THE POLLS WILL BE OPEN FROM 10:00 A.M. to 7:00 P.M.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Weare in the County of Hillsborough in said State qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Weare Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday the 12th day of March, next at 10 of the clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects.

- To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To see if the Town will vote in favor of changing the term of the Road Agent from one year to three years beginning with the term of the Road Agent to be elected at the 1986 Town Election.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to amend the existing Town of Weare Building and Permit Ordinance pursuant to New Hampshire RSA 675:3 to allow the Town of Weare to participate in the National Flood Insurance Program as recommended by the Planning Board on January 24, 1985, and adopted by the 1976 Weare Town Meeting.
- 4. Do you favor designation of Perkins Pond Marsh as a Prime Wetland as provided in R.S.A. 483-A:7? The Marsh is located south of Route 149 and north of Mt. Misery, encompasses wetland properties established by the State of New Hampshire as a wildlife management area and is described in documents and maps filed with the Town Clerk as required by R.S.A. 675:7.

NOTE: IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE VOTE OF TOWN MEETING OF MARCH 6, 1973, ARTICLES 5 through 62 WILL BE TAKEN UP AT AN ADJOURNED SESSION OF THIS MEETING ON APRIL 6, 1985 AT 10:00 A.M. IN THE WEARE SCHOOL GYMNASIUM.

- 5. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of same:

- 6. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen and the Town Treasurer to borrow on behalf of the Town in anticipation of taxes; said loans to be payable from taxes from the year 1985 and to issue notes therefore in the name of the Town at such rate of interest and payable at such time and place within one year as the Selectmen may decide.
- 7. To see if the Town will wote to authorize the Selectmen to accept gifts and/or federal or State Aid in the name of the Town of Weare, and to appropriate the same to the payment of purposes for which it constitutes reimbursement, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

- 8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to transfer tax liens and convey property acquired by the Town by Tax Collector's deed by public auction (or advertised sealed bid) or in such other manner as determined by the Selectmen as justice may require. (As provided under RSA 80:42, Sale of Tax Liens/Tax Deeded Properties).
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to accept all trust funds given to it during the year 1984 including but not limited to perpetual care funds for cemetery lot maintenance, the Emma Sawyer Trust Fund, and the Corliss Cemetery Trust Fund.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$106,280.96 for summer and winter maintenance of the highways or to take any other action in relation thereto.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$65,000.00 for the general expenses of the Highway Department or to take any other action in relation thereto.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000.00 for repair to bridges or to take any other action in relation thereto.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$82,140.24 which represents the anticipated Highway Block Grant Aid under New Hampshire RSA 235 for the maintenance, construction and reconstruction of Class IV and V highways.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25,000.00; \$10,000.00 for road sealing of town roads and \$15,000.00 for the resurfacing of town roads or to take any other action in relation thereto.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,000.00 to go with State Matching Funds of \$30,000.00 (2 to 1) to complete the reconstruction of River Road (Clough Road Section) or to take any other action in relation thereto.

- 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$48,133.16 for the reconstruction of Quaker Street for a distance of 1.5 miles beginning at Route 114 or to take any other action in relation thereto.
- 17. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to appropriate for the purchase of a new Highway Department truck(s) and authorize the withdrawal of \$10,000.00 for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund with the balance to be raised by taxation.
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$20,000.00 for the purpose of paving the Gregg Road to the landfill. (Petition Article).
- 19. To see what some of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the paving of Ridgeview Road, or to take any other action in relation thereto. (Petition Article).
- 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$33,380.00 for the Weare Police Department or to take any other action in relation thereto.
- 21. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 to complete renovations of the Weare Police Department headquarters and to authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund.
- 22. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$2,800.00 for radio and communications equipment for the Weare Police Department and to authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund.
- 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$32,967.00 for the general budget of the Weare Fire Department or to take any other action in relation thereto.
- 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for repairs and maintenance of the Town Fire Stations or to take any other action in relation thereto.

- 25. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$2,872.00 for communications equipment for the Weare Fire Department and to authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund.
- 26. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$1,200.00 for the repair and maintenance of the Town Water Holes and to authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund.
- 27. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$6,600.00 for new and replacement equipment for the Weare Fire Department and to authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund.
- 28. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$2,200.00 for the installation of two new overhead doors at the Center Fire Station and to authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund.
- 29. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$10,000.00 for purchase and installation of a new oil burner system for the Center Fire Station and to authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund.
- 30. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$30,266.20 for the operation and maintenance of the Weare Landfill or to take any other action in relation thereto.
- 31. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen on behalf of the Town to enter into a cooperative agreement, pursuant to RSA Chapter 53-A, for the purpose of joining together towns and cities in a joint and cooperative effort for the disposal of solid waste in a manner which will meet federal and state regulations and for the economical and efficient recovery of energy from said solid waste disposal. The Cooperative to be formed under the cooperative agreement will be designated the "Concord Regional Solid Waste/Resources Recovery Cooperative". A copy of the current draft of the proposed cooperative agreement is posted with the warrant and is available at town offices during normal business

hours. The Board of Selectmen is specifically authorized on behalf of the Town (a) to execute and deliver the cooperative agreement (with such changes therein from the posted agreement as the Board of Selectmen shall approve, such approval to be conclusively evidenced by the Board of Selectmen's execution thereof) and such other instruments, documents, and agreements as the Board of Selectmen may deem necessary or desirable in furtherance of the purposes of the cooperative agreement; (b) to cause to be performed all obligations which may from time to time be required pursuant to the terms of the cooperative agreement; and (c) to take action relative thereto.

- 32. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$12,873.21 for the operation of the Weare Public Library or to take any other action in relation thereto.
- 33. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the Weare Public Library to conduct a study of the Town's future library needs or to take any other action in relation thereto.
- 34. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the restoration of the Town Hall or to take any other action in relation thereto.
- 35. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$6,680.75 for word processing equipment for the Weare Town Offices and to authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund.
- 36. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 to repair town cemeteries under the direction of the Trustees of Cemeteries and to authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund.
- 37. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$17,600.00 to provide for handicap access to the Town Office Building and the Town Hall, and to authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund.

- 38. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to install a suspended ceiling in a second floor meeting room in the Town Office Building and to authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund.
- 39. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$12,000.00 for professional assistance in up-dating the Master Plan and developing a five-year Capital Improvement Plan for the Town of Weare, and to authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund.
- 40. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 for the construction and installation of a septic system and toilet facilities at Chase Recreational Park and to authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund.
- 41. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$1,200.00 to erect a spun-aluminum flagpole on the grounds of the Town Office Building and to authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund.
- 42. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$2,700.00 for the purchase of a conference table and eight chairs, 30 folding chairs and a four-drawer, legal-size, fire-proof file cabinet for a second floor meeting room in the Town Office Building and to authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund.
- 43. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$2,115.00 for Town Office renovations and equipment for the Selectmens' and the Town Clerk/Tax Collector's Offices and to authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund.
- 44. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to repair the storage vault at the Town Office Building and equip it with steel shelving, and to authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund.

45. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following Gravel Ordinance to replace the existing ordinance adopted on March 7, 1972 and subsequently amended in 1976, 1977, 1978 and 1979:

Town Of Weare Gravel Ordinance

1. No owner shall permit or conduct any excavation of earth off on his premises in the Town of Weare without first obtaining a permit.

EXCEPTIONS:

- A. Lawful construction or alteration to building, parking lots, ways, or driveways on a portion of the premises where removal occurs.
- B. Excavation that is incidental to agricultural or silvacultural activities, normal landscaping or minor topographical adjustment.
- C. Excavation from a granite quarry.

2. PERMIT APPLICATION

- A. Any owner or owners designee shall, prior to excavation of his land, apply to the Selectmen for an excavation permit. The permit shall be signed and dated by the applicant and shall contain at least the following information:
 - The name and address of the owner(s) of the land to be excavated.
 - Name and address of all abutters to the premises to which will be excavated.
 - 3. A drawing showing:
 - (a) Description of the location and the boundaries of the proposed excavation. (Does not have to be a surveyors description)
 - (b) The number of acres involved in the project
 - (c) Access to the excavation

- (d) Visual barriers to public highways.
- 4. The breadth, depth and slope of the proposed excavation.
- 5. The estimated time duration of the project
- The elevation of the highest annual average ground water table within or next to the proposed excavation.

3. PROHIBITED PROJECTS:

- A. The Selectmen shall not grant a permit:
 - Where an excavation is proposed below road level within fifty (50) feet of any highway right of way, unless such excavation is for the purpose of said highway.
 - 2. For excavation within fifty (50) feet of the boundary of a disapproving abutter, or within ten (10) feet of the boundary of an approving abutter (in both 50' and 10' instance there must be a minimum of 1' to 1 1/2' slope toward abutters line), unless reasonable further approval is requested by said abutter.
 - When the issuance of the permit would be unduly hazardous or injurious to the public welfare.
 - 4. Where the excavation would substantially damage a known aquifer, so designated by the United States Geological Survey.
 - 5. When excavation is planned beneath or adjacent to inland surface waters in such a manner that a permit is required from the N.H. Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission, the Water Resources Board, the Special Board on Dredge and Fill, or other State or Federal Agencies with jurisdiction over the premises; but the regulator may approve the application when all necessary permits have been obtained.
 - 6. Where the project cannot comply with the restoration provisions referred to in paragraph 4A.

4. RESTORATION

- A. Within twelve (12) months after the expiration date in the permit therefor or the completion of the excavation, whichever first occurs, the owner of the excavated land shall restore, or cause to be restored, the area affected by the excavation to meet each of the following minimum conditions:
 - Except for exposed rock ledge, said area shall be covered with vegetation suitable to prevent erosion and with soils suitable to sustain such vegetation. Topsoil or existing material will be saved on site for reapplication during the restoration of the excavated area..
 - Debris resulting from excavation shall be buried or removed.
 - All slopes shall be graded to natural repose for the type of soil of which they are composed.
 - 4. The elimination of any standing bodies of water created in the excavation project as may constitute a hazard to health and safety unless the Selectmen specify different restoration.
 - 5. Any Owner shall not be forced to restore any working face within the application area, until such area of work is exhausted or the excavation permit is expired. However, the owner is responsible for the safety of any person or persons on the site.

