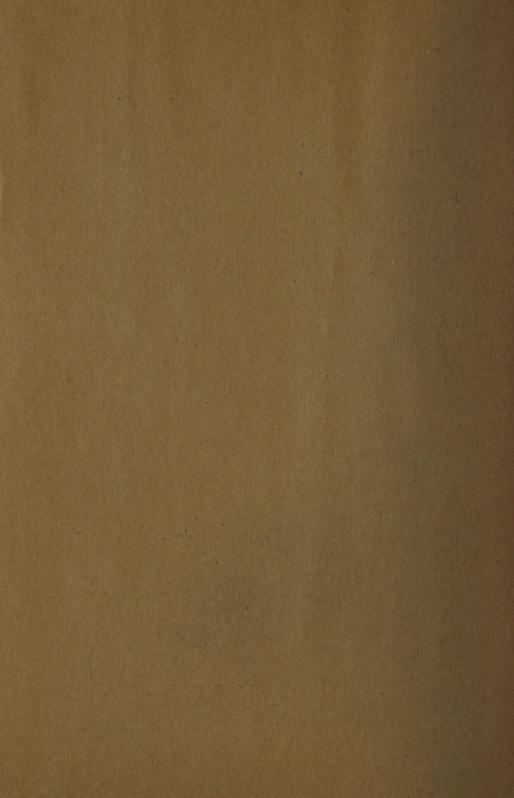

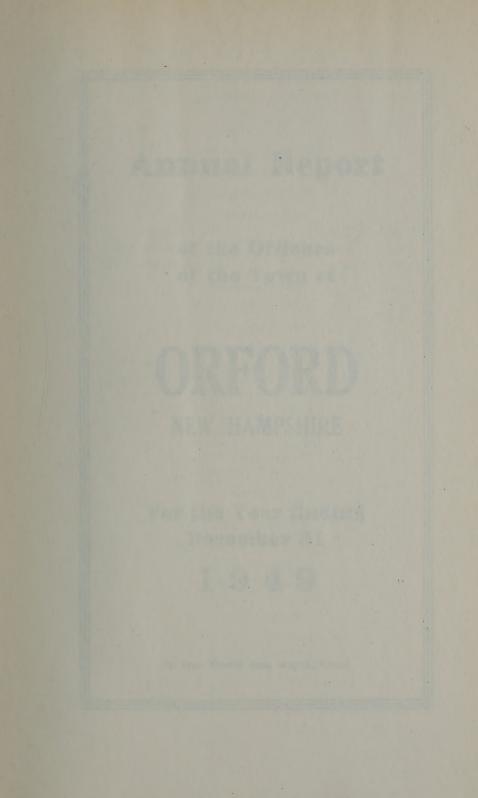

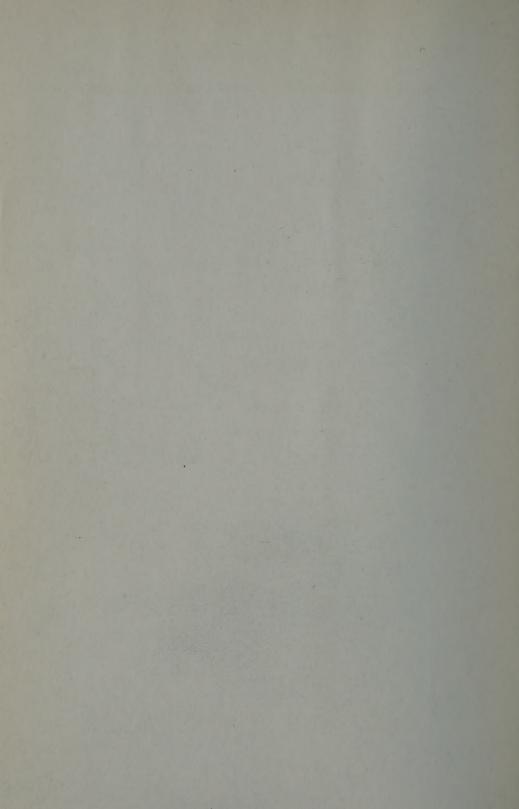

TOWN WARRANT

State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Orford in the County of Grafton, in said State qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Orford on Tuesday, the 14th day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon to act on the following subjects:

First to adjourn for two hours to act on School District Meeting.

