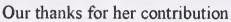

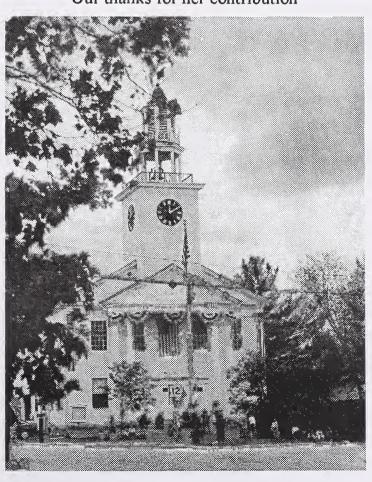

## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE TOWN WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Troy, N.H. in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in the Town affairs.

You are notified to meet at the TEASI building, in the said Town on Tuesday, the 11th day of March next at 10:00 AM in the forenoon for balloting upon matters specified in Articles 1 and 2, listed below, and you are hereby further notified to meet at the Troy Elementary School on Wednesday, the 12th day of March at 7:30 PM to act upon the remainder of the listed warrant.

**ARTICLE 1:** To bring in your vote for one Selectmen for three years and other Town Officers elected by ballot as passed by Town Meeting or State Statute for the specified number of years.

**ARTICLE 2:** Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 1 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Troy Zoning Ordinance as follows:

To delete Article XI - SIGNS and replace with a new Sign Ordinance, renumbering the Zoning Ordinance accordingly. The new Sign Ordinance sets forth a procedure for the permitting of signs, standards for the placement, lighting, number, and size of signs; describes types of signs that do not require a permit, as well as those that are not permitted under the ordinance.

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 2 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Troy Zoning Ordinance as follows:

To add a new Paragraph K to Article III - General Provisions restating the bylaw passed by the Selectmen on May 17, 1993 limiting Yard or Tag Sales to a maximum of five (5) times per calendar year per lot; a permit is required from the Selectmen and no sale may run longer than three consecutive days.

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 3 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Troy Zoning Ordinance as follows:

To amend Article XX - Definitions by including "dumpster" in the definition of Structure (#36).

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 4 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town of Troy Zoning Ordinance as follows:

To amend Article XX - Definitions by deleting the term "radio towers" from #36. Structure, and replacing it with "wireless communication towers".

**ARTICLE 3:** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray the following Town expenditures:

ARTICLE 4: To see if the Town will vote to modify the elderly exemptions from property tax in the Town of Troy, based on assessed value, for qualified taxpayers, to be as follows: for a person 65 years of age up to 75 years, \$12,000.00; for a person 75 years of age up to 80 years, \$25,000.00, for a person 80 years of age or older \$50,000.00. To qualify, the person must have been a New Hampshire resident for at least five years, own the real estate individually or jointly, or if the real estate is owned by such person's spouse, they must have been married for at least five years. In addition, the taxpayer must have a net income of not morethan \$13,400.00 or, if married, a combined net income of less than \$20,400.00 which includes social security and pension payments, and own net assets not in excess of \$40,000.00 excluding the value of the person's actual residence and the value of a minimum single-family residential lot or two acres, whichever is greater. This article has been placed on the warrant because effective January 1, 1998 all elderly exemptions will be repealed and any municipality which has not adopted higher parameters, which can be done any time after July 23, 1996, for their elderly exemptions under RSA 72:39-b, will be required to follow the new minimum exemption, which is \$5,000.00 off the assessed value of the

property, applied equally for all age groups. Recommended by Selectmen.

**ARTICLE 5:** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate up to \$225,000 for the purpose of purchasing property in the Town of Troy for elderly housing, industrial development, or a community center and authorize the transfer of the December 31, 1996 fund balance in that amount for this purpose. This is to be done by the Selectmen, with the approval of the Budget Committee, after consultation with the Planning Board. Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee. (Majority Vote Required).

**ARTICLE 6:** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$16,800.00 for the care of the cemeteries and authorize the withdrawal of \$15,800.00 from the Cemetery Trust Funds established for this purpose. Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 7: To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to expend the Highway Block Grant of \$38,306.82 that the Town will receive from the State of New Hampshire for the calendar year 1997 for maintenance, construction, and reconstruction of Class IV and V Highways. Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee.

