TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Chesterfield in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Chesterfield on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To vote by Australian Ballot for all necessary Town Officers.

Article 2. To determine the method of collecting taxes for the ensuing year.

Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 4. To hear the report of the Budget Committee and act Thereon.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the following sums of money for the following purposes:

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,200.00 for street lighting.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$224.00 (1/100th of 1% of the valuation of the Town) to the Monadnock Region Association of Southwestern New Hampshire, for issuance and distribution of printed matter, newspapers and magazine advertising, and by other means calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the Town, in co-operation with the other thirty-seven towns of the Monadnock Region.

Article 8. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$435.00 as its fair share of the operating cost of the Elliot Community Hospital (\$200.00 approved by the Budget Committee.).

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,157.95 for Town Road Aid, thereby receiving an additional \$7,719.66 from the State.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$8,000.00 for Winter Maintenance of Roads.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 for the repair and upkeep of

Highway Equipment. (\$4,000.00 approved by Budget Committee.)

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 for permanent road improvements.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$13,500.00 for Summer Road Maintenance.

Article 14. To see if the Town will appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to be added to the Fire Truck Reserve Fund, for the purchase of Class A equipment in the future.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to be added to the Highway Equipment Reserve Fund, for the future purchase of new highway equipment.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to allocate the Town Road Aid money for the improvement of and/or reconstruction of the so-called Old Westmoreland Road.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the purpose of widening, draining and resurfacing with either gravel or tar the hill part of Jackson Hill road, and in so doing cease spending excessive amounts of money to keep this particular section of road even passable. (Not approved. Recommend \$1,000.00 out of Permanent Road Improvement Plan).

Article 18. To raise and appropriate \$3,000.00 for the convenience of the public to improve and drain and resurface the Lincoln Road, so called, from the turn off near the top of Chesterfield Hill to the Atherton Hill Junction. (Not approved. Recommend \$1,000.00 from Permanent Road Improvement Plan.)

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$18,000.00 which is 60% of the cost, and apply for State Aid for the construction, of a new multiplate type bridge on the road leading from W. Chesterfield to Cobleigh Corner, to be financed by raising \$2,000.00 from this year's taxes, using

\$4,000.00 from the Town's Treasury surplus, and the balance of \$12,000.00 by borrowing on long-term notes, to be paid off at the rate of \$2,000.00 annually.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to trade the Adams Grader, the sum realized on the trade to be applied to a new Grader, fully equipped. Balance of the cost to be paid as follows: \$1,000.00 of highway equipment fund, plus the balance of the Reserve Equipment Fund. Final balance to be paid at the rate of \$2,000.00 per year until paid, and to authorize the Selectmen to borrow this money. (Not approved. Recommend Adams Grader be considered for complete overhaul and reconditioning.)

Article 21. To repair the Ferm Road so that it will be passable at all times.

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Zoning and Building Regulations of the Town of Chesterfield as provided by Article 7 thereof by deleting Article 1 thereof and adding in place thereof the following:

Article 1—Districts

The Zoning and building regulations shall be effective only to a depth of Five Hundred Feet on each side, from the center line of all Paved Public Roads and Highways now in existence within the Town of Chesterfield.

Article 23 To see if the Town will vote to amend the Zoning and Building Regulations of the Town of Chesterfield as provided by Article 7 thereof by adding to Article 2 thereof, the following:

J. No building or structure within Five Hundred Feet of the center line of the road around Spofford Lake shall be used for any commercial purpose nor shall any business be conducted therein, except this provision shall not apply to any building or structure being used for commercial purposes at the time of the passage of this Regulation.

Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$150.00 from Mary A. and Bryon A. Davis for the perpetual care and upkeep of the Davis-Royce lot in Spofford Cemetery and to be known as the Davis-Royce Trust Fund.

Article 25. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$100.00 from Fannie and Raymond Chickering, the income from same to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery for the perpetual care and upkeep of the Fannie and Raymond Chickering burial lot. Said fund to be known as the Fannie and Raymond Chickering Trust Fund.

Article 26. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$200.00 from Frank Richardson. The income to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Association for the perpetual care and upkeep of the Stowell-Richardson lot in the Chesterfield West Cemetery and to be known as the Stowell-Richardson Trust Fund.