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year. Also to choose one Selectman, one Trustee of Trust Funds, and two Library Trustees.
- 2. To hear the Budget of the Town and to raise and appropriate any money recommended therein or to pass any vote relative thereto.
- 3. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year.
- 4. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of Town highways and bridges for the ensuing year.
- 5. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the removal of snow and care of Town winter roads for the ensuing year.
- 6. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to insure Town property.
- 7. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the use of Electric Lights.
- 8. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the use of Orford Free Library and for Orford Social Library.

- 9. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of Taxes.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to dispense with the distribution of inventory blanks until the Selectmen appraise the property.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to sell and convey any property acquired by tax deed.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not exceeding one one-hundredth of 1% (1/100 of 1%) of the assessed valuation based on assessment of 1948 for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the Town, together with other towns in the Dartmouth Lake Sunapee Region.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid for construction of Class V roads and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$468.05 for that purpose.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the improvement of West Cemetery.
- 15. To see how much the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the use of the Fire Department.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the highway, subject to gates and bars, from the foot of Blackberry Hill so-called to the highway leading from the Miller bridge to Archer Town and known as the Samuel Cutting road.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue that part of the highway that is in the Town of Orford and known as the Whipple road.
- 18. To see if the provisions of Chapter 171-A of the Revised Laws relative to playing games of beano shall be adopted in this Town.
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,200.00 for building a new bridge across the Archer Town brook.

- 20. To see if the townspeople of Orford are in favor of removing the War Memorial now in the triangle in Orford to a suitable place on the Mall, the location to be decided by the people.
- 21. To see how much money the Town will raise and appropriate for an Honor Roll for World War II Veterans, the location to be decided by the people.
- 22. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, and Committees heretofore chosen, and to pass any vote relating thereto, and to transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of an audit and examination of the accounts of the Town of Orford which was made by this Division, acting under authority of Chapter 82, Section 27, of the Revised Laws of New Hampshire, which provides in part as follows:

"Audit on Motion of Commission. The commission may cause an audit to be made of the accounts of any city, town, school district, village district or precinct, as often as once in two years, or whenever conditions appear to it to warrant such audit.

This audit covered the fiscal year ended December 31, 1948, and the period from January 1st to November 8th, 1949. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report which is made up in three sections as follows:

Section I—Fiscal Year Ended December 31, 1948.

Section II—Period January 1st to November 8th, 1949.

Section III—Statistical Tables Covering Ten Year Period.

Scope of Audit

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Road Agent and Trustees of Trust Funds.

Financial Statements

Comparative Balance Sheets — Dec. 31, 1947 — Dec. 31, 1948: (Exhibit A)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1947 and December 31, 1948, are presented in Exhibit A. As indicated therin the Surplus increased by \$2,583.54 during the year 1948.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit B)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the town during the year is made in Exhibit B, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These were as follows:

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures — Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits C and D)

Comparative statements of appropriation and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1948, are presented in Exhibits C and D. As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit D), a net revenue surplus of \$831.77, plus a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$1,686.37, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$2,518.14.

Summary of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit E)

A summary of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1948, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit E. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of November 8, 1949, is indicated in Exhibit L.

Audit Procedure

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source insofar as possible and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements obtained from depositary banks.

General Comments

Town Charges:

It has been the custom in Orford to make one lump sum appropriation for so-called "town charges," covering a dozen or so separate items for which expenditures are made. These include town officers' salaries, town officers' expenses, election and registration, town hall expense, old age assistance, town poor, etc.

