## ANNUAL TOWN MEETING MARCH 4, 1974

The polls of the Town Hall were opened at 8:00 A.M., by Moderator, Richard Rutherford, reading Article I.

ARTICLE 1. To choose by a non-partisan ballot one selectman for a term of three years, a Town Clerk for a term of one year, a Town Treasurer for a term of one year, a Trustee of Trust Funds for a term of three years, a Highway Agent for a term of one year, and a Tax Collector for a term of one year.

At 6:00 P.M. the polls were closed. 684 Haverhill residents cast their ballots.

The Annual Town Meeting was reconvened at 8:00 P.M. at the James R. Morrill Elementary School Auditorium, for consideration of the remaining articles in the warrant.

ARTICLE 2. To announce the result of the balloting.

The Officers that were elected were sworn in by Moderator, Richard Rutherford.

ARTICLE 3. To hear the reports of the Selectmen, Treasurer, Cemetery Commissioners and any other Town Officers and Committees heretofore chosen and to pass any vote relating thereto.

Karl Bruckner made the motion that the reports be accepted as printed in the town report, Paul LaMott seconded the motion. It was so adopted.

ARTICLE 4. To choose one or more Auditors, one Library Trustee for the term of three (3) years, one Cemetery Commissioner for the term of five (5) years, and all other necessary Town Officers.

Paul LaMott made the motion that James Barber be an Auditor, and Ezra B. Mann, II, made the motion that Clarence Knox be an Auditor, Karl Bruckner seconded the motion. The Clerk cast one ballot for each.

Karl Bruckner made the motion that Nina Mitchell be elected Library Trustee for a term of three years, James Hood seconded the motion. The clerk cast one ballot.

Karl Bruckner made the motion that Harry Moses be elected Cemetery Commissioner for a term of five years, James Hood seconded the motion. The clerk cast one ballot.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to elect the Chief of Police by ballot as provided by RSA \$41:47, said election to be held next Town Meeting.

Paul LaMott made the motion that this article be accepted as written, Madeline Haynes seconded the motion.

After a lengthy debate, Karl Bruckner explained the New Hampshire law, which stated that as elected Police Chief would continue in office during good behavior, could be removed by a hearing and review.

Clayton Placey put forward an amendment to the article, The Chief of Police be elected for a term of three years. This amendment was defeated, as was the article. The Chief of Police will be appointed by Selectmen.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to contribute funds for the construction of Class V Highways, as provided in Chapter 241 RSA, as amended.

After much discussion about the condition of the back roads, Karl Bruckner made the motion that this article be passed as written, A. Frank Stiegler, Jr. seconded the motion. It was passed in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to issue interest-bearing notes or orders in anticipation of taxes, to provide for expenses of the current year.

Ezra Mann moved that this article be accepted as written, Henry Fogarty seconded the motion. It was so adopted.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept gifts of Federal or State Aid, in the name of the Town of Haverhill.

John Cobb moved that this article be accepted as written, Larry Fournier seconded the motion. It was so adopted.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to distribute inventory blanks by mail, or at the same time they examine the taxable property.

Frank Stiegler, Jr. Moved the article be accepted as written. Paul Mayette seconded the motion. It was so adopted.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer, or to sell real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's deed, by public auction sale or by advertising for sealed bids.

Karl Bruckner moved the article be accepted as written, Larry Fournier seconded the motion. It was so adoopted.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will vote to appoint or elect a Budget Committee to supervise the appropriations of the Town, and to recommend to the next annual Town Meeting the amounts to be raised for various purposes, such recommendations to be printed in the next annual report.

Karl Bruckner made the motion the Moderator appoint a committee. Ezra Mann II seconded the motion. It was so voted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to contract with Grafton County for the purchase of the old County Courthouse located in Woodsville for the sum of Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000.00) payable Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,-000.00) per year for five (5) years and to appropriate the sum of

\$10,000.00 for the 1974 payment and to authorize the withdrawal of that sum to be used for that purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972, or to pass any other vote relating thereto.

Richard Kinder moved that this article be accepted as written. Paul Mayette seconded the motion. After much discussion, Reginald Smith asked for the article to be moved. After two voice votes the

article was voted on by ballot. There were 330 votes cast.

YES 185 NO 145

The article was adopted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$20,000.00 for a portion of the cost of a solid waste disposal system for the Town of Haverhill and to authorize the withdrawal of that sum for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

Paul LaMott moved the article be passed as written, Larry

Fournier seconded the motion. It was so adopted.

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to make alterations in the amount of money to be raised and appropriated for the ensuing year for support of the Town as recommended by the budget committee in its report, to raise and appropriate all sums so determined for said purposes, and to pass any other vote relating thereto.

Karl Bruckner moved the Article be amended to include an appropriation of \$1,380.00 for The White Mountain Regional Association, Steve Wellington seconded the motion. After comments from the floor the amendment was rejected.

Richard Kinder moved that a budget of \$343,908.98 be accepted,

James Hood seconded the motion. It was so adopted.

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as set-offs in whole or in part against budgeted appropriations for the following priority purposes and in the amounts indicated: Capital Expenditures:

Larry Fournier moved that this article be accepted as written. Karl Bruckner seconded the motion. It was so adopted.

ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town will vote pursuant to RSA \$204-A:9 to authorize the New Hampshire Housing Commission to operate in the Town of Haverhill for all lawful purposes, including the erection or renovation of up to 25 housing units, such authorization to continue until rescinded by vote of the Town.

Elizabeth Gibson moved that this Article be accepted as written, Karl Bruckner seconded. This article was rejected by the voters.

ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will vote to create a Regional Refuse Planning Committee and authorize the moderator to appoint three (3) members thereto as provided in RSA Chapter 53-B which committee shall perform the duties assigned by that chapter and report its findings and recommendations as soon as possible.

Clark Ingalls moved this article be accepted, Richard McDanolds seconded. It was so adopted.

ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will vote to join and thereby empower the Town Planning Board to nominate and the Selectmen to appoint two representatives to the North Country Council, Inc. which is the official planning commission for New Hampshire Planning Region I, formed in July 1973 to prepare a comprehensive plan for Region I, to encourage and assist member towns to solve on a cooperative basis those problems which involve more than one town, and to help member towns in their planning functions and to perform all other powers and duties given it by state law.