Article 27. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$200.00 from the Henry F. Highton Estate. The income from same to be used for the perpetual care and upkeep of the Henry F. and Ada Ethel Highton burial lot in the Spofford Cemetery Association Yard, and to be known as the Henry F. & Ada Ethel Highton Trust Fund.

Article 28. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$100.00 from Jessie M. B. Joslin to be known as the Jessie M. B. Joslin Trust Fund in Trust for the John E. Joslin lot in Spofford Cemetery Association Yard. The income from same to be applied together with the John A. Joslin \$100.00 Trust Fund in Trust on the John E. Joslin lot, for perpetual care and upkeep of the John E. Joslin lot in Spofford Cemetery, making a \$200.00 Trust Fund on this lot.

Article 29. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$50.00 from Jessie M. B. Joslin to be added to the George H. Joslin \$152.16 Trust Fund, the income from same to be used for the upkeep and perpetual care of the George H. Joslin burial lot in Spofford Cemetery.

Article 30. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$50.00 from Jessie M. B. Joslin to be added to the Ellen M. Ball \$152.16 Trust Fund, the income from same to be used for the upkeep and perpetual care of the Ellen M. Ball burial lot in Spofford Cemetery.

Article 31. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$100.00 from Katherine L. Post, to be added to the Arthur H. Post Trust Fund, making a \$200.00 Trust Fund for the care of the Arthur H. Post Lot in Spofford Cemetery.

Article 32. To hear reports of Standing Committees and act thereon.

Article 33. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

TOWN MEETING, 1957

Proceedings of the Annual Meeting of the voters of the Town of Chesterfield, New Hampshire, called at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, March 12, 1957.

The meeting was called to order by the Moderator, James E. O'Neil at nine o'clock in the forenoon and the warrant through Article 1 was read by him. He then declared that the polls were open for balloting by Australian Ballot for all necessary town officers.

George Barrett was appointed by the Selectmen as Assistant Moderator and Mildred Gauthier as Assistant Clerk. They took the oaths of office before the Clerk.

At ten o'clock the Moderator called the meeting to order and the remainder of the Warrant was read by the Clerk. The Articles of the Warrant were then disposed of as follows:—

Article 2. H. Claude Mowry read the following statement and resolution:—

“Inasmuch as a number of the citizens of the town of Chesterfield, seeing that the cost of local government is rapidly rising and will most likely continue to rise for some years to come, have felt for some time that some constructive action should be taken to improve the financing of the town in an adequate and equitable manner of taxation. Therefore the following resolution is offered for the consideration of the voters of the town of Chesterfield. This resolution is not being offered in criticism of any office holders, but to give voice to opinions that may serve as a guide to those office holders in working out a more equitable taxing of property in the town.

Be it resolved that a vote be taken to see if the voters favor a closer look by the selectmen at all property, toward bringing ALL property, not up to the assessed valuation of comparable property in similar condition or location, up to

the standard or prevailing assessment of comparable property in similar condition or location. This, we realize, is a very sensitive point on which to touch, and we only recommend to the selectmen that they search their conscience to see that all property is assessed impartially, without fear or favor. That is, correct any mistakes, no matter who made them or when they were made.”

He then moved the adoption of this resolution only after full discussion.

Malcolm Sullivan then proposed an amendment to the motion made by H. Claude Mowry which would limit the number of years a Selectman could serve continuously. Robert Woodman stated that he thought this amendment was worthy of consideration, and suggested that the Moderator ask for a show of hands to see if there was enough interest for discussing it. This was done and the Moderator declared the vote showed enough interest. Discussion followed, during which Malcolm Sullivan was asked to withdraw his amendment and propose it again later in the meeting as a new motion.

Robert Woodman then supported the motion made by H. Claude Mowry to adopt the resolution. Voted by voice on same and the Moderator declare the vote carried in the affirmative.

Voted by voice vote on motion made by Harry E. Winn and supported by William Mitchell that three men be elected to work with the Selectmen to make a fair appraisal of properties, that nominations for same be made from the floor and that they be elected by paper ballot. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

The Moderator then called for nominations and the following resulted:—Robert E. Woodman was nominated by Alfred Gattey and supported by Ronald Brown. Kenneth Wiggin was nominated by Robert Woodman and supported by John McKeon. Malcolm Sullivan was nominated by Michael Pikula and supported by Leslie Fowle. Harry E. Winn was nominated by Arvid Pearson and supported by Paul Welcome. George E. Joslin was nominated by Monique Fisher and supported by H. Claude Mowry. Paul E. Welcome was nominated by Robert Woodman and supported by Floyd Fuller. Carl A.