**ARTICLE 8:** To see if the Town will vote a sum of money \$76,978.34 for the payment of Sewer Bonds. Income from the State of New Hampshire will be \$24,418.34. Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee

**ARTICLE** 9: To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$219,189.00 for the Water/Sewer Department operations. Income comes from collections of water and sewer rents. Recommended by Water/Sewer Commissioners and Budget Committee.

**ARTICLE 10:** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,775.00 to purchase new computer equipment necessary to handle upgraded tax processing software. The Tax Program has been rewritten and support for the existing version is being terminated. Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 11: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the

sum of \$1,026.85 to purchase five voting booths and a handicap accessible voting booth to be in compliance with RSA 658:9 relative to handicap accessible voting booth specifications. Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 12: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen as agents to expend from the Reassessment Capital Reserve Fund created for that purpose and to authorize the Selectmen to accept a proposal for \$44,500.00 over a three year period to do a complete revaluation and conversion to a computer appraisal system with a physical reinspection of all property and a valuation update in the third year to bring all values to 100% of fair market value. Payments to be made over the three year period; Year 1 payment \$10,500.00, Year 2 payment \$12,500.00, Year 3 payment \$21,500.00. Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee. (Majority Vote Required).

ARTICLE 13: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 for the Planning Board to engage the services of Southwest Region Planning Commission for the development of a computer generated composite parcel map to be used for planning purposes. Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee.

**ARTICLE 14:** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000.00 to paint a portion of the Town Hall. This will be a non-lapsing account per RSA 32:3, VI and will not lapse until the project is completed or in two years, whichever is less. Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee.

**ARTICLE 15:** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,015.00 to purchase a Mitre DC-1856 copier for the Town Hall. Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee.

**ARTICLE 16:** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 for the Police Department to teach the DARE Program at Troy Elementary School. Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 17: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to enter into long-term lease/purchase agreement in the amount of

\$30,000.00 payable over a term of four years at a rate of \$8,244.54 annually to purchase a 1997 Crown Victoria Police Cruiser and to authorize the withdrawal of \$8,244.54 for the first year's payment from the Police Department Capital Reserve Fund established for that purpose. Proceeds from the sale of the police vehicle it is replacing are to go into the Police Department Capital Reserve Fund. The Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this lease. (Majority Vote Required).

ARTICLE 18: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the amount of money listed below to be placed into the Capital Reserve Funds for each department for the purpose of purchasing vehicles or equipment when voted by the Town. Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee.

**ARTICLE 20:** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$7,500.00 to be placed in the Reassessment Capital Reserve Fund. Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 21: To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the Samuel E. Paul War Memorial Fund created in the 1970's. Said funds, \$2,555.42,

with accumulated interest to date of withdrawal, are to be transferred to the War Memorial Recreation Capital Reserve Fund. Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 22: To see if the Town will vote to rename the War Memorial Recreation Capital Reserve Fund to the Samuel E. Paul War Memorial Recreation Capital Reserve Fund. Recommended by the Selectmen and Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 23: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the amount of money listed to be donated to each organization as follows. Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee.

**ARTICLE 24:** To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw up to \$10,000.00 from the General Government Building Capital Reserve Fund for the purpose of expanding and renovations to the Police Department. Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 25: To see if the Town will vote to organize the Troy Fire Department pursuant to RSA 154:1 III as a Board of Engineers consisting of a Fire Chief, 1st Deputy, and 2nd Deputy, elected by the local legislative body on alternating three year terms, pursuant to RSA 669:17 VIII with firefighters appointed by the Fire Chief. Recommended by Selectmen.

**ARTICLE 26:** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,651.52 to be placed in the Fire Department Capital Reserve Fund. This is the exact amount received form the sale of the 1963 Willys Jeep pickup truck, July 15, 1996. Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 27: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen

and Board of Engineers to withdraw up to \$60,000.00 from the Fire Department Capital Reserve Fund for the purchase of a chassis suitable to build a fire tanker or the purchase of a fire tanker if something becomes available during the year. Requested by Board of Engineers. Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee.

**ARTICLE 28:** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$20,000.00 for sand sealing new pavement on town roads. Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 29: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25,025.00 for the final lease payment on the 1988 Trackless for the Highway Department and to authorize the withdrawal of \$10,000.00 from the Highway Department Capital Reserve Fund for that purpose. \$15,025.00 to be raised by taxation. Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee.

**ARTICLE 30:** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$40,000.00 for a project on High Street (shim, overlay, blasting and drainage). Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee.

