Old Home Day.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15.00 for Memorial Day.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$275.00 for Interest on Temporary Loans.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for Fire Protection.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the aid of the Plymouth Hospital.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes, and to deliver inventory blanks when assessing:
- 17. To transact any further business that may legally come before said meeting.





### Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual examination and audit of the accounts of the Town of Bridgewater for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1955, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the Town. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

### SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk and Trustees of Trust Funds.

### FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balance Sheets-December 31, 1954-

December 31, 1955: (Exhibit A)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1954 and December 31, 1955, are presented in Exhibit A. As indicated therein the Net Debt decreased by \$627.27 in 1955.

### Analysis of Change in Financial Condition:

Expenditures-Estimated and Actual Revenues:

(Exhibits A-3 & A-4)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1955, are presented in Exhibits A-3 and A-4. As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit A-4), a revenue surplus of \$1,894.02, less a net overdraft of appropriations of \$1,248.31, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$645.71.

### Summary of Receipts and Expenditures:

(Exhibit B-1)

A summary of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1955, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit B-1. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of December 31, 1955, is indicated in Exhibit B-2.

### AUDIT PROCEDURE

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds, were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source insofar as possible and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements obtained from depository banks

### GENERAL COMMENTS

### Conclusion:

The provisions of Chapter 184 of the Laws of 1955, require that this report or the summary of findings and recommendations (letter of transmittal) shall be published in the next annual report of the Town.

It gives me pleasure to submit the following library report for the year ending Dec. 31, 1955:

The trustees met on April 2 of this year, fifty-four years to the same day of the first organized meeting. We elected officers as follows: chairman, Elizabeth Torsey; treasurer, Alice B. Dickinson, and secretary, Gertrude M. Bucklin. The State Public Library report for 1954 was filled out. Fines and magazine subscriptions were discussed. Agreed to meet annually on Saturday nearest this date.

As recommended at last year's town meeting, the Hill Station has been closed and the 356 books are in storage at Mrs. Dickinson's. The two remaining stations have exchanged books twice, thus making more titles available to each side.

In order to give better service we are, with the assistance of an extension librarian, Mr. Riley, in the process of eliminating obsolete titles which we are in the hopes

of having completed by another year. In the near future we hope to have a complete file of book titles available from these stations.

The River Road Station has paid particular attention to purchasing books needed by school pupils for book reports, and also books of permanent reference value, such as the Columbia Encyclopedia, Audel's new Automobile Guide for Mechanics and Servicemen, the new revised version of the Bible, and the National Geographic Magazine book on American Indians. The Everett Atwood Memorial gift includes the four following authoritative reference works: Trees and Shrubs of New Hampshire, Knowing Your Trees, An Introduction to Trees, American Resources: Their Management and Conservation.

Books of permanent value were also added at the Turnpike Station such as: 1,000-page book of Birds of America, American Woman's Cookbook, The Complete Garden Handbook, The Book of Arts and Crafts; and for the children, The Civil War and Bible Story of Noah's Ark. With additional summer and local patrons, the circulation at this station remains steady.

In closing we wish to draw your attention to the fact that many towns increased last year's appropriation and that our quota per capita has been low in comparison with other towns in the past years; also the wholesalers we deal with are eliminating the 40% "used only" service completely, thus curbing more volumes. Good books are costing more. In voting your appropriation this year, please take in consideration these facts.

We solicit your comments, pro and con, on this type of report.

### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE SCHOOL WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the School district in the town of Bridgewater qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Grange Hall in said district on the 6th day of March 1956, at eight o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
  - 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
- 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.
- 9. To see if the district will appropriate a sum not to exceed \$6000 to enlarge the River Road Schoolhouse by adding and equipping a second classroom; and to authorize the school board to issue notes or bonds, and to determine the terms and conditions upon which the notes or bonds shall be issued including their sale and time and place of payment of principal and interest, in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act of 1955, and any amendments thereto. (A 2/3 vote is necessary

to carry this motion, and must be taken by actual count

and so recorded by the clerk.)

10. If the above article is carried to see if the school district will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$4100 to be added to the regular budget to hire an extra teacher, to pay for other necessary operating expenses including insurance to cover the limit permitted by law, and to pay the principal and interest.

11. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$2575 to send the pupils in grades 7 and 8 at the River Road School out of town to

school for one year only.

12. To see if the school district will vote to authorize the school board to sell the Bridgewater Hill Schoolhouse.

13. To transact any other business which may come

legally before said meeting.

#### SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT 1955-56

We wish again to emphasize the most serious shortage of teachers who are qualified through either training or successful experience, or both, and to quote material based on a study financed by the Ford Foundation for the Advancement of Education and written by Mr. Beardsley Ruml and Sidney C. Tickton, noted businessmen. The demand for teachers is great and will increase for years to come because: 1) The total number of births during the depression years was relatively very small (the present college age group); 2) 1954 produced the biggest crop of babies yet with over 4 million being born in comparison with less than 3 million in 1944; 3) In the next 10 years we will need to recruit three new teachers for every two now employed; 4) It would take half of all college graduates for each of the next 10 years to meet this demand; 5) We have now 9,200,000 pupils in the 14-17 age level but in 1965 there will be 14,200,000! The above constitute basic facts, the foundation of serious troubles, and can not be changed. These in themselves create a tremendous shortage of teachers, making a very restricted economic supply of a scarce commodity and resulting in an increasing market value of the same, higher salaries. Added to this shortage and increased demand due to increased number of pupils we have a rising salary level in the field of industries as shown below:

From this it can be seen that there is little incentive for a pupil to spend four years, or more, of his life, and a considerable capital investment in a vocation paying less than jobs in industry which pay as you learn. Earning over \$10,000 per year were 41% of the physicians and surgeons, 28% of the lawvers and judges, and 24.6% of the dentists, and .95% of the teachers.

Why does anyone enter the teaching profession today? What are these basic figures going to do to every salary paid any teacher in the years to come? No amount of

unfavorable publicity or unkind belittling thinking can change the demand for teachers caused by children already born and who will be educated during the next 20

years

Much is being written about the poor quality of education of today and most of it implies great superiority of past educational systems. How did we get into such dire circumstances, if we are in them, when the situations of today are the results of a supposedly superior educational system of previous generations? Certain it is that those now in school and vet to go to school can not be blamed for circumstances due to their parents and grandparents. We are trying to blame the newly born for errors of our own, and past generations, which errors actually may not be very great anyway. Somehow or another the people of the United States past and present, (and future, I'm sure) have given an account of themselves unmatched, and universally envied. We might ask, "How good can we get?" The answer is, of course, "Better." That's the premise we work with, and always will, but to do so and keep some small degree of sanity requires a judicious omission of much that is being popularized at the moment. For instance, reading is taking a "panning" at the moment (it was history a few years ago and it will be either math or spelling in a year or so). Most of what is being written assumes that we know nothing about two things: 1) How to teach reading; 2) What results we are now getting.

Let's look briefly at results of nationally standardized tests given every year in Union No. 4. To avoid exact identification we will assume the grades taken to be fictitious although the figures used are basically correct. Twenty-four out of 35 in grade 6 scored above grade level in reading last April with the highest level above grade 10; 12 were at the 8th grade level or higher. In grade 5 fifteen out of 30 were above grade with 8 above grade 7. More of the same could be quoted based on recorded facts but let's reverse the figures and say that 15 out of 30 were below grade level, which is true. Popularly these are the ones that get into print! But let's go one step further and say that the abilities of the pupils in this grade vary from border line feeblemindedness to high superiority, but none near the genius level. We are speaking here of those abilities necessary to acquire a high degree of reading ability or academic achievement. We

are not considering mechanical, social, artistic, musical, or any number of other abilities. In summary we can say that our results are as anyone acquainted with human beings knows deep down in his heart and secretly admits to his conscience; an average grade will test average in accomplishment with bright pupils achieving brilliantly and dull ones doing below a standardized level with exceptions both ways occasionally thrown in for good measure; a mathematical average, whether of business profits or grade achievements, is composed of all elements both good and bad. Schools have one great handicap from the viewpoint of achieving only top quality results: We can not give the "pink slip" to those not improving our product! We might add here, in view of some recent publicity nationally, that it takes a mighty smart youngster with exceptional ability in mathematics to become an engineer; just requiring all pupils to take four years of high school math is not going to automatically produce atomic scientists but will produce an amazingly large number of flunks in high school!