Johnson was nominated by Joseph Sorrentino and supported by Bertha Willette.

Voted by voice vote on motion made by H. Claude Mowry and supported by Michael Pikula that the nominations be closed. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Voted by voice vote on motion made by H. Claude Mowry and supported by Joseph Sorrentino that they vote by paper ballot, using one piece of paper and writing three names on it. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Voted by voice vote on motion made by Robert Woodman which was supported that if any one elected cannot serve, the one with the next highest vote shall take his place. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

A count of the ballots cast resulted as follows:—Carl A. Johnson had 66 votes, George E. Joslin had 64 votes, Harry E. Winn had 64 votes, Robert E. Woodman had 47 votes, Paul E. Welcome had 30 votes, Malcolm Sullivan had 22 votes, Kenneth Wiggin had 20 votes. Carl A. Johnson, George E. Joslin and Harry E. Winn were declared by the Moderator to be elected and that Robert E. Woodman, having the next highest number of votes would serve if one of the three elected was unable to.

Voted by voice vote on motion made by Alfred Gattey and supported by Robert Woodman to recommend to the Selectmen and the newly elected board that they ask the State Tax Commission to sit in with them one afternoon for suggestions and instructions and that the State Tax Commission come in for one day to go over commercial properties with them. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Voted by voice vote on motion made by Robert A. Woodman and supported by Wakefield Dort to use the same method of collecting taxes for the ensuing year as for the past year. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 3. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Clifford E. Chickering and supported by George Joslin to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 4. William Mitchell, as chairman of the Budget Committee reported that the Public Budget Meeting was held on February 1 with only five citizens outside of the Budget Committee attending. He thanked the five for attending and showing their interest and also the members of the Budget Committee for their cooperation. He recommended that the Budget Committee be increased to nine members.

Voted by voice vote on motion made by Robert Woodman and supported by Paul Penning to accept the report as given. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 5. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Robert Woodman and supported by Alfred Gattey to amend part two of the article and increase Officers Expenses by \$750.00. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Voted by voice vote on motion made by H. Claude Mowry and supported by Paul Penning to raise and appropriate the following sums of money for the following purposes:

Article 6. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Clifford E. Chickering and supported by Robert Woodman to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for street lighting. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 7. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Clifford Chickering and supported by Harry Winn to amend the article to instruct the Selectmen to hold back payment of sum raised until a representative be appointed to take the place of Harry Winn who resigned a few years ago. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Voted by voice vote on motion made by Paul Penning and supported by Robert Woodman to raise and appropriate the sum of \$214.00 (1/100th of 1% of the valuation of the town) to the Monadnock Region Association of Southwestern New Hampshire for issuance and distribution of printed matter, newspaper and magazine advertising, and by other means calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the town, in cooperation with the other thirty-seven towns of the Monadnock Region, but to instruct the Selectmen to hold back payment of sum raised until a representative be appointed to take the place of Harry Winn who resigned a few years ago. Moderator declared the vote carried in the affirmative.

Article 8. Voted by voice on motion made by William Mitchell and supported by George Joslin to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 approved by the Budget Committee as the Town's fair share of the operating cost of the Elliot Community Hospital. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 9. Voted by voice vote on motion made by George Joslin and supported by Wakefield Dort to raise and appropriate the sum of \$910.85 for Town Road Aid, thereby receiving an additional \$6,072.30 from the State. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Voted by voice vote on motion made by Anna Hubner and supported by Alfred Gattey that we adjourn for lunch. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative and he declared the meeting adjourned until 1:30 p.m. At that time the Moderator called the meeting to order again and continued the articles.

Article 10. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Robert Woodman and supported by Ronald Brown to amend the article to raise the sum of \$8,000.00 for Winter Maintenance of Roads. Vote declared carried in the affirmative.