**ARTICLE 31:** To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw the amount of \$2,000.00 from the Highway Department Capital Reserve Fund for the purchase of a used plow and wing set up. Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 32: To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the Highway Garage Capital Reserve Fund created in 1993. Said funds, \$652.28, with accumulated interest to date of withdrawal, are to be transferred to the General Fund. Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee. (Majority Vote Required).

ARTICLE 33: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$652.28, with accumulated interest; the exact amount which was deposited in the General Fund, closing the Highway Garage Capital Reserve Fund, for the purpose of finishing the Highway Department Garage. Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 34: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the

sum of \$25,000.00 for the preparation of detailed construction plans for the library addition/renovation. This will be a non-lapsing account per RSA 32:3, VI and will not lapse until the project is completed or in two years, whichever is less. Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 35: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Library Trustees to collect and expend without further action by Town Meeting, any fees for the use of the copier, and fines collected for lost and overdue materials.

ARTICLE 36: To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of RSA 202-A:4-d authorizing the Library Trustees to accept gifts of personal property, other than money, which may be offered to the library for any public purpose, provided, however, that no acceptance of personal property by the Library Trustees shall be deemed to bind the town or the Library Trustees to raise, appropriate or expend any public funds for the operation, maintenance, repair or replacement of such personal property.

ARTICLE 37: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to enter into agreement with Southwest Region Planning Commission and other state agencies, when money becomes available for feasibility studies, grants, and agreements in the best interest of the town. This is to be done by the Selectmen, with the approval of the Budget Committee, after consultation with the Conservation Commission, Planning Board, and Industrial Development Committee.

**ARTICLE 38:** To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, accept, and expend money from the State, Federal, or other government units or a private source, which becomes available during the year in accordance with the procedures set forth in RSA 31-95b.

ARTICLE 39: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to transfer tax lien and convey property acquired by the Town by Tax Collector's Deed by public auction, or advertised sealed bid, or in such a manner as determined by the Selectmen as justice may require.

**ARTICLE 40:** To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money, and to pay charges and interest thereon.

ARTICLE 41: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hear reports of committees, agents, or officers heretofore chosen and take any action relative.

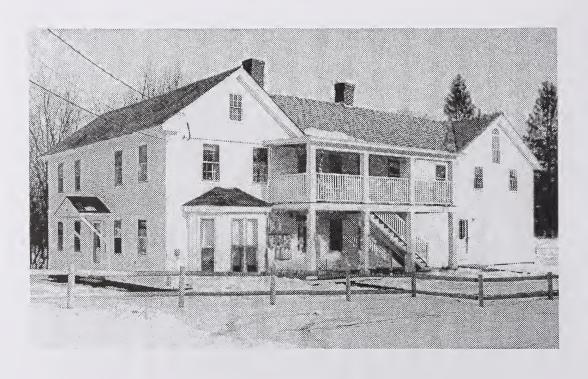

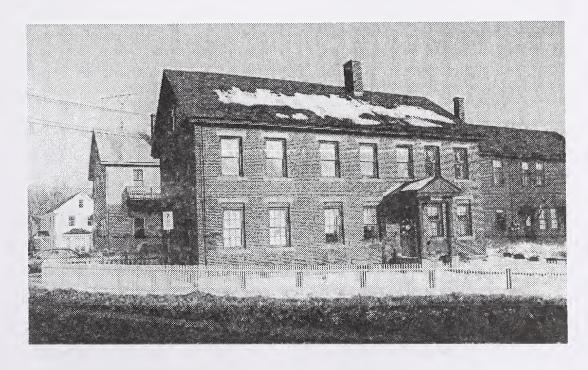

#### LIBRARY

1996 saw many good things happen at the library. Enthusiasm was high for the Building/Renovation Project and townspeople donated generously to the Building Fund. Circulation of materials continued to remain high and the Troy Library has the distinction of having the highest per capita circulation in Cheshire County! Our very popular programs and activities, including Story/Craft Times, Book Discussion Group, summer reading incentive program, parties and performers, as well as fund raising events, keep the place bustling.

On the down side, the building continues to become ever more crowded and the shelves are almost full. Space is at a premium for all the technological improvements that libraries need to have to keep up with the information age. There is very little office and work space or room for students to study. Handicap accessibility is almost non-existent. New at the library this year was the computer that offers Internet, CD-ROM, word processing and reference capabilities to our patrons. For participating in the American Library Association Log on at Your Library Day in April, the library was awarded a CD-ROM copy of Microsoft Encarta Encyclopedia.