Some few years ago the "better" schools were de-emphasizing marks to such an extent that those of us who were still "old-fashioned" enough to cling to them were just not accepted as being quite normal! A recent article has been written stating that marks are very much in style, are perhaps being stressed too much not because of not being in step with modern trends but because so many scholarships are being offered putting a very high premium on marks and slighting those which may have other abilities equally important, or more so, than those necessary to achieve good grades. And so the educational pendulum swings in another arc! Past performance is still one of the best indexes we have to predict future

success.

The last legislature increased state aid to needy school districts from \$900,000 to \$1,200,000 which when read one way is a 33% increase but when looked at from another angle is a mere \$300,000 hardly enough to build a high school for 150 pupils. When the tough educational problems facing us, and some are in Union No. 4, are carefully analyzed this is a very small amount of money when compared with what some of us believe will be eventually necessary to even partially meet our educational needs. Canaan received \$19,400 of state aid; Danbury \$8,143; Alexandria and Orange some few dollars

over \$1,000. The first two are significant amounts but are small when compared with present and future needs (particularly the latter). Even towns not receiving aid at present, and who may never under a formula based on need as measured at present, may well require significant amounts of aid to meet future needs including salary spirals. The local real estate tax should not be expected to meet all of these costs and the state with its different sources of tax money will be required to help more and more or the federal government will be forced into educational fields because of its biggest source of revenues, the individual income tax of which New England contributes a share far in excess of its population. We are now paying for federal projects benefiting other sections of the country and should not be too squeamish about getting more of it back here, at least for capital improvements for schools, flood control and like projects. We believe in local control of education, the least amount of state control, and no federal control, if possible, but, at present, we can not foresee the local unit being able to increase its contribution indefinitely, foresee the state as being reluctant to be financially realistic in its educational obligations, and only a hodgepodge of ideas at the national level. A state building aid bill was passed providing aid beginning with the school year of 1956-57 provided funds become available. This would pay up to 20% of outstanding debt for a current year of buildings approved by the Department of Education. It seems unwise to plan on receiving much from this source because it is too indefinite. This bill marks a step up in the right direction and we have hopes of its increasing in future vears. Educational costs are bound to increase very materially in the years to come due to the pressure of more children, if for no other cause.

The River Road School now has a fine addition to house its new toilets and lavatories. Much credit should be given to all of those who aided in any way in this project but particular mention should be given to Mr. Bertram Forbes Sr. and Mr. Lawrence Drew who acted as co-chairmen, did the major part of the planning, working, supervising, and yankee bargaining to make all of this possible at a most reasonable figure. Most of their spare summer hours were spent on this project, and, I dare say, they would not want to make this an annual

event! Below is a summary of the project.

Bertram Forbes Sr. and Lawrence Drew began work

on June 16 by tearing down the old 14' x 14' ell in order to better remove the old chemical toilets and to permit the building of a small basement, and better overall planning. The new addition of 14' x 18' continues the old roof line and would permit later additions without major changes. "Everything that was purchased for the new building was bought where the best trade could be made." The Merrimack Farmers Exchange and Rand's Hardware Store were very helpful in helping to secure the necessary items and in giving generous discounts. Mr. Forbes sold needed lumber at less than half price, Rand's donated the use of a pump, David Dickinson his cement mixer and ladders, Lawrence Drew a truck and a hot water tank.

Those working at the school from time to time included Wayne Terrill, Forest and Alan Drew, Billy, Dave and Dave Dickinson Sr., and Bertram Forbes Jr. Electrical work was done by Harleen Samaha of Plymouth, and plumbing, heating and carpentering by Bertram Forbes and Lawrence Drew.

"It was interesting to note that many people were interested in how we were getting along not only among the townspeople but many out of towners who have a similar problem in their towns.

"This enterprise is of course, minute in the scope of the world. However, we, who have done the work, feel that it is another expression of faith in the future, giving the present crop of children just a little better than we had

in the schooldays we knew."

The last paragraph above expresses very well a bit of educational philosophy which is a driving force among those of us interested in school affairs no matter at what phase of education we work. With this philosophy working at all times the pupils will be the gainers even though we as adults may not agree as to exact details. This whole project has given us courage to tackle a problem or two in other towns which, at the moment, seem to have no solutions.