Karl Bruckner moved the article be accepted as written, Paul Mayette seconded the motion. It was so adopted.

ARTICLE 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,892.00 as the Town's share for operation of the North Country Council for the year beginning July 1, 1974, which funds may be used in conjunction with available State and Federal funds.

Karl Bruckner moved the article be accepted as written, Paul Mayette seconded the motion. It was so adopted.

ARTICLE 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$3,000.00 to match Economic Development Administration funds for a feasibility study for an Industrial Park in the Town of Haverhill.

Charles P. Butson moved the article and Clark Ingalls seconded. It was defeated by a voice vote.

ARTICLE 21. To see if the Town will vote to indemnify and save harmless for loss or damage any person employed by the Town and any member or officer of its governing board, administrative staff or agencies, from personal financial loss and expenses including reasonable legal fees and costs, if any arising out of any claim, demand, suit or judgment by reason of negligence or other act resulting in accidental injury to a person or accidental damage to or destruction of property if the indemnified person at the time of the accident resulting in the injury, damage or destruction was

acting in the scope of his employment or office; and to authorize the selectmen to purchase a comprehensive general liability policy to protect the town against such liability as well as purchase insurance to protect the Town against liability arising under civil rights suits imposed upon it by RSA 31:106; and to appropriate the sum of \$200.00 therefor.

Paul Mayette moved this article be accepted as written, Paul

LaMott seconded the motion. It was so adopted.

ARTICLE 22. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the so-called Powers-Blumley Road leading from Route 10 easterly to the east side of the B&M railroad underpass, as an open highway and make the same subject to gates and bars.

Clark Ingalls made the motion that the article be amended to

read:

I move that the Town vote to discontinue the so called Powers-Blumley Road leading from Route #10 easterly to within 600 feet of the West side of the B&M Railroad underpass as an open highway, and make the same subject to gates & bars. Karl Bruckner seconded the motion. It was adopted as amended.

ARTICLE 23. To transact any other business proper to come before said meeting.

Paul Mayette read a letter from the Governor, Meldrim Thomson, Jr., requesting the residents of Haverhill vote on the following question.

"Do you favor the construction of an oil refinery in New Hampshire so long as it meets all environmental requirements?"

Elizabeth Gibson made the following amendment.

Providing that the Town in which the refinery would be located has so approved by local town vote.

This article was adopted as amended. The meeting was adjourned at 11:35 P.M.

### REPORT OF THE SELECTMEN

To the Citizens and Taxpayers of Haverhill:

The reappraisal voted by the 1972 Town Meeting was finally done in 1974. Inequities still exist and there are adjustments to be made but hopefully these will be worked out to give us a fair and equal basis for taxation. The Town does not realize additional money from the increased total value. The tax you pay is based on the amount voted at Town Meeting. The Selectmen do not increase the amount to be spent—we work with what's available and do the best we can just as you do with your own family income.

Haverhill is a good town to live in. A small rural town with beauty and character but large enough to provide shopping, social and health services, emergency protection, schools, libraries etc. that are not available in smaller communities.

The town of Haverhill is a big town with 52 square miles, about 3200 residents and 90 miles of roads. Your tax dollars are spent carefully with a devotion to duty by your Town officials and employees that is unusual in this day. We think you are getting a bargain. There is no question that services and facilities could be improved but not without increasing expenses. Do you think the Police budget is too high? Perhaps, but you also know that you will get immediate response in your time of need. Do you think there is a delay in the plowing of your road? Think of the school bus routes, mail delivery, milk tanks and the priorities that must be given to coordinate the maintenance of our extensive road system. Do you think Town office expenses are too great? Can you imagine running a million dollar business with part time help?

Do you think Town expenses should be reduced? Do you think the Selectmen should be required to solve your personal problems? Should you involve the police in your family disputes? Your responsibility involves your providing for yourself and also giving consideration to your neighbor. Do you have a sincere interest in your Town? If you won't assist the fellow next door then the Town must do it. It is not enough to say the Town should reduce services unless you as a citizen are willing to do more.

Unfortunately Haverhill has been divided in the past by regional factions which have prevented us from working towards common goals. Let's turn the Town around and take a positive attitude!

If you have had an opportunity to visit the new Town offices and had visited the old, you can appreciate the improvement in the facilities and the increased ability to serve the townspeople. Without the old courthouse it would have been necessary to find adequate quarters for the District Court, a new police station and office space for the State appraisers.

Land

Inflation and "hard times" are not new to you or your Towr officials. We are affected by the economic situation in our business and everyday life. We must evaluate the services we now have and decide at Town Meeting what kind of foundation we want to build for the future. A poor foundation will not support a good building or a good program in health, business, law, schools, environment or any other endeavor.

Administering the Town of Haverhill involves so much office work, so much red tape to be coped with, so many government agencies, State and Federal, so many personal problem demands at all hours of all days and nights that three part time persons can no longer steal enough time from their families and full time jobs to run the Town efficiently. We strongly advise that you consider the adoption of Article 18 to study the feasibility of having a town manager form of government.

To the Selectmen of the Town of Haverhill:

Herein I submit my report as Chief of Police of the Town of Haverhill for the year ending December 31, 1974.

- 1,158 Complaints
  - 32 Accidents over \$300.00 damage
  - 180 Doors found unlocked
    - 12 Persons transported to hospital (state and local)
  - 10 Arrests for other departments
  - 37 Messages delivered
  - 311 Motor Vehicle cases prosecuted in court
    - 81 Criminal cases prosecuted in court
    - 14 Juvenile cases prosecuted in court

Assisted other departments 81 times

Assisted motorists 107 times—changing tires, pumping gas, etc.

Assisted fire departments 27 times (traffic)

Issued warnings to 564 vehicles

We had no fatal accidents in 1974 and very few personal injury accidents.

These statistics should, if properly evaluated, give the story of your Police Department but they only give the number value and not the concerns faced by the Department. I would mention a few for you to consider: We are concerned about drug abuse, especially within the boundaries of Haverhill. Its legal control entails countless hours of research and observation.

