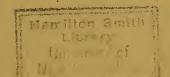

TOWN WARRANT

State of New Hampshire

(L.S.)

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Enfield, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in Whitney Hall in said town of Enfield on the Fourteenth day of March next at Nine of the Clock in the Forenoon of said day to act on the following subjects; Polls will open 9:30 A. M. and close at 5:30 P. M.

- Article 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers required by law to be chosen for the ensuing year.
- Article 2. To choose one Trustee for three years for the purpose of holding all Trust Funds of the Town.
- Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes, and the same so borrowed to be paid during the ensuing year.
- Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of one hundred dollars in trust from the bequest of Frank H. Follansbee, the income there-from to be used for the perpetual care of the Joseph Follansbee lot in the Old Town Cemetery.
- Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of one hundred dollars in trust from the Frank B. Morse heirs, the income there-from to be used for the perpetual care of the Frank B. Morse lot in the Mont Calm Cemetery.
- Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$380.52 for town Road Aid Construction, the State to furnish \$1,522.06, or act thereon.
- Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund for the financing of all or part of the cost of a Community Building as provided by Chapter

160, Laws of 1943, and transfer to said fund the sum of \$2,000.00 from the unencumbered Cash Surplus or act there-on.

- Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund for the financing or all or a part of the cost of a Truck, as provided by Chapter 160, Laws of 1943, and transfer to said Fund the sum of \$911.47 from the unencumbered Cash Surplus, or act thereon.
- Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund for the financing of all or part of the Town's Proportionate Share of the State Aid Construction, as the State may require, and raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,300.00 for said Fund; or act thereon.
- Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to purchase a Road Machine, and raise and appropriate the sum of \$950.00 to pay for same, or act thereon.
- Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to accept the report of the Budget Committee and vote to adopt their recommendations as posted.
- Article 12. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote thereto.
- Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the non-Partisan Ballot System as provided by Chapter 34 of the Revised Laws as amended by Chapter 22 of the Laws of 1943.
- Article 14. To take any vote or transact any further business that may legally come before said Meeting.

BUDGET COMMITTEE'S REPORT

To the Citizens and Voters of Enfield:

In compiling the town budget for 1944 the committee has carefully considered all necessary items of revenue and expenditures and also have included plans for the post war era under provisions of Chapter 160, session laws of 1943.

There is no increase in revenue items. Expenditures are based on an eleven months period where possible

as the town fiscal year will close December 31.

Expenditures for General Government items will run slightly higher due to primary and general elections occuring this year. Under town officers' salary an increase of \$50.00 is recommended to the collector of taxes whose salary was not raised at the time of other officer's salaries.

The usual amount was recommended for police de-

partment.

\$900.00 is recommended for fire department—\$125.00 of this amount to be used for installation of pump and

booster tank on the fire truck.

Under Highways and Bridges \$3,300.00 was recommended for summer maintenance with the additional sum of \$200.00 to be expended on the East Shore Road of Mascoma Lake.

The usual amount for winter maintenance of roads, cutting brush, oiling, Town Road Aid and bridges were recommended.

The amount for Street lighting \$2,021 was recommended—this to include a street light on Lake Street near resi-

dence of C. B. Pimer.

The committee investigated Road Agent's equipment and recommended \$950.00 for a grader and that the road agent hire other heavy equipment for road maintenance.

Under miscellaneous item, \$400 was recommended, \$300 of this to provide accident insurance for Town

employees.

Your committee at the public hearing was requested to consider the recommendation that \$200.00 be raised for a playground supervisor at Huse Park. Upon careful consideration it was decided inexpedient to make this recommendation due to lack of facilities and that the precinct maintains the Park.

It is recommended \$911.47, net earnings from the town truck be placed in a capital reserve fund to purchase a

new truck.

For Post War Planning the committee recommends the sum of \$1,300 be raised for State Road construction and \$2,000.00 appropriated from cash surplus for a com-

munity building.

The Superintendent of Schools, Mr. Fuller presented the school budget and recommended the sum of \$20,900 to be raised to maintain the schools, or the sum of \$20,200 if the schools were consolidated. Upon further consideration by the committee it was recommended the sum of \$20,200 be used in calculating this budget.

