STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Littleton, in said State, qualified to vote in Town and State affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall and Police Court Room in the Town Building on the 11th day of March next, being the second Tuesday of March, at eight o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE 1. To choose a Town Clerk, one Selectman for the term of three years, a Town Treasurer, a Collector of Taxes, an Overseer of the Poor, three members of the Board of Trustees of the Public Library, one Trustee of Trust Funds, a Constable, and two Road Agents.

ARTICLE 2. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of Chapter 171-A of the Revised Laws relative to playing games of Beano in the Town of Littleton, and that the following question be placed upon the ballot to be used at said meeting, — "Shall the provisions of Chapter 171-A of the Revised Laws relative to playing games of Beano, be adopted in this Town?"

ARTICLE 3. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the laying out, construction and repairing of highways and bridges, for town building maintenance, for election and registration expenses, for Memorial Day, for Municipal Court expenses, for the Police Department, for the Health Department, for vital statistics, for the Community House, for advertising purposes, for miscellaneous expenses, for street lighting, for band concerts, for cemeteries, for Town Poor, for Old Age Assistance, for damage and legal expenses, for protection of the prem-

ises on the Ammonoosuc River from flood and other water damage, for White Pine Blister control, for payment of the Town debt and interest, for the Community Nurse, for the Park Commissioners, and all other Town charges.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will vote that its Road Agent or Agents, Tax Collector, and Overseer of the Poor, or any of them, shall hereafter be appointed by the Board of Selectmen instead of being elected.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to adopt a plan for extending to employees of the Town, the benefits of Title II of the Federal Social Security Act (old age and survivor's insurance) as authorized by Chapter 234 of the Laws of 1951, and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,200.00 to defray the Town's share of the cost thereof.

ARTICLE 6. If the foregoing Article is adopted, to see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to execute on behalf of the Town, the necessary agreement with the State of New Hampshire, to carry into effect the plan, and to see if the Town will designate the Town Treasurer as the officer to be responsible for the administration of the plan.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will authorize the Board of Selectmen to appoint a committee of three voters to investigate the advisability of acceptance by the Town, of a gift of the Unitarian Church property on Union Street, in said Town, for recreational purposes, if it should be offered to the Town by the Trustees of said Church.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will authorize the Board of Selectmen to accept a gift to the Town, of the Unitarian Church Property, on Union Street, said Town, if so recommended by the committee appointed in accordance with the votes herewith.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to use fluorine in the Town Water supply.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will authorize its Board of Selectmen to borrow monies, from time to time, for current indebtedness of the Town for the ensuing year, in anticipation of taxes to be collected for the year 1952, and to be paid therefrom.

ARTICLE 11. To hear the report of Agents, Auditors, Committee on Equalization, Pine Hill Committee, and Zoning Committee, or officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the Pattenville Cemetery so-called, situated in that part of the Town known as Pattenville and bounded by the highway leading from the Town to Waterford, Vermont known as Route 18, and by lands of the Connecticut River Power Company, such discontinuance to become effective upon the execution of a contract for the removal of the remains of persons buried in said Cemetery as provided for in succeeding

Article 13; and to authorize and direct the Selectmen to evidence such discontinuance by filing a Certificate in the Grafton County Registry of Deeds stating that such contract has been executed.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to (a) acquire a suitable tract or parcel of land within said Town, and to establish the same as and for a public cemetery; provided however, that Connecticut River Power Company, its successors or assigns, provide for reimbursement to the Town for all expenditures made in connection with such acquisition. (b) Authorize and direct the Selectmen to provide, by contract or other-

wise, with such persons or corporation as the Selectmen in their judgment deem fit, for the disinterment of the remains of persons buried in the Pattenville Cemetery and the re-interment of the same in the new cemetery or in such place within said Town as may be designated by the nearest surviving relatives of the deceased persons if any is designated; and for the removal of monuments, grave stones and other appurtenances attached to the graves and the set up of the same at the place of re-interment; however, that Connecticut River Power Company, its successors or assigns, provide by contract or otherwise for reimbursement to the Town for all expenditures made by the Town in connection with the foregoing. (c) Sell and convey to Connecticut River Power Company, its successors or assigns, for a consideration of Ten Dollars (\$10.00) the land and premises known as the Pattenville Cemetery described in Article 12; and to authorize and direct the Selectmen, on behalf of said Town, to execute and deliver to said Connecticut River Power Company, its successors or assigns, a deed therefor. (d) To authorize and direct the Selectmen to execute and deliver to Connecticut River Power Company, its successors or assigns, such agreements, contracts or other instruments which they in their judgment may deem necessary and proper to carry out the objects of the foregoing votes.