We are concerned about the tightening economy of the country and people fighting for their habitual life style and what law enforcement problems this will produce as they have to do with your welfare and protection. We are concerned about you and your neighbors if we are unable to give ambulance and other special public services such as fire, our escort and other cooperation. We are concerned about reciprocal support with other departments; if we receive we must also be able to give. We are concerned about the impact that Interstate 91 is making, and will increasingly produce in the way of law enforcement problems.

We are concerned about the increased population of this area, its families, their needs, desire and protection. There are about ninety miles of road in Haverhill with people living all along these ways. Each has a right to our cooperation in their time of trouble. The number who call on us for aid you can partially evaluate by studying this report. We hope we may continue to be able to help you when you need us.

# REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

All open burning when the ground is not covered with snow is controlled by the Town Forest Fire Warden in cooperation with the New Hampshire Forest Fire Service. Anyone wishing to kindle a fire out-of-doors when the ground is not covered with snow must have a written permit signed by the Town Forest Fire Warden. If the fire is to be kindled on land not owned by the person kindling the fire then he must have the permission of the landowner. No outdoor fires can be kindled between 9 A.M. and 5 P.M. unless it is raining, without the additional approval of the District Forest Fire Chief.

The 1974 forest fire season was one of the worst in the past two decades. Woodlands in central and southern New Hampshire became so dry in mid August that the Governor and Council, upon the recommendation of the State Forester, enacted a partial woodlands closure in Sullivan, Cheshire, Hillsborough, Merrimack and Belknap Counties and a complete woodlands closure in Strafford and Rockingham Counties plus the Towns of Barnstead, Gilmanton and Alton in Belknap County. Through the excellent cooperation of the citizens of our State no major forest fire occurred at any time during the year.

### WOODSVILLE FREE PUBLIC LIBRARY REPORT

INFLATION HITS THE LIBRARY — from a report issued by the New Hampshire Library Trustee Association:

First, the paper shortage; tighter supplies were accompanied by higher prices. Elimination of price controls stimulated new mill capacity, but it also stimulated cost of paper.

Second, a book is not just paper: there is a shortage of supers, the gauze-like material used to reinforce the spines of books. Covering cloth was in short supply. Binders board and paperboards used for hardcover books became scarce because waste paper was scarce so publishers were forced to turn to top-grade materials. Adhesives became hard to get.

In addition to all this, transportation and distribution handling costs rose. The cost of new machinery and plants has been rising for more than a decade. Labor costs are a major factor in cost increases, especially authorship. A publisher has to pay more in royalty advances. This adds to book prices so we now have \$15 biographies and \$10 novels, to say nothing about the sharp rise in the cost of reference books.

Let's look at some cost percentage figures of the subject area in which public libraries purchase most heavily: Fiction up 54 percent; Juvenile 37 percent; Biographies 44 percent; History, a whopping 78 percent; Sports 34 percent; Literature 55 percent; and Travel 53 percent.

So much for the N. H. Library Trustee report. What does this mean to you, the patron of our public library in Woodsville? If you wish to keep your library "alive, up and doing" in the manner to which you have become accustomed, please attend the budget and town meetings. We need your support and cooperation more than ever.

This past year, library activities, such as the Summer Story Hour and the Summer Reading Club, were conducted as usual with good attendance and participation. Poster contests were held during Children's Book Week and National Library Week. An attractive book display was placed in a local store window during National Library Week.

Also, during the summer Mr. Joseph Grebanier, a retired teacher of English literature from the New York school system and now a resident of Benton, gave a most informative talk on mushrooms. Mr. Grebanier and his wife are enthusiastic experts on identifying these field and woodland delicacies.

Activities outside the Library included the usual book exhibits in Littleton and meeting with state Council Delegates. Our librarians also attended several meetings with other local librarians and school librarians which has resulted in even closer cooperation between school and village libraries.

Mrs. Leonard and one of the trustees, Mrs. Donald Evans. attended the New Hampshire Library Council annual conference in Laconia. Guest speakers included Judson Hale, editor of Yankee Magazine, and cartoonist, Jim Dobbins, of the Boston Herald.

Several repairs to the library building or outside areas have been made or are in the process of completion. These include cleaning of carpet, protection of town histories and other valuable books, cleaning of windows, new lock for front door, reinforcing of back wall foundations, and repainting of upstairs interior portion of the library.

Despite cost setbacks in books and maintenance, our Library continues to offer full service to its patrons. One of our biggest assets is the dedication of our librarians. Their knowledge of the community and its people is what bring books and people together. They serve us well, and we are lucky to have them.

## ANNUAL REPORT OF THE WOODSVILLE FIRE DEPARTMENT

To the Residents of the Precinct of Woodsville

In a continuing effort to improve the fire department and keep you abreast of our activities. I am pleased to file this report. During the past year many things have happened in the fire department. We have worked very hard trying to update our department. First and foremost was the addition to the station. This was long overdue and very much appreciated. At this time I must take this opportunity to thank all who unselfishly gave of themselves for nothing. Among those are Brown Concrete, Robert Clifford, W. N. Brill & Sons, and last but not least the firemen themselves.

We were very fortunate to get the old Cottage Hospital to use for a training session. This was a great opportunity for all the fire depts. in the Twin State Mutual Aid Association, of which Woodsville is a member. Our thanks go out to Mr. Sonny MacDonald for this opportunity. This session was the finale to a 10 week training session held in Woodsville by the N.H. State Fire Training Service.

Throughout the year we have been making improvements in our equipment, updating our procedures and making improvements in our alarm system. We have through the cooperation of the Police Dept., The Highway Dept., No. Haverhill Fire Dept., Haverhill Fire Dept., Town Selectmen, Precinct Commissioners, and officials of the Grafton County Jail installed a radio communications system complete with a tone control system to alert the firemen of a fire. This system consists of radio receivers in the firemen's homes of which we currently have 13. These radios were bought by the firemen themselves at no cost to the taxpayers and is reflected in the 1974 financial statement. This system has proved very valuable and has cut our response time tremendously. We have combined all fire phones in the town of Haverhill into one common number. This number is 787-6222. In Woodsville you must dial the full 7 numbers.

