

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Salisbury in the county of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

[L. S.]

Polls will be open 10:00 a. m. to 6:00 p. m.

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Salisbury on Tuesday, the eighth day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year

ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.

3. To elect one Selectman for three years.

4. To see if the Town will vote to accept the budget as submitted by the Budget Committee.

5. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as

may be necessary for the Town Budget.

6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow money on notes of the Town in anticipation of taxes.

7. To hear reports of agents, auditors and officers

heretofore chosen.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the control of White Pine Blister

Rust (Estimate \$400.00).

9. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit (Estimate \$200.00).

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropri-

ate a sum of \$150.00 for the Franklin Hospital.

11. To see if the Town will vote to use \$1500.00 of the Capital Reserve Fund interest for road maintenance in the flood control basin.

12. To see if the Town will vote to rebuild Flanders Brook Bridge on Pumpkin Hill Road at a cost of \$2200.00. Of this sum \$1200.00 to be raised by taxation, and to see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to withdraw \$500.00 from the interest of the Capital Reserve Fund

from Trustees of Trust Funds, and the Selectmen to use

\$500.00 of Class 5 Highway money.

13. Would you vote at a future Town Meeting to have the Town take over the Church at "The Heights" and maintain it through taxation as a town building?

14. Would you vote to maintain the building in its

present interior and exterior design?

15. Would you vote to have the building used solely

for (1) a Library or (2) Public Meetings.

16. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Planning Board of five or seven members with duties as set forth in Sections 1-15, Chapter 53, Revised Laws of New Hampshire 1942, as amended, to make a study of the Town's development, and report to the Town appropriate recommendations for the promotion and maintainance of the Town's best development. The Board members shall consist of one Selectman and four or six other citizens appointed by the Selectmen, as provided in sections 1-15, Chapter 53, Revised Laws of New Hampshire 1942, as amended.

17. To see if the Town will vote to set the Selectmen's salaries at 1st year \$125.00; 2nd year \$150.00; 3rd year

\$175.00

18. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Town Hall to be used for recreational purposes from the date of the Town Meeting and until a future article rescinds this vote. Recreational activities always to be attended and supervised by an adult chaperone.

19. To transact any other business which may legally

come before said meeting.

FIRE PREVENTION REMINDER

Watch for Ways to Stop Fires Before They Start

- 1. Matches. Keep in metal containers. Away from children. Put out and stamp out if dropped. Same for cigarettes, pipes and cigars.
- 2. Papers. Empty waste baskets. Don't leave papers under stairs or in the privy or anywhere. Papers cause many fires.
- 3. Oil and Kerosene. Don't spill and if you do, put sand on floor. Cover oil can. Don't leave stove. Burn oily rags.
- 4. Chimney and Stove Pipe. Keep repaired and cleaned. Insulate from wood. Clean out soot. Replace when rusted.
- 5. Fire Extinguishers. In barn, in attic, in cellar, in house. Be sure they are renewed regularly. Phone Art Shaeffer to inspect.
- 6. Hay and Straw. Watch if put in damp. Don't use matches near. Clean up if loose on floor.
- 7. Wiring. Watch for loose wires. Have them tested and inspected.
- 8. Television. Keep away from curtains and anything it could set fire to.
- 9. Insurance. The only way to replace your lose. Even a little will bring back something.
- Rubbish. Paper, rags, paint cans, debris. GET RID OF IT.

Forest Fire Protection is Everybody's Business

Carelessness is responsible for 97 percent of all our forest fires. This is a serious indictment of our interest in our own welfare and that of our neighbors. In too many instances this carelessness results in the destruction, not of the careless one's own property, but of someone not even known to him.

Thoughtlessly thrown lighted cigars, cigarettes and matches from moving vehicles by hikers, hunters and fishermen; the careless burning of debris during hazardous periods, high winds or in dangerous locations; improperly extinguished camp or cook fires—all add up to the CARELESSNESS that means serious loss of property, disruption of industry and farm work and unnecessary expenditure of town and state funds.

It points to the need of eliminating CARELESSNESS so far as it concerns fire from our daily life. The rules are simple—your cooperation is earnestly solicited.

- 1. Be careful with fire in or near woodlands.
- 2. Be sure that all lighted material—cigars, cigarettes and matches—is completely out before discarding it. Use ash trays in autos.
- 3. Secure the required written permission to burn from your local forest fire warden when the ground is not completely covered with snow.
- 4. Insist that others be careful and comply with burning requirements.

5. Call the warden promptly when fire is detected

and aid him to extinguish it.

Let's remember that FOREST FIRE PREVENTION is EVERYBODY'S BUSINESS and our MOST IM-PORTANT undertaking.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Salisbury:

It is pleasant to report to you again briefly upon the condition of your schools. Let me begin by mentioning something about the kind of instruction that is being given. It is basically sound. Children are being effectively taught the three R's. The emphasis is properly placed here. And there is a thoroughness in the teaching that to me is very gratifying.

Another type of teaching goes on simultaneously. It is the kind that emphasizes the social and ethical values which children need to know. Social attitudes towards others, concepts of honor, right, wrong, rules for health and clean living, are being given considerable attention within the classroom. This is valuable training for children to be receiving. It is a safeguard against vice. It is a positive approach to the serious problems confronting our youth of today. It is good to know that this sort of teaching is going on in Salisbury's schools. I believe it to be very valuable. I speak of it because I want you to know that it is a part of your children's daily work. You are fortunate in having teachers who can give that kind of service to your children and to your community.

I also want to say a word about recreation values to growing youth. Children need opportunities to play together, to meet in social groups, and to have a chance to be given social responsibilities. A community can make a good investment by providing facilities and leaders to conduct some recreation activities for its young people. It is good insurance against child delinquency. When a community has teachers interested in this sort

of project, the community would be wise to make use of such leadership.

With respect to your needs for next year, I want to again say that I would like to have new desks and chairs at the Heights School if possible. It isn't a must, but a recommendation.

Your school rooms also should contain up-to-date reference books. A new encyclopedia is especially needed at the Heights School.

Your School committee plans with care for regular maintenance of your buildings and takes a lot of responsibility for this important work. For their help and guidance I am always very grateful.

I also want to express my personal appreciation to the teachers who are so cooperative in every way, and to parents and friends who, because of interest, work for the good of the schools.
