- 5. To see if the Town will vote to pay members of the Fire Department \$72.00 in addition to that required by law.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to accept the budget as submitted by the Budget Committee.
- 7. To see if the Town will empower the Selectmen to purchase a station wagon as a Police cruiser and appropriate a sum of \$2,100.00 for said purchase. Approved by Budget Committee.
- 8. To see if the Town will petition the Selectmen to accept, plow and tar the extension of Ham St. (Petition).
- 9. To see if the Town will install a street light at Maplecrest in the vicinity of the Zocchi residence. (Petition). Approved by Budget Committee.
- 10. To see if the Town will authorize the purchase of that part of the #8 Mill lot now being used for public parking, so as to have a public parking lot owned by the Town and to authorize the Selectmen to float a bond or long term notes, in the amount of \$6,000.00 for the above purchase and expenses for same. Approved by Budget Committee.
- 11. To see if the Town of Newmarket will vote to extend the present rubbish collection to include New Road to the point of the private way at the extreme end of Kustra's property and appropriate said sums of money necessary. (Petition). Approved by Budget Committee.
- 12. To see if the Town of Newmarket will vote to authorize the Selectmen to have installed another street light on New Road near the property of Don-

ald Howcroft. (Petition). Approved by Budget Committee.

- 13. To see if the Town will install a sewer line, beginning at the manhole opposite the John Edgerly residence on Exeter St., thence running southerly to a point opposite the residence of L. Boisvert and appropriate the sum of \$6,000.00 for installing above sewer. Not approved by Budget Committee.
- 14. To see if the Town of Newmarket will vote to retire Police Chief Andrew Gordon on half salary.

### A Progress Report from the Office of the Selectmen

We wish to report that the bridge in Durham Side and the approaches have been finished to the Eagles Hall as we had anticipated.

In this matter of approaches we feel that a sidewalk starting from the Five and Ten Cent store and completely circling the #8 Mill Lot to Central St. should be installed. This section has a considerable amount of traffic and with the new building of the Rockingham Shoe we can expect more use of this section.

It is our plan to use our T.R.A. money to finish the Ball Hill Road this year. The following year the New Road will be started. The reason why we have delayed on this road is because it is going to be more expensive and we felt that once we started we wanted to finish the entire road before going to another.

We are honestly soliciting your help and it must be in the form of additional money to rectify one of our saddest conditions.

### OUR PUBLIC BUILDINGS

The Public Library is of major concern. The Town has here a building that can become very valuable to it. The Trustees have worked out a plan for repairing and decorating the Library.

The Town Hall is the other building in mind. This has been a thorn in the Towns side for a long time. The plan we have worked out is to start in the cellar and make use of wasted space. First of all, adequate public toilet facilities, then the Police and Jail, a fire resistant room for old Town records that should have some protection and a room which can be used as a Court Room.

All of this work is to be of a permanent nature, concrete blocks, tile and cement.

In both of these buildings the plan is to do a certain amount each year, in this way there will be no great burden to anyone or extra money wasted by the payment of interest.

Another major concern to the Town is a public parking lot. It is absolutely necessary that the Town have the #8 Mill Lot. If this lot should fall in the hands of others and the lot is restricted, the consequences are going to be dear to the Town and trouble-some.

The purchase of this should be entered into with a clear mind and with no prejudice. The Town has failed to purchase one parking lot and all we have heard since that time is that it was an error!

We as Selectmen are recommending to you that the Town purchase this parking lot.

Financially speaking this year, the Town's Balance Sheet slipped from a surplus of \$2,323.32 to a net debt of \$23,921.32. The only reason for this was the floating of \$30,000.00 of serial notes for the New Bridge and the Water Works improvements. This is not a serious condition as the \$30,000.00 is to be paid within a seven year period.

We repeat that we are still open to constructive criticisms. Our regular Selectmen meetings are held the 1st and 3rd Tuesdays of each month and they are open to all. If you have a problem bring it in to us for consideration.

### Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of an examination and audit of the accounts of the Town of Newmarket for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1955, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the Town. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

### SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Public Library, Water and Sewer Departments.

### FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balance Sheets — December 31, 1954—December 31, 1955

### (Exhibit A)

Comparative Balance Sheets for the fiscal years ended December 31, 1954 and December 31, 1955, are presented in Exhibit A. As indicated therein the financial condition of the Town changed from a Surplus of \$2,323.32 to a Net Debt of \$23,921.32 during 1955.

### Analysis of Change in Financial Condition:

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures—Estimated and Actual Revenues:

### (Exhibits C & D)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1955, are presented in Exhibits C and D. As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit D) a net revenue surplus of \$4,116.52, less a net overdraft of appropriations of \$82.68, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$4,033.84.