A matching funds grant was awarded to the library by the Library Services and Technology Act for the purchase of a new computer and related equipment for the purpose of automating the card catalog.

Book sales were held in June and September raising funds towards more materials and another computer. The new town tents were a major improvement to both events. Turkey raffles were held by the Building Committee to raise money for the building Fund. Plans are in place to hold another raffle next November.

Grant money was received to enable us to have a basket making performer and activity for youngsters during the summer. The Troy PTO sponsored a group called Stories and Stuff who were the kick-off event for Reading The Best Game Around summer reading incentive program.

We have audited the general purpose financial statements of the Town of Troy, New Hampshire as of and for the year ended December 31, 1996, and have issued our report thereon dated January 30, 1997.

We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards; *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States; and the provisions of Office of Management and Budget Circular (OMB) A-128, "Audits of State and Local Governments". Those standards and OMB Circular A-128 require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the general purpose financial statements are free of material misstatement.

The management of the Town of Troy, New Hampshire is responsible for establishing and maintaining an internal control structure. In fulfilling this responsibility, estimates and judgments by management are required to assess the expected benefits and related costs of internal control structure policies and procedures. The objectives of an internal control structure are to provide management with reasonable, but no absolute, assurance that assets are safeguarded against loss from unauthorized use or disposition, and that transactions are executed in accordance with management's authorization and recorded properly to permit the preparation of general purpose financial statements in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles. Because of inherent limitations in any internal control structure, errors or irregularities may nevertheless occur and not be detected. Also, projection of any evaluation of the structure to future periods is subject to the risk that procedures may become inadequate because of changes in conditions

or that the effectiveness of the design and operation of policies and procedures may deteriorate.

In planning and performing our audit of the general purpose financial statements of the Town of Troy, New Hampshire for the year ended December 31, 1996, we obtained an understanding of the internal control structure. With respect to the internal control structure, we obtained an understanding of the design of relevant policies and procedures and whether they have been placed in operation, and we assessed control risk in order to determine our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the general purpose financial statements and not to provide an opinion on the internal control structure. Accordingly, we do not express such an opinion.

For the purpose of this report, we have classified the significant internal control structure policies and procedures in the following categories:

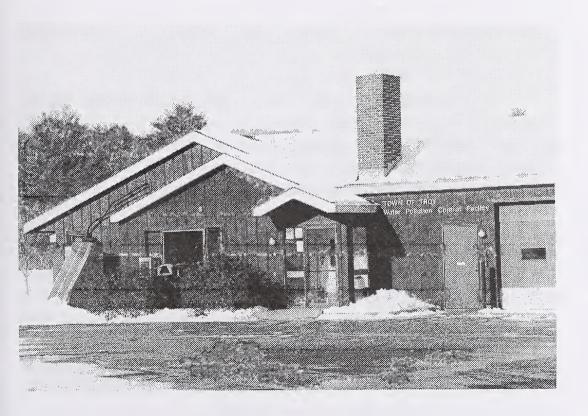
Our consideration of the internal control structure would not necessarily disclose all matters in the internal control structure that might be material weaknesses under standards established by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants. A material weakness is a condition in which the design or operation of one or more of the internal control structure elements does not reduce to a relatively low level the risk that errors or irregularities in amounts that would be material in relation to the general purpose financial statements being audited may occur and not be detected within a timely period by employees in the normal course of performing their assigned functions. We noted no matters involving the

#### SELECTMEN'S REPORT

The biggest issues facing the Town of Troy in 1996 were what to do with Route 12, and the closure of the landfill.

The State of New Hampshire is continuing to study what should be done with Route 12. The options are widening the present road, doing nothing, or bypass the town. The State's study will continue in 1997, and the Selectmen encourage everyone to participate in the study process in order to help make decisions based on facts provided by the study.

The closure of the landfill should take place in 1997 when the engineering firm agrees on bids for the drum removal project and the State gives final approval of the closure plan.

Some projects that were completed in 1996 were the renovations of three apartment buildings by Southwestern Community Services, repairs to the Town Hall, the installation of lanterns on the Town Common, and the perambulation of the Troy/Marlborough town lines.