Voted by voice vote on motion made by Robert Woodman and supported by Monique Fisher to raise the sum of \$8,000.00 for Winter Maintenance of Roads. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 11. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Edward J. Willette and supported by Walter Woodward to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 for the repair and upkeep of Highway equipment. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 12. Voted by voice vote on motion made by H. Claude Mowry and supported by Ronald Brown to appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 for permanent road improvements, \$1,000.00 of this to be used to continue the Road Improvement Plan as submitted by the Town Road Committee, and adopted at Town Meeting 1953. This year's appropriation being used on the Gulf Road; the additional \$2,000.00 to be appropriated and earmarked for further permanent road improvements, in conjunction with the Road Improvement Plan. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 13. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Robert Woodman and supported by Ronald Brown to amend

the article to read \$13,500.00 instead of \$13,000.00. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Robert Woodman and supported by Stella French to raise and appropriate the sum of \$13,500.00 for Summer Road Maintenance. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 14. Voted by voice vote on motion made by William Mitchell and supported by Alfred Gattey to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Hundred Dollars (\$400.00), to be used in cooperation with State and Federal Funds, for the control of White Pine Blister Rust within the confines of the Town. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the negative.

Article 15. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Winston Cray and supported by William Mitchell to appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to be added to the Fire Truck Reserve Fund, for the purchase of Class A equipment in the future. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 16. Voted by voice on motion made by Arvid Pearson and supported by John McKeon to appropriate the sum of \$500.00. This sum to be matched with Federal Funds of like amount, to be used for the purchase of two mobile radio units, for Fire Mutual Aid. One unit to be placed in the Center truck, the other in West Chesterfield. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 17. Voted by voice vote on motion made by William Mitchell and supported by Alfred Gattey to appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to be added to the Highway Equipment Reserve Fund, for the future purchase of New Highway Equipment. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 18. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Paul Welcome and supported by Malcolm Sullivan to pass over the article in regard to raising a sum not to exceed \$4,000.00 in addition to trade in value of the old truck, for

the purchase of a new dump truck. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 19. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Agnes Chickering and supported by William Mitchell to accept the sum of \$150.00 from the Edward L. Welcome Estate, this sum to be added to the Ashbel Stoddard Trust Fund, and the income there-from to be paid to the C.W.C.A., for the perpetual care and maintenance of the Ashbel Stoddard burial lot in the Chesterfield West Cemetery. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 20. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Agnes Chickering and supported by Clifford Chickering to accept the sum of \$100.00 from Harry and James G. Bothwell, the income from the same to be paid to the C.W.C.A. for the perpetual care and maintenance of the Bothwell burial lot in the Chesterfield West Cemetery, and to be known as the Bothwell Trust Fund. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 21. Voted by voice vote on motion made by John McKeon and supported by Agnes Chickering to accept the sum of \$125.00 from Chesley J. Cripps, the income from same to be paid to the C.W.C.A. for the perpetual care and maintenance of the Chesley J. Cripps burial lot in the Chesterfield West Cemetery, and to be known as the Chesley J. Cripps Trust Fund. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 22. Voted by voice vote on motion made by John McKeon and supported by Agnes Chickering to accept the sum of \$100.00 from Carrie S. Caswell, this sum to be added to the Farr-Caswell Trust Fund, and the income therefrom to be paid to the C.W.C.A., for the perpetual care and maintenance of the Farr-Caswell burial lot in the Chesterfield West Cemetery. To the inhabitants of the school district in the town of Chesterfield qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Central School in said district on the 8th day of March, 1958 at 3:00 o'clock in the afternoon to bring in your votes for the election of the following officials:

1. A moderator for the coming year.
A clerk for the ensuing year.
A member of the school board for the ensuing three years.
A treasurer for the ensuing year.
Two auditors for the ensuing year.

You are further notified to meet at the Central School in said Chesterfield at 8:00 p. m. on the 8th of March, 1958, to act upon the following subjects.

2. To determine and appoint the salaries of school board members and the truant officer, and to fix the compensation of any other officer or agents of the district.

3. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers chosen, and to pass any vote relating thereto.

4. To choose agents, auditors and committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

5. To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officers, auditors and agents, for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of any sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund, together with other income, the school board to

certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

6. To see if the district will vote to hereafter use a check-list for the election of its officers, beginning with 1959 annual district meeting, and will adopt as its school check-list, the town check-list, as provided in RSA 197: 12a as inserted by laws of 1957 chapter 57.

