

Mr. O. A. Putnam remains in charge as Superintendent of the County Farm and House of Correction and Mrs. Putnam as Matron of the Home and Almshouse. Their service for the county, for the past eighteen years, has always been very satisfactory.

To the other employees of the Institution, we wish to express our appreciation for faithful service rendered.

Quite extensive repairs have been made, during the past year, in the renewal of pipes and plumbing throughout the almshouse, also in laying pipe lines to all the barns.

Quite a lot of work has been done in clearing up twenty acres or more of pasture land.

The Overseers of the Poor and Selectmen in the several towns, have rendered valuable assistance in looking after the poor.

To the Commissioners of Sullivan County:

At the March, 1924, term of the Superior Court indictments were returned and entered in Court against four defendants. Two were for a statutory offense and both defendants served time. The other two were for violation of the liquor laws and resulted in convictions. Several appealed cases were disposed of, one of these by jury trial with a verdict of guilty.

REPORT OF MEETINGS OF SULLIVAN COUNTY CONVENTION Session of 1923

Sullivan County delegation met in room 109, State House and elected officers as follows: Chairman, Mr. Hartley L. Brooks; Clerk, Alfred Pierce, both of Claremont.

Moved by Mr. Leo Osborne that meeting adjourn to the call of the chairman. Adjourned.

ALFRED PIERCE, Clerk.

Second meeting, 1923, Thursday, February 5, Sec. 5, House of Representatives. Called to order by Mr. Brooks of Claremont. Remarks about the shorter season on the deer law, by Mr. Colby, of Plainfield, and Mott Bartlett, Commissioner of Fish and Game. Mr. Lewis, of Newport, moved that it is the sense of the meeting that the deer law be the first fifteen days of December, or to conform to the seven lower counties. Remarks by Mr. Rossiter, of Claremont, in regard highway from Walpole to Lebanon. Mr. Bluett, of Lempster, moved to adjourn to the call of the chairman.

LEO OSBORNE, Sec. Pro Tem.

Third meeting held in Sec. 5, House of Representatives, Concord.

Called to order by chairman, Mr. Brooks, of Clare-

mont, in order to set time to go to the County Farm for annual meeting. Rev. Mr. Etsler moved, and it was supported, that the meeting be held Friday, March 9, 1923. Mr. Robinson, of Newport, spoke about the re-indexing of the records of Probate Court, the same as in the Register of Deeds. Mr. Franklin, of Cornish, moved, and it was supported, to adjourn. Quorum present.

ALFRED PIERCE, Sec.

Fourth meeting held at the County Farm, March 9, 1923. Meeting called to order by the chairman, Mr. Brooks, of Claremont. On a roll call the following men were present: Senator Ralph Lufkin; Representatives, Clark, of Acworth, Barney, Etsler, Nichols, Pierce, Wolcott, Rossiter, of Claremont, Franklyn, of Cornish, Barton, of Croydon, Thornton, of Grantham, Bluitte, of Lempster, Glynn, of Newport, Robinson, of Newport, Colby, of Plainfield, Osborne, of Sunapee, Walker, of Unity.

Report read by Mr. Sanders, Chairman of County Commissioners, asking the sum of \$45,700 be raised and appropriated annually for the next two years. Mr. Etsler asked if the Commissioners thought the annual expenses would exceed the appropriations. Mr. Balloch replied that they could keep within the amount asked for. Mr. Aiken expressed his belief that in the near future many expenses for repairs would be needed. Mr. Wolcott asked about the records of the Probate Court. Replied to by Mr. Jameson, of Newport, that many records were called for and it was unable to find them. That from 1827 to 1893 the records were put away in disorder. That from 1893 to 1923 they were not in proper form. Mr. Bluitte asked if salary of Superintendent would be increased. Replied by Mr. Sanders that it would and had been provided for in the budget. Mr. Osborne asked for

the exact salary, and was informed that it was \$1200 per year for the two.

Mr. Rossiter asked why money due County from liquor cases had been withheld. Mr. Sanders replied that the cases would be looked into.

Moved by Mr. Wolcott and supported, to go into executive session. Mr. Osborn moved and it was supported, to raise the amount (\$45,700), as recommended by the County Commissioners for the years 1923-1924.

Mr. Robinson moved and it was supported, that the sum of (\$300) three hundred dollars be raised and appropriated annually for the indexing of the records of the Probate Court. Mr. Robinson moved and it was supported, that the sum of (\$4,000), four thousand dollars be raised annually for the support of the Sullivan County Farm Bureau.

Mr. Etsler moved and it was supported, that the Chairman be instructed to ask Mr. and Mrs. Putnam to appear before the delegation. On the appearance of Mr. and Mrs. Putnam, Mr. Brooks expressed the appreciation of the delegation to Mr. and Mrs. Putnam for the very fine dinner prepared and the courtesies extended.

Mr. Bluitte moved that sometime during the summer the representatives with their wives and intended wives, have a picnic. Mr. Etsler moved that the Chairman, Secretary and Mr. Bluitte act as the committee to arrange for the same. Mr. Osborne moved to adjourn to the call of the chair.