5. APPLICATIONS FOR AMENDMENT:

A. When the size of the project changes from what is described in the original permit requested, (affecting either size or location of the excavation, the rate of removal or plan for restoration) the owner shall submit an application for amendment of his excavation permit. The application shall be subject to approval in the same manner as provided for an excavation permit.

6. HEARINGS:

A. Prior to the Selectmen approving or disapproving an application for a gravel permit or for an amended excavation permit:

- A public hearing shall be held within thirty (30) days of such application.
- A notice of the hearing shall be sent to all abutters by certified mail and will state:
 - a) grounds for the hearing
 - b) date, time and place of hearing.
- 3. A legal notice shall be published in at least two (2) newspapers that have general circulation in the Town at least fourteen (14) days in advance of the hearing. The 14 days shall not include the day of publication nor the day of the hearing, but shall include any Saturday, Sunday or legal Holiday within said period.
- A notice of the hearing shall be sent by mail to the members of the Weare Planning Board and the Weare Conservation Commission.
- Legal notice shall be posted in at least three (3) public places in Town.
- 6. An excavation fee of twenty five (\$25) dollars will be paid by the applicant at time of filing.
- 7. The current cost of mailing certified letters to all abutters and the publishing of legal notices in at least two newspapers will be paid by the applicant at the time of filing
- B. Within ten (10) days of said hearing, or any continuation thereof, the Selectmen shall render a written decision approving or disapproving the application. If disapproved, the Selectmen shall state reasons for disapproval in writing.

7. ISSUANCE OF PERMIT

- A. If the Selectmen, after the public hearing, approve the application for a permit and determine it is not prohibited by this ordinance, paragraph (3) three (Prohibited Projects), they shall require:
 - 1. Posting of a bond, with such surety as the Selectmen shall reasonably determine, with the Town Treasurer in an amount as reasonably set by the Selectmen based on the working size of the project (not including stockpile areas or areas already leveled where excavation work is completed) but not less than five thousand (\$5,000.00) dollars to guarantee compliance with the terms of the permit.

- a) The bond shall not expire until eighteen (18) months following the end of the permit or any extension thereof.
- B. A copy of the permit shall be prominently posted at the excavation site or the principal access thereto.
- C. The permit shall not be assignable or transferable without the prior written consent of the Selectmen.
- D. The permit shall specify the date upon which it expires:
 - Renewal issuance dates shall all be the same month, the month of December.
 - 2. Inspection date by the Selectmen should be in October.
- E. The Selectmen may include in the permit such reasonable conditions as are consistent with the purpose of this ordinance, including the provision of visual barriers to the excavation.
- F. The calling of a bond or surety which is found not to hold sufficient moneys to restore area does not, however, relieve the landowner of his obligation to comply with this ordinance. It will be the responsibility of the Selectmen to take whatever means necessary to force compliance.

8. RENEWAL OF PERMIT

- A. All valid gravel permits issued by the Town of Weare shall expire on December 31st in the year in which it was issued. The date of expiration shall appear on the permit.
- B. The Board of Selectmen may renew any existing permit following:
 - The filing of a renewal permit application with the Selectmen's Office complete with a \$10.00 fee by October 1.
 - 2. The Selectmen shall inspect the specified gravel pit by October 30 to check on the operation and order any necessary work to be completed by December 31 in order to be in compliance with the terms of the ordinance.

- 3. The Selectmen determine the extent of the work being performed on the site is outlined in the applications already filed with the Selectmen's Office.
- c. Should the Board of Selectmen for any reason deem a renewal of the permit was not in the best interests of the Town of Weare, they will notify the applicant in writing by December 31 stating their reasons for denial and will refund the \$10.00 renewal fee.

9. VIOLATIONS OF ORDINANCE

- A. The Board of Selectmen shall issue cease and desist orders against any operator if he is found to be in violation of any terms of this ordinance. The order shall remain in effect until the violation is corrected.
- B. If a violation is cited by the Board of Selectmen and a cease and desist order is issued, any continuation of the violation shall be subject to a \$100 per day fine to be imposed by the Board of Selectmen. Each day the violations continue shall be deemed as a separate offense.
- C. Any cease and desist order issued by the Selectmen shall take affect for the purpose of this ordinance on the date it is issued and shall be served by either certified mail or by a law enforcement officer.
- D. The Selectmen may recover any fines due upon application to a court with appropriate jurisdiction.

10. EXISTING OPERATIONS

Excavation operations in actual operation on the effective date of this ordinance shall be entitled to a permit upon request without having to comply with the procedures herein; said permit shall expire on December 31 of the calendar year following the year of enactment of this ordinance.

11. PRIOR ORDINANCES

To the extent any proior ordinance is inconsistent with the provisions hereof, said prior ordinance is repealed.

12. EFFECTIVE DATE

This ordinance shall be effective upon passage by the voters of the Town of Weare and upon publication of notice of same in a paper of general circulation in Weare and upon filing a copy with the Town Clerk.

- 46. To see if the Town will appropriate the sum of \$750.00 to help Senior Citizen activities for the year 1985. (Petition Article).
- 47. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,861.00 for the purpose of subsidizing the cost of services provided by the Contoocook Valley Counseling Center to Weare residents needing financial assistance. (Petition Article)
- 48. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,000.00 to reshingle the roof of the Town Office Building, or to take any other action in relation thereto.
- 49. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 from the Town Forest Account for the purpose of constructing access roadways within the Felch Farm Town Forest.
- 50. To see if the Town agrees to participate in the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) by directing the Board of Selectmen to complete the eligibility application and submit the required information to the Federal Insurance Administration.
- 51. To see if the Town agrees to adopt the following Resolution which is required to establish eligibility to participate in the National Flood Insurance Program.

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, certain areas of the Town of Weare are subject to periodic flooding from streams, brooks, rivers, ponds, etc. causing serious damages to properties within these areas; and

WHEREAS, relief is available in the form of Federally subsidized flood insurance as authorized by the National Flood Insurance Act of 1968; and

WHEREAS, it is the intent of this Town Meeting to require the recognition and evaluation of flood hazards in all official actions relating to land use in the floodplain areas having special flood hazards; and

WHEREAS, this body has the legal authority to adopt land use and control measures to reduce future flood losses pursuant to New Hampshire RSA Chapters 672, 673, 674, 675, 676, and 677.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That this Town Meeting hereby:

- 1. Assures the NFIP that it will enact and maintain in force for those areas having flood hazards, as delineated by the Flood Hazard Boundary Map issued by the NFIP dated February 14, 1975 and any published revision to this map, adequate land use and control measures with effective enforcement provisions consistent with the Criteria set forth in Section 1910 of the National Flood Insurance Program Regulations and
- 2. Vests the Board of Selectmen with the responsibility, authority, and means to:
 - (a) Assist the Administrator, at his request, in his delineation of the limits of the area having special flood hazards.
 - (b) Provide such information as the Administrator may request concerning present uses and occupancy of the floodplain areas.
 - (c) Cooperate with Federal, State and local agencies and private firms which undertake to study, survey, map and identify floodplain areas and cooperate with neighboring municipalities with respect to management of adjoining floodplain areas in order to prevent aggravation of existing hazards.
 - (d) Submit on the anniversary date of the community's initial eligibility an annual report to the Administrator on the progress made during the past year within the Town in the development and implementation of floodplain management measures.

- (e) Upon occurrence, notify the Administrator in writing whenever the boundaries of the community have been modified by annexation or the community has otherwise assumed or no longer has authority to adopt and enforce floodplain management regulations for a particular area. In order that all Flood Hazard Boundary Maps and Flood Insurance Rate Maps accurately represent the community's boundaries, include within such notification a copy of a map of the community suitable for reproduction, clearly delineating the new corporate limits or new area for which the community has assumed or relinquished floodplain management regulatory authority.
- 3. Appoints the Board of Selectmen to maintain for public inspection and to furnish upon request, for the determination of applicable flood insurance risk premium rates within all areas having special flood hazards indentified on a Flood Hazard Boundary Map or Flood Insurance Rate Map, any certification of flood-proofing, and information on the elevation (in relation to mean sea level) of the level of the lowest habitable floor (including basement if habitable) of all new or substantially improved structures, and include whether or not such structures contain a basement, and if the structure has been floodproofed, the elevation (in relation to mean sea level) to which the structure was floodproofed.
- 4. Agrees to take such other official action as may be reasonably necessary to carry out the objectives of the program.
- 52. To see if the Town will vote to accept funds from the Weare Bicentennial Fund for purposes of creating the Weare Tricentennial Trust Fund, to be held by the Trustees of Trust Funds for purposes of celebrating Weare's 300th Anniversary in 2064. Both principal and interest may be expended for the puposes of the trust fund as created.

- 53. To see if the Town will reaffirm its March 6, 1973 vote concerning the creation of a Historic District Committee or to take any other action in relation thereto.
- 54. To see if the Town will receive the report of the Semi-Annual Tax Collection Committee or to take any other action in relation thereto.
- 55. To see if the Town will vote to call upon its elected representatives in the United States Congress to strongly support continuation of the Federal Revenue Sharing Funds Program for the continued benefit and improvement of the Town of Weare and her sister communities nationwide. Realizing the need to get the federal budget deficit under control, the Town of Weare would further urge the Congress to reduce the level of funding to the program instead of its total elimination.
- 56. To see if the voters will vote to adopt the following ordinance:

 "It shall be unlawful for any person to engage in electioneering on any public property within 500 feet of the Town Hall for and during any election. The American Legion Post and its environs are considered public property for the purpose of this Ordinance. Electioneering includes sheet and pamphlet distribution; signs inserted into the ground; signs attached to vehicles stopped or parked within 500 feet of the polling place and any audio system.

A breach of this Ordinance is a Violation punishable by a \$50.00 fine for each offense." (Petition Article)

- 57. To see if the Town will vote in favor of continuing the recent practice of holding the business portion of the Town Meeting on a Saturday or to take any other action in relation thereto.
- 58. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to hire independent public accountants to perform the financial audit of the town records for the year ending December 31, 1985, and also a compliance audit required of Federal Revenue Sharing Funds.