It is recommended that in the future each such item be listed separately in the town budget and that the town meeting likewise make a separate appropriation for each. This makes it possible to make a comparison between individual appropriations and expenditures which cannot be done under the existing procedure of combining several appropriations under the general classification of "town charges".

Incomplete Records:

At the time of the audit, November 8, 1949, no book record of vouchers issued by the Board of Selectmen had been made for the current fiscal year. Entries of vouchers should be kept up to date at all times by the Selectmen. When this is done comparison between appropriation and expenditures may be made from time to time. This serves as a means of preventing overdrafts of appropriations which often occur as the result of the lack of proper information.

It is also recommended that the use of the Class A loose leaf Selectmen's Receipts and Payments Book be adopted in place of the Class B book now in use. The

Class A book provides for a more complete classification of receipts and expenditures than is possible in the other book.

Town Clerk:

Summaries of the Town Clerk's motor vehicle permit and dog license accounts for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1948 and the period from January 1 to November 8, 1949, are presented in Exhibits I and P, respectively. It was noted that the provisions of Chapter 116, Section 22, of the Revised Laws, relative to monthly remittances to the Treasurer of all motor vehicle permit funds, have not been complied with. This section provides as follows:

"Each designated city official and town clerk shall keep an account of the money received by him for said (motor vehicle) permits and deposit the same in the city or town treasury on the last Saturday of each month, to be used for the general purposes of the city or town. Failure to deposit shall be cause for immediate removal from office. xxxx"

The fact that the offices of Town Clerk and Town Treasurer are held by the same official does not affect the application of the provision of this law.

Town Treasurer:

The Town Treasurer issues separate checks in payment of orders drawn by the Selectmen. This is not necessary as countersigning of these orders by the Treasurer would convert such orders into negotiable checks. This recommended procedure has the added advantage wherby the Selectmen's vouchers and Treasurer's order-checks bear the same numerical sequence.

Tax Collector:

The use of the standard form of loose leaf columnar cash book by the Tax Collector is recommended. This record provides for the segregation by years of levy of tax collections, redemptions from tax sales and interest.

It is also recommended that the Collector adopt the use of the regular tax sale record book. Partial payments received on account of redemptions from tax sales should be remitted to the Treasurer by the Collector currently rather than retained until redemptions have been made in full as is the present practise.

Uncollected and Unredeemed Taxes:

Exhibit N indicates that, as of November 8, 1949. there were uncollected taxes on the Collector's warrants going back as far as the levy of 1940. These lists should be carefully gone over by the Selectmen and Collector and taxes which appear to be uncollectible should be abated.

Tax deeds should be given to the Town by the Collector in cases where more than two years has elapsed since the date of the original tax sale and no redemption has been made therefrom.

Conclusion:

The provisions of Section 31, Chapter 211, of the Laws of 1939, require that this report or a summary of its essential features shall be published in the next annual town report. This letter of transmittal should be included in its entirely but the inclusion of Exhibits is optional.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Town of Orford for their assistance during the course of the audit.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Orford:

I hereby submit my second annual report as your

superintendent of schools.

The item of greatest interest and most concern to the people of Orford at the present time is the problem regarding the high school. As this is quite completely covered in another printed report I will proceed to other matters.

You have good schools in Orford, primarily due, I think, to the excellent spirit and attitude which is shown by pupils, teachers, and parents. In times such as these, when it is so very difficult to obtain good elementary teachers, because of the very short supply, we are indeed fortunate to have capable, interested and successful teachers. After all, they form the heart of any school system. Our one difficulty in this respect seems to be the possibility of large classes. It is generally believed to-day that no teacher should have more than 30 pupils in a class.

Repairs

For many years the outside woodwork at the Street School has been in a deplorable state. Last summer this was all repainted with the exception of the cupola. A protecting cover was added to the Orfordville fire escape to keep off ice and snow. New chairs and desks were added for the 7th and 8th grade room. The entrance to the lunch room at Orford Street was remade to allow for easier entrance and exit. A few replacement curtains were added at the Street School.