### Summary of Receipts and Expenditures:

### (Exhibit E)

A summary of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1955, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is presented in Exhibit E. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of December 31, 1955, is indicated in Exhibit F.

### AUDIT PROCEDURE

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source insofar as possible and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements obtained from depository banks.

### GENERAL COMMENTS

### Current Surplus:

The current surplus (excess of total assets over current liabilities) increased from \$16,528.32 to \$18,-283.68 during 1955, as shown by the following statement:

### Note and Bond Register:

The Town Treasurer should adopt the use of the standard form of note and bond register for the purpose of maintaining a permanent record of notes, bonds and coupons.

### Town Treasurer's Surety Bond:

It is noted that the Town Treasurer's surety bond is written in the amount of \$5,000.00. Inasmuch as this official is responsible for the receipt and expenditure of more than \$300,000.00 annually, it is recommended that the surety bond be increased to \$20,000.00 in order that it may be more comensurate in amount to the funds handled.

### Conclusion:

The provisions of Chapter 184 of the Laws of 1955 require that this report or the summary of findings and recommendations (letter of transmittal) shall be published in the next annual report of the Town.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Town of Newmarket for their assistance during the course of the audit.



### Superintendent's Report

It is with pleasure that I submit my first annual report to you.

The Stone School under the supervision of Mrs. Ruth Robie in grade five, and Mr. Ralph Kelley in grade six, has done remarkably well in carrying out the objectives of education. Stress has been placed on the 3 R's with a carry-over into the social studies in order to educate the whole child.

More playground area is desirable at the Stone School. This is a problem which will solve itself with an increased enrollment.

The Central School with Mrs. Lillian Witherell, Mrs. Frances Nesbitt, Mrs. Mildred Rooney and Mr. George Rand, teachers of grades one, two, three and four, respectively, has educationally carried out a successful program. Emphasis was placed on each child to work to the best of his inherent ability.

A new and most effective plan has been developed this year in reporting to parents the progress of pupils in grades one and two. The tendency is away from the old-fashioned report card, which reported only such facts as the pupil's scholaristic conduct and attendance, and toward a more comprehensive report form containing information on the pupil's habits and character traits. This newer type of reporting, which is characterized by attempts at providing more and more information on the pupil are much more time consuming than the former type; however, the teachers and I have agreed that they are worth the extra time and energy. Favorable comment from parents has indicated its need.

It is my hope in the near future that penmanship

may be taught in the elementary grades. Improvement in the handwriting of the children is definitely desired.

Mr. John Scanlan, Guidance Director, was replaced by Mrs. Eugenia Livingston. Her duties have consisted of testing and counselling.

Newmarket High School has received an above average rating-score on the tests given by the University of New Hampshire. Much credit is due the students, Mr. Rexford Avery, and the staff.

From evaluating the educational functions within the school, there are evidences which support the conclusion that the aims of the learning activities are understood by the students. Also, there are evidences that the techniques employed by the teachers allow for self-discipline, with resultant growth characteristic of self-control.

Many thanks to the school board members for giving so generously of their time and energy in preparing a well proportioned budget — a budget that will provide for the educational needs of the pupils and teachers, as well as taking into consideration the financial ability of the citizens.

### Principal's Annual Report

To the School Board and Citizens of Newmarket:

It is with pleasure I am able once again to submit this annual report to you.

In view of the increasing interest in education in this state as well as the nation as a whole, which has been manifested by the New Hampshire "Grass Roots" conference, and the nation wide White House Conference, my annual report to you will be somewhat different than in previous years.

The American High School has many functions, all of which are designed, of course, to help our youngsters become better citizens, be more secure in their work, and to live a more meaningful life.

Unfortunately, however, our product cannot be evaluated upon graduation for only after several years of work and study and living with others in our society, can full maturity be realized. Statistics show that by far, the greater majority of our graduates become good citizens, good workers, good parents, and assets of the community in which they live.

Our system of education has been and is under fire for certain inadequacies which do indeed exist. We, in education, realize our shortcomings and are constantly striving to eliminate the bad and acquire the good. The question at hand, however, is simple yet pertinent to you and the people of Newmarket. Are we doing all we can for our youth and is the program which we have giving you sufficient return on your investment?

Are we doing all we can for our youth? The obvious answer is no we are not—for we always can do more. How much more depends, naturally, on the amount of money spent. Are you getting your money's worth as indicated by our present school program? The answer to this question is not simple—

it cannot be answered in a few words—and there will be as many opinions, almost, as there are people who try to answer it by intelligent thinking. If, over the past several years the greater majority of our graduates have become good citizens and good members of the community in which they live, have been good workers, have brought up their children to be good citizens, then, I believe that the answer must be yes—we are getting our money's worth. If, on the other hand our graduates have not been successful in life, then the answer must be no.