The completion of the renovations to three apartment buildings in downtown Troy by Southwestern Community Services has certainly made the downtown area look more attractive. The Town Hall saw some unforeseen major repairs. The front overhang was discovered to have been separating from the main building. The front overhang has been successfully reattached which shows why such a large over expenditure in the Town Hall budget. The last major project in 1996 was the installation of copper lanterns on the Town Common. We hope that everyone would agree that it adds to our beautiful Town Common. The Selectmen would like to thank all the volunteers who helped complete this project.

Every seven years the Town is required to determine it's boundaries with neighboring towns, called perambulation. The Town of Troy has completed perambulation with Marlborough and we still need to complete this task with Richmond and Fitzwilliam.

Positive news in 1996 was the Town's tax rate remained the same and the overall tax rate was reduced by 2%.

The Town continues to reach out to bring State and Federal money to help us fund programs and personnel. The Police Department leads the way in outside funding with grants providing funding for one full-time officer and two part-time police positions.

The Recreation Department was assisted by the New Hampshire Job Corp Program which gave us four teenagers to perform maintenance tasks for the Town during the summer months.

This past fall the Selectmen held a picnic for all Town employees and volunteers which we hope will become an annual event. This year's picnic honored Raymond Dicey who retired as Superintendent of the Landfill. We wish Ray the best of luck and much happiness in retirement.

A major undertaking the Town is looking to start in 1997 is to do a complete revaluation of all properties. We hope that everyone agrees that this needs to be done with all the problems that the 1989 reval created.

Another project we hope to complete in 1997 is to build a band stand for the Town Common.

The Selectmen would like to remind everyone that the biggest part of your tax bill, almost 80%, goes to the school district. Don't forget to participate in your annual school and town meetings, and elections.

Lastly, the Selectmen would like to thank all Town employees, volunteers, and committee members, who have helped keep the Town running smoothly and successfully. We would like to extend an invitation to all residents to get involved and volunteer to serve on a committee. The Town is always in need of new ideas, and new people.

#### **BUDGET COMMITTEE**

This year the Budget Committee welcomed several new volunteers who were appointed to fill vacancies. Nancy Cummings, Ernest Descheneaux, and William Parkman joined us for the first time, and Stephen Holmes returned after having served previously.

As always, this year we faced the difficult job of making hard choices about recommending town spending. Our department heads and committee members all oversee important functions, and they all want to provide the town with the best possible service in their department. The Budget Committee has the job of weighing the costs of town services against the importance of those services and the tax rate burdening our citizens. We often feel we must recommend different amounts than were requested in order to best balance the services to the town and the costs to the taxpayers.

Our budget this year includes several major items. The Landfill closure will be costly; the Library Building Program is coming along; Town Hall, Police, and Highway budgets are all up; and our Selectmen are asking to spend some of the Town's surplus funds.

The list of requests is long, and it's not easy to recommend against any of them. The Budget Committee met almost every week during December and January to hear from department heads and to consider their requests. We feel we have recommended a budget to Town Meeting that is a good balance between the need for town services and the cost of providing those services. We are always cognizant that Town Meeting can vote to appropriate different amounts than we recommend, but we try to present recommendations that have been carefully considered and justified during our committee meetings.

All of the members who served on the Budget Committee during the year deserve thanks from the Town for their efforts.

#### HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

The winter of 95-96 was one to remember, near record amounts of snow which really took it's toll budget wise.

We got a lot done in 1996. We used the Highway Block Grant to shim Old Whitcomb Road, a portion of Quarry Road, a portion of Prospect Street, Brickyard Road, and complete Mackey Road. We also did a road project to complete 85% of Tolman Road in which we replaced a culvert at Corey Pond and filled in a low portion of the road, and shimmed the road. We also did some crack sealing.

With the lease/purchase of a Trackless MT5, we are very pleased with the amount of jobs that this machine will do. We use it to mow the sides of the roads and the snow blower works really well for the sidewalks. The Recreation Department made fine use of the lawn mower, as did the Cemetery Department. We took possession of 34M4, a fire truck the town purchased new in 1971. Our plans are to mount a sander on the frame. This will make a second sander to cut time and overtime down.

In 1997 the Highway Block Grant is going to be used to replace culverts, do some blasting, and shim a mile of South Street. We also plan to do some sand sealing. We also hope to do a project on High Street to take care of the ice problem and put the road back in shape before it goes too far.

I would like to thank my assistant, Gary LeBlanc, for another year of good service, and Peter Mattson, Ray Dicey, Brad Beaudoin, and Allen Purrington for their help in snow plowing.