ARTICLE 14. To choose any other necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year and to choose and elect any Agents or Committees which may be necessary to carry into effect any vote that may be passed under this warrant.

ARTICLE 15. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual audit and examination of the accounts of the Town of Littleton for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1951, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the Town. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

Scope of Audit

Included in the audit and examination were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Trustees of Trust Funds, Library and Municipal Court. The accounts of the Water and Light Department and the Village District were also audited and separate reports are being made for each of these divisions.

Financial Statements

Comparative Balance Sheets — Dec. 31, 1950 — Dec. 31, 1951: (Exhibit A)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1950 and December 31, 1951, are presented in Exhibit A. As indicated therein the Net Debt decreased by \$5,263.04 in 1951.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit B)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the Town during the year is made in Exhibit B, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These were as follows:

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures — Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits C & D)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1951, are presented in Exhibits C and D. As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit D), a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$4,290.13, plus a net revenue surplus of \$4,347.90, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$8,638.03.

Summary of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit E)

A summary of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1951, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit E. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of December 31, 1951, is indicated in Exhibit F.

Parking Meter Account: (Exhibit H)

A summary statement of the Parking Meter account is presented in Exhibit H.

Statement of Long Term Indebtedness: (Exhibit N)

A statement of long term indebtedness as of December 31, 1951, showing annual debt service requirements, is contained in Exhibit N.

Audit Procedure

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source insofar as possible and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements obtained from depository banks. Verification of uncollected taxes was made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpayers as indicated by the Collector's records.

General Comments**Current Surplus:**

The Current Surplus position of the Town was maintained in 1951 as indicated herewith. It is noted that this was accomplished notwithstanding the fact

that \$11,000.00 of the cash surplus of 1950 was used to reduce the 1951 tax rate.

To the Board of Trustees of the Littleton Public Library the Annual Report of the Librarian is herewith Submitted:

Last fall the Littleton Public Library began its new project of providing classroom collections for all the public school elementary grades. This means supplying eleven collections instead of the six which used to be sent to the Apthorp School alone, nearly double the previous number. Since the move to the new elementary school, the children formerly at Kilburn will depend largely on these collections for their recreational reading. It is important that this library service be maintained in view of the distance of the new school from the library which makes it difficult for the small children to visit the library after school hours. It is hoped that by building up an adequate book collection for the lower reading levels the established reading habits of these children can be encouraged.

The increased circulation of books at the school should be provided for by additional book buying by the library. Whether this loan service can be continued satisfactorily and the collections changed often enough will depend on the library's ability to provide enough books over a prolonged period. It would seem that a larger proportion of the book budget should be allocated to children's books. The St. Rose of Lima School also depends on the library for book report material as does the junior and senior high school. Fortunately many of the required books are available and are used extensively; however, replacements are necessary from time to time.

1951's major purchase was a new Americana Encyclopedia, a fine reference tool, which, with the World Book encyclopedia for upper grade and high school use

and older sets for basic information, provides a good foundation for the reference collection.

Books have been received in memory of David A. Proctor, Raymond C. McLeod, Earl F. Hoyt and Chester F. Meacham. These and other generous gifts of books and money were most welcome.

It was decided to keep the library open on Friday evening instead of Saturday evening to accommodate shoppers.

The Extension Division of the N. H. State Library has again been able to appoint a bookmobile librarian, Mr. Ralph Riley, to the northern part of the state with a permanent base at Littleton. Mr. Riley will live in Littleton and use the basement room of the library as headquarters for his bookmobile trips. The interchange of ideas and professional advice, and the cooperative use of certain reference tools will be of distinct benefit to this library.

The librarian wishes to thank the board of trustees and the patrons of the library for their good will and help during the past year.

REPORT OF PARK COMMISSION 1951

This is, to our knowledge, the first time a report has been presented to the people of our town. We feel that the efforts carried on at Remich Park, Apthorp Common and The Dells Area should be on record.