- 59. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate a sum not to exceed \$10,000.00, said sum to represent a town contribution not to exceed \$5,000.00 and a matching grant from the State of New Hampshire for the construction of a playground area, and equipment for same, plus paving and landscaping at Chase Park.
- 60. To see if the Town will vote to convey to Gerard P. Schaumberg a certain tract or parcel of land in said Weare known as the land in South Division, containing about 65 acres, said conveyance to condition upon payment by said Gerard P. Schaumberg of all taxes and costs incidental to a prior conveyance by the Collector of Taxes for the Town of Weare to the Town of Weare.
- 61. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$780.50 to replace money the Weare Public Library may be required to turn back to the Town. \$780.50 was originally raised by the Library through the sale of miscellaneous items and books (some bequeathed to the Library by Mildred Hood) and if replaced, will go toward the purchase of a photo copy machine or books. (Petition article)
- 62. To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

At 6:59 p.m., Forrest Esenwine moved to keep the polls open until 7:15 p.m. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

The polls were closed at 7:15 p.m. by the Moderator and the ballots counted. At 8:48, Raymond Kelly read the result of the School District election. At 8:50 p.m., William Herman read the result of the Town election.

At 8:55 p.m., the Meeting was declared recessed until Saturday morning, March 17, 1984 at 9:00 a.m.

After the Meeting recessed, the Town Moderator gave the oath of office to Raymond Kelly, School District Moderator. Mr. Kelly then gave the oath of office to Joyce Smith, School District Clerk.

At 9:07 a.m., Saturday, March 17, 1984, the recessed Town Meeting was called to order by the Moderator, William G. Herman. The pledge of allegiance to the flag was led by Forrest Esenwine. The Meeting was asked to stand to hear the reading of town residents who had died since last Town Meeting. This was followed by a moment of silence. The Moderator then asked the Meeting to remain standing to observe a moment of silence for prayer for the memory of Kathleen Mattil and for the recovery of her mother, Paula Mattil.

The Moderator read the results of the Town and School District elections held Tuesday, March 13, 1984.

The Moderator announced the following appointments to the Finance Committee: Peggy McAllister, Daniel Corsetti, Jr. and Craig Knowles to three-year terms; Frank Szerlog to an unexpired two-year term.

The Moderator announced there are two appointments still to be made to the Finance Committee -- one three-year term and one unexpired one-year term.

The Moderator stated the rules of order for the conduct of the Meeting. He introduced the Town Officers, members of the Finance Committee and Senator Jack Chandler, State Senator for our District.

Forrest Esenwine moved the reading of the Warrant in its entirety be waived at this time and that each article be read as it is taken up. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

Forrest Esenwine moved to raise and appropriate the sum of \$385,645.00 under Article 2. The motion was seconded. Mr. Esenwine stated this sum is an increase over the posted budget of \$2,520.00 under Emergency Answering Service to cover communication coverage by the Goffstown Police Department 1 day a week for the Weare Police Department from April 1 to December 31, 1984.

Stetson Hunt, of the Finance Committee, moved to amend the amount to \$382,125.00. The motion was seconded. This would reduce the Emergency Answering Service by \$3,520.00 -- \$2,520.00 for communication coverage by the Goffstown Police Department and \$1,000.00 for telephones in the homes of the Police Chief and Fire Chief.

Discussion ensued on Article 2, and the Board of Selectmen were asked why an Administrative Assistant had not been hired in 1983. Also the Auditor's report printed in the Town Report was discussed.

Robert Munro requested the qualifications and job description of the Administrative Assistant position and when the Selectmen anticipated this position would be filled. The Selectmen replied the job description was available in their office and was based on the N. H. Municipal Association's job description for this position. anticipate filling this position by June, 1984.

Gordon Tiffany asked if any thought had been given to having a performance bond posted for this position.

Chester Rhodenizer moved to amend the amendment to increase the amount raised under Article 2 to \$382,625.00 to add the \$500.00 to restore the Fire Department telephone in the Chief's house. The motion was seconded. After discussion, Robert Munro moved the question. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative. The vote on the amendment to the amendment bringing the appropriation to \$382,625.00 was affirmative.

Murray Wigsten moved to amend Article 2 by increasing the amount appropriated for the Planning Board by \$600.00. The motion was seconded. The vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$383,200.00 was affirmative.

Wilfred Foote moved the acceptance of Article 5 as read. The motion was seconded.

Finance Committee recommended acceptance of Article 5.

Kenneth Glaude asked about department heads having to submit purchase orders for purchases over \$50.00. Forrest Esenwine stated this is strictly a matter of good business practice. It is to keep good records of expenditures.

Robert Munro moved the question. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

The vote on Article 5 was affirmative.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000.00 for repair of bridges or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Wilfred Foote moved the article be accepted as read. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$70,843.62 which represents the anticipated Highway Block Grant Aid under RSA 235 for the maintenance, construction and reconstruction of Class IV and V highways.

Wilfred Foote moved acceptance of Article 7 as read. The motion was seconded. It was stated that under this classification, there is a carry-over from last year in the amount of \$4,518.27.

Finance Committee recommended acceptance of Article 7.

The vote on Article 7 was affirmative.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25,000.00; \$10,000.00 for road sealing of town roads and \$15,000.00 for the resurfacing of town roads or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Wilfred Foote moved Article 8 be accepted as read. The motion was seconded.

Finance Committee recommended acceptance of Article 8.

The vote on Article 8 was affirmative.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Highway Department to sell some of its used equipment with the funds received to be applied toward purchasing updated equipment for the Highway Department or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Forrest Esenwine moved that the Town vote to allow the Highway Department to sell some of its used equipment and appropriate the funds received to be applied toward purchasing updated equipment for the Highway Department. The motion was seconded.

The Finance Committee concurred with this article.

The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,000.00 to go with State Matching Funds of \$30,000.00, 2 to 1, for reconstruction of River Road (Clough Road section), or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Harold O. Hall moved to raise and appropriate the sum of \$45,000.00, \$15,000.00 to go with the State Matching Funds of \$30,000.00, 2 to

1, for reconstruction of River Road (Clough Road section). The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,000.00 to finish resurfacing South Sugar Hill Road from Knox's corner on, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Robert Munro moved to dismiss Article 11. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$12,500.00 for the purpose of paving Barnard Hill Road for a distance of approximately 1/2 of a mile or to Cold Springs culvert, off of Route 114.

Robert Silva moved the article be adopted as read. The motion was seconded. Finance Committee recommended this article.

Neal Kurk stated he feels petition articles such as this one are not appropriate. This work should be planned by the Road Agent.

Edith Foote moved the question. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

The vote on Article 12 was affirmative.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$7,900.00 for the purchase of a sander for the Highway Department and to authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

Wilfred Foote moved to vote to appropriate the sum of \$7,900.00 for the purchase of sanders, new or used, for the Highway Department and to authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972. The motion was seconded.

Finance Committee agreed with this article.

Robert Munro asked where we stand currently with Revenue Sharing Funds. Forrest Esenwine stated the articles in this Warrant are covered by current funds -- not anticipated funds. We have more funds due us as soon as the audit is completed.

The vote on Article 13 was affirmative.

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$28,500.00 for the Weare Police Department or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Donald E. Thomson moved Article 14 be accepted as read. The motion was seconded.

The Finance Committee recommended this article.

The vote on Article 14 was affirmative.

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$3,800.00 for communications equipment for the Weare Police Department and to authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

Donald E. Thomson moved Article 15 be adopted as read. The motion was seconded.

Finance Committee concurred with this Article.

The vote on Article 15 was affirmative.

ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$750.00 for pager equipment for the Weare Police Department and to authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

Donald E. Thomson moved the adoption of Article 16 as read. The motion was seconded.

Finance Committee concurred with this article.

Forrest Esenwine stated these funds are received from the Federal Government and are not reflected in your property tax rate.

A division vote was taken on Article 16: Yes - 62; No - 31. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$32,967.00 for the general budget of the Weare Fire Department or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Chester Rhodenizer moved to accept Article 17 as read. The motion was seconded.

Donald Rogers of the Finance Committee moved to amend this amount to \$31,238.45. The motion was seconded.

The Finance Committee recommended a reduction of \$1,728.55 overall in the areas of reimbursements, electricity and fuel oil. After discussion and explanation, Gertrude Murdock requested the amount of reduction made by the Finance Committee for salary reimbursements. Mrs. Murdock then moved to amend the Finance Committee amendment by this amount - \$628.00 - making the total figure \$31,866.45. The motion was seconded. The vote on this amendment was negative.

The vote on the Finance Committee amendment of \$31,238.45 was negative.

The vote on the original amount of \$32,967.00 was affirmative.

ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,050.00 for repairs and maintenance of the Town Fire Stations or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Chester Rhodenizer moved Article 18 be accepted as read. The motion was seconded.

Finance Committee agreed with this article.

The vote on Article 18 was affirmative.

ARTICLE 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$7,408.00 for new and replacement equipment for the Weare Fire Department, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Chester Rhodenizer moved Article 19 be accepted as read. The motion was seconded. Finance Committee agreed with Article 19. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for repairs and maintenance of the Town Water Holes or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Chester Rhodenizer moved to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000. for repairs and maintenance of the existing Town Water Holes and to build new Water Holes. The motion was seconded.

Finance Committee had no recommendation on this article.

The vote on Article 20 was affirmative.

ARTICLE 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 to repair and replace a section of the cement floor and apron to the Center Fire Station or take any other action in relation thereto.

Gordon Brown moved to accept Article 21 as read. The motion was seconded. Finance Committee concurred with this article.

The vote on Article 21 was affirmative.

ARTICLE 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$975.00 for two compressors, one new and one used, for the Center and South Weare Fire Stations, or take any other action in relation thereto.

Chester Rhodenizer moved Article 22 be accepted as read. The motion was seconded. Finance Committee concurred with this article.

The vote on Article 22 was affirmative.

ARTICLE 23. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purpose of celebrating the Fire Department's Fiftieth Birthday, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Chester Rhodenizer moved to raise and appropriate \$300.00 for the purpose of celebrating the Fire Department's Fiftieth Birthday. The motion was seconded.

Finance Committee did not have a recommendation on this article since there was no dollar amount specified. However, it was stated this was not to be construed as a negative recommendation.

The vote on Article 23 was affirmative.

ARTICLE 24. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$1,800.00 for the purchase of 6 new pagers and to authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

Chester Rhodenizer moved to appropriate the sum of \$1,800.00 for the purchase of 6 new pagers for the Fire Department and to authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972. The motion was seconded. Finance Committee concurred with this Article. The vote on the Article was affirmative.

