



#### REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BOARD

One of the most important matters a town has to deal with in the administration of its affairs is the education of its children. It should strive to improve the educational facilities of the pupils by way of competent teachers and modern equipment. This has been the aim of your school board.

For the last few years six schools have been maintained in town. This year a new school was opened in the Sanborn District, so-called. The question of opening this school was foreseen by your board last year and called to the attention of the school meeting and as the matter was left in the hands of the school board to exercise its judgment on the matter, it seemed to be the proper way to deal with the situation as this school is in a locality where there is every prospect of an increased attendance in years to come.

Normal school graduates have been employed as teachers in most instances. While this calls for a slightly higher salary per teacher the board felt that it was justified in view of the increased allowance by the State Board of Education in the budget over that which would be allowed for a teacher not holding a state certificate.

The canvass of the possible high-school pupils in town shows that it will be necessary to raise more for high school tuitions than was raised last year.

Because of a reorganization of the Supervisory Unions throughout the state by the State Board of Education, New Hampton has been taken out of the Supervisory Union to which it has belonged for a number of years and placed in the Supervisory Union with headquarters at Bristol. Mr. Freese has filled the position of School Superintendent and has given the school board a great deal of time and assistance in the discharge of their duties. We believe the change has worked to the advantage of New Hampton and there has been no increased cost because of the same.

The repairs during the past year have consisted of shingling the Plaisted schoolhouse and the installation of jacketed stoves at the Fiske schoolhouse and the Old Institution, together with new desks and a new chimney at the Old Institution schoolhouse.

Aside from minor repairs during the coming year we recommend the shingling of the south side of the Village schoolhouse and the alteration or remodelling of the shed in the Winona district in such a way as to accommodate the necessary supply of wood. We also recommend the installation of another jacketed stove either in the Hanaford or the Winona school.

As required by law we make the following estimate of amounts necessary to support the schools for the year beginning July 1st, 1927:

Statistics are at best dry reading. The per cent of attendance for 1925-26 is good; though lower than the previous year. A gain was made in the number of tardy marks in that there were less. The figures show a falling off in this particular instance. There are seventeen less than in the previous year. Clocks vary. The teacher should see to it that her watch runs accurately and the children should learn that the school begins and stops by her time.

A small gain was made in the time lost by "no school days." The average number of days lost per school the previous year was 4. In 1925-1926 the average lost per school was 3.2 days. This, it seems to me is of vital concern. The school year should be of thirty-six weeks duration. The law does not specify that there shall be

180 school days. However, in the interests of economy every effort should be made to keep the school open as many days as possible. Careful arrangement of the school calendar each year will tend to lessen the number of days lost.

The figures tabulated also show that a spirit of cooperation exists between the homes and the schools. The school district is to be congratulated upon this fact.

#### YEAR 1926-27

This fact of the report deals with the current year beginning July 1, 1926.

#### One Additional School

It became necessary to open the Sanborn school although this was not done until after the school year started. At present there are nine pupils enrolled. Most of these are in the first two grades. A normal school graduate is in charge of this school. There is every prospect that the enrollment will be larger next year. The building is in a fair state of repair. It does not come up to the standard of a New Hampshire schoolhouse and alterations will have to be made if the school continues to be kept open. I do not recommend that anything be done to it next year.
