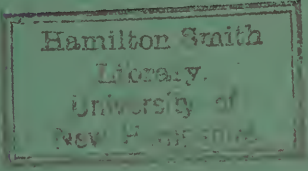

## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants in the town of Hanover in the County of Grafton, in the State of New Hampshire qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in the Nugget Theatre in said Hanover on Tuesday, the tenth day of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects.

First: To choose by ballot a clerk to serve for one year.

Second: To hear the reports of the Selectmen, Treasurer, Auditors and other town officers and committees and pass any vote relating thereto.

Third: To choose by ballot

*To serve for three years*

One Selectman

One Library Trustee

One Trustee of Trust Funds

*To serve for one year*

One Treasurer

Two Auditors

Three Fence Viewers

Two Surveyors of Wood and Lumber

A Prosecuting Agent to prosecute violations of the Liquor Laws and any other necessary town officers.

Fourth: To raise such sum of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.

Fifth: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Dollars for the benefit of the Etna Fire Association.

Sixth: To see if the Town will participate in the financing of highway construction recently completed within the Village Precinct of Hanover, N. H., and raise and appropriate any money for this purpose.

Seventh: To see if the Town of Hanover, New Hampshire, will vote to raise and appropriate money to supplement the Services rendered by The Mary Hitchcock Memorial Hospital through the Town of Hanover free beds.

Eighth: To see if the town will vote to make subject to gates and bars that part of Rope Ferry Road which is northerly of a point opposite to the Hanover Country Club House.

Ninth: To see if the town will vote that such portion of the property of Dartmouth College as cannot be exempted from taxation under Sections 22 and 24 of Chapter 60 of the New Hampshire Public Laws be taxed in addition to the tax on eight hundred thousand dollars (\$800,000) as provided in the vote of the town passed March 9, 1915.

Tenth: To transact any other business that legally may be brought before said meeting.

## ABSTRACT FROM TOWN CLERK'S RECORD

At a legal meeting of the inhabitants of the town of Hanover, qualified to vote in town affairs on Tuesday the eleventh day of March 1930, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, the meeting was called to order by Harry E. Burton, the Moderator. After the reading of the warrant proceeded to the election of town officers and other business as follows:

### *Article 1—Upon Motion:*

It was voted that Horace E. Hurlbutt cast one vote for George M. Bridgman for Town Clerk, and the said George M. Bridgman having all the votes given in was declared by the Moderator elected Town Clerk, and in open meeting took the oath of office prescribed by law.

### *Article 2—Upon Motion:*

*Voted:*

That the Town Report as printed including the reports of the Selectmen, Treasurer, Auditors and other town officers be accepted.

### *Article 3—Upon Motion:*

*Voted:*

That the Town Clerk cast one vote for Horace E. Hurlbutt for Selectman for two years, and Charles A. Holden for Selectman for three years, and the said Horace E. Hurlbutt and Charles A. Holden having all of the votes given in were by the Moderator declared elected as Selectmen for their respective terms.

### *For Library Trustee:*

*Voted:*

That the Town Clerk cast one vote for Etta F. Emerson for Library Trustee, which was done and the said Etta F. Emerson having all of the votes given in was by the Moderator declared elected as Library Trustee.

*For Trustee of Trust Funds:*

*Voted:*

That the Town Clerk cast one vote for Francis V. Tuxbury for Trustee of Trust Funds, which was done and the said Francis V. Tuxbury having all of the votes given in was by the Moderator declared elected as Trustee of Trust Fund.

*For Treasurer—Upon Motion:*

*Voted:*

That the Town Clerk cast one vote for Alfred W. Guyer for Treasurer, which was done and the said Alfred W. Guyer having all of the votes given in was by the Moderator declared elected Treasurer.

*For Auditors—Upon Motion:*

*Voted:*

That the Town Clerk cast one vote for Archie M. Peisch and Halsey C. Edgerton which was done and the said Archie M. Peisch and Halsey C. Edgerton having all the votes given in were by the Moderator declared elected as Auditors.

*For Fence Viewers—Upon Motion:*

*Voted:*

That the Town Clerk cast one vote for James Spencer, Daniel O. Hoyt and Irving P. Fitts for Fence Viewers which was done and James Spencer, Daniel O. Hoyt and Irving P. Fitts having all of the votes given in were by the Moderator declared elected Fence Viewers.

*Surveyors of Wood and Lumber—Upon Motion:*

*Voted:*

That the Town Clerk cast one vote for John A. Humiston and William H. Hart and the said John A. Humiston and William H. Hart having all of the votes given in were by the Moderator declared elected Surveyors of Wood and Lumber.

*For Prosecuting Agent to Prosecute Violations of the  
Liquor Laws:*

Discussion ensued, and it was voted to leave the appointment to the Selectmen.

*Article 4:*

*Voted:*

That in addition to the State, County, Highway and regular Poll taxes provided by law, the Town raise the sum of twenty-one thousand (\$21,000) dollars and appropriate said sum and all other moneys which may be paid into the treasury, and which are not required by law otherwise to be expended, in accordance with the budget and report as presented by the Selectmen.

