#### WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING

#### March 9, 1937

To the inhabitants of the Town of Madbury, County of Strafford and State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Madbury on Tuesday the ninth day of March, A. D., 1937, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- ART. 1. To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.
- ART. 2. To choose a Selectman for the ensuing three years.
  - ART. 3. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- ART. 4. To choose a Collector of Taxes for the ensuing year.
  - Art. 5. To choose two Auditors for the ensuing year.
- ART. 6. To choose a Trustee of Trust Funds for the ensuing three years.
  - Art. 7. To choose all other necessary town officers.
- ART. 8. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

- ART. 9. To see what action the Town will take on the question:—Is it expedient to revise the constitution?—Resolution adopted by the General Court.
- ART. 10. To see if the Town will appropriate \$535.30 for the construction of the Durham road provided the State does not grant House Joint Resolution, No. 83, which provides for the Town raising \$500.00 and the State \$1,500.00 for the construction of the Durham road.
- ART. 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$500.00 as provided in House Joint Resolution No. 83.
- ART. 12. To see if the Town will raise \$247.13 for Class V highways, the State will contribute \$988.50.
- ART. 13. To see if the Town will raise a sum of money, not exceeding \$100.00, for the purpose of constructing a water-hole near the residence of Mr. Wilcox—for the purpose of fire protection.
- ART. 14. To raise and appropriate for the issuance and distribution of printed matter calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the Town, in cooperation with other towns in the Seacoast Regional Development Association, the sum of \$30.00.
- ART. 15. To see what action the Town will take on the proposed budget for the current year.
- ART. 16. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

# REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS IN MADBURY, N. H.

TO THE SCHOOL BOARD AND CITIZENS OF MADBURY:

I take pleasure in presenting this, my eighth annual report.

The statistics given are for the year ending June 30, 1936 and the report of pupils perfect in attendance is published for the same period.

This year there has been one change in teachers. Mrs. Pearl Hale resigned and Miss Dorothy Bullard, a Plymouth Teachers College graduate of the three-year curriculum, was engaged. She is keeping up the high standard of work set by her predecessors. Miss Margaret Macdonald, R. N., continues as school nurse and has the cooperation of all. Both schools started the year "full to the doors" but both have had pupils move away so that now the attendance is slightly less than that of the past two years. Twenty-five at the Center School and twenty-three at the North School. The attendance record, as you will note from the statistics was very good last year and is continuing high this year. We have had no serious outbreaks of disease of any kind. Attendance of pupils at Dover High School has dropped from seventeen last year to eleven this vear.

Thanks are due to the Grange for the donation of electric lights and to Mr. Raymond Gerrish who installed them. The lights are appreciated, especially during that period of the year when the days are short.

Neither of the buildings should need extensive repairs next summer. At the North School new blackboards have been purchased but have not yet been installed. A water supply is needed at both schools. It is dangerous for the pupils to carry water from the neighboring houses, especially so at North Madbury, where the pupils walk on a hill on a much travelled state highway. I believe that a well could be driven in the yard of that school at very small expense. The water need not be piped to the building at this time. There is a good spring on private land near the Center School and there is a possibility of its being secured for a water supply. Neither school has any playground apparatus. I should like to supply swings and teeter boards.

Elsewhere in your Town Report I know there will appear an account of the passing of Miss Jennie DeMerritt but I cannot let this occasion pass without paying my tribute to an unusual woman. I have met many during my professional career but not one of them took more at heart the schools and young people of their town than did Miss DeMerritt. Always unruffled she rose to meet every occasion courageously and with an open mind. She always urged by precept and example anything which seemed to her to be for the betterment of the schools and town. I am glad that her picture hangs in the Center School as an inspiration to those who knew her and to be talked about by those who come after.

#### JENNIE MABELLE DEMERRITT

(1863-1936)

The sudden death of Madbury's most influential citizen became a sad realization on July 29, 1936.

Jennie M. DeMerritt was born June 2, 1863 the only daughter of Ezra Edric and Louisa (DeMerritt) DeMerritt the third generation to live in the homestead at "DeMerritt Corner" which was built by her paternal grandfather in 1820 on the site of the historic Tasker Garrison.