ARTICLE 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,400.00 for the Weare Community Health Organization for expenses and to have the Concord Regional Visiting Nurse Association provide Home Health Services for the residents of the Town of Weare, NH or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Harold O. Hall moved to accept Article 25 as read. The motion was seconded. Finance Committee concurred with this article.

The vote on Article 25 was affirmative.

The Meeting recessed for lunch at 12:05 and resumed at 12:36. At that time, Chester Rhodenizer, Fire Chief, stated the Fire Department would be demonstrating the "Jaws of Life" at the far end of the hall.

ARTICLE 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$20,200.00 for the Weare Landfill, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Wilfred Foote moved the article be accepted as read. The motion was seconded. Finance Committee concurred. The vote on Article 26 was affirmative.

ARTICLE 27. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to hire a qualified Hydrologic or hydrogeolic consultant and for the installation of groundwater monitoring wells at the Town's Landfill site.

Forrest Esenwine moved that the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$14,500.00 to hire a qualified hydrologic or hydrogeolic consultant and for the installation of groundwater monitoring wells at the Town's Landfill site. The motion was seconded. Finance Committee concurred with Article 27.

After some discussion under Article 27, Jeff Brown moved the question. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

The vote on Article 27 was affirmative.

Stetson Hunt moved to suspend the rules and take up Article 45. The motion was seconded and the vote to suspend the rules was unanimous.

ARTICLE 45. To see if the Town will authorize and direct the Selectmen to review the considerations which may be involved in participating with the City of Concord Solid Waste Resource Recovery project, to enter into discussions and negotiations regarding the project, and

to report back to the Town as to their findings and recommendations. A decision by the Town to participate or not to participate in the project will be deferred to a Special Town Meeting in the Fall of 1984, or the Regular Town Meeting in March of 1985.

Forrest Esenwine moved Article 45 be accepted as read. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

Forrest Esenwine moved to suspend the rules and consider Articles 28 and 29 together. The motion was seconded and the vote to suspend the rules was unanimous.

ARTICLE 28. To see if the Town of Weare will vote to become a member of the Southern New Hampshire Planning Commission.

ARTICLE 29. To see if the Town of Weare will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,666.72 (\$.46 per capita) as the Town's share of the operation of the Southern New Hampshire Planning Commission.

Forrest Esenwine moved that the Town vote to become a member of the Southern New Hampshire Planning Commission and to raise and appropriate \$1,666.72 as the Town's share of the operation of the Southern New Hampshire Planning Commission. The motion was seconded.

Finance Committee had no recommendation under this article.

Gordon Russell stated the information gained at these meetings make it an excellent investment.

The vote on Articles 28 and 29 was affirmative.

Forrest Esenwine moved to reconsider Article 2. The motion was seconded and the vote was negative. Article 2 was not reconsidered.

ARTICLE 30. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for support of the Annual July 4th Celebration or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Robert Munro moved to raise and appropriate \$500.00 for the Annual July 4th Celebration. The motion was seconded.

Finance Committee had no recommendation under this article.

The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 31. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,271.71 as the pro rata share of the Town of Weare cost of the Probation Department for the Town of Goffstown.

Forrest Esenwine moved the article be accepted as read. The motion was seconded. The Finance Committee concurs with this article. The vote was affirmative.

Jon Osborne moved to reconsider Article 8. The motion was seconded. The vote was negative.

Chester Rhodenizer moved that all articles, after being accepted or defeated, cannot be reconsidered at the 1984 Town Meeting. The motion was seconded.

Neal Kurk asked if this is binding and in order. The Moderator stated this motion is legal. Legal Counsel stated the Moderator's ruling stands unless the Meeting overturns it.

Jeff Brown moved the question. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

A division vote was taken on Mr. Rhodenizer's motion. The result of the vote: Yes - 57; No - 40. The vote was affirmative. No articles will be reconsidered.

Joe Brennan called to the Meeting's attention that Vernon Wood was sitting in the back of the hall. The Meeting gave Mr. Wood a standing ovation for his years of service to the Town.

ARTICLE 32. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$14,602.67 for the operation of the Weare Public Library, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Camille Ahern moved the article be accepted as read. The motion was seconded. Finance Committee concurred with this article.

The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE 33. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for repairs to the Library roof or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Harold O. Hall moved the Town raise and appropriate \$2,500.00 to put a new roof on the Library. The motion was seconded. Finance Committee concurred with this amount.

Robert Munro asked if this would be put out to competitive bid. The answer was yes.

The vote on Article 33 was affirmative.

ARTICLE 34. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 for repairs to the Town Hall and to authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

Renaldo Azotea moved to appropriate the sum of \$3,500.00 for repairs to the Town Hall and to authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

The motion was seconded. Finance Committee concurred with this amount.

This amount would be used for outside painting, repair of ceiling and repair of steps; however, this is just a beginning.

Kenneth Glaude recommended to Selectmen to look into what it would cost to repair the floor so it could be used for large gatherings and to come before next year's Town Meeting with a figure for the cost. The Moderator stated the request is noted in the Minutes of the Meeting. It is non-binding, but it has been noted.

Robert Munro stated last year the Board of Selectmen was mandated to come up with a budget to put the Town Hall into good condition. He feels there should be some long-range planning on the amount to be spent.

Gordon Brown stated he felt the problem is with making the floor sound enough for dancing, etc. Feels the building will serve the Town with small crowds, but it may be very expensive to fix floor to accomodate large groups.

Frank Farmer stated he felt the underpinnings should be fixed before ceilings, steps, etc. are fixed. Feels someone should come before Town Meeting with list of problems or an estimate for necessary repairs to put the Town Hall in good shape. He felt this article should be defeated and wait until some information is available at next Town Meeting.

Robert Munro moved to amend the article by appropriating \$3,500.00 for purpose of repairing the Town Hall, but to hold the money, with the exception of \$500.00, in an account for that purpose: the \$500.00

to be used to pay a contractor or contractors for an estimate as to what it would cost to repair the floor, roof, etc. -- whatever else has to be done. The motion was seconded.

Mr. Munro was informed that this money cannot be put in a separate account; however, it could be used over a two-year period.

The vote on the amendment was affirmative. The vote on the article as amended was affirmative.

ARTICLE 35. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for the Supervisors of the Check List to computerize the voter check list and to authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

Terry Knowles moved to appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the Supervisors of the Check List to computerize the voter check list and to authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

The motion was seconded. Finance Committee concurred with this article.

The vote on Article 35 was affirmative.

ARTICLE 36. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for a crossing guard at the crosswalk at Route 114 (in front of Weare Center Store) or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Stetson Hunt moved to dismiss Article 36. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative. Article 36 was dismissed.

ARTICLE 37. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for senior citizen activities and to authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

Harold O. Hall moved to accept Article 37 as read. The motion was seconded. Finance Committee concurred with this article.

The vote on Article 37 was affirmative.

ARTICLE 38. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the purpose of subsidizing the cost of services (provided by the Contoocook Valley Counseling Center) to Weare residents needing financial assistance.

Margaret Wood moved the article be accepted as read. The motion was seconded. Finance Committee does not recommend this article.

Christine Hague and Carol Barringer both spoke in support of this article. Elizabeth Himan, with the permission of the Meeting, also spoke in support of this article.

Adrienne Scarfo of the Finance Committee, stated acceptance of this article would be setting a precedent.

The vote on Article 38 was affirmative.

ARTICLE 39. To see if the Town will vote to accept the Joseph Perrigo Scholarship Trust Fund.

Ray Rogers moved the Joseph Perrigo Scholarship Trust Fund be accepted. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 40. To see if the Town will vote to affirm the sale of the Sawyer Homestead, Tax Map #1457, by the Trustees of the Trust Funds.

Forrest Esenwine moved to accept Article 40 as read. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 41. To see if the Town will vote to accept Center Brooke Lane as a town road.

Wilfred Foote moved to accept Article 41 as read. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 42. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept gifts and/or Federal or State Aid in the name of the Town of Weare, and to appropriate the same to the payment of purposes for which it constitutes reimbursement, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Renaldo Azotea moved the article be accepted as read. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 43. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to transfer tax liens and convey property acquired by the Town by Tax Collector's deed by public auction (or advertised sealed bid) or in such other manner as determined by the Selectmen as justice may require. (As provided under RSA 80:42, Sale of Tax Liens/Tax Deeded Properties).

Renaldo Azotea moved the article be accepted as read. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 44. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following ordinance pursuant to authority conferred by RSA 286, as amended, and for the purpose of promoting the general welfare and development of the Town of Weare.

Sec. 1. Specifications

To insure that the safety and welfare of the public and convenience is maintained, no person or organization shall hold or sponsor any of the following activities with the Town of Weare without first obtaining a license from the Board of Selectmen:

- Parades or processions upon a public street or a public way.
- b) Open air meetings or gatherings, including theatricals and concerts (not to be construed as including private gatherings of families and guests for such events as weddings, house parties, barbecues, etc., unless such gatherings shall cause parking on a public way).
- c) Circuses.
- d) Carnivals.
- e) Sideshows.

Sec. 2. Procedure

- a) Applicant must obtain an application form and a copy of the ordinance from the office of the Selectmen during normal working hours.
- b) Completed application forms must be returned to the Selectmen's office no later than thirty (30) calendar days prior to start of event, but this provision can be waived by the Board of Selectmen for good and sufficient cause.

- c) Application will be routed to the following town departments for their investigation, requirements, and comments:
 - 1. Police

3. Health

2. Fire/Rescue

- 4. Highway
- d) Selectmen will review departments' comments and recommendations and notify applicant of decision. If the decision is in the affirmative, further requirements, if any, will be stated.
- e) Upon compliance with all requirements, a license may be issued.

This ordinance is not intended to cover applicable activities held completely within the confines of halls or buildings, except as required by State statutes. Further, nothing herein contained is to be construed as applying to activities not specifically addressed in the above categories.

3. Requirements

The Selectmen may require in the amount and form that they specify that the sponsor obtain, provide or pay the following:

- a) License fee
- b) Bond
- c) Adequate parking
- d) Adequate sanitary facilities
- e) Type of activity, location, dates, times, and hours of operation.
- f) Written permission of owners of affected property within 1/4 mile radius.
- g) Insurance
- h) Police and/or Fire protection provided by the Town and paid for by the sponsor.
- i) Estimated number of attendees or participants as applicable for each occurrance.