*Voted:*

That authority is hereby granted the Selectmen to borrow on notes issued for not over one year an amount not to exceed five thousand dollars (\$5,000) in addition to what has been raised otherwise.

*Article 5:*

*Voted:*

To raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred dollars for the benefit of the Etna Fire Association.

*Article 6—Report of Committee on Municipal Building:*

March 11, 1930

The Committee on the Municipal Building wishes to report that the Municipal Building and the Municipal Apartments were completed and turned over officially to the Selectmen October 10, 1929.

A statement concerning the expenditures is to be found in the Annual Report on pages 26-27.

To discontinue as an open highway and make subject to gates and bars that portion which may be designated by the Selectmen, of the Wolfboro Road, so called, easterly of the Three Mile Road, near the residence of H. Guyer and westerly of the Conway place near Tunis.

*Article 8:*

*Voted:*

That Edgar H. Hunter, Thomas E. Ward and Archie B. Gile be and hereby are elected Assessors for one year to act with the Selectmen in the assessment of Real Estate.

*Voted:*

That upon all taxes upon real and personal property a discount of five percent be allowed the taxpayers if paid on or before July 15, 1930, and a discount of two percent be allowed the taxpayer if paid on or before October 15, 1930.

*Upon Motion:*

A vote of thanks and appreciation is hereby extended by those present at Annual Town Meeting on March 11, 1930, to Professor Charles N. Haskins for his interest and services in having collected and restored the ancient records of the town of Hanover and in having prepared photostatic copies of those records.

*For Delegates to the Constitutional Convention:*

The whole number of tickets given in was one and Perley R. Bugbee and James P. Richardson having all the votes given in were by the Moderator declared as Delegates from said town to the Constitutional Convention.

*Upon Motion:*

Voted that we extend to Carl C. Ward our appreciation for the time and service he has put into the office of Selectman in the past ten years.

*Voted:*

That the Selectmen be authorized to borrow such sums of money as may be necessary to meet the town's obligations until the taxes are collected and paid into the Treasury.

*Motion by Prof Fletcher:*

Moved that the budget item for Town Library in Etna, for this year be made \$450, an increase of \$50 above the \$400 allowed in 1929, because of an insurance premium of about \$53 due this year.

*Voted:*

That the Selectmen be authorized to appoint a special committee of five to consider the governmental relations of the Town of Hanover with the incorporated Precinct of

Hanover, such committee to consider problems involved both separately and in joint meetings with a similar committee representing the Precinct of Hanover, and to make report of its work to the Annual Town Meeting of 1931, with or without recommendations as it finds advisable. The Selectmen appointed A. W. Guyer, Chairman, R. D. Beetle, P. R. Bugbee, J. A. Humiston and F. V. Tuxbury.

The large balance of February, 1930 was due to the fact that bills of the preceding year had not been presented before the account was closed, as the treasurer was out of town, five weeks before town meeting. The balance to next account should always be enough to make payments during the interim before receipts from the taxes of the year are available.

The periodicals subscribed for, for the current year, 1930-31 are: The National Geographic Magazine, Saint Nicholas, American Nature Magazine, Child Life, Literary Digest, American Magazine, National Republic and Hanover Gazette.

It will be noted that the insurance for another term of three years had to be renewed.

Attention is called to the bequest of the late Mrs. Ella Dewey Merrill of one hundred dollars to the library fund. This will increase the total of trust funds for benefit of the town library from \$700 to \$800, as will be seen by referring to another page.

The trustees wish to acknowledge the co-operation and assistance of the librarian of the Howe library in perfecting the card catalogue of the town library and giving advice in the selection of books. This aid is particularly valuable because of the increasing difficulty of selecting wholesome, worthwhile books from the great mass of undesirable and even distinctly harmful books recently published. It will be noted that the children and grown-ups are about equally favored in the selection of magazines subscribed for. The aim has been to have the same policy in the choice of books. The librarian of the town library is always ready to receive suggestions concerning new books. However the readers should be aware that the quality of a good book cannot be judged by the title only. Some titles repel a right-minded reader at once. For others the reputation of the author is a fairly safe guarantee of good quality.

The library has been increasingly used during the past three years both by general readers and the young people of the schools. An annual appropriation of \$400, *at least*, is needed for regular service and contingencies.

There should be a better appreciation of the older books on the shelves, both fiction and more serious and informing reading. Surely some of the old favorites of our fathers and mothers and of our own earlier years have not lost all of their interest. There were thrillers then as now. Why not look over the shelves occasionally before insisting upon having one of the most recent books.

You are hereby notified to meet in the Nugget Theatre in said Village, on Thursday, March 12, 1931, at 8:30 P. M. o'clock, to act upon the following subjects:—

First: To choose by ballot a Moderator to preside over said meeting.

Second: To choose by ballot a Clerk for the term of one year.

Third: To hear the reports of the Precinct Commissioners, Treasurer, Auditor, and other Precinct officers and pass any vote relating thereto.