A sum of \$5,000 is usually appropriated to the Park Commission to maintain these areas. The Dells and Remich Park have interest money on \$5,000 each year from which to draw. From this total we try to maintain your park areas as efficiently as we know how. By prudent expenditures it is possible to improve each area.

In brief, we would like to tell you of our combined efforts. Let us begin at Remich Park. We would like to place on record our sincere thanks to Mr. Albert Orr, for we believe he has done an excellent job keeping Remich Park in the best of condition. Also we cannot forget the work of Cornelius Brinn on the baseball field and the many other places he has rendered his services. Thank you both. In the spring a crew from the Village District helped place a culvert at the third base end of the grandstand. This took care of the excess water coming from the roof of the grandstand. We were able to hire Duncan Crawford for a few weeks and with his help we had a much needed tool shed built for the caretaker under the grandstand on the first base side. At the wading pool we had the inlet and outlet pipes covered and put under lock and key for an obvious reason. Mr. Crawford painted the grandstand. Mr. Brinn, with help from some of the Village District boys started and completed much needed work on our baseball field. Mr. Albert Bennett, your recreational director, worked

very cooperatively with us. We hired Mrs. Richard Ross to help at the wading pool area. The usual maintenance of the Park area was taken care of as usual. This winter the Water and Light department has pruned the trees for us. This year we cooperated with the Chamber of Commerce by allowing them to supervise the Park for winter sports.

At the Aphthorp Common we did not do too much. This year the softball program did not seem to take hold. We did paint the field house and repair the back-stop. In the fall the field was ready for high school football. Something for you people to think about is grass. We would like to see good sod at the Common.

The area at The Dells is still under investigation. We would like to say that the picnic area was a success last summer.

Our thanks to Ira Mann and his crew and to Walter Goss and his men for their help throughout the year.

We will appreciate and welcome constructive criticism or ideas as to what to do or not to do at Remich Park, Aphthorp Common and The Dells Area.

To the Citizens of Littleton :

The school board of the Littleton School District presents herewith its annual report. Included in this report you will find the audit of finances for the year 1950-1951 by the Division of Municipal Accounting of the State Tax Commission; budgets and estimated receipts for this year and next year; and written reports of the superintendent of schools and the principal of the high school.

Salaries for teachers, transportation and other related charges, including payments into the State Retirement Fund, constitute the major portion of the budget. These items receive close attention, but we know that no single payment is excessive. All of our regular teachers have been advanced in salary each year to keep in line with the other districts throughout the state. Fuel costs have taken a gradual rise along with costs of building maintenance. As a result of recent legislation, it has been found necessary to increase the coverage of insurance on our buildings and equipment. All of these items contribute toward increased costs in the operation of your schools.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Littleton:

It is with pleasure that I submit my annual report relative to your schools.

The following are outstanding accomplishments in our schools since my last report:

The completion, except for outside site work, of the new elementary school.

The beginning of weekly lessons for pupils in band instruments and the organization of a school band.

The organization of a school lunch program in the elementary school under the National School Lunch Program with over 200 pupils participating.

A 30-hour in-service training program for elementary teachers in The Improvement of the Reading Program.

The establishment of a kindergarten class in the school program.

TEACHERS

We were fortunate this past year in that very few replacements were necessary in our teaching staff.

Miss Virginia Brown, a graduate of Plymouth Teachers College in 1948, with two years' experience in Epping High School and one year in New Castle High School, Colorado, was elected to teach commercial subjects to replace Miss Lois Stinson, who resigned to accept a similar position at Westbrook Junior College.

Mr. Anthony Katsiaficas, a graduate of Keene Teachers College, with three years' experience as

principal of Allenstown Grammar School was elected principal of the elementary school after Mr. Kenneth MacPherson was transferred from the junior high classes in the Apthorp School to the high school building.

Mrs. Dorothy MacPherson, a graduate of Keene Teachers College, with practice teacher training under Mrs. Lakeway last year, was elected to teach the fourth grade. This was an added position due to increasing the number of teachers in the elementary school.

Mrs. Lila Nutbrown, who has been a regular sixth grade teacher in the Kilburn School was transferred to the junior high school to replace Miss Daisy Bronson, who retired in June.