- j) Conformity with the Life Safety Code.
- k) Any other expense not covered in the above. (All exchanges of funds will be in the form of cash, certified check or money order).

In the event of cancellation, notice must be given to the Selectmen 72 hours prior to the start of the scheduled event. License fee is not refundable.

In the event cancellation is called less than 72 hours prior to the time the event is scheduled, sponsor will pay four (4) hours for each Town employee scheduled to work.

License must be obtained at least (1) week prior to the scheduled event, but this provision may be waived by the Board of Selectmen for good cause.

Sec. 4. License Fees

The fees for obtaining said license shall be as follows:

- a) Parades or processions upon a public street or a public way shall be \$1.00.
- b) Open air meetings or gatherings, including theatricals and concerts shall be:

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Groups of less than 50 - $ 10.00 Groups of less than 500 - $ 25.00 Groups of 500, but less than 1,000 - $ 50.00 Groups over 1,000 - $ 100.00
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- c) Circuses shall be \$10.00.
- d) Carnivals shall be \$10.00.
- e) Sideshows shall be \$10.00.

Forrest Esenwine moved to waive the reading of Article 44. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

Forrest Esenwine stated that Article 44 has been withdrawn by the Selectmen. Withdrawal of an article does not require a vote of the Meeting per Town Counsel.

ARTICLE 46. To see if the Town of Weare shall call upon the Governor and Executive Council, its State Representative(s) and State Senator

to promptly convene a Special Session of the Legislature for the sole purpose of preventing the imposition of huge cost increases in electric rates resulting from the Seabrook Nuclear Power Plant on the citizens, businesses, schools and agencies in the Town of Weare, and to direct the Selectmen to promptly notify our above listed elected officials of the Town's desire.

The Moderator ruled Article 46 out of order and stated his reasons for this ruling as follows:

"As Moderator, I took an oath of office to 'uphold the rules and regulations of the State of New Hampshire'. The rules of this State are very clear concerning the recall of the Legislature into special session. Part 2, Article 50 of the New Hampshire Constitution leaves the recalling of the Legislature to the discretion of the Governor with the consent of the Executive Council. Subsequently, RSA 16 also allows the Legislature to recall itself provided a prescribed number of State Representatives and State Senators agree to the need of a special session. Both of these avenues have already been pursued by the main sponsor of the article and there was no support by either the Governor and Executive Council or his fellow Legislators for this recall. There is no provision in the State Constitution or State Statutes which provide for the public as a whole to recall the State Legislature.

Secondly, under New Hampshire law, a special session of the Legislature cannot be confined to one issue as this article would suggest. There is no way that anybody can guarantee that only electric rates will be considered at this session. The legislators are free to propose laws, impose taxes and discuss any issue they choose if they are called into special session.

Thirdly, the Public Utilities Commission in this state and in every other state were created by state law to decide issues and rates for utilities. They have a quasi-judicial stature and their decisions may be appealed by either party through the courts. By law, they are the only ones who should be deciding this issue.

And, finally, the Chair has grave reservations about this sort of issue coming before the Town Meeting forum. State Statutes specifically define the purpose of a Town Meeting as a means of conducting the Town's business through a democratic, legislative process... the most democratic process known to man. This town business includes items such as determining Town budgets, discussing ordinances, accepting roads as Town roads and the like. There is no provision or mention of the discussion of any State, National or world event or problem. The Chair strongly feels the growing number of articles of this nature... particularly articles which are drafted and prepared by persons or organizations from outside of our Town... are an abuse

of the Town Meeting process. When the voters of this or any Town meet once a year to set a direction for their Town's government, only those issues over which the voters have a direct control should be the subject of discussion and debate.

So, after lengthy study and careful consideration of this warrant article and the points which the Chair has just addressed, the Chair has ruled this article out of order as being an attempt to circumvent the State's Constitution and laws, improper for the Town Meeting forum and deceiving and improperly worded.

Recognizing the desires of those citizens who placed this article on the Town warrant for consideration, the Chair will recognize anyone who wishes to challenge the Chair's ruling."

Neal Kurk moved to challenge the Chair's ruling. The motion was seconded.

Paul Dosher and David Erikson spoke in support of the challenge. Robert Munro, Forrest Esenwine and Leola Killpack spoke in support of the Moderator's ruling.

Charles Toll asked if Town Counsel supported the ruling of the Chair. Town Counsel stated that procedurally, the Meeting is on the right track. The Moderator has made a ruling on procedure. Neal Kurk has properly challenged the ruling. The Meeting must now decide whether to accept the Moderator's ruling.

Jeff Brown moved the question. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

A division vote was taken. The result of the vote:

Yes - 68; No - 26

The Moderator's ruling was upheld.

ARTICLE 47. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following ordinance, or to take any other action in relation thereto:

In order to protect and promote the safety, welfare and peace of the Town, the Selectmen are authorized and empowered to regulate the hours and conditions, including the number of persons permitted to be present, at any place, public or private, inside or outside, where (a) more than ten people are assembled and (b) alcoholic beverages, however acquired, are present, regardless of whether a state liquor license is required. Regulations may, among other things, distinguish between different classes of activities, may impose penalties for their

violation, may require licensing and may be changed from time to time. A public hearing must be held before the adoption of any regulation or change in regulation.

This ordinance shall not apply to the following: a) private houses and the premises immediately adjacent thereto when used for private, non-profit making activities; b) public or private charitable or religious organizations; and c) the Town and its political subdivisions, including the school district, and agencies.

Forrest Esenwine stated that Article 47 has been withdrawn by the Board of Selectmen.

ARTICLE 48. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 for a Security Guard at Chase Recreational Park, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Robert Munro moved this article be accepted as read. The motion was seconded.

Finance Committee moved to amend the article to read that no money be raised under this article. The motion was seconded.

Finance Committee feels that with the Park's bank balance at the end of the year, the Park can hire a guard without the money being raised by taxation.

The vote on the amendment was affirmative. The vote on the article as amended was affirmative. No money was raised under Article 48.

ARTICLE 49. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$750.00 for repairs to the Town Water System and to authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

Harold O. Hall moved Article 49 be accepted as read. The motion was seconded. Finance Committee concurred with this article.

The vote was affirmative.

Gordon Brown asked if the money received by the Town from people who pay the Town for their water goes into a Water Fund account. The answer was that money received goes into the General Fund.

ARTICLE 50. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to deed back to Glendon Johnson of Houston, Texas certain

property off Old Fern Price Road, so-called, in the Huskie Subdivision, located in South West Weare, known as Lot #10 of a plan recorded at the Hillsborough County Registry of Deeds, formerly owned by him and acquired by the Town by Tax Collector's Deed, but only after payment to the Town of all unpaid taxes, plus interest and/or penalty on same, legal fees, etc., and upon payment of any other costs as deemed by the Selectmen to be in the best interests of the Town.

Gordon Brown moved to dismiss Article 50. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 51. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to seek semi-annual taxes by 1985.

Stephen Flanders moved Article 51 be accepted as read. The motion was seconded.

After a short discussion, Paul Dosher moved to amend the article to authorize the Selectmen to look into semi-annual tax collections and report back to the Town by 1985 how much the Town would save and the impact on the tax rate.

Wilfred Foote moved the question. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

The vote on the amendment was affirmative. The vote on the article as amended was affirmative.

ARTICLE 52. To see if the Town will vote to change Paragraph 2B of the Subdivision Regulations to read: "The gift or offering for sale by any person in a calendar year of a single piece of property at least two acres in size, regardless of the fact that it may be part of a larger parcel, does not come within the scope or purpose of Paragraphs 2C, 2D, and 3 of these regulations. This exception does not apply to approved lots in any approved subdivision."

Murray Wigsten stated the Planning Board has withdrawn Article 52.

ARTICLE 53. To see if the Town will vote to change Paragraph 3C to add "shall be equipped with a hammerhead or a turn-around roadway."

Murray Wigsten moved approval of Article 53 as read. The motion was seconded. Wilfred Foote spoke in support of this article.

Kenneth Glaude moved to amend the article to read "to be equipped with a hammerhead only". There was no second to the motion to amend.

The vote on the article as printed was affirmative.

ARTICLE 54. To see if the Town will vote to change Paragraph 3F to read: "This paragraph F shall expire on March 31, 1986."

Murray Wigsten moved to adopt the article as written. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative.

ARTICLE 55. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

The Moderator expressed his thanks to the Board of Selectmen and the Finance Committee.

Forrest Esenwine moved to adjourn the Meeting. The motion was seconded and the vote affirmative. The Meeting adjourned at 3:15 p.m.

The following Town and School officers were given the oath of office by the Moderator following the adjournment of the Meeting: Neal Kurk, Moderator; Wilfred Foote, Road Agent; Robert Hatfield, Auditor; Melanie Knox, Supervisor of the Check List; Robert Munro, Trustee of the Trust Funds; Gordon Brown, Board of Fire Wards; Tom Branscom and Gary Evans, School Board Members.

The new Selectman, William Herman, was given the oath of office by the Town Clerk following the adjournment of the Meeting.

BOARD OF FIRE WARDS' ANNUAL REPORT

The work to make the Center Fire Station more energy efficient continues. The cement floor has been repaired, overhead doors have been refitted, and cracks in the cement block walls pointed up. This work was done at a considerable saving to the Town because of the donation of a large compressor and two jack hammers from Daniels Drilling and Blasting Company of New Boston, and a lot of hard work by a few firemen.

Money was appropriated, at the 1984 Town Meeting, to build an office upstairs and an outside room to house the generator. The Board of Fire Wards thought that it would be in the best interest of the Town to pool this money and the money saved from the above project, and build an addition to the rear of the station that would accomodate both of these needs, plus give us some much needed space for storage. In doing this we would be covering up a large section of the cenent block wall where there was a large heat loss. This project has been completed.

After much imput from the Rescue Squad as to the types of calls they were responding to, the Board of Fire Wards met with the Selectmen to discuss the matter. It was decided that in the best interest of the taxpayers and members of the Rescue Squad, a mailing would be sent out to the taxpayers to reinform them of the purpose of the Rescue Squad as an emergency service only and not to be used as a transporting service. This was done and hopefully will eliminate many of the non-emergency calls of the past.