Fourth: To choose by ballot a Treasurer and an Auditor, each to serve for one year; a Park Commissioner, and a Precinct Commissioner, each to serve for three years.

Fifth: To raise such sum of money as may be necessary to defray Precinct expenses for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.

Sixth: To hear a report of the Committee of five appointed by the Commissioners to study the relations between the Town and the Precinct with reference to the possibility of effecting economies and improvements in organization either by consolidation of the Town and Precinct or by other means, and pass any vote relating thereto.

Seventh: To act on a preliminary report to be made by the Zoning Commission appointed at the last annual meeting

and to see what action the voters will take with reference to the adoption of any zoning regulations.

Eighth: To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

A meeting of the voters of the Village Precinct of Hanover, N. H., was called to order by Frank A. Musgrove at 8:45 o'clock P. M.

The Warrant was read by the Clerk.

Article 1. Frank A. Musgrove was elected Moderator to preside over said meeting.

Article 2. Ira W. Leavitt was elected Clerk for the term of one year.

Article 3. Voted: That the Precinct report as printed, including the reports of the Commissioners, Treasurer, Auditor and other Precinct officers, be accepted.

Article 4. Alfred W. Guyer was elected Treasurer for the term of one year. Clarence W. Cofran was elected Auditor for the term of one year. Roland A. Lewin was elected Commissioner for the term of three years.

Article 5. Voted: That the Village Precinct of Hanover, N. H., raise and appropriate the sum of thirty two thousand and fifty dollars (\$32,050.00) to defray the expenses of the Precinct for the year 1930 according to the items set forth in the budget.

Article 6. For the purpose of constructing highways within the Precinct taking advantage insofar as possible of joining with the State in so-called State aid highway construction, it was

Voted: That the Commissioners of the Village Precinct of Hanover, N. H., be and they are hereby authorized to borrow such sums of money as in their judgment may be

necessary but not to exceed fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000.-00) on the notes or bonds of the Village Precinct of Hanover, N. H., and to execute any documents in connection therewith; full discretion as to fixing the time and place of payment and the rate of interest of said securities and any other details in connection therewith, is hereby delegated to the said Commissioners of the Village Precinct of Hanover, N. H.

Article 7. Voted that the committee of five appointed by vote of the 1929 Precinct meeting to consider the problem of the governmental relations of the Town and Precinct of Hanover and to make recommendations thereon, be continued for further study of the questions involved, that they consult with a committee of like purpose appointed by the Town of Hanover, that they hold hearings open to the public; and publish a report of their findings with recommendations to be voted on by the voters of the Precinct at its annual meeting in March, 1931.

Article 8. Voted to adopt the act approved by the Legislature March 27, 1929, amending Section 3 of Chapter 225 of the Laws of 1901 making Section 3 now read:

“Section 3. The said Precinct shall have all the rights and be subject to all the liabilities now belonging to it, and shall have all the powers granted to village districts under Chapter 57 of the Public Laws, including the extinguishment of fires, the lighting and sprinkling of streets, the planting and caring for shade and ornamental trees, the supply of water for domestic and fire purposes, the construction and maintenance of sidewalks and main drains or common sewers, and the appointing and employing of watchmen and police officers, and all the powers granted to towns under Sections 48 to 68 inclusive of Chapter 42 of the Public Laws, and the said Precinct shall have all the powers in relation to these

objects that towns have or may have in relation to like objects, and all that are necessary for the accomplishment of its purposes.”

Voted: That in accordance with the provisions of Section 53 of Sections 48 to 68 inclusive of Chapter 42 of the Public Laws the following men be appointed the Zoning Commission: Edgar H. Hunter, Chairman, Arthur C. Barwood, Willard M. Gooding, Francis J. A. Neef, Milton V. Smith.

Article 9. Voted to adopt the provisions of Sections 1 to 9 inclusive of Chapter 163 of the Public Laws relating to inspectors of milk and licensing dealers in accordance with the authority granted by the Legislature by their act entitled “An Act to enlarge the powers of the Village Precinct of Hanover, N. H.” approved Feb. 28, 1930.

Article 10. Voted that upon all taxes on real or personal property a discount of five per cent be allowed the taxpayer if paid on or before July 15, 1930, and a discount of two per cent if paid on or before October 15, 1930.

Voted: That the Precinct Commissioners be instructed to convey to the Selectmen of the Town of Hanover, N. H., the suggestion that for the convenience of residents of the Precinct, the Clerk of the Town maintain an office in the Municipal Building at suitable times.

Voted to authorize the Precinct Commissioners to borrow such sums of money as may be necessary to meet the Precinct's obligations until the taxes are collected and paid into the treasury of the Precinct.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 9:45 o'clock.

## REPORT OF FIRE DEPARTMENT

February 1, 1931

To the Commissioners of the Precinct of Hanover, N. H.:

Report of the Fire Department for the year ending January 31, 1931.

The Fire Department is a volunteer company with apparatus as follows:

One double tank Ford Chemical Truck with 300 feet 1 inch hose and two small ladders.