During the fall members of the dept. installed 7" insulation in the ceiling of the old station. This should make a substantial savings in the heat bill in the coming winter. Our primary concern for the coming year is to improve our hose situation. We are in desperate shape on large hose for supply lines. We have not replaced this hose when it became outdated. In the past year we have blown 18 lengths of hose or 900 ft. A great deal of the hose we have left is over 20 years old and outdated. I feel it is necessary to bring this to the attention of the taxpayers. Therefore, most of the money in the 1975 proposed budget, under new equipment, is for new hose. During the year we received an army surplus 6x6 truck. This truck is to be used in conjunction with the N.H. State Forest Fire Service. It is our intention to build a water tank onto it so that it can be used for grass fires and also building fires where water supply is a problem. This project will be undertaken by the firemen themselves in an effort to hold costs down.

During 1974 we answered 24 alarms for fire. Of those, 8 were for mutual aid, 2 were false alarms, and 4 were of suspicious origin. I wish to thank No. Haverhill, Haverhill, and Wells River Fire Depts. for their help and cooperation during 1974.

As with all of you inflation has raised havoc with the fire dept., however, after several meetings with the precinct commissioners we have agreed to submit a line item budget and stay within it. We have also, during the last year, through the efforts of the secretary of the precinct, kept an accurate record of our expenses. This record appears along with this report.

The fire department is only as good as its members and its equipment. We have the personnel dedicated in their efforts, and we are striving to improve our equipment. We ask your usual cooperation and support. Thank you.

To the inhabitants of the Precinct of Haverhill Corner, in said Haverhill, who are qualified to vote in District affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet in the Chapel, in said Precinct, on Tuesday, March 11, 1975 at 7:30 o'clock in the evening to act upon the following subjects.

- Article 1. To choose a moderator for the ensuing year.
- Article 2. To choose a clerk for the ensuing year.
- Article 3. To hear the report of the treasurer and other agents.
- Article 4 To choose one commissioner for the term of three years.
  - Article 5. To choose a treasurer.
  - Article 6. To choose an auditor.
- Article 7. To see if the voters will vote to increase the Fire Chief's salary from \$100.00 to \$250.00 per year.
- Article 8. To see if the voters will vote to increase the Treasurer's salary from \$200.00 to \$250.00 per year.
- Article 9. To appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 for the purchase of new equipment for the Fire Department.
- Article 10. To amend the Water Rules and Regulations of the Precinct, Articles 8 and 9 of the March 17, 1971 meeting and the Special meeting of October 6, 1971, to read as follows:
  - a. Five dollars (\$5.00) delinquency will be charged if a water bill is not paid before the end of the quarter due.
  - b. Five dollars (\$5.00) will be charged for turning on or turning off water for any purpose.
  - c. A charge of two hundred dollars (\$200.00) will be made on each new water service, including the shutoff, or the actual cost of installation, whichever is greater.
- Article 11. To amend the Water Rules and Regulations of the Precinct, Articles 8 and 9 of the March 17, 1971 meeting and the Special meeting of October 6, 1971, Water Rates, to effect a 50% increase in all services effective July 1, 1975.
- Article 12. To authorize the Commissioners to borrow money to provide for current expenses, or for emergency, until the taxes are collected and to give note for same.

Article 13. To raise such sums of money for the ensuing year as printed in the budget for the ensuing year.

Article 14. To transact any other business proper to come before this meeting.

### PRECINCT OF HAVERHILL CORNER

The 1974 annual meeting of the Precinct of Haverhill Corner was called to order at the Parish House in Haverhill Corner on March 12, 1974 at 7:30 P.M. by the Moderator, Karl T. Bruckner.

The Moderator announced that under Article 1 of the Warrant, the election of a Moderator for the coming year was in order. Karl Bruckner was the only person nominated for this office and having a majority of the ballots cast, was declared elected.

Under Article 2, Sue Bruckner was the only person nominated as Clerk and having a majority of the ballots cast, was declared elected.

Under Article 3, it was moved, seconded and voted that the report of the Treasurer and other agents be accepted as printed in the Town Report.

Under Article 4, Ed Morris, William Andrews and Bud Cleveland were nominated to fill the one-year unexpired term as Commissioner vacated by the resignation of William Keyes. After the second balloting, Mr. Andrews had received a majority of the ballots cast and was declared elected.

Under Article 5, Ken Smith was the only person nominated for Commissioner for a three-year term and having a majority of the ballots cast, was declared elected.

Under Article 6, Stewart Holden was the only person nominated for Treasurer and having a majority of the ballots cast, was declared elected.

Under Article 7, James Barber was the only person nominated for Auditor and having a majority of the ballots cast, was declared elected. No other agents were chosen under Article 7.

The oath of office was administered by the Moderator to all the above persons with the exception of James Barber, who was not present.

Earl Aremburg explained the reasons for Article 8. After considerable discussion about the problem of ownership and administration, it was moved, seconded and voted that the Village raise the cost of installing new water services from the present \$100 to \$200.

Under Article 9, a motion was made by Joe Lavoie and duly seconded that the Commissioners repair the bandstand situated on the Common. Robert Ross moved to amend the motion to read: "That the Commissioners keep the bandstand in repair at least in the condition it is now and to look into the cost of repair and make recommendations to the annual 1975 Precinct Meeting."

The motion to amend was seconded and on a voice vote, it passed. It was then moved and seconded that the article as amended be passed. On a voice vote, the Moderator declared that the amended motion had carried.

Under Article 10, it was moved, seconded and unanimously voted to authorize the Commissioners to borrow money to provide for current expenses or for emergency until taxes are collected and to give notes for the same.

Under Article 11, it was moved, seconded and unanimously voted to appropriate the sum of \$8,457 for the operation of the Precinct for the ensuing year, this being the sum set forth in the Precint budget as printed in the Town Report.

Inquiry was made of the Commissioners as to whether the action under Article 11 had provided any money for the Commissioners to carry out the duties imposed upon them by the vote under Article 9. When it was learned that no money had been so appropriated, it was moved by Ruth Fogarty and duly seconded to reconsider the vote on the budget under Article 11. Carl Elsner raised a point of order and after discussion, the meeting voted by majority vote to suspend any rules necessary to allow the voters to reconsider the action taken under Article 11. Mrs. Fogarty's motion to reconsider was then passed on a voice vote and the Moderator ruled that further discussion with respect to Article 11 was in order.

