

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

# TOWN WARRANT

#### To the Inhabitants of the Town of Dublin qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, March 11th, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

First: To bring in your ballots for Town Clerk, Town Treasurer, Selectman, Road Agent, Tax Collector, Water Commissioner and three members of the Library Committee.

Second: To choose all other necessary Town Officers, Agents, Auditors and Committees for the ensuing year.

Third: To hear reports of Agents, Officers, Auditors and Committees heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

Fourth: To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to apply for Town Road Aid.

Fifth: To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and for any other purposes as may be mentioned in the Budget.

Sixth: To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purpose of completing the improvements in the west end of the cemetery.

Seventh: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to spray roadsides for the extermination of gypsy moths or take any action relating thereto.

Eighth: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to install a new heating system for the fire station, tramp room, and selectmen's rooms or take any action relating thereto.

Ninth: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to finish tarring or asphalting the upper Jaffrey road or take any action relating thereto. Tenth: To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate to install a drainage system down Mechanic Street from the culvert under the parking space near the Library to a point off Mechanic Street near the causeway or take any action relating thereto.

Eleventh: To see if the Town will vote for State Bridge Aid for a bridge on the Charcoal road and raise and appropriate money for the same or take any action relating thereto.

Twelfth: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to provide for insurance, fuel bills and other incidental bills that have accumulated for care of Public Library building or take any action relating thereto.

Thirteenth: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to compensate Charles H. Silver for expenses caused by injuries to his son Curtis Silver by acid burns from acid container kept in the rear of the Town Hall or take any action relating thereto.

Fourteenth: To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Fifteenth: To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's deeds.

# REPORT OF ROAD AGENT

I herewith submit my report:

1,978 yards of gravel were placed on the roads this year.

We laid 174 feet of 15-inch, 24 feet of 18-inch concrete pipe; and relaid 24 feet of 30-inch pipe. We built several headers.

All tar roads were patched, and given a seal coat.

About 23 tons of chloride were applied.

Bushes were cut and burned on several roads.

All roads were scraped and dragged several times.

We widened the road from The Dublin Inn to the residence of Winslow Pierce about six feet and applied a light coat of gravel. This section should have more gravel this coming year.

We cut bushes, scraped, widened and graveled the Leonard and Old Dublin roads. These roads had not been maintained for several years.

We made extensive repairs on Blackberry Lane. This road should not have been repaired with maintenance funds, and I called attention to the condition of this road in my first report of 1939, and asked for a special appropriation.

Our maintenance tools are in good condition with the exception of the grader. We should have a new grader. Our winter equipment is also in good condition without any serious breakage this winter.

### **REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF CEMETERY**

During 1940, but one death occurred among Dublin residents, thus equalling the unusual record of the previous year. There were seven interments. Four additional Perpetual Care Trust Funds were received. Broken gravestones were mended and a considerable number of stones straightened; additional lots have been graded, grassed and can now be cut with lawn mower.

The entire cemetery was sprayed for the extermination of gypsy moths, paid for by an interested friend. Meadow pinks and mountain laurel have been set in the point of land at the junction of roads next the lake.

In the west part, including some of the newly acquired Frothingham addition, filling, grading and seeding have been done. It is recommended that another section of similar size be finished this coming year; that the proposed short road be built through the new part, a gate erected at the two new entrances to practically complete the work on the new development.

It would seem desirable to replace the old wooden turnstile which formerly stood at the entrance of the foot-path on the north side, with a new one of similar design.

A loose-leaf record of gravestones and burials is needed for the alphabetical expansion of additional names and locations.

## REPORT OF THE DUBLIN SCHOOL BOARD

To the Citizens of the Dublin School District:

We hereby submit the one hundred and nineteenth annual report of the school.

The number of pupils in the Dublin Consolidated School remains close to the hundred mark and the census indicates that the school population will not change much in the near future. A change in the location of the children in the area has made it necessary to extend the bus route at several points.

Some improvements that may not be so noticeable to the casual observer have been made in the last few years. The hard-surfacing of the grounds next to the school building has removed all trace of dampness from the basement walls, and the extension of the use of gravel on the school grounds has greatly improved their condition in wet weather. More needs to be done in this direction.

There has been an extension of the use of the building for constructive purposes not otherwise provided for and we are glad whenever the building is thus used. The School Board was especially happy that the Red Cross could find within the building suitable rooms for both its summer and winter work.

Some of the happiest community gatherings of the year are those that center around the children and take place in the school building. At Christmas and at graduation it seems as if the whole community turned out. A new project this year was the Children's Fair in the fall. Hand work, garden products, and collections of many other kinds were sent in by the children of three townships and made a very fine exhibit. The Dublin Garden Club is helping to make this a year around project heading up in the fall with a Children's Fair.

The School Board have appreciated the fine spirit that has prevailed in its relations with both teachers and superintendent. We do not hesitate to say that teachers and janitor have all worked together effectively for the interest of the children and the community and we are grateful.

# ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS TO THE DUBLIN SCHOOL BOARD

I am submitting at this time my seventh annual report of the Dublin Consolidated School, together with the statistical table and summary, and am also calling attention to the report of the school nurse, Miss Margaret E. Harris.

During the past ten years, since the Consolidated School has cared for the elementary pupils of Dublin it has been interesting to note the growth and development of this school.

The following figures are of interest:

This table shows that the enrollment and attendance for the last school year was nearly 30% above the 10 year average.

There was one change in the teaching staff at the opening of the present school year. Miss Rosamond Gunn resigned to be married and was succeeded as teacher of grades 1 and 2 by Miss Dorothy Sawyer of Antrim. Miss Sawyer is a graduate of Keene Teachers' College who has had very successful teaching experience in Rindge.

A thorough testing program has been carried on in the Dublin schools, and every effort is being made to discover and correct any weakness that is revealed.

Especial commendation is due to Miss Mary Grimes for her work in preparing and serving hot lunches.

Miss Worters had done some exceptional work in scenery design, and Miss Sawyer has shown her excellent ability as teacher of the primary grades. Mr. Tobey has been alert to secure such needed improvements as have been within our means and has maintained an orderly and progressive school.

A new sound projector has been purchased which will be used not only for school but for community purposes as well. Its educational value is unquestionable.

One afternoon each week from 3:30 to 5 is spent in sewing, art, and manual training clubs.

A rest period for grade one has been introduced. This lasts for one hour each day. Cots have been provided and the period has been supervised by the teachers and the older girls.

It is planned this spring to introduce an individual garden project with as many of the pupils participating as possible. This project is sponsored by the Dublin Garden Club, and will culminate in a school fair in the fall. It is also hoped that vegetables may be raised and canned for use in hot lunches the following winter.

One of the desires of the school administration is that another year some winter sports equipment may be added.

The aims of the Consolidated school so well set forth in the reports at the time of its institution have been consistently followed so far as possible throughout the intervening years. We have tried to get away from the conventional elementary and grammar school and have a real community school where the fundamentals have not been neglected, but where art, training in mechanics and supervised recreation have their proper place.

It has been a pleasure to work under the direction of a progressive school board, and I wish at this time to thank the board, the teachers, pupils, and citizens for their loyal cooperation in this work.