One International 350 gal. pumper carrying 1,000 feet 2½ inch hose, 40 gallon chemical tank, 300 feet 1 inch hose and 2 ladders.

One Maxim 500 gallon pumper carrying 1,100 feet 2½ inch hose, an 80 gallon booster tank with 250 feet 1 inch hose and 2 ladders.

One Maxim ladder truck with 230 feet of ladders, and 80 gallon booster tank with 250 feet 1 inch hose.

A Gamewell Fire Alarm System with 22 boxes and switchboard, whistle blowing machine, batteries and battery charging outfit.

During 1930 the company answered 55 alarms.

## REPORT OF HEALTH DEPARTMENT

February 1, 1931

To the Commissioners of the Precinct of Hanover, N. H.:

Report of the Health Department for the year ending January 31, 1931.

During the past year the Precinct adopted the necessary legal requirements so that the Board of Health of the Precinct was able to control its milk supply more efficiently.

The licensing of dairymen to sell milk in the Precinct was made contingent on compliance with the Sanitary Milk Rules of the local Board of Health.

Hanover draws its milk supply from a territory extending from Pompanoosuc to White River Junction and Hartford, Vermont and from Lyme to Etna. During the year forty-seven inspections were made at twenty-four different producers', necessitating the travel of approximately two hundred and seventy-five miles. Licenses to sell milk in Hanover were granted to twenty-six producers and distributors.

On the whole the dairies show from year to year increasing cleanliness and improved facilities for handling milk. Certain dairymen this past year have made radical improvements in their equipment. Only one producer failed to comply with the requirements for dairy cleanliness. In the past year only nineteen milk samples were tested locally as the State Board of Health made a number of analyses of Hanover milk. All of the samples tested in Hanover were well within the bacterial standard and were for the most part free from dirt.

To the Voters of the Village Precinct of Hanover :

The following is the report of a committee of five authorized by vote of the Precinct meeting of March 14, 1929 and continued by vote of the Precinct meeting of March 13, 1930.

The two votes were as follows: March 14, 1929,

“Voted: That the Commissioners be requested to appoint a Committee of five (5) to study the relations between the Town and the Precinct with reference to the possibility of effecting economies and improvements in organizations, either by consolidation of the Town and Precinct or by other means; this Committee to prepare a report for publication not later than February 1, 1930, the understanding being that this Committee shall hold public hearings and by other means insure that full consideration be given to those living outside as well as within the present Precinct limits.”

March 13, 1930:

“Voted: That the Committee of five appointed by vote of the 1929 Precinct meeting to consider the problem of the governmental relations of the town and precinct of Hanover and to make recommendations thereon, be continued for further study of the questions involved, that they consult with a Committee of like purpose appointed by the town of Hanover, that they hold hearings open to the public, and publish a report of their findings, with recommendations to the Precinct, not later than February 1, 1931, such recommendations to be voted on by the voters of the Precinct at its annual meeting in March 1931.”

In accordance with the above vote, your Committee has had frequent meetings, has had one joint session with the Committee appointed by the Town selectmen by authority of the vote of the Town meeting of March 11, 1930, has held

two public hearings, and has endeavored by informal discussion to ascertain the state of public opinion on the local government. We present the following as our conclusions and recommendations.

I. *The present form of government should be continued.*

We believe that the present form of local government, that of the incorporated Village Precinct of Hanover within the town of Hanover, should be continued. (The alternative would be for the Village Precinct to surrender its charter and to operate the town as a single government under the authority of the Town meeting and administration of the Selectmen chosen by that meeting.) Our chief reason for this conclusion is that we have been unable to discover public sentiment in favor of a change. We believe that drastic changes in the form of a government should come as the result of a real public opinion demanding alteration. Where there is no apparent dissatisfaction with the form of a government or specific demands for change, the government would seem by inference to be working reasonably well. We believe this to be the case with regard to the local government for several reasons.

The Precinct has been incorporated for limited purposes since 1855, and has operated under its present full charter since 1901. The residents of Hanover village have become thoroughly used to the existence of a separate group of three Commissioners, distinct from the Town officials, who have charge of their streets, lighting and sidewalks, of their fire and police protection, and who have power to enact and enforce ordinances for the local protection of order, health and safety. We believe that the voters generally feel that these men represent the peculiar interests of the settled part of the Town as distinct from the Town at large, and that they like the idea of their being readily reached for consultation or for complaint.

In a measure ours is a complicated form of government, for there are six men (two boards of three men each), to

administer the small area of the town. But there are no serious conflicts of jurisdiction, no serious frictions in operation. Each board has its separate tasks and responsibilities. The present system depends, of course, on the willingness of six representative citizens of the Town to serve, each giving a portion of his time to the task. To surrender the charter would considerably increase the burden of work of the Town Selectmen, and very probably, make more difficult the finding of three men who would be willing to devote the additional time needed for the administration of town affairs.