A motion was made by Janet Bagonzi and duly seconded that the meeting raise and appropriate an additional \$250 for repair and maintenance of the bandstand and an additional \$500 for the library. The motion was lost on a voice vote.

A motion was made by Robert Ross and duly seconded that the budget be amended to appropriate the sum of \$8,707, which sum included an additional \$250 to enable the Commissioners to fulfill the duties imposed by the vote under Article 9. The Moderator declared that the motion had carried on a voice vote. It was then moved and seconded that the amended motion to appropriate the sum of \$8,707 be passed. The motion carried on a voice vote.

Under Article 12. Louis Pike asked that the Precinct water mains be extended from his residence to the Currier lot, a distance of about 974 feet. Discussion arose as to the location of the Precinct boundary lines and as to whether or not the Currier lot was within the Precinct. It was moved, seconded and voted that the Commissioners work with the Selectmen in an attempt to definitely establish the eastern boundary of the Precinct.

Under Article 11, Ken Smith read part of the proposed contract with the Piermont water users. There was much discussion over the rates, adequacy of supply and incidental expenditures connected with supplying water to the Piermont users. At the end of the discussion, Earl Aremburg moved that the Commissioners be authorized to present a contract to the Piermont water users identical to the one previously presented to them but without the 90 day clause. The motion was seconded and carried on a voice vote.

Charles Murphy, Chairman of the Haverhill Village Planning Board, reported that the Board had drafted a proposed zoning ordinance and was working on the bounds of the proposed zones. He noted that there were several vacancies on the Planning Board to be filled by the Commissioners.

Under Article 12, it was moved, seconded and voted that the Clerk's minutes of this meeting be printed in the next Annual Town Report.

Under Article 12, it was moved, seconded and voted that the Commissioners bring to the next Precinct Meeting figures for the repair and upkeep of the fence around the Common.

It was moved, seconded and voted that the meeting be adjourned.

The Moderator declared the meeting adjourned at 9:10 P.M.

# ANNUAL TOWN MEETING WARRANT State of New Hampshire

TO THE INHABITANTS OF THE TOWN OF HAVERHILL, in the County of Grafton and State of New Hampshire qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in North Haverhill in said Town on Tuesday, March 4, 1975 at 8 o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following matters. Article 1 will be decided by written ballot. The polling booths will be open from 8:00 A.M. to 6:00 P.M. for voting on this article. At 6:00 P.M. the meeting will be adjourned to reconvene at 8:00 P.M. at the James R. Morrill Elementary School Auditorium in North Haverhill, said Town of Haverhill, for consideration of the remaining articles in the warrant.

ARTICLE 1. To choose by a non-partisan ballot one selectman for a term of three years, a Town Clerk for a term of one year, a Town Treasurer for a term of one year, a Trustee of Trust Funds for a term of three years, a Highway Agent for a term of one year, and a Tax Collector for a term of one year.

ARTICLE 2. To announce the result of the balloting.

ARTICLE 3. To hear the reports of the Selectmen, Treasurer, Cemetery Commissioners and any other Town Officers and Committees heretofore chosen and to pass any vote relating thereto.

ARTICLE 4. To choose one or more Auditors, one Library Trustee for the term of three (3) years, one Cemetery Commissioner for the term of five (5) years and all other necessary Town Officers.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to contribute funds for the construction of Class V Highways, as provided in Chapter 241 RSA, as amended.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to issue interest-bearing notes or orders in anticipation of taxes, to provide for expenses of the current year.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept gifts of Federal or State Aid, in the name of the Town of Haverhill.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to distribute inventory blanks by mail, or at the same time they examine the taxable property.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer, or to sell real estate acquired by the town through Tax Collector's deed, by public auction sale or by advertising for sealed bids.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will vote to appoint or elect a Budget Committee to supervise the appropriations of the Town, and to recommend to the next annual Town meeting the amounts to be raised for various purposes, such recommendations to be printed in the next annual report.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the withdrawal of the sum of \$5,000.00 to assist or fund in whole or in part the Haverhill Senior Citizens Club, Inc. for programs for Town of Haverhill residents over the age of sixty (60) only and for the Administration thereof with the advice of the New Hampshire State Council on Aging, pursuant to RSA 167-A:10 from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise, appropriate and contribute the sum of five hundred (\$500.00) Dollars to Bedell Covered Bridge Inc. for restoration of the Bedell Covered Bridge in the Town of Haverhill, which sum will match that raised by the Town of Newbury in 1974.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to make alterations in the amount of money to be raised and appropriated for the ensuing year for support of the Town as recommended by the budget committee in its report, to raise and appropriate all sums so determined for said purposes, and to pass any other vote relating thereto.

ARTICLE 14. # WARRANT FOR ANNUAL MEETING OF NORTH HAVERHILL

### WATER AND LIGHTING DISTRICT

To the inhabitants of the North Haverhill Water and Lighting District in the Town of Haverhill, New Hampshire, qualified to vote in District affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in the Town Hall in said district, Thursday, March 6, 1975, at seven-thirty o'clock in the evening, to act on the following matters:

- Article 1. To choose a moderator for the ensuing year.
- Article 2. To choose a clerk for the ensuing year.
- Article 3. To hear the reports of the officers heretofore chosen and to pass any vote relating thereto.
  - Article 4. To choose a treasurer for the ensuing year.
  - Article 5. To choose an auditor for the ensuing year.
- Article 6. To choose a commissioner for the term of three years.
- Article 7. To act upon petitions of prospective new water customers outside the district.
- Article 8. To amend the Water Rules and Regulations of the district, Article 14, Miscellaneous, to read as follows:

Five dollars (\$5.00) fine per quarter will be charged for delinquent water bills of over thirty (30) days.

Five dollars (\$5.00) will be charged for shutting off or turning

on water for any purpose.

A charge of three hundred dollars (\$300.00) will be made for each new water service within the District; and for each new water service outside the District, the charge will be the actual cost including shut-off, or three hundred dollars (\$300.00), whichever is greater.