On the basis of the Budget herewith submitted your tax rate for the year 1944 will be \$3.35. Any increase would reflect in this estimate at the rate of 3/4c per \$100.

We wish to thank the Selectmen, School Board and other Town Officers for their cooperation in furnishing data requested.

I would like to call your attention to the Law on building fires without a permit:

Synopsis of Forest Fire Permit Law

(Chapter 191, Public Laws)

No person shall kindle a fire upon the land of another without permission from the owner, agent or caretaker thereof.

No person shall kindle a fire or burn any material in or near woodlands, pasture, brush, sprout, waste or cut over lands, or where the fire may be communicated to such land, except when the ground is covered with snow, without the written permission of the Forest Fire Warden or the presence of the warden or person designated to superintend such burning.

Any person, firm or corporation causing or kindling a fire without a permit, when a permit is required, and also any person, by whose negligence or the negligence of his agents any fire shall be caused, is liable to the town for all expenses incurred in attending or extinguishing such fire.

Every person who shall set fire on any land, that shall run upon the land of another, shall pay to the own-

er all damages done by such fire.

When permission has been obtained from the land owner, camp or cooking fires may be kindled without permission of the Forest Fire Warden (unless such permission is required by city or town), at suitable times and in suitable places where they will not endanger woodlands. Upon failure to totally extinguish such fires the parties responsible are subject to the same liabilities and penalties as are prescribed for other fires.

Penalty for kindling a fire without a permit, \$200,

or imprisonment not more than thirty days.

Penalty for kindling a fire willfully, or in a careless or impudent manner, \$500, or imprisonment not more than one year, or both.

Gentlemen:

In accordance with the vote taken at your annual town meeting in March 1943, an audit and examination of the accounts and records of the Town of Enfield has been made by this Division, and we submit herewith our report. The audit covered the fiscal year ended January 31, 1943 and the current year from February 1st to September 25, 1943. The Exhibits and Schedules are included as part of the report.

Scope of Audit

The accounts of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Road Agent, Overseer of the Poor, Trustees of Trust Funds and Library Treasurer were audited. The audit included the examination of vouchers and other supporting data.

Finances

In order to present a comprehensive picture showing the trend of the financial condition of the town during the last ten years, we have included in this report statements prepared from date on file in this office, said statements being entitled Schedules A and B.

Indebtedness, Valuation and Taxes: (Schedule A)

The assessed valuation of taxable property increased and the average local tax rate per hundred decreased from \$3.65 in 1938 to 3.48 in 1942, while the average rate for the whole state increased from \$2.74 in 1933 to \$3.23 in 1942. During the year 1942 Trust Fund Debt in the amount of \$2,150.00 was entirely liquidated.

Appropriations and Expenditures

Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Schedules C and D) As shown by the above statements, net unexpended balances of appropriations amounted to \$1,483.05, while the excess of actual revenues over estimated revenues amounted to \$729.07 for the fiscal year ended January 31, 1943. The results for the year indicate a budget Surplus of \$2,212.12. Added to last year's Surplus (January

31, 1942), and after giving effect to a reserve for replacement of the Fire Truck the year closed with a final Surplus of \$1,942.93.

Accounts of Selectmen and Treasurer

(Schedules E and F)

We examined all vouchers issued by the Selectmen during the year ended January 31, 1943, and the current year February 1st to September 25, 1943. Road Agent's payrolls and supporting vouchers were included also.

As some payments have been made on "Statements", it would appear that an effort should be made to obtain detailed bills in all instances. A few bills were missing,

however the total amount of these was very small.

We noted that a few large payments on bills to the town were made to the Road Agent, he in turn paying the creditor. We suggest that large items of this nature

be paid directly to the creditor.

Receipts of the Selectmen and Treasurer were checked by source, insofar as it was possible to do so. Totals of receipts and expenditures were verified. The Treasurer's cash book balance as of September 25, 1943 amounted to \$11,064.89. The reconciled bank balance plus undeposited cash on hand equalled this amount. (Schedule F-1).