The present form of government is not an expensive one in its administrative operation. The three Precinct commissioners serve for a nominal salary of \$50 each and the Treasurer for \$25, a sum not sufficient to meet the expenses incurred in the administration of the office of Precinct Commissioner. The total governmental administrative expense of the Precinct for the past fiscal year was \$876.27, as compared with a similar item of \$4,620.91 for the Town. Your Committee does not believe that a consolidation of Town and Precinct would effect any marked economy in road construction and maintenance. The needs of the settled and rural areas would remain the same; about the same equipment would be needed. The rural roads and the village streets need to have the snow removed at the same time in the Winter. They both must be given attention as regards surfacing, repairs, and new construction at the same time in the Spring and Summer. Some economy might be achieved in the centralized operation and direction of the equipment, but not enough to make such saving a controlling factor.

Two further observations should be made with regard to the effect of a consolidation of the Town and Precinct. (1) If the Precinct charter were surrendered and, after a period of trial, the local residents again desired a separate Precinct government it might not be an easy task to get again so full and liberal a charter from the Legislature. Under the general laws of the State the Precinct could again incorporate, but there are special powers given to this Precinct, not granted by the general law, which might or might not be regranted



by the New Hampshire legislature. (2) The inevitable effect of a consolidation of the Town and Precinct would be to raise slightly the taxes in rural Hanover. If the Precinct were abandoned, the greater part of the money now raised and spent as a purely Precinct tax would still have to be raised, but it would then be raised in the form of a Town tax. As the residents of the Precinct now pay 86% of the Town taxes they would still pay the greater part of the taxes raised. But the money now raised by the Precinct budget would then be paid by 100% of the Town tax payers, somewhat raising taxes outside the Precinct.

## II. *Need for a Central Office.*

The Committee recommends to the Selectmen and Precinct Commissioners the desirability of establishing in the Municipal Building an office with some person on regular duty at the usual business hours, to receive messages for either the Selectmen or Commissioners, to answer inquiries or to direct inquiries to the proper officials, and, in general, to act as a link between the public, the Selectmen and the Commissioners. Such an office appeals to the Committee as desirable in view of the fact that the Selectmen and Commissioners are as part time officials not continuously at the Municipal Building. The matter is one that can be worked out in a variety of ways by the Selectmen and Commissioners, and needs no action by the voters.

## III. *No Needed Changes in Charter—Need for Revision of Ordinances.*

The Charter granted to the Precinct by the Legislature in 1901, and several times amended, is remarkably full in its grant of powers. A careful examination of its terms reveals no present need for additional enabling legislation. The Committee does believe that the Commissioners should thoroughly examine the existing ordinances, codify them, and publish them with the existing charter in pamphlet form.

#### IV. *Need for a Building Code and Building Inspector.*

The Committee recommends to the Precinct Commissioners the enactment by ordinance of a building code to cover more fully the standards of general safety and especially of protection against fire hazard in building construction and repair. There should be a designated officer to inspect plans and construction of new and remodelled buildings to see that the code is complied with and to inspect such plans and buildings to see that the zoning regulations of the Precinct, if adopted, are observed.

#### V. *Increased Compensation for Precinct Commissioners Recommended.*

Your Committee believes that the present compensation of \$50 each per year of the Precinct Commissioners is not adequate. It is not, of course, possible or desirable to award them compensation directly proportioned to their time and effort, for the position of Commissioner is one of disinterested public service. But we recommend that their annual salary be increased to \$100 each per year, plus reimbursement for actual expenses incurred by them while engaged on Precinct business.

#### VI. *A General Budget Committee Recommended.* (The following is a recommendation by a majority of your Committee; one member is not in agreement with this recommendation).

If the present form of double government is to be continued, the most important end to be sought is maximum cooperation and efficiency in the relations of the Town and Precinct. With this object, your Committee recommends the establishment of a joint committee to prepare a joint budget for the three existing agencies of Town, Precinct and Schools. The greater part of the taxable property of the Town of Hanover (86%) is now subject to taxation by the Town, the Precinct and the School District. Under present

conditions, the executive board of each of these bodies prepares its own budget. By vote of the three groups these budgets are now required to be discussed at a joint conference of the executive officers of the three bodies and then presented for the approval of the voters at the three respective meetings. The purpose of the joint conference is in theory to compare the budgets, and to secure adjustments when it is not possible to carry out the several programs in full without unduly raising the tax rate. But frequently there is no real discussion of the budgets at these meetings. Evidently, such a method will not, even when there is full discussion, always secure the desired end. Suppose, for example, that in a certain year the Precinct Commissioners desire to repave village streets, the Town Selectmen desire to improve rural roads, the School Board believes that the time has come to enlarge the public school facilities. Each body is impressed with the pressing nature of its needs. To carry out all the projects would markedly increase the tax rate, especially in the Precinct. If the School Board could convince the Town and Precinct representatives that their need is greater, under existing conditions the Town and Precinct would postpone their own projects. With a spirit of pleasant cooperation, such adjustments will frequently be made. But suppose that each body is still convinced that its program cannot longer be delayed? In such a case, no agreement could be reached and the respective budgets would stand. Again, a detailed study of the items in the several budgets is not possible in such a meeting. Nor could such conferences readily look ahead and see that in say five years a new school building must be built, that it is advisable to that end to restrict present expenditures by Town and Precinct, and to build up a fund for such purpose by the School tax in order to prevent a very heavy expenditure for School purposes in a single year. A single board representing all three groups could do these things. It could make positive recommendation that this or that present program of one body be reduced or postponed because the needs of another body seem greater. It could examine and carefully compare

the several budgets and make recommendations for the reduction or elimination of items because they seem to be of less pressing need. It could frame the present budget with a view to the future.