I would like to thank the Town of Troy for all the support all year long.

#### PLANNING BOARD

The Troy Planning Board had a fairly active year in 1996 with quite a few consultations on land use issues, and several subdivision and site plan reviews. At March Town Meeting the community supported our efforts to redraft the Manufactured Housing Ordinance, adopt rules of procedure and to enact several small zoning changes. It is our hope that these changes will, over time, streamline Board procedures and make more efficient and consistent the way in which an all volunteer Board tries to address Troy's land use issues. Over recent years a number of Board members have attended the annual Planning Board Conference in Concord as well as dinner meetings hosted by Southwest Region Planning Commission. These events help us to learn the whole process, to seek advice on specific land use problems, and to see how other Boards throughout the state address zoning issues.

The Board spent a number of meetings this year redrafting the Sign Ordinance, and adding language to the Zoning Ordinance which references yard sale activities, dumpsters, and communication towers. This is an effort to bring our zoning standards and terminology up to that of our neighboring communities, and to address local problems and issues that have come up. In 1997 the Board plans to come up with a way to review small scale changes of use in retail or commercial properties without going through an entire Site Plan Review process. In addition, all three Route 12 options (bypass, upgrade, no-build) need to be examined with respect to Troy's Mater Plan, which was last revised in 1992. Increasing traffic volumes on Route 12 is by far the greatest force of change that this community will face in the decades ahead. The Planning Board will work with whatever highway option is finally chosen, but it presently supports a strategy which allows Troy the opportunity to preserve it's existing resources while allowing opportunities for future growth and diversification. Based on the information we have received thus far, only a bypass option meets these criteria.

The Board is asking for the town's support of a Warrant Article to have a Property Line Base Map drawn up this year. This will be a great planning tool for it includes all town parcels on a single map for the first time.

#### PLANNING BOARD

I would like to thank the Planning Board, members for their commitment to making Troy a better place to live and work. We have been very fortunate to have two former Selectpersons, a long standing ZBA member, and a number of members with years of tenure serving. We sometimes see issues from different viewpoints and don't always agree, but this often leads to better results in the long run. We owe a debt of gratitude to Carol Ogilvie of Southwest Region Planning Commission who patiently attends most meetings and helps the board draft, interpret, and enforce New Hampshire zoning statutes. Her professional assistance and good humor are most appreciated.

#### POLICE DEPARTMENT

In 1996 the Troy Police Department attempted to provide the same services and coverage as in 1995, with fewer officers. Many of you were aware of the problems we faced and supported the department, enabling us to get through the year.

It was a challenging year with incidents and cases increasing, as well as the need to rely on the State Police to assist us on the occasions when we were unable to respond. The following statistics show the increases in the number of incidents and cases over the past three years:

The Department managed to continue to teach DARE and graduated four classes, two from Troy and two from Fitzwilliam. This program had been a joint endeavor between the towns and cost the taxpayers little, as grants and donations from Fitzwilliam merchants and citizens had, for the most part, funded the program.

The Department was able to institute a few changes, with our Officer Bicycle Program during the summer and fall and was able to continue a number of safety programs we had taught in the past. Both programs enabled us to be out and in close contact with many of the town's youth. Unfortunately, a number of children's programs had to be cut due to lack of funding.

We also completely revamped the town's mapping system, instituted the 911 system and actually visited each house to verify the address. We provided detailed maps to the necessary emergency service units. At this time, we are the *only town in Cheshire County* to have completed this undertaking. We also began the accreditation process for the department, again, the *only department of it's size in the state* to undertake this endeavor.

We look forward to the new year; to restoring the school safety programs as well as continuing and improving upon existing programs.

#### POLICE DEPARTMENT

These will be partially funded by a federal grant we received, thus allowing us to ask for a minimal increase to our operating budget. Our goal in 1997 is to provide the best service in Cheshire County.