Tax Collector

The tax warrants of Collectors D. Campbell and H. Biathrow for the levies of 1941, 1942 and 1943, were audited as of October 4, 1943. Summaries of these warrants are presented in Schedules H-1, H-2 and H-3. As indicated in Schedule G, which summarizes the accounts of these years, Levy of 1943 indicated net excess of \$72.65 which should be further checked by the Collector. Levy of 1941 shows an overpayment by the Collector to the extent of \$4.00.

In all cases, whether property is bought at a tax sale by the town or by an individual, redemptions should always be made through the Tax Collector. In cases where the tax sale is made to an individual and the property subsequently redeemed, the Collector's Tax Sale record book should indicate the date of redemption and also the date of payment of the redemption funds over to the purchaser. For his own protection, the Collector should take a receipt for money thus turned over.

Town Clerk

The accounts of the Town Clerk were examined for the fiscal year ended January 31, 1943 and from February 1st to September 25, 1943, as shown in Schedules I-1 and I-2.

It is suggested that in all cases where the Motor Vehicle permit is less than fifty (50c) cents, the minimum fee of fifty (50c) cents be charged as required by law.

Trust Funds

The securities and savings banks' books representing the invested principal and unexpended income of the various trust funds were examined. All funds as indicated by the trust fund records were accounted for. During the fiscal year ended January 31, 1943, the Town of Enfield paid up its Trust Fund liability and the funds were reinvested. Details are to be found in Schedule J.

This indicates an average income return of 2.69%. *Reinvested in Sugar River Savings Bank during the year.

Overseer of Poor

Records of the Overseer were found to be in good order. In connection with payments for hospitalization or doctor's care, such charges should be classified as "Town Poor" rather than "Health Department" expenditures.

Library Treasurer

The record of receipts and expenditures of the Treasurer of the library was examined and the cancelled checks compared with vouchers and cash book entries. The balance on October 8, 1943, of \$56.49 as indicated by the Treasurer's cash book, was in agreement with the actual bank balance and undeposited funds as verified. (Schedule K).

Town Officers' Bonds

The surety bonds of town officers were examined and found to be satisfactory as to form and amount. These are outlined in Schedule L.

Municipal Court

Statement of Municipal Court (Schedule M) covers the period ended January 31, 1943 and the current period February 1st to August 9, 1943. In the absence of Justice Leonard F. Kelley, the records are being maintained satisfactorily by I. H. Sanborn, Associate Justice.

General Comments

Exemption from Federal and State Taxes:

Under the provisions of the 1942 Revenue Act, states and sub-divisions of local government are exempted from the payment of excise taxes levied on purchases of certain commodities by the federal government. The exemption also applies to the transportation of property.

When making purchases of materials or equipment, as indicated therein, the town should require that invoices show the gross price, the amount of the tax, and the net price to the municipality. Exemption certificates should be filed to avoid payment of the tax.

The town is also exempt from the payment of the State tax on gasoline used for other than highway purposes. An account of gasoline so used should be kept and

application for rebate filed with the State Treasurer within 90 days of purchase. (Revised Laws—Chapter 120—Section 10).

Conclusion:

The accounts and records of all town officials were found in good condition and the accounting procedure, with the exceptions as noted, conformed to the standard procedure prescribed by this Division.

The provisions of Section 31, Chapter 211, of the Laws of 1939, require that this report or a summary of its essential features shall be published in the next annual town report. This letter of transmittal should be included in its entirety.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Town of Enfield for the time and cooperation given during the course of our audit.

THE DARTMOUTH-LAKE SUNAPEE REGION

The Legislature of 1937 authorized the establishment of six Regions, each comprising a group of towns suggested by the State Planning & Development Commis-The Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region Comprises this town and 37 others in this section of the state. The Region is incorporated as a non-profit corporation and its affairs are supervised by a group of officers chosen annually. The Region employs a full time secretary who is paid by the state (not by the towns). Thus your Region is a set-up established by law and the matter of whether or not it has sufficient financial support to render real service to your community rests with the voters of the towns. During its existence the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region can point to the following accomplishments. Through the publicity it has issued it has brought visitors to every town, some have established summer homes and others have become permanent residents. It has been instrumental in bringing industries to several towns. It has inaugurated plans that have saved historic landmarks. It has sponsored paying summer attractions. It has been active in bringing about a survey of our mineral resources that has resulted in revenue to many towns and has conducted studies of new agricultural products.