Our recommendation is that the several meetings, Town, Precinct and School District, authorize the creation of a general budget committee. This committee would consist of three representatives of each group, one elected for a term of three years by each annual meeting. No member of the executive board of Town, Precinct or Schools would be eligible for membership. It would be the duty of this committee to receive the three proposed budgets, to hear the respective boards in explanation of their proposed expenditures, to hear interested tax payers, and finally to present to the respective meetings such budget as they recommend. If the proposed Committee did not accomplish the desired purposes it could be abandoned at any time by vote of Town, Precinct or School District; but your Committee hopes that the idea may be given a real trial of at least three years.

Such a budget committee would have no legal power. Its function would be merely to introduce in each of the three meetings a unified program. Such a budget could be "broken" on the floor of any meeting. If, for example, the Precinct commissioners desired to pave a certain street and the item were eliminated from the budget, upon motion of the Precinct Commissioners the Precinct meeting could disregard or "break" the budget and make the appropriation desired. But your Committee believes that such a budget would have considerable "moral force" behind it and would not be lightly disregarded. The majority of the voters who attend the Town, Precinct and School meetings are taxpayers of all three agencies, and the recommendations of their joint committee would not, we believe, be lightly disregarded.

It should be stated that the Committee representing the Town does not concur in this recommendation. While they are in accord as to the importance of encouraging further cooperation of the three bodies, they believe that the proposed budget committee would add another body to an already com-

plicated government, that the budget committee could accomplish no purpose that could not be secured by a willing cooperation of the respective executive bodies, and that the existence of a general budget committee to which proposed expenditures would be submitted would possibly increase friction, since each group would be inclined to press its ideas upon the budget committee.

It is, of course, for the voters to decide between these lines of thought. The majority of this Committee is convinced that the creation of such a committee would be a very worth while experiment, for the reasons which we have stated.

PINE PARK ASSOCIATION  
REPORT OF THE MANAGERS OF PINE PARK

Note: The managers of Pine Park are the Village Precinct of Hanover and Dartmouth College jointly. They are represented respectively in the management by Adna D. Storrs "Commissioner" and Halsey C. Edgerton "Agent," who render this report in behalf of their principals, and who, for convenience, are hereinafter described as "Managers".

The valuable and beautiful tract of forested land now known as Pine Park, comprising about 91½ acres, is located at the northwest corner of the village bordering upon the Connecticut River. With the exception of about five acres, this land is all wooded, chiefly with pine, and offers varied scenic attractions which the lapse of time only improves. Its preservation from the lumberman's axe thirty years ago, and its dedication to public uses, were due to the foresight and generosity of private citizens. For a complete history of the Pine Park Association reference may be made to "A Sketch of the Pine Park Association," 1900-1929, by James F. Colby, copies of which are deposited in the office of the Selectmen of the town of Hanover, in the office of the Precinct Commissioners, and in the Dartmouth College Library. An excellent and careful map of the whole area of the park was made under the direction of Professor Robert Fletcher in 1925, copies of which are deposited with this historical sketch.

In 1900 one of the lumber companies then operating in this region was trying to secure the pine along the eastern bank of the Connecticut River and was negotiating for that on the Hutchinson farm, which included both sides of Girl Brook, commonly called the Vale of Tempe. Mr. Charles P. Chase, treasurer of the College, president of the Bank, and public spirited citizen, consulted with other citizens with a view to preserving for the public this windbreak and spot of natural beauty. As a result, fifteen citizens of Hanover and three non-resident friends, subscribed the funds necessary to purchase this land. The original lot contained about forty-five acres and cost \$4,000. The subscribers were Perley R. Bug-

bee, Charles P. Chase, James F. Colby, Frank W. Davison, Louis H. Dow, Fred P. Emery, John M. Gile, John V. Hazen, Hamilton T. Howe, John K. Lord, Charles F. Richardson, Justin H. Smith, William T. Smith, William J. Tucker, and D. Collin Wells, of Hanover, H. W. Cannon of New York, Herbert A. Wilder of Newton, and Edward Tuck of Paris.

The property was held for a time by agents of this group, and in 1905 was transferred to a corporation "The Pine Park Association," with the above subscribers as stockholders, and later by agreement dated June 10, 1913, the present form of control was established. Under this organization the stock in the corporation was transferred to five trustees, and the Village Precinct of Hanover and Dartmouth College were made joint managers of the property for the benefit of the public.

Just prior to this, in 1912, the Association had received under the will of Mrs. Emily H. Hitchcock, another tract largely pine woodland joining the original tract and comprising about 46½ acres. This Hitchcock addition consists of land on the east side of Rope Ferry Road and extends from the property now owned by Harry R. Wellman to a north line approximately marked by the trestle of the new ski jump.