- Article 9. To amend the Water Rules and Regulations of the District, Article 15, Water Rates, to effect a 50% increase in all services, effective April 1, 1975.
- Article 10. To amend the Water Rules and Regulations of the District, Article 15, Water Rates, to add a charge for swimming pools over a certain size, and to set a charge for such pools.
- Article 11. To authorize the commissioners to investigate the possibility of use of the former Town Clerk's office for District purposes.

- Article 12. To see if the District will authorize further study on improvements of the water system in the Center Haverhill area, and authorize the commissioners to borrow money for the study and improvements.
- Article 13. To see if the District agrees to pay the volunteer firemen three dollars (\$3.00) per meeting or drill, not to exceed eighteen such paid meetings per man per year.
- Article 14. To see if the District would authorize the commissioners to purchase land around Cold Spring, and to withdraw a sum not to exceed \$33,450.00 from existing trust funds for the same.
- Article 15. To see if the District will vote to authorize the commissioners to borrow money to provide for current expenses or for an emergency until taxes are collected, and give notes for same.
- Article 16. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be deemed necessary for the ensuing year for new equipment and for maintenance of the Fire Department, street lights and sidewalks of said District.
- Article 17. To see if the District will vote to authorize the commissioners to place surplus money, if same exists, into trust funds.

Article 18. To transact any other business proper to come before this meeting.

# 1974 REPORT OF THE HAVERHILL PLANNING BOARD

The major Planning Board effort was again directed toward subdivisions. (A subdivision is the division of a parcel of land into two or more lots including mobile home sites.) 35 new applications were received. From these applications and three from the previous year, 90 lots were approved and 251 lots have conditional approval or await resolution of deficiencies. The majority of the lots are about an acre in size; the applications represent approximately 1200 acres. Approval of a subdivision does not necessarily mean that Board members believe it is a desirable one, only that it conforms to the regulations.

The subdivision regulations, although limited, are one tool intended to insure reasonable layout of lots, safe roads and consideration of soil, topography and drainage. This year the subdivision regulations were revised incorporating suggestions proposed over the four years the regulations had been in effect. A public hearing was held and revisions adopted which modified the format and clarified procedure. New sections were added which will be particularly helpful in evaluating and directing multi-lot subdivisions. The Board received assistance from the U.S.D.A. Soil Conservation Service, North Country Council and legal and engineering consultants.

It is readily seen that the number of lots created during the last year present a sizable potential growth in population and demand for services. The Board anticipates working more closely with neighborhoods to develop a town plan. Regular Board meetings at which the public is welcome are held monthly. TOWN OF HAVERHILL PLANNING BOARD

# REPORT OF NORTH COUNTRY HOME HEALTH AGENCY

The following is a statement of all services rendered to residents of the 15 towns we cover: 4.800 nursing visits, 18 physical therapist visits.

In the three months of 1974 that Homemaker Home Health Aide Service was in effect, the aides made 581 visits or approximately 1,300 hours of service. We had six Child Health Clinics and conducted one series of Expectant Parents classes.

The following is a statement of services rendered to the people of Haverhill.

The nursing staff made 975 visits to residents of Haverhill. There were two physical therapist visits. There were 175 Homemaker Home Health Aide Visits. This represents 1152 visits to the residents of Haverhill. Coupled with Child Health and Expectant Parents classes, this represents approximately \$16,188.00 in services to the residents of your town in 1974. Of this amount \$3,499.00 was charged to the town account. Last year the appropriation was \$3,165.00 so the remaining \$334.00 was paid for from other funds.

# REPORT FROM SWIMMING POOL COMMITTEE --- 1974

#### WOODSVILLE PRECINCT

The present Swimming Pool Committee was appointed in March of 1973 with an objective, as it has been for the past twenty years or so, to provide Woodsville's Youth Recreation program and residents with its own regulation size swimming pool. There was much optimism that the project could be accomplished within two years at the most.

Meetings were held regularly, financial assistance was promised by Federal agencies, district voters agreed to raise their share of the cost, and a site was chosen, the Community Field which we hoped, as a consequence of our choice, would eventually become the center of all recreation activities in the area. An architect was selected, Banwell, White & Arnold of Hanover, who began immediately to draw up plans and specifications to meet local and Federal regulations. A budget of \$65,000 was voted, and it appeared that we could build both pool and bathhouse for this sum. The way things shaped up, the project became ready to go out for bids during the summer of '74. Slowly, but surely, it seemed that, at long last, a dream was becoming reality.

Then, calamity struck. We learned that our chosen site has been designated as part of a Federal Flood Plain. This means that in order for us to obtain Federal funds, we have to carry Flood Plain insurance. This, in turn, requires district zoning which we do not have, then or now.

The Committee, discouraged but not defeated, held more meetings. We asked help from the voters on suggestions for an alternate site, weighed all current and previous pros and cons — could we build the pool with our own resources perhaps. After a great deal of discussion among ourselves and with other interested citizens of the community, we finally came to the conclusion that for all its problems, the Community Field is still the best, the most economical site. For one thing, we own the land, to go out and purchase another site would be an added expense, plus the fact that suitable alternate sites, we discovered, are few and far between. The pool must be located within the precinct. Also, we don't believe the voters will go along with carrying the full financial burden of \$65,000.

So, this is where we stand as of now. However, we wish to take this opportunity to assure those who had hoped to see a swimming pool in Woodsville by the summer of '75, that we are still determined and working very hard to solve the present problems facing us. As we explore the possibilities, we ask your continued patience and support. We believe that you will feel as we do that we have come too far to give up now.

#### REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

I herewith submit my tenth annual report to the voters of the Haverhill Cooperative School District.

Many new things have occurred in the last six years since the formation of the Haverhill Cooperative. New additions, different personnel and programs have appeared, but none of these will have more impact on education in this area than legislated formal negotiations which will come either from our state or national legislatures in the very near future. It is the sign of the times and this district, as well as all districts in this state, will have to negotiate direct economic benefits with all public employees.