REPORT OF WEARE FIRE DEPARTMENT

During the year of 1984, the "Red Network" received 509 calls. These are broken down into the following types of calls:

These calls are calls on Red Network only. They do not reflect calls made by radio from other towns or police.

In June, the Fire Department held an open house to mark the 50th Anniversary of the Weare Fire Department. At this event, there was a display of fire equipment from past to present.

I Equipment

This past year the Weare Fire Department added to its equipment the following items:

5 Fireman Coats

6 Firefighting Helmets

400 ft. of 4-inch hose

An Incoming-gated relief valve

300 ft. of 1 3/4 in. Firefighting hose

- 2 30-minute Aluminum Self-Contained Breathing Tanks
- 5 Pairs of Bunker Pants

In addition, there were numerous smaller items of new equipment purchased through the Mutual Aid Bid List, which saved the Town approximately \$800.

II Water Holes

During 1984, the Fire Department filled in two water holes, which were too small and not of any reasonable use. There are plans for a water right-ofway in North Weare across from Ray Eaton's house to the river, which would give North Weare Village an adequate water supply in case of fire.

III Repairs & Alterations to Trucks

New Canvas to Engine I
Pump Repairs to Engine I (Valves Rebuilt)
Engines 1,4,5 & Tanker I were rust-proofed by
a hot-oiling process at Wilson's Hot Oiling
of Deering. We hope that this will enhance
the body life of the trucks.

Engine 5's storage compartments were sand blasted, repainted and properly vented to prevent moisture from adversely affecting the equipment in the compartments.

Twice a year, at inspection time, all vehicles are taken to the Goffstown Truck Center for a thorough inspection, including grease job, oil change, and a complete check up of all working parts.

A canvas cover for the portable pump on Tanker l was made for better utilization during the winter months.

A battery charge-conditioner was purchased and installed on Rescue 1 so its battery will always be in a ready state during emergencies.

IV Inspections

All Town buildings were inspected by a State Fire Inspector from the State Fire Marshal's Office. All deficiencies were noted and are in the process of being upgraded. This the first known inpsection of all town buildings in recent history.

V Study Committee

Due to the fact that some of the fire trucks are of antique vintage, we are now in the process of establishing a committee to study the needs and draw up specifications to measure the cost of a new truck to the Town Meeting in 1986.

VI Mutual Aid

Through the continuous training with other towns by the Mutual Aid System, we saw our training pay off this year when we stopped a major fire from spreading in Weare Center, and we were able to save the Leach Place on Sugar Hill when the barn burned down. The help we received from our neighboring towns has been tremendous, and we wish to thank these towns for their support.

VII Support

The Fire Department would like to thank the Fire Auxiliary for its continuing support through its sponsoring the Community Calendar, Halloween Party for kids, and the Santa Program. We would also like to thank the American Legion Post #65 for its support in sponsoring the Firemen's Supper and all other various activities they help us with. In closing, we would like to thank the townspeople for their continuous support in making the Weare Fire Department a department they can be proud of.

WEARE RESCUE SQUAD

The rescue squad answered a total of 168 calls from November 1, 1983 to October 31, 1984. Of these calls 99 were for medical emergencies, 41 auto accidents, and 28 for other calls such as non-transport, mutual aid, and canceled calls. This is a small increase from the previous year.

There were 18 members of the rescue squad as of January 1, 1984. Three have moved to other towns and three have chosen not to renew their licenses. This, combined with most members working full-time in and out of town, leaves the squad limited during the day. We have gained two new E.M.T.'s and one Licensed Nurse. We are currently looking for people who are willing to take at least 40 hours training, or who already have the training, to join the squad. A 40 hour Advanced First Aid course will be scheduled when sufficient interest is shown. Please contact Chief Chester Rhodenizer or myself, Jon Osborne, for further information.

The Jaws of Life were purchased and placed on Engine 1. A number of training drills were held and many fire and rescue personnel showed great interest in using the tools. The Jaws of Life were used on a number of auto accidents during the year.

During the year the rescue squad formed a non-profit association to handle the fund-raising events and other duties. The association will be known as the Weare Emergency Medical Services Association. We welcome any townspeople who wish to join this association and help continue the fine services that the squad has given the town for so many years. Anyone interested in joining should contact Director Jon Osborne at 529-1547 or Leon Methot at 529-2609.

The Director and Members of the Rescue Squad wish to thank all the townspeople for their support of the squad especially employers who allow rescue squad members to leave work and respond to the rescue calls. Their help is greatly appreciated.

WEARE POLICE REPORT 1984

During 1984 we had one officer resign from the force, one move out of town, and two others sworn in. Two officers completed the 80+ hour course to become certified by the State of New Hampshire as part time officers. This is now a requirement of the State of New Hampshire regardless whether you are full time or part time. All officers have completed at least one qualification with the firearm carried on duty under a certified firearms instructor, which as of 1985, is required by the State of New Hampshire. Two officers also completed the Radar training course at Police Standards and Training which consists of approximately 20 hours of class and also some operation of the radar unit.

Our present roster consists of five part time regular officers, two of which live out of town and three part time auxilliary officers. In order to provide better service to the town we should have more people available and are looking for interested persons with the time to serve and are willing to take the time for the required training. If you are interested, an application can be obtained at the Town Clerk's Office or from the Police Department.

During the year a fingerprinting program was held, for school children up through the sixth grade, in cooperation with the Fire Department Auxillary. A total of 413 children were fingerprinted in three sessions. Plans are being made to hold another program during 1985. "Officer Friendly" type of visits were held also during 1984 with plans to continue these visits during 1985. Both of these programs require the officers involved to take time off from their regular job.

Stepped up enforecement of the Motor Vehicle laws were implemented during the year as a result of previous bad experience with accidents and in particular fatal accidents. A comparison of the accident rate and the number of fatals after this program started showed a significant decrease in accidents and showed the number of fatals going to zero. We plan to continue the strict enforcement of the Motor Vehicle laws during 1985.

During 1984 over 300 motor vehicle cases were processed in court consisting of 255 cases of speed, 8 cases of DWI and 37 other moving violations.

Recent criminal activity found the department able to solve six burglaries involving three juveniles, recovering most of the stolen items, and getting convictions in court. In connection with this we are again requesting anyone seeing anything they feel suspicious about to report this information to the police at 529-2323. Your name will be held in strict confidence if you wish.

The department has an engraving tool for the use of anyone wishing to use it to mark any of your property. A call to 529-2323 will reserve it for you.

In light of the Towns' growth and the amount of activity requiring some action by an officer, the Board of Selectmen and the Police Department have requested the New Hampshire Police Chiefs Association to review the needs of the Town of Weare in terms of police protection and make recommendations. Although this report will not be ready for the town meeting of 1985, we should have a good basis for planning in 1986.

I would like to personally thank those that have assisted the department during the year by giving us information on criminal activities. Without this type of help it is very difficult and sometimes nearly impossible to solve many crimes. A special thanks also to men of the fire department and rescue squad for their help at the scene of accidents directing traffic, etc.

HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT REPORT

The beginning of 1984 started out with icy roads, which consumed large amounts of salt, sand and time. As the season changed, we wound up with Craney Hill Road, Twin Bridge Road and Barnard Hill Road (Cold Spring Area) with major wash outs. Around the Daniel Lake area and Newman-Wilson Road, sections were under water, roads were closed and extensive road repairs were made.

Then pot holes were next in line and seemed to pop out constantly all around the town for about a month. The Department was grading, raking, patching holes, cleaning ditches and repairing equipment for the future road projects.

Road projects completed this year included Barnard Hill Road from Route 114 to the culverts consisting of large culvert, excavation, gravel and resurfacing. River Road (Clough Road) was rebuilt and tarred, with Town and State Funds, to the bridge. The hazardous section on River Road was raised with fill for safety purposes and tarred. Sections of Poor Farm Road were cut, excavated and graveled. Breed Hill (Peaslee) was continued and is now about 1/2 tarred.

During the summer we continued grading and raking the rough roads whenever possible. They were so dry that they would make more dust and we were unable to keep them smooth. Cram Road bridge was redecked and rerailed. Continuation of removing trees, brush, cleaning and replacing culverts, road signs and general maintenance of all town roads and town equipment continued till snow came.

Throughout the year driveway permits were issued and new subdivisions were supervised while being built.

The Highway Department also is responsible for maintaining the Landfill Area and equipment repair.

We are continuing the process of updating roads.

The Board of Selectmen have asked that I come up with a five (5) year road maintenance and repair program to be included in the 1984 Town Report. The time phase of the program for completion will solely depend on town funding, and will be updated on an annual basis.

WEARE PARKS AND RECREATION COMMISSION

At the last Town Meeting, the Town expressed a desire to have Chase Park be available for use primarily by the citizens of Weare instead of non-residents from outlying areas. Despite the fact that the Committee was reorganized just three weeks prior to the opening of the season, this goal was realized. A good balance was achieved making the park readily available to the townspeople while, at the same time, taking advantage of the outside revenue from residents of outlying towns.

One of the Committee's primary concerns was to meet the requirements of the original deed which stated that a lifeguard must be on duty weekends and holidays. This was accomplished.

To avert a sanitary problem, the pit toilets were closed and chemical toilets were leased for the season. Buoys and lines marking swimming areas for safety were added. Some other accomplishments were:

Resurfacing of boat ramp
Tree Trim
Addition of sand and gravel to beach area
New and additional signs
Security lighting
Refurbishing of picnic tables
Repairs to snack bar

The Commission is looking forward to further improvement to Chase Park with the addition of a permanent toilet facility and septic system which hopefully will be partially financed by revenue sharing funds.

Our goal is to not only make Chase Park financially independent but perhaps add to the town revenue.

WEARE CONSERVATION COMMISSION

Activities of the Weare Conservation Commission for 1984 are summarized for the information of residents and taxpayers of Weare:

TOWN FOREST MANAGEMENT

A major effort is being made to improve large sections of standing conifer trees throughout the Felch Farm Forest. The second selective harvest in the last year is currently under way; the present cut removing 143,000 board feet of mostly low quality pine from amongst trees which will benefit from the additional space. The Commission is planning to construct access roadways into forest acres presently inaccessable. The first access road will be built into a section of the Felch Farm Forest which lies between the landfill and Peasless Meadow. This program of access roadways will continue until each section of the forest can be properly managed and protected from possible fire.