An act of the Legislature of New Hampshire, approved March 14, 1913, provides that the property of the Pine Park Association shall be exempt from taxation so long as the same is devoted solely to public purposes.

The College owns the land west of Rope Ferry Road and south of the original Pine Park tract, including the pine-clad river bank. This tract, while not a part of the Pine Park property, has been handled along similar lines, and has been managed as if it were a part of the Park. The line of division, running east and west, crosses the ridge between the present fourth green and the fifth tee of the Hanover Country Club golf course.

The trust agreement of 1913, above mentioned, provides that

“The property of the corporation shall be held for the following public purposes:

To promote the public health, growth and material prosperity of the village of Hanover by preserving its natural windbreak of forest on Occom Ridge and along the Vale of Tempe.

To establish and maintain within the limits of such ridge and vale and any adjacent or neighboring land a park, lay out roads and walks and plant shade and ornamental trees, shrubs and flowers therein.

And to secure permanently to the inhabitants of the village of Hanover, under suitable regulations, improved opportunities for swimming and boating on the Connecticut River, and generally to do all things incidental to these purposes.”

The original Trustees were Charles P. Chase, James F. Colby, John M. Gile, John V. Hazen, and William J. Tucker. The present Trustees are James F. Colby, Perley R. Bugbee, James P. Richardson, Charles H. Dudley, and Robert Fletcher. Any vacancies in the Board are filled by the remaining members. The Trustees hold the legal title to the property, control the funds of the old corporation, would manage the property if the Precinct and the College gave up the management, and with the managers are authorized to extend the boundaries of the property, erect structures or otherwise carry out the public purposes for which the Park is held. The representatives of the Precinct and the College, as managers may use any income of the property, including the proceeds of wood and timber cut, for the purposes outlined. Under the terms of the agreement

“The managers shall control and develop the property only for the uses and purposes of a forest park with authority however to devote such portion of the property as may be open land to purposes of



outdoor recreation and to this end may lease on proper terms such portion of the property to any society, association or club whose objects shall include outdoor recreation and whose membership shall be open to students of Dartmouth College, residents of said Precinct, and others if desired, subject to such reasonable rules and regulations as may be approved by the managers. The managers may permit the erection of buildings on said real estate for the furtherance of the purposes of outdoor recreation, but not for merely private use.

In the control and management of the wood and timber land of the corporation the managers shall apply the principles of forestry for the preservation and maintenance and may use the proceeds of any wood and timber cut in accordance with forestry principles for the general management, improvement, and development of such forest park."

There is a provision in the agreement that in case of any disagreement between the two representatives of the Precinct and the College, the Judge of Probate for Grafton County is authorized to designate a third person to settle the question, but this part of the machinery has not yet been required. The "Park Commissioner" of the Precinct, for the entire period, has been Adna D. Storrs. Until his death Charles P. Chase was the "Agent" of the College. Then John M. Gile acted in this capacity until his death. The present "Agent" is Halsey C. Edgerton.

Soon after the land was first acquired, volunteer workers recruited by Professor D. Collin Wells, chiefly from among the College Faculty, and under his active leadership, not only thinned out the trees and removed dead wood, but built the path along the bank of the river and up the slope to the golf course. At the same time "Cathedral Aisle" was trimmed out to give the majestic beauty so frequently overlooked at the present time. This "Aisle" extends north and south along the base of the slope. The best view of it is to

be seen by the visitor going down the sloping path from the south.

About the time the old ski jump was constructed, at the suggestion and under the direction of Howard M. Tibbetts, a path was cleared from a point near the base of the jump along the brook bed to the river, connecting with the other path at that point. Later, after the new ski jump was built, an old path from the Girl Brook Trail was brought into use, coming out near the base of the new jump. In recent years the managers have opened up a new access to the easterly part of the Park through a winding path down the bank at a point just north of the line of Harry R. Wellman's property. This path follows along the brook and under the golf course bridge, and connects with the Girl Brook Trail.

Another way of approach to the westerly part of the Park across the land of the College has also been opened up by an arrangement made by the Managers with the College, under which the College built a foot bridge across the ravine in the woods north of the house of N. L. Goodrich, which bridge is reached by a new path from the end of Occom Ridge. These two new entrances give pedestrians an opportunity to enter and use all the existing paths without crossing the golf course. Other approaches are possible from the Lyme Road, through the courtesy of the College acting through the Hanover Country Club. That organization has installed an entrance through the fence opposite the ski jump for visitors desiring to enter the Park at that point. Another entrance through a barway about opposite the old ice house ties in with the Park paths at the point where these paths come closest to the Lyme Road.