Also, another legislated mandate from the legislature or state board will be accountability in the area of learning outcomes. We have always been fiscally accountable to the New Hampshire Tax Commission but this is a new area. We have had nine drafts of a state accountability model and hopefully, one will be finalized this year. In essence, at the local level school districts will be asked to define their own objectives, build programs which help students master these objectives, and develop evaluation plans for determining how well the objectives are being attained. This will be an elaborate challenge for everyone concerned with education in this district.

Last spring, all elementary schools in Supervisory Union #23 were evaluated by the New Hampshire Department of Education. Although our elementary schools are "Conditionally Approved" we are continually assessing our present programs and adding others on a priority basis. We have a long way to go before full approval but fiscal restraints must be exercised in implementing new services.

On July 1, 1975 a new certification program for all professional personnel in New Hampshire will become a reality. After many hours of study and deliberation, a Staff Development Program was developed, later approved by your school board and submitted to the New Hampshire Department of Education for approval. Official approval from the department was received on January 17, 1975 and now will be operational this summer.

As of this writing, your school board's recommended budget for 1975-76 shows an increase in the vicinity of five percent. Many factors for the increase in the budget are the result of the present

recessionary-inflationary economy. Such items as increased salaries, fuel, heat, teaching supplies, fixed charges, etc. are signs of the times. Many hours of scrutinizing and deliberating have been spent in keeping our budget below the inflationary level. Some programs have been cut back and other new services have been shelved for the time being.

Enrollments continue to level off at the elementary level but are still growing at the junior and senior high schools levels. Unless we have a large influx of new families, we feel our projections for the future will be valid. Please consult your report for the chart on projected enrollments.

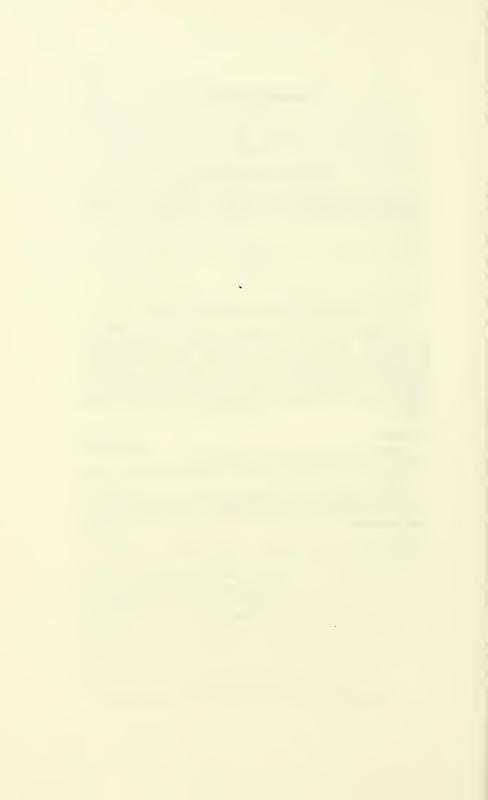

#### REPORT OF THE ASSISTANT SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

I herewith submit my fifth annual report to the voters of the Haverhill Cooperative School District.

The school year began with our annual Orientation Workshop for all Supervisory Union Staff members. The workshop was held at Lin-Wood High on the 28th and 29th of August, 1974. The general theme of our conference was "Performance Objectives as a Means to Curriculum Development." The first day was spent with four special consultants, Mr. George Bussell, Mrs. Judy Chase, and Mr. Doug Brown from the State Department of Education and Mrs. Mary McKelvey our Science teacher at the Haverhill Academy Junior High. The special consultants worked with the teachers in small groups on the various approaches to the development of curriculum objectives. On the second day the teachers were divided into subject area groups and began to work on devising curriculum objectives at each level and in each subject area. These committees have continued their work into the school year. Our main concern is to write these objectives in precise and measurable terms.

In my last report I referred to the formation of a Staff Development Committee. This Committee was authorized to formulate a three year masterplan for the recertification of all staff members according to guidelines set down by the State Department of Education. We are very pleased to report that we have submitted our plan and it has been approved by the State Department of Education. The approval was dated January 17, 1975. The plan will go into effect on July 1, 1975 and run through June 30, 1978, at which time it will be considered for renewal.

On May 14th, 15th and 16th, Mr. John Economopoulos, Elementary School Services Coordinator, State Department of Education conducted an evaluation of the Elementary Schools in Supervisory Union #23. This evaluation was made with respect to the State's Minimum Standards. The results of this evaluation are printed separately verbatim.

You will notice that the evaluation is divided into three parts: Commendations, Recommendations and Standards Not Achieved. On the positive side we note that the commendations far outweigh the other categories. Under the Standards not Achieved the reference to a certified librarian should be deleted, we have been providing this service since September of 1974. Priorities have been established on the other items listed and will be implemented as soon as we are able to fund them. Overall the evaluation was very favorable and reflects credit on the staff for their good work and on the community for its excellent support.

I would like to direct your attention to the enrollment projection printed separately. This projection averages out the enrollments & computes the percentages of in and out migration over the past six years. When we apply these percentages to present and expected enrollments we have an idea of what our student population will look like over the next few years. This projection indicates that Woodsville Elementary school will have fewer pupils in the Morrill Elementary School and that both will experience a mild decline in enrollment. Peak enrollments are expected at the Haverhill Academy Jr. High during 1975-1976 (202) and 1976-1977 (186) after which the enrollments are expected to stabilize in the 135-145 area. The High School enrollments will peak in 1977-1978 (398) and 1978-1979 (392) after which the downward trend is continued. These figures correspond roughly to what's happening at the State and National level. Properly used, this kind of information can be very helpful in determining priorities, funding programs and making staff assignments.

Many thanks to our school lunch operators and their assistants who continue to operate efficiently and economically in spite of a generally poor economic situation.

My sincerest thanks to the School Board, the Staff and everyone connected with the Haverhill Cooperative School District for their excellent support.

## JAMES R. MORRILL ELEMENTARY SCHOOL REPORT OF PRINCIPAL

To the Superintendent of Schools:

I submit herein my annual report of the James R. Morrill Elementary School for the year ending December 31, 1974.

The school enrollment as of the writing of this report is 208. The enrollment by grades is as follows: Kindergarten, 23; Grade 1, 29; Grade 2, 23; Grade 3, 26; Grade 4, 28; Grade 5, 34, and Grade 6, 45. Grade 6 is split into two sections because of the large number of pupils.