The home economics class completely redecorated their room for only the cost of paint. This cost was defrayed by selling an old oil stove and hot water tank. Through special arrangements with one of the large companies, a new electric range and refrigerator were installed at a very moderate cost. These will be replaced with new ones each year at no charge. These improvements have resulted in a marked increase in enrollment in home economics classes.

Due to the age of the school building, many repairs are constantly needed. Some of the more pressing needs are a cover for the fire escape at the Street School,

inside painting of the rooms, improved lighting, and new desks and chairs.

Miscellaneous

Our former school nurse, Miss Underhill, died last spring. She was a district nurse serving many schools in the Woodsville area. When they hired a new nurse this fall, Miss Latulippe, we also engaged her to act as school nurse for the Orford schools. She tries to call regularly on Fridays and at other times by special request.

The hot lunch programs in Orford are some of the best in my union. This is especially true when we consider the very moderate charge that is made. I am

pleased that so many pupils participate.

The state dental trailer was due to call at Orford this fall to examine, clean and give fluorine treament to all the children's teeth. Just before it was scheduled to come, the dental hygienist resigned and the department has had insufficient funds to hire a new one. Orford is the next school on the list when the new dental hygienist is engaged. The only cost for this service will be her board and room.

I want to take this opportunity to mention the outstanding work of the Orford P. T. A. It has been a real pleasure to see the large crowds in attendance at the meetings and observe the enthusiasm with which both

the leaders and the members have worked.

The reduction in state aid was a serious blow to Orford. When the legislature reduced the allotment for State Aid from \$2,000,000.00 to \$400,000 it caused the allotment for this purpose in Orford to be reduced from \$6,905.72 to 2,558.59 This loss of over \$4,000.00 had a serious effect on the tax rate in a small town like Orford.

I can truthfully say that I enjoy working in Orford for the Orford Schools. People are friendly, children are happy and there is good cooperation and understanding between the teachers and the home. May I take this opportunity to thank all those who have assisted us in developing and maintaining good schools in Orford.

REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON ORFORD HIGH SCHOOL

In August 1927 a simple contract was drawn up between Plymouth Teachers College and the Orford School District by which Plymouth Teachers College would provide instruction, schoolroom supplies and school furniture and Orford would provide a school building, light, heat and janitor service. For this arrangement Orford would pay a tuition rate of \$85.00.

As the years progressed it became necessary to enlarge the present building and include additional subjects. To provide for this, a new and more complicated contract was drawn up in July 1938. Under the terms of this contract Plymouth Teachers College would pay the notes (amounting to \$1,125.00 per year) if the enrollment remained above 70 pupils. If it fell below 70 pupils the refund of \$1,125.00 would be prorated, if necessary.

In April 1947 the Director of Student Teaching at Plymouth Teachers College made a lengthy report to the President on the situation at Orford High School and recommended that the contract be terminated because it was believed that student teaching could be carried on better by other means. Furthermore, evidence was produced to show that it was a costly venture for Ply-

mouth Teachers College.

As a result of this report and several conferences, a new contract was drawn up in July 1947, the main change in which was the fact that Orford would now pay tuition at the rate determined by the average cost of high school instruction in the state rather than the old rate of \$85.00. These rates proved to be \$138.89 in 1947-48, \$158.74 in 1948-49, and \$181.02 in 1949-50.

A growing resentment to this increased rate, and the necessity of paying the note, was apparent in Orford. As a result, Superintendent Mason held a conference with President Jones in August 1948 in an attempt to revamp the conditions of the contract. This led to two further conferences with Commissioner Buley in October and February. It became increasingly evident that Plymouth Teachers College did not wish to make any changes in the contract and, in fact, preferred

to sever its connections by paying up the note in full.