Miss Carolyn Brown, a graduate of Lesley College, was elected to teach in the kindergarten.

Five teachers attended summer school in 1951 and ten attended extension courses.

REPAIRS

In addition to the regular cleaning and minor repairs that are made in the buildings each year, the following work was completed in the high school building:

New concrete floor in the boys' toilet on the second floor.

Painting the boys' locker room.

Painting boys' and girls' toilet rooms.

Redecorating the upper corridor.

Painting the clock tower.

Painting ventilators on roof.

Painting monitor top skylight on roof.

During this winter we were faced with the emergency of finding it necessary to retube the boiler in

the high school during the Christmas vacation. This was a job that was not anticipated and for which no funds were provided. The regular annual inspection did not reveal this condition in the boiler.

HEALTH

I believe the health program in our schools compares favorably with that of other towns in the state. Miss Hazel Bryant, our school nurse, not only looks out for the general welfare of all pupils, but arranges for the attendance of children with the most serious defects at special clinics. Our school doctors, Dr. Barbara Beattie and Dr. Frank G. Dudley, give thorough examinations periodically to certain groups. Under the present schedule Dr. Beattie examines pupils in grades one, three and seven and all high school girls. Dr. Dudley examines high school boys.

A number of children had dental treatment by the family dentist before the examination by the nurse, which accounts for the number of corrections being more than the number of defects found.

THE NEW ELEMENTARY SCHOOL

Materials from the Kilburn and Apthorp Schools were moved into the new school during the Christmas recess and classes began in the new building on Tuesday, January 2, with a minimum of confusion.

At the time of writing this report, the program is going along exceptionally well. A number of State Office personnel have worked with the staff in an advisory capacity to improve the program. Among those who have helped are Dr. Alice Baumgarner, Director of Art Education; Miss Madeline Bartell, Director, Elementary School Services; Miss Annette Eveleth, Director, School Health Services and Miss Ruth Cutter, Director, School Lunches.

SCHOOL LUNCH PROGRAM

Shortly after moving into the new elementary school, the school lunch program was instituted. Mrs. Samuel Maxwell and Mrs. Harold Lewis were em-

ployed to operate the program with the assistance of two volunteer helpers furnished through the cooperation of the Parent Teachers Association. From 225 to 242 children have taken advantage of the program. A lunch consisting of a main hot dish, bread and butter, milk and a dessert of fruit or pudding is served each day. Pupils pay 20 cents per meal and reimbursement from federal funds is 6 cents per meal. Surplus foods furnished free by the United States Department of Agriculture also help to support the program. Miss Ruth Cutter, Director of School Lunches, who visited the program recently remarked that the Littleton program was functioning better in its ninth day of operation than many in their second year.

HIGH SCHOOL

The high school continues to carry on an excellent program of regular school work and special activities under the able direction of Principal Kenney. His report will be found on other pages of this report.

The teaching situation in the elementary schools continues to be very acute and with the prospect of drafting college men plus the opportunity for better pay in industry, the high school situation begins to look bad once more.

The statistical report and school calendar will be found following this report.

In closing, I wish to express my appreciation for the cooperation received from Mrs. Howland, Principals Kenney and Katsiaticas, the teachers, school nurse, school physicians and janitors. I also desire to thank the Littleton Courier for the generous amount of space given the schools this past year, and the school board and citizens for their loyal support.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

To the Superintendent of Schools:

My report as principal of Littleton High School follows:

REGISTRATION

The total registration of the senior high school to date is 214 and 92 in the junior high school making a total of 306. The senior high school shows an increase of 2 while the junior high school shows an increase of 26. This figure is to a large degree due to the consolidation of all the public school junior high school pupils in this building.

Our withdrawals number 11 in the senior high school and 8 in the junior high school.

School attendance has continued to improve this year and our average of 95.59 for the first five months of this year is above the state average.

CURRICULUM

In order to insure a maximum efficiency we have tried to place people of similar interests, abilities and needs

together wherever possible. This has improved our instruction considerably. We have a class in Consumer Mathematics required of seniors who have not taken mathematics previously. In our commercial course we have divided the class into a secretarial and a clerical group which we feel meets a need of these students.