1996 Cases totaled 404 with a breakdown as follows:

- 4 Deaths
- 9 Sexual Assaults
- 41 Assaults
- 10 Burglaries
- 47 Thefts
  - 6 Stolen Vehicles
  - 1 Forgery
  - 3 Frauds
- 38 Criminal Mischief

### NEW HAMPSHIRE DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION ROUTE 12 ADVISORY TASK FORCE

In the course of its purpose to study the benefits, impacts, and feasibility of no change, upgrade, and bypass alternatives as a means of improving safety and traffic capacity on NH 12 through Troy, the Route 12 Improvement Study brought five bypass alternatives and a preliminary upgrade plan to a conceptual design stage during 1996. NH Department of Transportation project staff and consultants presented possible bypass routes and described the policy and regulatory considerations for social, environmental, and engineering aspects of the bypass alternatives. Project staff, state and federal permitting agencies, the Task Force, and public in attendance at the Task Force meetings selected the five remaining alternatives from more than 20 alternatives through a process of eliminating those with unbearable impacts or prohibitive costs. All five alternatives would carry NH 12 on a new route east of the village joining NH 12 in the vicinities of the Marlborough town line.

Residents have expressed the full spectrum of concerns and opinions about the bypass alternatives, possibilities of upgrading existing NH 12, and the value of the study itself. It appears that most residents remain attentive to the process and are asking for the best possible information about the town's options for the future of NH 12. There are also groups in town that have made it known that they are decided on the best course of action regardless of the outcome of the study.

During the spring of 1997, the Task Force will continue to meet with project staff with a renewed focus to make recommendations for one preferred bypass alternative and one preferred upgrade design. After those decisions are made the Department and its consultant will proceed with the Environmental Assessment or EA. The EA is a formal document required by federal law to demonstrate the level of impacts of the recommended projects on the social and natural environment as well as the projected benefits of the project.

The Task Force welcomes residents and other interested parties to attend the upcoming meetings.

#### HERITAGE COMMISSION

The purpose of the Heritage Commission is fourfold:

- 1. To engage in historical research
- 2. To encourage historical preservation
- 3. To highlight historic properties
- 4. To advise other town agencies about matters of historic interest

The Heritage Commission involves itself in ongoing research of historic properties in Troy, the National Register, and Historic Districts. Two information sources which have proven helpful are, "Survey of Selected Properties, Troy, New Hampshire" and "Preserving Community Character"

Formal application for a historic marker recognizing Troy Mills has been completed. The mill is the oldest textile mill under continuous one family ownership still in existence today.

The Heritage Commission has corresponded with state and national officials to express support for the Route 12 Bypass in order to preserve key historic areas of town. With Jay Blanchard of Keene Monument Company, the Heritage Commission has designed a marker, which will be constructed of Marlborough granite, to mark the 1815 establishment of Troy's Common. The marker will be placed near the bandstand, which is scheduled for construction in the spring.

The Heritage Commission and the ad hoc Common Committee have worked on plans to improve and enhance the common. ### SOUTHWEST REGION PLANNING COMMISSION

The Commission, with a service area covering 35 municipalities in Cheshire and Hillsborough Counties, is one of New Hampshire's nine regional planning agencies established by RSA 36. We continue to provide planning related assistance to member communities and to represent the southwest region in state and federal programs. Our diverse work program covers activities such as local planning assistance, geographic information systems & mapping, transportation, community development block grant administration, and natural resources planning. We are funded through many sources including local town dues. For every dollar of local dues, the Commission's operating budget includes over four additional dollars to assist the needs of the region and its members. Funds are provided in the form of federal, state, and local grants and contracts. These resources provide the Commission the ability to assemble a critical mass of expertise which you have direct access to.

Highlights of Commission activities for 1996 include the development of a 10-year Transportation Improvement Program for the southwest region; award of a federal grant to provide education and coordination of the region's municipalities for proper disposal of toxic wastes; preparation of a document and process to promote natural resources planning; participation in sponsoring educational forums on planning related topics; and, in conjunction with Cheshire County officials, the award of a federal grant to provide financial resources to assist communities to meet the requirements of the Americans with Disabilities Act - a project in which Troy is a participant. We have provided assistance to the Planning Board, have been involved in the NH Route 12 Improvement Study, provided grant administrative services related to the Troy Affordable Housing Project, and prepared a successful grant application to study options for a Community Center. In addition, we have recently been awarded a modest grant to allow us to provide economic development planning assistance to our member municipalities.

### MONADNOCK FAMILY SERVICES

By adding the definition of: "Commercial Junkyard" - Any business and any place of storage: (1) with 2 or more unregistered motor vehicles which are no longer intended or in condition for legal use on the public highways; (2) with used parts of motor vehicles or old iron, metal, glass, paper, cordage, or other waste or discarded or secondhand material which has been a part, or intended to be a part, of any motor vehicle, the sum of which parts or material shall be equal in bulk to 2 or more motor vehicles; (3) used for the purpose of dismantling the vehicles for parts or for use of the metal for scrap and where it is intended to burn material which are parts of a motor vehicle or cut up the parts thereof.