During the past two years, various other paths have been constructed. One starts near the base of the golf course bridge and climbs through the large ravine running easterly until it connects with a roadway running along the edge of the woods to the new ski jump; thence down along the ridge west of the ski jump and across a new bridge which has been constructed over the brook to the main Girl Brook Trail. From a point near this bridge another trail follows the east-

erly side of Girl Brook upstream to the golf course bridge. A connecting trail from this runs easterly through one of the ravines to a connection with the trail system at a point southerly of the ski jump. From another point westerly of Girl Brook, a few rods upstream from the new bridge above referred to, another trail runs to the west through a ravine past a spring, and winds up the hill to connect with the main Rope Ferry Trail on the top of the ridge. Another path connects this portion of the Rope Ferry Trail along the edge of the woods adjoining the golf course to the bridge in the woods north of the house of N. L. Goodrich. During the past year the College has built a bridge across the ravine west of the base of the ski jump which with a short trail serves as a connecting link for the trail system on the east side of Girl Brook. This gives trails on both sides of the brook practically from the river to the golf course bridge, a distance of about three fourths of a mile. All told, the paths and trails in the Park have a total length in excess of four miles.

From 1913 until 1926 the Managers had only a few dollars at their disposal for expenditure. During this period of fourteen years they received a total of \$132.91 and expended \$123.80. Most of the work which was done was handled by the Precinct and by the College from time to time. No separate account of this work was kept and no bills were rendered. Each organization met the cost of the particular job done as a part of its contribution. Such income as was received came in the first few years from hay sold; and later, when this open land was used by the Hanover Country Club, a small payment was made yearly equivalent to the previous sales of hay. In the past two years a larger annual payment has been made for the use of this small portion of the whole area. The earlier expenses were chiefly for notices warning against fire, the expense of a forester, and for thinning some young pine. Attempts have been made to keep the paths reasonably passable and to warn against fire.

In 1917 the Managers felt that the Park would be improved by judicious cutting to give room and sun for the

growth of the other trees. At a hearing, citizens interested gave favorable opinions and Philip W. Ayers, a forester well known in this community, was brought to Hanover. Mr. Ayers favored the cutting and with local assistance indicated what trees should be cut. Deep snow that winter made it impossible to have the cutting done as it should be, especially in a park of this kind, and the opportunity passed by. In the next few years conditions for getting this work done advantageously did not materialize. Finally, in 1925, arrangements for this work were made with Gile and Brackett, who had the cutting executed under the supervision of Frank M. Hancock. The work was done very carefully to the entire satisfaction of the Managers. The brush was burned and a remarkable small amount of damage done to the trees left. The beneficial results of this thinning can now be seen. The net proceeds of this cutting amounted to \$973.20 which was received in 1926. The greater part is being held by the Managers for improvement to the Park.

As has been indicated above, the open land is leased by the Managers for use by the Hanover Country Club along the lines suggested in the organization documents.

Permission was given by the Managers for the erection on the Pine Park property of the new Dartmouth Outing Club ski jump, which incidentally brings into that portion of the Park a large number of visitors.

The original and only present entrance to the Pine Park by public highway is over Rope Ferry Road. This highway, which was relocated and realigned as such by the Town in 1906, runs to and terminates at the southern boundary of the original Pine Park tract at a point distant about 250 feet easterly from the fourth green and the fifth tee of the present layout of the Hanover Country Club golf course, which point is marked by a stone bound.

During recent years that portion of this highway which extends northerly from the present club house of the Hanover Country Club to the southerly line of the original Pine Park tract has been allowed to fall into disuse. There are several reasons for this. The golf course of the Hanover

Country Club is partly on land of the College and partly on land of the Pine Park. Its present layout calls for play on and across this part of the highway. Up to the present time the Managers have deemed it best to allow this practice to continue although the contention is true that it necessarily interferes with the free and safe use of this approach to the Park by the public. Again, this part of the highway was not infrequently used by persons who had mistaken Rope Ferry Road for the main road north; by persons whose presence in the Park was not desirable; also by would-be campers, whose presence would unquestionably increase the always present fire hazard, which in times of drought becomes a serious one. For the above reasons, and inasmuch as the Managers have never had sufficient funds to provide for a regular patrol of the Park property, they have felt justified in permitting this part of the highway to become out of repair, and since 1927 they have acquiesced with the approval of the Precinct Commissioners in the erection of posts in the highway near the Hanover Country Club House, the stretching of a chain across the highway at this point, and the erection of a nearby sign warning all persons in effect that the highway is temporarily closed and that passage will be at their own risk. It should be emphasized, however, that the use of the highway by the Country Club is only permissive and not under any claim of right; and that notwithstanding the erection of chain and signs, the highway retains its legal status as a public one as far as the southerly line of the original Pine Park tract. Anything which would interfere with such legal status would, of course, be a serious detriment to the value of the Park property, and might ultimately affect the non-taxable privilege of the Park under the Statute of 1913 above referred to.

The above is a review of the whole administration of the Park from June 10, 1913 to date. The Managers plan during the coming season to have the various trails marked and to issue a small map of the property showing these trails for the assistance of visitors. In their judgment the most serious problem is to safeguard the Park against damage by fire,

especially in a season of drought. This requires the hearty cooperation of all our citizens and is earnestly requested. The Managers will welcome any suggestions which will make the Park serve better the public purposes for which it was intended.