RECREATION

The recreation program, under the direction of Mr. Bennett, has made continued progress so that pupils not taken care of in the regular sports are now getting some attention, and we are consequently reaching a much larger percentage of our student body in wholesome recreation than previously. Our philosophy here is that every pupil should have an opportunity to participate in some form of organized recreation, not just the talented or athletic.

GUIDANCE

Our guidance program is continuing to expand and much effort and thought is put into the placement of our graduates and pupils.

MUSIC

The music program under the able directorship of Mrs. Cushing for vocal music, and Mr. McLure for instrumental music and band has made excellent progress this year.

THE TEACHING STAFF

We are pleased to report that the teaching staff here at Littleton compares very favorably with any of its size in the state and has cooperated with the administration very well.

EXTRA CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

Our school offers a full program of extra curricular activities which include music, vocal and instrumental, dramatics, athletics, socials, parties, dances, and the school publication, "The Record" which is representative of our school and which we are making every effort to improve each year. An active sports program is conducted by Mr. Bennett every Saturday and after school whenever possible for sports in season.

SERVICES TO THE COMMUNITY

We are pleased to report that the tradition of cooperating with our community established in the school is reflected in many worthwhile activities and services.

The Mechanic Arts group, under the direction of Mr. Smith, has performed many services which have become practically a daily routine. The projects are too numerous to mention but a few outstanding ones include, the cleaning of a part of the Dells area, the building of four picnic tables and the building and erection of a sign placed at the entrance to the area. The department also contributed to the Remich Park recreational area by building the sections to the toboggan chute and assisting wherever possible.

Other departments have also contributed a great deal to our civic enterprises.

Report of the Elementary School Building Committee
February 8, 1952

To the Citizens of Littleton:

The contract for the construction of the new elementary school was awarded on September 28, 1950 to H. P. Cummings Construction Company of Woodsville, N. H., and Ware, Mass., for \$293,067.00. The architects for the work were Hudson & Ingram, architects and engineers, Hanover, New Hampshire.

The arrangements for the sale of bonds were made through Kidder, Peabody & Company, 115 Devonshire Street, Boston, Massachusetts. The \$318,000.00 bond sale was negotiated at an interest rate of $1\frac{7}{8}\%$ with premiums and accrued interest amounting to \$934.79. The bonds were issued through the First National Bank of Boston for a twenty-year period.

Ground was broken for the building early in October with the promise by the contractor that unless there were unforeseen delays, it would be completed by the following September. There were delays for various reasons. The major delay was caused by the inability of the court to clear title in a short time to the so-called Emery Houle property. When this obstacle was removed, work had to be curtailed in a few weeks due to winter weather conditions. Construction was resumed in the spring of 1951 and continued until January of this year. Except for site work and some rubbing down of outside concrete work, the building is completed and was occupied by classes on January 2, 1952.

The specifications of the building as finally contracted for include 11 classrooms averaging 36 feet long by 24

feet, 3 inches wide, a kindergarten room 40 feet long and 32 feet wide; a combination cafeteria, auditorium and gymnasium 60 feet long and 40 feet wide, with a stage 32 feet wide and 24 feet deep. Adjoining the auditorium is a modern kitchen 23 feet long and 18 feet wide. Also adjoining the auditorium is a storeroom and shower room. Included in the specifications is a teachers' room and health clinic and administrative offices.

The only excavation is for the boiler room. The building is modern in construction and is made up almost entirely of steel, cinder block and brick. Each classroom has a vision strip of clear glass for the entire length of the room, above which is directional glass block. Other features are asphalt tile floors except in the gang toilets which called for ceramic tile.

Each classroom has built-in cabinets and counter. Each also has a wash sink and drinking fountain. The kindergarten and first grade rooms have their own toilets simulating "home conditions." The walls are painted in pastel shades and the new furniture has a light natural finish. The heating equipment is excellent and has automatic control of temperature for each room. The artificial lighting is indirect incandescent.

The construction of the building has been carefully supervised by the architects and by Mr. Arthur Pennock who was appointed clerk of the works by the committee. The contractor has been cooperative and desirous of giving us a good building.

At the time of writing this report the committee is waiting for the installation of the curtain and cyclorama for the stage so that it can set a date for an open house so that the public may have an opportunity to visit the entire building.

The school has to date received a number of gifts and