By an appropriation not exceeding 1/100 of 1% of the assessed valuation the Region now asks the support of your town in continuing the program that has brought about the aforementioned results and to institute the following three projects which if carried through must result in added income to each of the 38 towns of the Region. (1) A research of the possibilities of establishing industries that will use as raw materials, minerals within our area and make a study of the feasibility of the production, processing and sale of several agricultural products that in the past have received but little attention. (2) To cooperate with each of the towns in preparing descriptive pamphlets showing the attractions, natural advantages and resources of the community with the idea of eventually incorporating such material into a book descriptive of the whole Region. (3) To establish a system of Recreation Trails following back highways and little used roads leading to scenic areas and desireable locations in each of the 38 towns in the Region. As it is not deemed proper to devote more space in your Town Report to this subject, details have been omitted, however, letters of inquiry regarding any matter here mentioned will be welcome and given careful reply. ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Enfield:

The 10th annual report of the present Superintendent of Schools is herewith presented. The School Board has made it a part of their report to the School District. It contains the usual statistical and financial material. Introductory

It will not be more than four years before our boys and girls, who are now fourteen years of age, will be obliged to take upon themselves the obligations of manhood and womanhood. This means that there is a constant urge on the part of the public schools to provide every opportunity possible to afford these young people the best educational training that can be had in a community such as ours. It is with this older group in mind that the work in the public schools in the lower grades is organized to give a sound fundamental background upon which the pupils can later build their educational lives and meet the larger necessities of their after school life. While a school report can not show in detail the processes by which these objectives can be realized, it can place before the citizens a resume of some of the accomplishments and at the same time point out some of the more pressing needs.

Teachers

War necessity and more advantageous teaching positions again prevented the retaining of the services of some of our teachers. This situation is almost bound to recur in our smaller communities. It can be offset possibly by somewhat larger salaries to the teaching staff. Especially will this be true if salaries are more in keeping with those of other communities similarly situated. This may, in some degree, lessen the urge to enter industrial occupations. The action of the School District last year made it possible to meet some of these requirements. It is again urged that a somewhat larger appropriation be made for the item of teachers' salaries to the end of more nearly meeting the needs of the teachers in the rising cost of living. It should be remembered also that the teachers themselves are putting forth their best efforts in the instructional program. The continued cooperation of both the taxpayers and citizens is needed in order to maintain as strong a teaching staff as circumstances permit.

High School

Since the man power situation has so greatly depleted the ranks of male teachers, it was found impossible to continue the full time Manual Arts program that has been carried on the past several years. The headmaster has carried more than his share of the load and taken upon himself some of the work formerly taught by the teacher of Manual Arts. The community should not lose sight of the fact that as soon as there is a lesser need for men outside of the school field that an additional person should be employed at the High School to take care of these requirements. The work in mathematics and the work in sciences has been modified in order to meet the requirements of those young people who are to enter the Armed Forces. Some emphasis has been placed upon aeronautics in both the sciences and mathematics, but in a small school not too much of such instruction can take You are again reminded of the recommendation made in the last report regarding the need for additional room space in the High School; and the recommendation that positive provisions be made for this as soon as war conditions permit. This need may well be regarded as one of the Enfield projects in the Post War planning. The use of man power when there is some let down in industrial opportunities will help to lessen the burden upon the town, state and nation.