7. To see if the district will vote to accept the provisions of chapter 186 par 24 RSA as amended to provide for the employment of a helping teacher on a union-wide basis to assist teachers and pupils . . . to improve the growth and development of children, solve pupil problems of retardation, adapt the program of studies to better meet pupil needs.

8. To see if the district will authorize the school board to make tuition contracts with Brattleboro and Keene school districts for the education of high school pupils.

9. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand eight hundred seventy-six dollars (\$2,876) as a deficit appropriation to be made available prior to June 30, 1958 for the payment of additional high school tuition costs to the school district of Brattleboro for the school year 1957-58.

10. To see if the district wishes to approve a study committee of the following: two members appointed by the P.T.A.; one selectman appointed by that group and one member appointed by the school board; to investigate the possibility of sending all high school pupils to Keene High School with transportation furnished by the district; the possibility of adding a junior-senior high school addition to the Central school or other possibilities tending toward the solution of the education of secondary pupils; and to raise and appropriate the sum of fifty dollars (\$50.00) for any necessary expenses.

11. To bring up any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

The immediate problem in Chesterfield relates to the rapidly growing school population. Elementary enrollment has increased 45% in the past nine years with no sign of it levelling off. High school enrollment in the same period of time has increased 65% with every indication that this will increase 35% more within 3 years for a 100% increase in high school pupils in 12 years; or a total grades 9-12 high school population of 100 pupils. High School tuition costs during the past 9 years have increased from \$120 per pupil to \$598 per pupil (Brattleboro); or an increase of 500%.

The fact that Chesterfield soon will have some 170 pupils available for the junior-senior high school level and this number will increase; it seems wise at this time to study the possibility of adding a junior-senior high school wing to the central elementary school and educating all pupils in the community. Since many high schools operate in New Hampshire at an average cost per pupil of \$350 and still provide a fully certified program of academic and general courses; it is distinctly possible that the best long range solution to the increasing high school tuition costs may well be a high school in Chesterfield. If Westmoreland high school pupils could be attracted to Chesterfield; this solution would be even more attractive and beneficial.

The Chesterfield Central school continues to operate smoothly and successfully under the principalship of Mr. Damon Russell and through the efforts of a hard working and well balanced staff of teachers. Careful consideration must soon be given to the teacher salary situation in Chesterfield. The average salary of elementary teachers in New Hampshire in the school year 1958-59 will be \$3,900. The proposed elementary salaries in Chesterfield for 1958-59 will average \$3,340 (exclusive of the principal's salary). Since

this is below the salary for beginning teachers with no experience, Chesterfield is in no position to attract competent, experienced teachers with these salaries and is in a position to lose competent teachers. Only public awareness of the prime importance of education for national survival will provide the support and funds necessary.

January 1957 through June 1957, the participation in the Hot Lunch Program averaged 152.

The rate of reimbursement from Federal Funds remained at 5c for each Type A meal, except for June which was cut to 2c a meal.

The Program opened September 4th with Mrs. Louise Leu as my assistant.

We average 155 pupils a day. At present we are receiving the full 5c reimbursement.

Under the special Milk Program, we served about 115 children. We received 4c reimbursement for each ½ pint of milk served.

From Jan. 1 to Dec. 31 we received the following Surplus Commodities from the Government: butter, lard or shortening, salad oil, canned pork and gravy, peas, string beans, hamburg, process cheese, rice, powdered eggs, corn meal, stewed tomatoes, grapefruit sections, white flour, and pea beans.

REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL

1957

I herein submit my first annual report of the Chesterfield Central School:

When the Chesterfield Central School opened its doors on September 4, 1957 the enrollment was as follows:

The total enrollment increased to 221 once this past year and has now leveled off to 207 pupils.

The teaching staff had two changes since last year, that of Mr. Edward Fairbanks and Mr. Gordon Decato, past principal, who moved to different schools as professional promotions. The two positions were filled by Miss Priscilla Post, teaching social studies and language subjects, and Mr. Damon Russell, teaching mathematics and science and also serving as principal. In working with the staff of teachers, I have found them all to be experienced, hard working and

conscientious. Chesterfield surely has a teaching staff to be proud of.