The DeMerritts at that time owned practically all of the land reaching from the East, South and West of Beech Hill through to Bellamy River at the North of Hicks Hill, a territory several miles long and wide. Since April 11, 1694 when Eli DeMeret took a Grant of land in this part of Ancient Dover, the DeMerritts have given evidence of the force, industry and integrity necessary to found and carry on a family which has scattered its branches throughout New England and other parts of the United States.

The men gave valuable military service to the country in the time of need and were active in important offices of State and County before 1755 the year in which Madbury was set off from Dover.

The Town has always been honored by the loyalty and strong personality of men and women of this family. Jennie DeMerritt maintained a keen interest in her forbears and their activities in the making of New Hampshire history. It was particularly fitting that this last descendant of the Seventh Generation in direct line from the immigrant should have died in the maternal homestead, "The Powder Major DeMerritt House" which her family had occupied for nearly 200 years, where at the same time there had lived three generations bearing military titles, two Major Johns and Captain Hopley, and where she

spent many happy childhood days with her beloved aunts and grandmother.

Jennie DeMerritt and her late brother Major John De-Merritt are the sixth and last generation of the maternal line buried in the cemetery on the first Grant of DeMerritt land. Miss DeMerritt attended the public schools, received private instruction and was graduated from Robinson Female Seminary of Exeter, in 1882. She was an assistant in the Boston Athenaeum Library from 1892-1901, and later from 1915-19 she was engaged in arranging the historical part of the same library. During her research work at the Athenaeum, which was a meeting place for scholars and book lovers in New England, she gave assistance to many writers of that time; among others, Oliver Wendell Holmes; the naturalist, John Burroughs; William Dean Howells and Julia Ward Howe. She also systematized several private libraries in and around Boston. She gave much assistance in research to her friend and kinswoman, the late Mary P. Thompson, the author of "The Landmarks of Ancient Dover, N. H." During the past few years she has outlined the History of Madbury and completed a few chapters. Some of her writings have been published and many manuscripts form valuable historical records. She had made a collection of photographs and facts about old houses in this vicinity and requested that they be placed in the Dover Library.

She was a member of the State Library Ass'n of New Hampshire; the New Hampshire Historical Society; the New England Wild Flower Preservation Society; an affiliated member of New Hampshire Daughters in Boston; the Boston Browning Society since 1894; Dover Woman's Club since 1904, President 1907 and 1908; Durham Woman's Club; New Hampshire Federation of Women's Clubs, vice-president 1909-13, President 1913-15; General Federation State Secretary 1915-17, Chairman Portsmouth District

1919-24; Chairman Republican Women in Madbury; member (charter) Daughters of Founders and Patriots in New Hampshire; the Northam Colonists; the Piscataqua Pioneers; Margery Sullivan Chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution of Dover, Vice Regent 1905-06, Historian 1915-17, Regent 1925-27, State Librarian 1923-25, during which time she promoted the establishment of a fund for the purchase of historical and genealogical books for the Continental Library in Washington. In June, 1929, a boulder with bronze tablet was dedicated at "Powder Major" homestead reading thus:

This tablet marks the site
of the Home of
MAJOR JOHN DEMERRITT
Revolutionary Patriot
Buried Nearby
He assisted in the Capture of
Fort William and Mary at New Castle 1774
Brought to the premises some Ammunition
Later used at Bunker Hill 1775
Erected by Margery Sullivan Chapter
Daughters of the American Revolution

During many years of service on the Madbury Board of Education, 1914-36, her active interest was a motivating force in the progress of the schools and civic improvement. She was always the children's friend and they were welcome at her home on "DeMerritt Corner" where the friendly door was ever ajar and her cheerful hospitality will remain for many a blessed memory. She was a member of the Unitarian Church and Women's Alliance; an affiliated member of the Community Church in Madbury, for which she and her brother contributed the land and thereafter actively participated in its promotion; her family had previously given the site for the Town Hall and its surroundings. In 1934 in memory of her brother, Major John DeMerritt, the

sixth John in direct descent, she gave to the town a tract of land to be used for recreational purposes and a library site to be known as the "DeMerritt Memorial Field." She had the foresight for needs, the insight to discover the factors involved, the ability to execute the plan determined upon and together with these attributes she had an understanding heart and the gift of genuine sympathy. Jennie De-Merritt was an American gentlewoman, an author of no little note; her love of poetry, her love of Nature and delight in books helped her to carry on her ideals; she possessed a vision combined with historical knowledge which enabled her to create six Pageants for the use of her town and state. The last one, "From Dawn to Sunset," she completed on the eye of her death. When this beautiful expression of her intellect and art was portraved one late afternoon in August at New Hampshire University it seemed as though her spirit descended upon us. Her splendid life of usefulness, her dependable counsel, her true support in unwavering friendship combined with a rare personality made her a woman whom the world knew and delighted to honor. Hers was a valiant spirit, emulating the militarism in her family, with faith and trust she walked to Life's shore and passed to the Great Beyond.