School Lunches

The appropriation made by the School District for the purpose of continuing the School Lunch Program has made it possible to employ a person for that work. The necessary raw materials or food stuffs have been purchased through the utilization of two sources of income. First, the small charge made to the children for the lunches and second, funds available through the ALMA to take the place of the surplus commodities which were available last year. Material was also supplied by citizens of the community from their surplus products. The canning center and some of the homes gave a portion of their canned products to the school for the program. While the lunches have not been as elaborate as formerly, they have been on the basis of providing at least one hot dish for those who wish to make use of same and at a mini-

mum cost to the individual. If and when it becomes possible to enlarge the facilities at the High School in other respects, a provision should definitely be made for space for carrying on the lunch program, as well as space for a Domestic Arts laboratory.

Canning School

The State Department of Education, which organizes the government program for food production, made it possible to conduct a school for adults in canning products last summer. A good number of housewives took a ten week course under the direction of a Domestic Arts teacher and canned several hundred cans of fruits, vegetables and meats, for the purpose of conserving surplus commodities and made available these products later in the year. This group expressed themselves as interested and pleased to have had the opportunities. The government furnished most of the equipment. The work was carried on at Whitney Hall under the auspices of the School District. The equipment is still available at the school and may be used by persons who are willing to pay a small rental fee and have sufficient experience in its use so that no harm will result. It is not now known whether or not such a program can be carried on during the coming summer, but it may be possible for this work to be continued. The School Board will be very willing to cooperate if and when funds are available and a sufficient interest is shown on the part of our citizens.

School Buildings

The vote of the School District a few years ago which authorized the School Board to dispose of unused school buildings has been acted upon. The Mont Calm School and the George's Hill School have both been disposed of so that now the only unused building remaining is the one at East Hill. The Enfield Center School needs to have rather extensive repairs if it is to continue to be used for school purposes over a long period. There are needed repairs in that building which must be made. Minor repairs will need to be provided at the Village School. All of these immediate repairs can be taken care of through the allotment made in the school Budget.

The number of pupils attending the Schools this year is the same as that of last year. There is a slight reduction in the number in the two upper grades in the High School. This is due to two facts. The boys who are nearing eighteen years of age are either inducted into the service or have enlisted and some of the older boys and girls have entered industry due to the lure of high wages. It was stated last year that we expected the enrollment to continue at about the present level, but it can not be predicted how long the enrollment at the Center School will remain large. Already this year the number at that school has decreased. It should not be lost sight of by the Board or citizens that it is getting to be uneconomical to operate the school at the Center and that the pupils themelves would receive much better benefits were they to attend the Village School. The pupils are the ones to be considered in the last analysis.

The Budget

Due to the fact that the State Aid received in December was greater than the amount anticipated and due to the fact that no money was spent for the improvement of the playground, there will be a substantial balance at the end of the current school year. It should again be emphasized that the playground needs to be improved and that the money raised for that purpose last year will be saved in the current budget for that particular purpose. The only substantial increase in the budget request this year is that for teachers' salaries. This is in keeping with what is happening in other communities throughout the state and must needs be if we are to keep an adequate teaching staff. The very facts that there are fewer young women and almost no young men entering the teaching service at the beginning levels and that the enrollment of

normal schools and colleges has decreased to an unusual extent, indicate that it may be some years before an adequate supply of teachers will be available for all positions. Due to the increased state aid to the expected balance, the budget request this year is only \$500 more than that of last year. It is recommended, therefore, that the sum of \$21,000 be appropriated in adition to the expected income. This sum is actually but \$100 more than that raised in 1943.

You will note from the above table that the increase in Tax Levy has not been unduly large and you will also note that there has been a constantly rising income from State Aid. This latter fact is due in part to somewhat larger salaries for teachers, in part to the valuation of the town and for the past year entirely to the fact that the legislature allowed the entire demand which School Districts could ask of the State in accordance with the School Law of 1919.

That so much has been accomplished and so little has been done to lessen the educational opportunity of the community in the past two war years, should be a source of gratification to the School Board and citizens of Enfield. It is recognized that this could not be accomplished without the combined effort of the citizens, School Board and teachers all of whom have given their combined and individual contributions. Your Superintendent expresses his appreciation for all of these efforts and reiterates his recommendation that in the post war planning, steps be taken in providing for additional facilities at the Village School.