We do not, however, have to wait for years before we can tell just how effective our program is—for we can measure achievement in several areas through our scientific testing program. We test and examine all pupils so that we can guide them into proper study areas and do our best to see to it that they get what is best for them. The results of these tests show many things. For example, in a recent state-wide testing program on the reading ability of last year's sophomore class, it was found that this group were average readers and doing all that could be expected of them in relation to their general overall intelligence. These pupils are working up to full capacity in their reading. Surely, this does indicate that this group learned as it was supposed to.

Every year we give the University of New Hampshire battery test to pupils in grades 8, 10, and 12. These tests are used for the basis of subject selection, vocational and educational guidance, (job placement and post secondary school work). After three different tests we get a fairly accurate indication of a pupil's ability in several areas of work. The results vary, some do very well, others quite poorly. These tests, however, enable us to build an educational program for the individual and keep our curriculum ever up to date—to fit the needs of this community.

These tests also point out a basic fault in our educational system wherein we advance pupils by grades. For example, it is not unusual for a pupil in grade 8 to have the reading ability of a second year high school pupil or to have the ability of a sixth grade pupil, the spread may be even larger. What a problem this variation in the subject poses. We cannot teach down to the poorer readers—we go too fast if we work with the superior readers—so we work with the largest or average group for the most part, trying, of course, to handle the fast and slow ones to the best of our ability.

Each year we test all math and advance science classes in the school for pupil achievement, and for the most part we measure up to or beyond national standards indicating we are achieving results equal to and in many cases better than average.

In short we have a school, I believe, that is doing a good job, a functional school that is geared to the needs of the community, and a school which is giving the town its money's worth.

In view of the current mathematics and science controversy and in order to inform you of our offerings, I am listing the subjects offered in Newmarket High School by work and study areas.

Likewise, I believe, that we have the teachers and offer a good variety of subjects so that a pupil who wants to learn will learn. Of course, we have those pupils who do no more than sip at our fountain of knowledge, just getting enough to get by.

Responsibility for learning rests with the schools—desire for learning comes from the home and the community. These forces working together can bring out the best in our youngsters.

I believe we are working together—but are we working hard enough—the home, the community, and the teachers? The answers to these questions must come from you.

Once again, I wish to thank all who make working in Newmarket a pleasant task and not a chore. As always cooperation must exist in all areas before success can be achieved—cooperation is ever with us, and in my opinion, we are achieving our share of success educationally.

## Town Music Report

## High School:

The music program in the high school is much the same as last year. The quality of performance is showing definite improvement however. We have been fortunate to have some outstanding voices this year and this coupled with music of better quality has helped our performances a great deal. Some of these pupils have been united together in the formation of a new singing group called the Concert Choir. This group will perform the most difficult type of vocal music. The Glee Club, both Boys' and Girls', have been combined into one mixed singing group. Now that there are many boys interested in singing it is possible to have a well balanced harmonious group. At this writing the Glee Club and the Concert Choir have appeared at several assemblies and at occasions outside of school. It is planned to have them appear at a Spring Concert during the month of May, Working with groups such as these mentioned is both a pleasurable and gratifying experience.

## Junior High School:

With the addition of one period per week for music instruction it is much easier to teach vocal music and music appreciation properly. One class a week is devoted to music listening and theory. A number of excellent record collections and books for instruction have been purchased. The response of the students has shown a marked improvement in the past year. Grade seven has been gifted with some changed voices. This makes the vocal music much more interesting and entertaining to them as they are able to sing music arranged for soprano, alto and bass. It is planned to have some of the students of the Junior High School perform in the Spring Concert.

## Elementary:

Now that we have acquired a piano for each and every classroom in the elementary schools, the singing instruction has been made very effective. Two part music has been attempted with success in grade three. Some three part work has been done in grade five and six. The tonal quality of the children's voices has improved a great deal in the past two years. Piano accompaniment is a great aid in coaching children for intonation and interpretation. There is some music appreciation instruction in grades three through six, with more time spent in this department in the upper grades.

## Guidance Director's Report

To the Superintendent of Schools, Members of the School Board, and Citizens of Newmarket:

The opportunity to present the guidance program for the year 1955-56 is welcome, as it is only with the understanding, support, and help of the administrators and teachers of the school, and the parents and pupils of Newmarket that the program can be successful.

The present individual record folders for each pupil will continue to be maintained at the school. A new form of individual pupil cumulative record folder will be considered and decided upon with the aid of the teachers. This record will help meet the felt need for a complete and efficient cumulative record

of the pupil's physical, mental, and personal progress. The records are available to the teachers at all times; they assist them to better understand and guide each pupil. These records follow the pupil throughout his school career.