#### LILLIAN L. YOUNG

Born in Barrington, July 28, 1858, passed away in Madbury, May 23, 1936.

She was the daughter of the late Judge Jacob D. and Sarah C. (Twombly) Young, and came to Madbury with her parents, at the age of ten years, with whom she made her home during their lifetime, and later with her brother, Lewis H. Young, on the farm formerly owned by her maternal ancestors, where was located the Twombly Garrison. This farm was purchased by Miss Young's father in 1868 from one of the Twombly heirs and is now owned and occupied by her brother, Lewis H. Young.

Miss Young was educated in the public schools of Barrington and Madbury, Franklin Academy, Dover, and was graduated from the State Normal School at Plymouth, N. H., in 1876.

After graduating at Plymouth, she taught in the public schools of Madbury, and in the surrounding towns of Barrington, Lee, Rochester, and the Village school in Durham.

After ten years of strenuous work teaching, she retired to assist in the family cares of her home.

In 1909 Miss Young went to Rochester to care for her invalid sister, Esther S., who was the wife of A. I. Hall of Rochester, and remained as matron and housekeeper for Mr. Hall and his two daughters, for nearly twenty-five years.

To those who knew Miss Young, no eulogy is necessary. Her endearing disposition, kindness of heart, and unselfishness, are but a few of the outstanding qualities she possessed. Her greatest pleasure, through her entire life, was her devotion to others for their comfort and happiness.

The friendships she made were not transitory, but remained steadfast through life.

She disliked publicity, but it would seem fitting that some notice of her passing should be made in our Annual Reports, of one who had made her home in our community for nearly a lifetime.

Miss Young leaves two brothers, Edward L., and Lewis H. Young, and five nieces, and one nephew.

#### NEOMA V. DREW

Neoma V. Drew, wife of Greenleaf S. Drew, passed away very suddenly on the morning of October 16, 1936, at her home in Madbury, after an illness of several months, at the age of 74 years, 11 months, and 16 days.

She was born in Perryville, Mo., October 30, 1861, the daughter of Nicholas V. Miles and Philomene (Javeoux) Miles.

Her father enlisted in the Confederate Army when she was very young, and later moved his family to Mobile, Ala., where much of her early life was spent.

Her mother died when she was but five years old and her father was killed on the Mobile & Ohio R. R., a few years later.

After the death of her father, she returned to her native state of Missouri where she met Mr. Drew, and on October 28, 1884, they were married at Cape Girardeau, Mo.

Mr. Drew and his family left Missouri on July 21, 1896, and later came to New Hampshire to live, coming to Madbury on January 10, 1898, where they have resided ever since.

Mrs. Drew was the good and faithful mother of eight children one of whom died in infancy. Her greatest ambition in life was to make of her children, good, honorable citizens, and, in this effort, they hope she has not failed. She often said, "When I die, I want to go feeling that I have done my best."

Mrs. Drew was a member of the Barrington Congregational Church.

She is survived by her husband, seven children, twelve grandchildren, and one great-grandchild.

Funeral services were held at Barrington Congregational Church on Sunday, October 18, 1936, and burial was in the family lot in Pine Grove Cemetery in Barrington.

#### ORAH MARY LOCKE

Orah Mary Locke was born in Bradford, Massachusetts, February 23, 1863—the daughter of Edward C. Towle and Mary Isabell Van Dusee. She died in Madbury, April 14, 1936.

She was married to James I. Locke on September 10, 1892. She lived in Haverhill and was employed in the shoe industry. They moved to Madbury to the Locke homestead on March 20, 1927 and they remained on the farm to the time of her death. She leaves a husband, James I. Locke; one daughter, Ruth A. Regan of Hartford, Conn.; one son, Albert C. Locke of Los Angeles, Cal., and four grand-children.