There are five new staff members this year. Miss Rosalie Tewksbury, a graduate of Plymouth State College, is teaching Kindergarten. Miss Regis Jason, a graduate of Salem State College, is teaching Grade 4. Mrs. Joan Sirlin, a graduate of the University of New Hampshire, is teaching Grade 5. Mrs. Judith Paton and Mrs. Lois Mullenbrock have been employed as aides.

The school lunch program, under the direction of Mrs. Mary Allbee, is serving approximately 150 pupils and teachers every day.

A testing program was conducted on all levels in the school. Tests given were the Metropolitan Readiness Test in Kindergarten, the complete battery of the Stanford Achievement Test in Grades 1-6, and the Otis-Lennon Mental Ability Test in Grades 3 and 6.

Two awards were presented to sixth graders last June. The James R. Morrill Memorial Award was presented to Debra Keith and the Phyllis Page Memorial Achievement Award to Dianne Ingalls.

An Open House was held in October so that parents could meet and talk with the teachers. A large number of pupils were represented by visiting parents.

Christmas and Spring Music Programs were presented by Grades 1-6 under the direction of vocal music supervisor, Miss Edith Anne Emery, and instrumental music supervisor, Mr. Raymond Craigie.

New windows have been ordered for the lower floor of the old building and will be installed as soon as they are received.

Cable T.V. will be installed in the school as soon as possible. The school will then receive a much better signal and the teachers will be able to make better use of Educational T.V.

The Special Education Program involves pupils who have a hard time doing the work in the regular classroom. Tests are given to these pupils to pinpoint their learning difficulties. Some of the tests given are the Durrell Analysis of Reading Difficulty, the Peabody Picture Vocabulary Test (PPVT), the Illinois Test of Psycholinguistic Abilities (ITPA), and the Wide Range Achievement Test (WRAT).

I wish to thank Mr. Mullen, Mr. Haskins, the School Board and all members of the school staff for their cooperation in all matters.

There are four new staff members this year. Miss Rosalie Tewksbury, a graduate of Plymouth State College, is teaching Kindergarten. Mrs. Sandra Mann, a graduate of the University of New Hampshire, is teaching Grade 6. Mrs. Patricia Salyards and Mrs. Jean Roy have been employed as aides.

The school lunch program, under the direction of Mrs. Marjorie Paronto, is serving approximately 150 pupils and teachers every day.

A testing program was conducted on all levels in the school. Tests given were the Metropolitan Readiness Test in Kindergarten, the complete battery of the Stanford Achievement Test in Grades 1-6 and the Otis-Lennon Mental Ability Test in Grades 3 and 6.

A large number of parents visited the school at an Open House held on Tuesday evening, October 22. The Open House enables parents to meet and talk with the teachers.

Christmas and Spring Music Programs were presented by Grades 1-6 under the direction of vocal music supervisor, Miss Edith Anne Emery, and instrumental music supervisor, Mr. Raymond Craigie.

Cable T.V. was installed in the school last Spring. The building now receives a much better signal and the teachers will be able to make much better use of Educational T.V.

The Special Education Program involves pupils who have a hard time doing the work in the regular classroom. Several tests are used to pinpoint the learning difficulties of these youngsters. These include reading analysis tests, phonics inventory tests, auditory discrimination tests, visual discrimination tests, achievement and intelligence tests.

I wish to thank Mr. Mullen, Mr. Haskins, the School Board and all members of the school staff for their cooperation in all matters.

In November the Cohase Lions and Lionesses sponsored a preschool vision and hearing program. Natalie Smith, Public Health Nurse, from the New Hampshire Department of Health was in charge of the clinic. Children ages 4-6 years received free vision and hearing screening tests. The clinic was well attended and children failing the tests were referred to their own physicians for follow up. I want to thank the Lions and Lionesses for making this clinic possible.

I want to thank the Cohase Lions Club for their support of the Sight Conservation Program providing vision examinations and lenses, if needed.

All routine screening tests were completed and referrals made when necessary.

Mrs. Stark, dental hygienist with the Bureau of Dental Health started a new dental program in grade 4. This was an educational program and children were taught to brush their teeth and to use dental floss. The pupils brushed and flossed their teeth daily after lunch. A dental survey was done on each child at the start and again at the end of the program. Mrs. Stark noted much improvement.

Children entering school are required by law to have physical examinations and immunizations: Following is a copy of the State requirements.

## RSA 200:38

200:38—I States: "All children shall be immunized prior to school entrance according to the current recommendations of the State Public Health Agency."

The recommendations of the Division of Public Health become requirements of the State Board and local school boards by this statute.

The immunizations listed below must be completed prior to school entry:

- Measles Vaccine (live attenuated) (having had measles is acceptable when verified).
- 2. Oral Trivalent Polio Vaccine (Sabin).
- 3. Diphtheria, Pertussia, and Tetanus (DPT) (Adult type DT when over 6 years of age).
- 4. Rubella Vaccine.

Routine smallpox vaccination is not recommended.

Other vaccinations are optional.

200:38—III States: "All children shall be examined prior to school entrance to detect symptoms of tuberculosis and may be periodically examined during his school experience."

Tuberculin Test (introdermal) (within one year prior to school entrance.)

RSA 200:32 States: "A medical examination is required upon or prior to entrance into the public school system and thereafter as often as deemed necessary by the local school authority."

During the spring a series of three well child clinics are held. All required immunizations are available. The dates of these clinics will be published in the local papers.

## SUPERVISORY UNION #23

## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT'S SALARY

Section 5, Chapter 243, Laws of 1953 of the State of New Hampshire requires that school district annual reports show the total amount paid to the superintendent.

One-half of the supervisory union expenses is prorated among the several school districts of the union on the basis of adjusted valuation. One-half is prorated on the basis of average daily membership in the schools for the previous school year ending June 30. The Superintendent of Supervisory Union #23, during 1974-1975, will receive a salary of \$20,300.00, which is made up as follows: \$2,500.00 to be paid by the State Department of Education and \$17,800.00 prorated among the several school districts. Allowance of \$1,500.00 for travel within the Union is also prorated as stated above.