The job of finding new teachers is a difficult one, especially experienced and well trained ones. This becomes a real problem to small communities due to the difficulty of raising enough funds to offer a salary competitive with the larger industrial cities. The state of New Hampshire is one of the lowest states of the forty-eight in giving state aid to the public schools. The small communities need more assistance from the state. With more state aid the cost of the school budget would be less of a burden on the property taxpayers.

Mrs. Marion Warner, the school nurse, is doing a fine job in working out the many different health problems of the school children. She has carried out several different examinations and has assisted the school doctor with physicals. There has been one polio clinic and other special examinations arranged for by Mrs. Warner.

Mr. James McGuire, student teacher from Keene Teachers College, has spent nine weeks at the school teaching in the areas of mathematics and science. Mr. McGuire proved to be a well trained and respected teacher.

The local Parent Teachers Association has tackled the problem of making ballroom dancing lessons available to the school age children. Enough interest has been found to carry this project through and further arrangements are still being made at the time of this report. Several other projects have been discussed for the P.T.A. with the project of closet doors heading the list. The doors would be a great help in keeping the supplies neat and clean for the pupils. There is great hope on the part of the teachers that this project will be adopted. The P.T.A. becomes more and more vital to the parents and the school each year. Support your school by first becoming an active member of the P.T.A.

The school lunch program, under the direction of Mrs. Marion Nurse and assisted by Mrs. Louise Len, has offered varied and tasty meals, including several 'home-made' dishes. Many of the school children have taken advantage of the

fine food offered and also have been included in the special afternoon milk program.

Chesterfield Central School has had a steady increase in the number of children attending each year. The graduating class this year is the last small grade, which has been combined with another grade for several years. There is little possibility of being able to combine any two grades together without having about forty children to one grade. When a class becomes this size, it is very difficult for the teacher to do a fair job in educating. The state frowns upon having a class of this size, especially if there is two grade levels together. This leaves the alternative of adding a new teacher to the staff. This would make it possible for one teacher to have only one grade level, which is educationally, a sound step.

The eight years of education that your child receives are the most important stepping stones of their life. The future of our nation lies in the hands of our youth. The future of Chesterfield is in the hands of the present youth. There has been a great deal of interest shown in the town of Chesterfield for her youth. With the continued interest and willingness to cooperate, I am sure that the youth of this area will become active and informed citizens of the future.

Paul Penning moved that a paper ballot be had on the motion. Motion was duly seconded. Motion was lost on a voice vote. The meeting proceeded.

George Joslin moved that the Moderator cast one ballot for H. Claude Mowry for Clerk for the ensuing year. The Moderator cast one ballot for H. Claude Mowry for Clerk for the ensuing year, and declared him elected. Mrs. Imogene Chickering administered the oath of office.

Article 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.

Mrs. Alice Kaiser was nominated.

Mrs. Agnes B. Chickering was nominated.

Ronald Guyette moved that the nominations be closed.

The motion was seconded and passed on a voice vote.

A paper ballot was had with the following results:

Mrs. Alice Kaiser received 72 votes, and was declared elected by the Moderator. She took the oath of office from Mrs. Imogene Chickering.

Article 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.

Mrs. Evelyn Winn was nominated.

Mrs. Agnes B. Chickering moved that the nominations be closed. Motion was duly seconded and carried in the affirmative.

It was duly moved and seconded that the Clerk cast one ballot for Mrs. Evelyn Winn for Treasurer for the ensuing year. Motion carried in the affirmative on a voice vote.

The Clerk cast one ballot for Mrs. Evelyn Winn, and the Moderator declared her elected Treasurer for the ensuing year. Mrs. Imogene Chickering administered the oath of office.

Article 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.

Mrs. Anna Hubner moved that the salaries be accepted as printed in the annual Report. Seconded by George Barrett. Motion carried in the affirmative.

Article 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

Paul Welcome moved that all reports be accepted as printed in the Annual Report. Seconded by Oscar Ericson. Motion carried in the affirmative on a voice vote.

Article 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

Mrs. Agnes B. Chickering moved that the town auditors serve as auditors of the School District accounts as before. Seconded by Mrs. Monique Fisher. Motion carried in the affirmative.