The counseling and testing of individual pupils is being continued and expanded as much as the scheduled time permits. Counseling and individual testing are essential phases of guidance because they help determine: the pupil's capacity to do school work, the cause for behavior problems, the reasons for lack of interest in school work, and other educational, vocational, and personal matters that prevent a pupil from making a normal progress at school.

Mr. George Rand and Mr. Ralph Kellev assisted greatly by administering the battery of tests to the fourth and sixth grade pupils. Mr. Rexford Avery, assisted by members of his staff, administered the tests to students in grades eight, ten, and twelve. The following battery of tests was administered to the fourth and sixth grade pupils: reading, arithmetic, language, and mental maturity. Pupils in the eighth, tenth, and twelfth grades were tested in mental maturity, reading, clerical speed and accuracy aptitude, mechanical aptitude; and an interest inventory was taken. The results of the batteries of tests administered in the fall will be discussed with the pupils of grade four, six, eight, ten, and twelve. Each pupil will have an opportunity to study his own record in order to learn his strengths and weaknesses and where he may advance.

Individual interviews will be scheduled with the pupils of the eighth grade; the parents of each pupil will be welcome at the time of the interview to discuss the significance of the test results, and to assist in planning the courses for high school, which will lead to a happy and successful career. Parents of

each grade twelve student will also be invited during the interview to discuss test results and assist in planning the student's career following his graduation from high school.

Vocational talks by specialists in their respective fields were given to students from the eighth to the twelfth grade inclusive, to stimulate the students' thinking about their future life's work. The talks were started in January and continued at the rate of one or more a month. The vocations discussed by the speakers are those in which there is a great shortage of personnel in New Hampshire.

Occupational information was also provided for the high school students through occupational briefs, posters, and booklets. These were posted on the bulletin board in the hall, and changed weekly. It is quite apparent that student interest has been aroused.

Assembling of an occupational information file has been started at the high school. The content of this file provides descriptive information about occupations, the nature of the work, working conditions, and occupational relationships. Young people need this information if there is to be intelligent career planning.

Early in the New Year, plans were made for teachers' guidance meetings to be held at Newmarket High School, and Central and Stone Schools. These meetings were held each month at the secondary and elementary schools. Questionnaires were provided to all teachers to ascertain their interests in guidance. As a result of the answers to the questionnaires, the content of each meeting was designed to meet the expressed needs and interests of the teachers in the field of guidance. The meetings should help the teachers attain a broader view of guidance, assist them in the daily problems at school, and to provide more mean-

ingful instruction through a better understanding of the pupils and their capabilities.

We had very little contagious diseases in schools this year. Our largest epidemic was chicken pox and virus.

Pre-school clinics were held in May and June at St. Mary's School and Central School. Sixty children attended. Dr. Irving Brown, attending physician, gave examinations to all the children.

I am again asking you to have your children vaccinated early and by June first if possible. All children must be vaccinated before starting school September 1, 1956, or a written excuse from your doctor. This is a State Law.

If your child had shots for Diptheria, Whooping Cough, and Tetanus when very young, see your doctor about "booster shots" before your child enters school.

### Chest Clinic

All children in high school had Chest X-Rays at the Mobile Chest Clinic in November. No reports of bad chest conditions were received.

### Dental Clinic

The Dental Clinic is held every Tuesday at the offices of Dr. Getchell and Dr. Robshaw. The Dental Clinic is sponsored and transportation furnished by the P.T.A.

33 Children in grades 4 at Central and St. Mary's school had examinations, X-Rays and dental work done by Dr. Getchell.

We find that those who attend the Dental Clinic are taking good care of their teeth and going to the dentist has been a great benefit to them. It is very gratifying to see good oral hygiene and dental work in the lower grades. This shows good cooperation between children and parents, and means so much toward a child's better health.

Polio Clinics were held in May and October at Exeter. 105 children had the two polio shots. We expect that clinics will be held in early spring for all children ages one through fourteen; and that they will be at the new gymnasium in Newmarket.

Hot Lunch Program Sponsored by P.T.A.

300 to 315 children are eating well-balanced hot meals, prepared by Mrs. Mildred Jones, who is doing a good job in such small working quarters. Hot meals are served at St. Mary's school by Mrs. Beatrice Geoffrian and her helpers.

Parents have cooperated better this year in helping at Hot Lunch. We do need more parents to give a helping hand to a good cause.

Thanks again to the School Board, P.T.A., Teachers, Sisters at St. Mary's School, Dr. Brown, Dr. Getchell, Dr. Robshaw, Parents, and many others.