As a result of this knowledge Mr. F. Fairfield Mc-Cann made the following motion at the March meeting of the Orford School District which was unanimously adopted. Voted "The School Board and the School Superintendent appoint a committee of three or five members to assist them in obtaining information relative to the various possibilities for the continuation of a High School, in the event that Plymouth Teachers College should terminate their contract with the Orford School Board. This committee to make a complete report at the next annual School District meeting."

Within a very few days after the annual School District meeting, and before the special committee was appointed, word was received from Plymouth Teachers College that they wished to sever their contract as of June 30, 1949. This would have left no time for planning or reporting back to the voters. An urgent appeal was made by our Superintendent of Schools to the State Board of Education, through the Commissioner, that the contract be continued until June 30, 1950, giving everyone concerned at Orford ample time to consider all angles of the situation. This resulted in a final meeting at Orford between the President of Plymouth Teachers College, the Commissioner of Education, the Orford School Board and the Superintendent of Schools. At this meeting it was agreed that Plymouth Teachers College would continue its contract through June 30. 1950 and pay up all the outstanding note (except the one due in June 1950) previous to July 1, 1949.

The Advisory Committee met with the School board several times in the spring to discuss a plan of action and determine ways and means of gathering information about the possibilities ahead of us and the wishes of the people in regard to these possibilities. No meetings were held during the summer months.

With the resumption of school in the fall your committee and the School Board began meeting in earnest. The result of these meetings and discussions seemed to indicate the following alternatives open to Orford.

1. To continue the operation of Orford High School by the the Orford School District with five teachers (4 teachers and a headmaster).

- 2. To continue the operation of Orford High School by the Orford School District with four teachers (3 teachers and a headmaster).
 - 3. Join a cooperative school district.
- 4. Allow Orford pupils to attend any high school paying only their tuition.
- 5. Require Orford pupils to attend one specified high school, paying only tuition.
- 6. Require Orford pupils to attend any of several nearby high schools paying tuition and transportation.
- 7. Require Orford pupils to attend a particular high school paying tuition and transportation.

Your committee considered very carefully all of these possibilities and finally decided to eliminate all except numbers 1 and 7. The reasons numbers 2 through 6 were eliminatedwere as follows: Four teachers would have been unable to teach all the desired courses at the high school; there was little likelihood that a cooperative school district would be formed for some years to come; if Orford pupils had to attend outside high schools, it seems only fair to pay their transportation as well as tuition; transportation could be economically arranged only by sending them to one high school, this outside school was obviously Thetford Academy because it was near, offered the desired courses, had room for extra pupils, and was reasonable in tuition.

Concentrating on these two possibilities (numbers 1 and 7) a complete estimated budget was prepared for both showing the net cost to the town under each program. This estimate indicated the following approximate school costs for 1950-51.

If, as is quite likely, a larger number of tuition pupils come to Orford in future years, this figure for estimated receipts would be increased and thereby reduce the net to be raised by taxation.

Your committee's next problem was to (1) present the results of their findings to the voters of Orford and (2) to obtain the opinion of the voters regarding these findings. With these problems in mind a mass meeting was called on Friday evening October 28, 1949 at the Orford Town Hall and a questionnaire covering certain pertinent questions was sent to all the voters on the check list.

At the meeting held in the Town Hall a complete, printed, itemized, budget was presented to the hundred or more people present, showing in detail the costs and receipts under each of the two programs. All questions were answered as completely as possible. No formal vote was taken but it was quite obvious that the overwhelming majority of those present preferred to continue the operation of Orford High School by the Orford School District.

The questionnaire was prepared by your committee and duplicated and distributed by the commercial students at Orford High School on Tuesday November 29, 1949. The results of this questionnaire were tabulated by Mr. Becton and are listed below. One hundred seventy-seven questionnaires were returned.

1. Do you believe that every child capable of profiting by it, is entitled to a high school education?

This resulted in a final recommendation that Orford High School be continued by the Orford School District with five teachers (a headmaster and four teachers) and that the School Board prepare its budget to accomplish this purpose.