The first Felch Farm Town Forest Trail, one mile in length, has been completed. The Commission will be leading tours for the purpose of familiarizing interested townspeople with the many benefits available within this fine forest environment.

LAKE HORACE PRIME WETLAND

Following over two years of concentrated study by the Commission, and a three month Environmental Impact Assessment by students and instructors at New England College, evidence clearly shows that the practice of lowering water levels in Lake Horace each fall and raising levels again each Spring has serious and negative impacts upon the vast marsh area south of the lake. The Commission has partitioned the New Hampshire Water Resources Board for a public hearing in this regard.

TAVERN MARSH

This valuable marsh was illegally drained in September of 1982. The New Hampshire Wetland Board has been unwilling to enforce the state law which addresses illegal dredging of this valuable wildlife area. The Weare Conservation Commission lacking funds to mount any major litigation has, thus far, been unsuccessful in restoring any semblance of health to this 100 acre marsh community.

FERRIN POND

The environment of this unique highland pond has been seriously abused. People owning land in this area have been concerned enough to donate monies to the Weare Conservation Commission for the purpose of protecting the area from further degradation. The Board of Selectmen, along with the Commission, at the request of the Attorney General, have agreed that a public hearing should be called so this situation can be carefully reviewed.

OPEN HOUSE

In the Spring of 1984, two Open House events were held for the purpose of introducing state and town officials and local residents to the Commission's new meeting room. The major attraction of this room is a 24' hand-stenciled mural titled SEASONS IN A MARSH, painted by Linda Graham of Weare. Also in the room is a colorful map showing Weare's Historic Sites; this being done by George Hollis of Weare.

Closing: The Commission intends to continue its active role in watching over critical natural areas, specifically wetlands, throughout the Town. The townspeople are reminded that RSA 483-A requires a permit from the NH Wetlands Board before any wetland area can be changed from its natural state. This Commission is ready to assist anyone with questions or problems which arise when wetland areas are involved.

Protection of our surface and groundwaters is vital to our future health and well being, and we must all play active roles to protect the wealth of natural resources we have in Weare.

TRUSTEES OF THE CEMETERIES REPORT

In April the Board of Selectmen appointed a three-member Board of Cemetery Trustees in accordance with RSA 289:7, and charged them with the responsibility of maintaining and restoring the 35 cemeteries the Town of Weare is responsible for.

General maintenance and fall clean-up work was conducted at the Johnson, East Weare, Pine Grove, Sugar Hill, Weare Center and many other "family" cemeteries by a four man work crew.

Although the Town had budgeted \$6,800.00 for cemetery work, the Selectmen approved expenditures totaling nearly \$8,600.00 to do the work that was required.

The Trustees also contracted services to begin the repair of the fence bordering the East Weare and Johnson Cemeteries. Unfortunately, weather prohibited the completion of this project.

In 1984 the Selectmen, Cemetery Trustees, Administrative Assistant Ken Ward, and newspaper representatives toured the town cemeteries with an eye towards the future restoration work required to return the cemeteries to the quality they deserve. While the active cemeteries (Pine Grove and Johnson Cemeteries) are in good shape, there is a tremendous amount of work required at the other cemeteries. Sunken graves, toppled gravestones, broken gravestones, deteriorating fences, and more were found to be in need of attention by the Town.

Conservative estimates for the restoration of our cemeteries runs at \$100,000.00. Of course, we wouldn't expect the Town of Weare to accept such an undertaking all at once. We have proposed, with the approval of the Selectmen, to accept this challenge during the next seven to ten years. Our budget request for 1985 includes funds to restore the Sugar Hill Cemeteries off Route 77 in North Weare. Based on our experience here we will be able to more accurately plan future restoration projects and costs.

Our cemeteries have interesting stories to tell about our Town, her people and our heritage. They have been ignored for far too long. With your approval, we will work to preserve this legacy for our Town for generations to come.

REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD

1984 has represented another active year for the Planning Board. Within established subdivisions, a total of 16 new house lots were approved, all of at least two acres and many larger than the minimum. Under Weare's special one-lot-per-year regulation, an additional 21 lots per year were approved. The Board also met with a substantial number of landowners, giving guidance on subdivision procedures and assisting in several boundary line adjustments.

As in 1983, the Board feels that growth in Weare continues to be manageable and healthy. Legal challenges to growth rules, regulations and ordinances in other New Hampshire towns have been numerous and complex, however. The Planning Board has monitored some of these challenges and their outcomes to make sure that our own regulations and ordinances are consistent with current legal rulings on growth and restrictions on growth.

At the request of the Selectmen, the Planning Board reviewed the current Master Plan and believe it is not adequate in terms of new State law in several specialized and technical areas. The Board will therefore request, as a portion of its 1985 budget, funds to pay the Southern New Hampshire Planning Commission to help us update the Master Plan in such areas as existing land use, patterns of land development, population projections through the year 2000, land capability analysis, conservation, and economic development. It is believed these funds may be available through revenue sharing.

REPORT OF THE SOUTHERN NEW HAMPSHIRE PLANNING COMMISSION

Weare's membership in the Southern New Hampshire Planning Commission provides the Selectmen and the Planning Board with access to a variety of extremely cost-effective staff services that are available to help them deal with numerous planning and planning-related concerns.

Staff services rendered under the Commission's local assistance program consist of (1) those which the Commission believes are important enough to warrant a general notification of all member communities and (2) those which are specifically requested by municipal officials in accordance with locally-determined priorities.

Weare's renewed membership in the Commission became effective on July 1, 1984. Local assistance services provided to the Town since July included:

- . At the request of the Board of Selectmen, reorganized the text of the Town's personnel policies;
- Provided the Board of Selectmen with a suggested public health regulation to govern the conversion of seasonal homes for year-round use;
- . Offered to meet with the Planning Board and the Board of Selectmen to discuss the necessity of completing the Master Plan and Capital Improvements Program to address the provisions of state law;
- Co-sponsored the Municipal Law Lecture Series attended by several Weare Officials;
- . Provided the Planning Board with guidelines concerning new statutory requirements pertaining to the scheduling and notice of public hearings on proposed amendments to the building and permit ordinance in preparation for the March, 1985 Town Meeting; and
- . As requested by the Board of Selectmen, prepared ballot and warrant articles relative to proposed floodplain development regulations, and met with the Planning Board to review these and other provisions of the National Flood Insurance Program.

CONCORD REGIONAL VISITING NURSE ASSOCIATION 8 Loudon Road Concord, New Hampshire 03301

Annual Report of the Town of Weare, New Hampshire

The Concord Regional Visiting Nurse Association, Inc. continued to service Weare for this past year. In the Home Care Program, service is provided under a physician's plan of treatment to patients who are essentially homebound with diagnosed illness. This service is rendered by health professionals (Registered Nurses, Physical Therapist, Occupational Therapist, Speech Therapist, Nutritionist) and paraprofessionals, (Homemaker/Home Health Aides, Home Assistants) according to the patient's and family's needs. Hospice care is provided to patients in the last six months of a terminal illness. The Health Promotion Program has services (child health, family planning, screening) that are provided to low income/high risk patients and families in group settings, such as clinic and screening sites.

Health Education and Instruction is part of each home visit or clinic visit.

Anyone in Weare may request service; patient, doctor, health facility, pastor, friend or neighbor. Patients are also referred by other agencies. All requests are answered, but continuing home care can be provided only with a physicians orders.

A call to the Concord Regional Visiting Nurse Association, Inc. (224-4093) between the hours of 8 a.m. and 9 p.m. seven days a week is all that is necessary to start services or make inquiries. Hospice staff are on call (224-4093) 9 p.m. to 8 a.m.

Federal regulations specify a charge is applicable to all visits. Fees are scaled for those unable to pay the charge if that person has no other funding source available. However, for fee scaling, federal regulations require a financial statement be completed and a fee appropriate for which the patient will be responsible. Town monies subsidize those visits that are scaled or that no fee is collectible.

This Agency is accredited by National League for Nursing and American Public Health Association, certified for Medicare and is a member agency of Home Care Association of New Hampshire, United Way of Merrimack County, and National Association for Home Care.

ANIMAL CONTROL OFFICER'S REPORT

On March 23, 1981, the Selectmen appointed a Dog Officer for the purpose of picking up stray (unlicensed) dogs.

During 1984, approximately 175 calls were received by the Officer pertaining to animal problems: lost and found, complaints, pickups, and general information. All complaint calls were directed to the Police Department.

A total of 27 dogs were picked up during 1984 -- 13 were transported to the Animal Rescue League after attempts to find their owners proved negative, 2 were injured and transported to Russell Animal Hospital, 3 were deceased, 1 was adopted locally and 8 were retrieved by their owners.

As a service to the community, the Dog Officer also conducts a Lost & Found Service. Several animals have been returned to their owners at no charge.

REPORT OF THE TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

Our first forest fire prevention law was enacted by our State Legislature 90 years ago. This early law set in place a cooperative forest fire prevention and suppression effort between city and town governments and State government. It simply stated that no open fire could be kindled, when the ground is free of snow, without the written permission of the town/city Forest Fire Warden. This law also stated that anyone kindling a fire without written permission shall be liable for the damage caused and subject to a \$1,000 fine.

During the past 90 years, this law has worked so well that it has remained unchanged. All open fires when the ground is not covered with snow must be authorized by the local Forest Fire Warden. Persons kindling a fire without a permit when one is required are liable for damages caused, fire suppression costs and subject to a \$1,000 fine.

REPORT OF THE SEMI-ANNUAL TAX COLLECTION COMMITTEE

Following the direction of the 1984 Town Meeting, the Board of Selectmen appointed a seven-member committee in May of 1984 to study the issue of semi-annual tax collection for the Town of Weare. The committee consisted of the Tax Collector, the Town Treasurer, a member of the Finance Committee and four citizens at large, as well as a Selectman representative.

Under the system of tax collection currently used by the Town of Weare, money is borrowed in anticipation of taxes to finance town and school operations throughout the year. The loan is paid back when the property taxes are paid in December. Basically, the Town borrows a certain amount of money shortly after the first of the year to fund government operations through March. In March, the taxpayers approve a level of funding for the year at Town Meeting and the Town borrows more money to fund its operations through December at the level approved by the Town Meeting. In November, the Town mails out the property tax bills, through which it should gain the funds to pay back the loans for the previous months.