Article 8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials, and agents, and for payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

Gordon Decato moved that the school district raise and appropriate the sum of \$86,789.50 and to authorize and direct the school board to apply against said appropriation such income as is estimated by the school board exclusive of state aid to be received by the school district during the next fiscal year, to authorize the school board to apply against such appropriation the sum to be received from state aid and with the school district clerk certify to the selectmen the balance as an assessment to be raised by the town for school purposes. James O'Neil seconded the motion. On a voice vote the motion was declared lost by the Moderator.

A motion was made and seconded that a paper ballot be had on the motion. Motion carried in the affirmative. A paper ballot was taken with the following result:

Article 9. To choose a school board member for one year to complete the term of the late Mr. Harold Putnam.

Mrs. Marjorie White nominated Mrs. Miriam A. Putnam.

James Gattey nominated Thomas O'Sullivan. George Barrett moved that the nominations be closed. The motion was seconded and carried in the affirmative on a voice vote. A paper ballot was taken with the following results:

Article 10. To see if the district will vote to adopt the provisions of chapter 34, sections 112-120 of the revised laws of New Hampshire or any amendments thereto; namely, the non-partisan ballot system for the election of all officers of the school district which have been customarily elected by ballot at previous meetings, the article if adopted to become effective at the annual meeting of March 1958; and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 (one hundred dollars) for necessary expenses.

William Mitchell moved that the article be adopted as read. Seconded by Ronald Guyette. Motion carried in the affirmative.

Article 11. To see if the district will vote to authorize the school board to make application for and to accept, on behalf of the district, any grants for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the State of New Hampshire or the United States of America.

Agnes B. Chickering moved that the article be adopted as read. Seconded by Paul Penning. Motion carried in the affirmative.

Article 12. To see if the district will vote to establish a capital reserve fund under provisions of chapter 160 par. 1 laws of 1943 and ch. 8 par. 2 laws of 1947 revised, and ch.

35 par. 1-5 revised laws of New Hampshire, and to authorize the deposit of the balance of the school building account into capital reserve and any balances on hand at the close of the school year. Such funds to be deposited with the trustee of trust funds and to be used for major capital outlay or emergency use upon a vote of the district meeting.

Paul Welcome moved that the article be adopted as read. Seconded by Donald Emery. Motion carried in the affirmative on a voice vote.

Article 13. To see if the district will authorize the payment of tuition to the Alley-Hicks School in Brattleboro.

Mrs. Agnes B. Chickering moved that the article be adopted as read. Seconded by Alfred Gattey. Motion carried in the affirmative.

On the suggestion of Mrs. Clara B. Wellington a rising vote of thanks was given to the two retiring members of the School Board.

Oscar Ericson moved that the meeting be adjourned. Seconded by Louis Gauthier. Motion carried in the affirmative.

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Forest Fire Prevention is Everybody's Business

New Hampshire faces a continuing challenge in its forest fire problem—97 per cent of all our forest fires being man-caused and preventable—a serious indictment of interest in our own welfare and that of our neighbor. Both the State and the towns are striving diligently to effectively meet the challenge through education of the public to the threat fire presents to our woodlands; by maintaining a well trained corps of wardens and deputy wardens in every community and by providing ample opportunity for all who wish to dispose of unwanted waste materials. Careless and perverseness, however, continue to be the big hurdles.

Thoughtlessly discarded lighted cigars, cigarettes and matches from moving vehicles by hikers, hunters and fishermen; careless burning of debris during hazardous periods in dangerous locations; illegal burning; improperly extinguished debris, camp and cook fires—all result in serious loss of property disruption of industry and farm work and unnecessary expenditure of town and state funds.

To meet the challenge successfully, the state, your community and your local forest fire warden need YOUR thoughtful and cooperative effort—The rules are simple.

1. Don't burn at home—use your town dump and avoid all fire problems.
2. If you do burn, be sure to secure a written permit from your local forest fire warden when the ground is not covered with snow. Permits are required for open debris fires, home incinerators, outdoor fire places and camp fires. Your warden is instructed to permit burning if weather conditions, site and type of burning are safe.
3. Be sure that all lighted material cigars, cigarettes and matches—are completely out before discarding them. Use ash trays in automobiles.
4. Make certain that your debris, camp and cook fires are completely out before leaving them.
5. Insist that others be careful and comply with burning requirements.
6. Call the warden promptly when fire is detected and aid him to extinguish it.

REMEMBER—the fire you prevent might be the one which could burn YOUR property.