**PASSED - YES 210 NO 100** 

Are you in favor of the adoption of <u>Amendment #3</u> as proposed by the Planning Board for the Troy Zoning Ordinance to amend Article XV - Administration and Enforcement, Paragraph B, by adding the sentence:

"No building permit shall be issued for any building unless the street upon which the lot has actual frontage corresponds with the requirements of RSA 674:41".

ARTICLE 3: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Million Two Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$1,200,000) for the drum removal project and the hydrogeological study and closure process for the Troy Municipal Landfill and pursuing cost recovery through PRP litigation and insurance coverage litigation, together with any related costs or anything pertaining thereto. Said sum is to be raised by the issuance of serial bonds or notes not to exceed One Million Two Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$1,200,000) under and in compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated, Chapter 33), and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to issue and negotiate, such bonds or notes, to determine the rate(s) of interest thereon and to take such other actions as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such bonds or notes as shall be in the best interest of the Town of Troy, and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to accept any funds from the State of New Hampshire, the federal government, and private sources, as may become available, and pass any vote relating thereto. This will be a non-lapsing account per RSA 32:3, IV, and will not lapse until the projects are completed. Recommended by the Selectmen and Budget Committee. (2/3 ballot vote required).

Following a brief explanation of the bond process, terms of financing, and the impact on the Town, also the point that if the Town did not take action it would be forced at an undetermined cost.

ARTICLE 4: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150,000.00 for the construction of an addition to the Gay-Kimball Library, meeting room facilities therein, and renovations of the present library building to meet the Americans with Disabilities Act of July 26, 1990 and to authorize the issuance of not more than \$150,000.00 of bonds or notes in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (RSA Chapter 33) and to authorize the Town Officials to issue such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon. Prior to acting under approval of this Article the Town Officials in consultation with the Library Trustees shall determine whether such action is in the best financial interest of the Town. Not recommended by Selectmen or Budget Committee. (BY PETITION) (2/3 ballot vote required).

A presentation on the progress of the library building plans was given by Ralph Wentworth. Some comments for and against the bond issue followed.

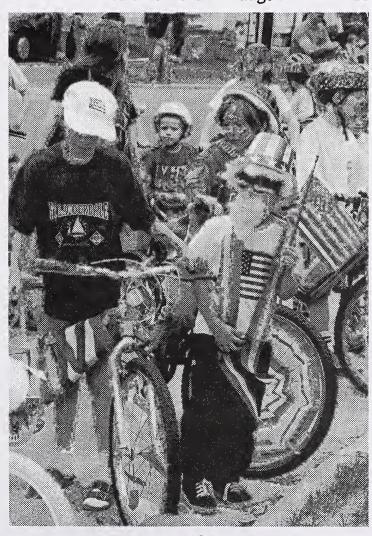

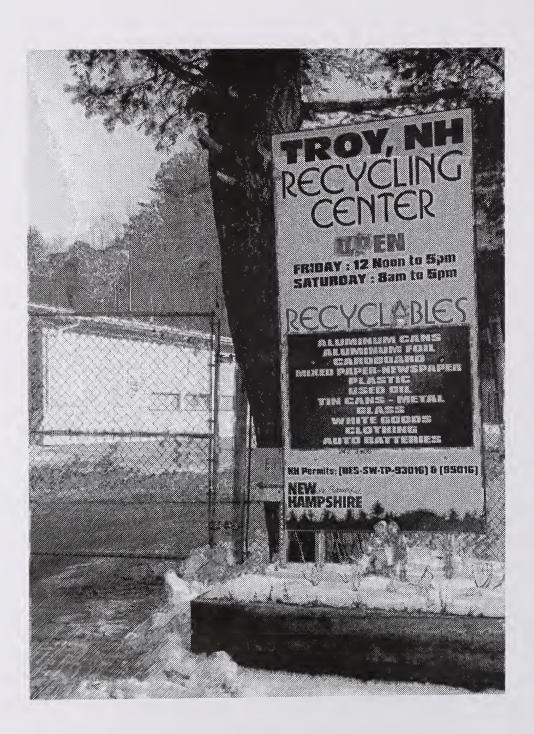