By utilizing the system described above, the Town of Weare is always working on borrowed money as we collect our revenue at the end of our fiscal year.

One source of relief to this process is semi-annual tax collection which would permit the Town to collect twice a year. This was the issue addressed by this committee and for which we submit our findings.

Semi-annual tax collection involves partial payment of the taxes assessed on April 1 in any tax year. Partial payment of taxes assessed under this section is due and payable on July 1 of the present tax year. A payment of the remainder of the taxes assessed on April 1, minus the payment due on July 1 of that year are due December 1.

The Advantages

Many of Weare's neighboring communities including Henniker, Deering and Manchester, have adopted the provisions of semi-annual tax collection and realized a savings due to the elimination or reduction of borrowing in anticipation of taxes. The expense of borrowing is as much a cost to the taxpayer as any appropriation approved by the Town Meeting. The cost of borrowing money for the Town of Weare has totaled \$308,903.38 for the past 10 years. This is a significant cost to the Town and its taxpayers which semi-annual tax collections could work to eliminate.

By changing to a semi-annual collection of taxes, the Town of Weare could utilize the tax revenues received in the July 1 payment not only to reduce the need for short term borrowing, but it can be invested in certificates of deposit or repurchase agreements which can yield substantial revenues. Increased revenues plus decreased borrowing costs can result in a reduction of the tax rate which is great enough to: 1) Eliminate the tax assessment to the taxpayer to cover municipal borrowing costs; and 2) offset the loss of earned interest payments the taxpayer would have received from the money put in an escrow account earmarked to pay the property tax bill.

The Disadvantages

Despite the positive aspects of semi-annual tax collection, there are some disadvantages to the plan.

Since taxes will be collected twice a year, two bills have to be sent. This means twice the postal and handling costs. There are ways to minimize the added costs, however, such as sending the July tax bill with the resident tax bill.

A town must have a well-structured and operating system of cash management. A cash management system can best be described as a balancing triangle. Each of the three functions is equally important. The three functions are collection of revenues, expenditure of funds and the investment of idle monies. More frequent collection of revenues will not result in a reduction of operating costs unless the other two functions are prudently managed.

Before deciding on a semi-annual tax billing process, it has been suggested the Town analyze its expenditure program to see if the maximum benefits are being derived from trade payables and transfers to the school district. Then, review all other revenue collection methods to be sure that funds are billed and collected in a timely manner. Another step is to review the investing strategies of the Treasurer to be sure that all idle funds are invested in the highest yielding accounts possible. Another step is to meet with bankers to negotiate upcoming borrowing requirements and see what they have to offer. If all of the above is accomplished and the Town is deriving the most from the existing system that it can reasonably expect, then consideration should be given to the next step of semi-annual tax billing.

Fiscal Year Change

Semi-annual collection is a vast improvment over year-end collection, but it is still not totally current. July payments still come six months after the beginning of the year and are based on the tax rates of the previous year.

Many communities have adopted semi-annual collection in conjunction with changing from a calendar year (January 1 to December 31) to a fiscal year (July 1 to June 30). The fiscal year change would allow the Town of Weare to be consistent with the state, county and school district fiscal years. Also, the budget is adopted before the fiscal year begins rather than two-and-one-half months after the beginning of the fiscal year.

Borrowing Costs

The following chart details the cost of borrowing for the Town of Weare under our present system for the past 10 years compared to interest made on investments.

It is obvious from this chart that, under our present system, increasing interest rates and high inflation will work against the Town's borrowing and investment practices.

Conclusion

After examining the pros and cons of semi-annual tax collection, this committee concludes the semi-annual collection of taxes for the Town of Weare would make good, economic sense only if Weare voted to adopt a July 1 - June 30 fiscal year.

Under state statutes, the provision for adoption of semi-annual tax collection is given to the Board of Selectmen. However, the changing of the Town's fiscal year is a decision for the Town Meeting.

Recommendations

Before any final decisions are made, this committee makes the following recommendations:

- 1) The Board of Selectmen be allowed to seek professional advise and guidance concerning the Town's system of cash management including collection of revenues, expenditure of funds, and the investment of idle monies.
- 2) This report and back-up information be referred to the Finance Committee for their study and recommendation for the 1986 Town Meeting.
- 3) This report and back-up information be referred to the Town Auditors for their study and recommendation for the 1986 Town Meeting.
- 4) An article concerning the adoption of semi-annual tax collection and the change of the Town's fiscal year be placed on the warrant of the 1986 Town Meeting for discussion and action.

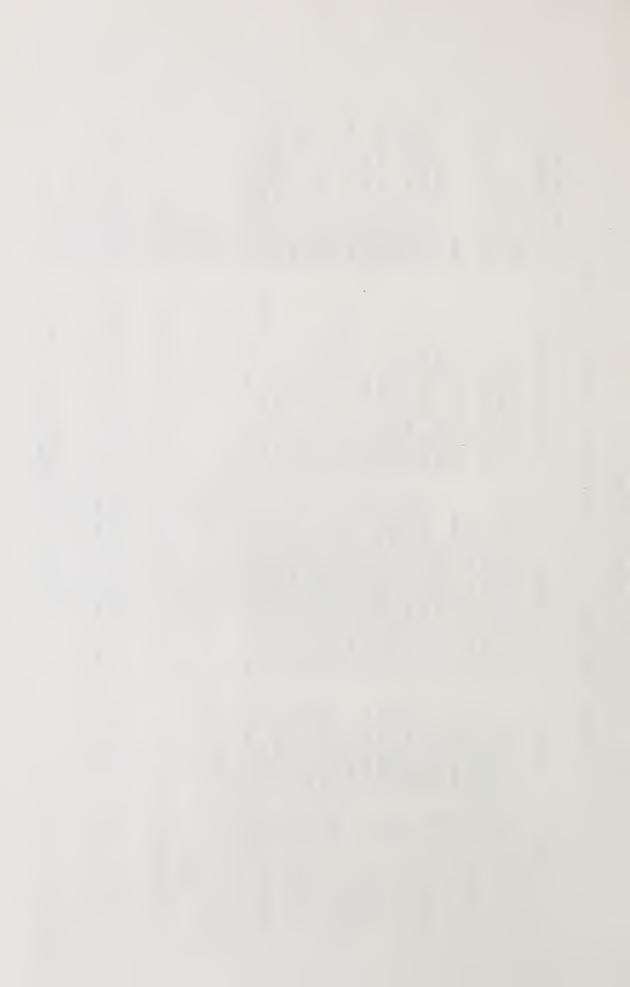

After reviewing all current information submitted by each sub-committee, the six member cooperative study committee, believes there is a very strong possibility of a cooperative venture between Henniker and Weare. We recommend to each town that they seriously consider this option for the education of their students and delay any major building in either town until this question can be answered, as this would economically prevent either town from being able to enter into a cooperative in the near future.

The earliest projected time line for the operation of the new cooperative school district is projected as of the school year 1987-88; if both towns strongly support the cooperative as well as a bond issue for a proposed building necessary for the operation of the district.

The cooperative study committee recommends that each town appropriate the sum of \$5,000 to the formal study for the purpose of (1) publishing costs of the final report of the committee and (2) consultant services to assist the formal study committee in establishing preliminary information for a new facility.

CURRICULUM SUB-COMMITTEE

The Curriculum Sub-Committee was charged by the Cooperative Committee to:

 Examine present programs for adequacy and uniformity.

2. Study offerings in both elementary and secondary programs. Compare the present programs with the State Minimum Standards.

3. List the educational advantages each town might expect to derive by entering into a cooperative school district.

The committee has found thus far, that both towns present curriculums in English, Social Studies, and Math that are relatively uniform. We feel both curriculums are minimally adequate with weaknesses in similar areas. A comparison of the offerings in both elementary and secondary programs to the state standards is still being examined.

At this point in our study we have found the following list of educational advantages each town might expect to derive by, entering into a cooperative school district: 1. A cooperative would provide the opportunity to offer broader programs on a more cost efficient basis. This more varied curriculum could include more offerings in each subject area. 2. The union of henriker and Weare would provide for an increased student population which would allow: a. more appropriate scheduling of individual students' course needs; b, more effective class sizes. We believe that class size is a significant factor in quality education, neither too large nor too small a class provides for adequate and effective education. 3. A cooperative permits more efficient and economical use of staff time in the instructional programs.

We believe, the curriculum, which may be developed through the formation of a cooperative between Henniker and Weare, would have a very positive effect on the quality of education for our students. We support the continuation of this study.

SPECIMINARY REPORT OF THE SCHOOL HOUSING NEEDS AND BUILDING

On October 29, 1984, the School Housing Needs and Building Sub-committee was formed and charged by the Cooperative Study Committee to:

determine the adequacy of the present elementary and secondary facilities
 project additional needed space
 project estimated cost for new facility including land acquisition and development costs.

Having spent several meetings touring both Weare and Henniker facilities and talking with their respective administrators, we find that the school facilities in both towns are at their full capacity and have exceeded capacity in some areas. Additional space is badly needed in both towns school facilities to accomospace is badly needed in both towns additional curricula.

During the next few weeks we will be looking into potential building sites for a new facility between Weare and Henniker and after receiving enrollment and curriculum projections from those respective sub-committees, we will be developing space needs and estimated costs for a new facility. This committee will also be studying the adequacy of each town's present facilities to house either a K-8 or K-6. As of this date, we recommend that the cooperative study be continued and that neither town begin any major building expansion until the cooperative issue is decided.

We have examined the financial statements of the Weare School District Treasurer for the year ended June 30, 1984, and have issued our report dated November 28, 1984.

Our study and examination of the above records would not necessarily disclose all the material weaknesses in the districts accounting system. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the system of internal control of the Weare School District.

However, our review of the Treasurer's accounts disclosed the following:

The summary of receipts and revenues on the Treasurer's Report (form F-4) showed that five of the six receipt accounts had amounts posted to incorrect accounts. Although the ending balance of cash on hand appears to be correct.

The Treasurer must balance his bank accounts with the districts general ledger as soon as his bank statements are received, and any discrepancies should be reconciled.

The year end closing of the books should be done prior to the end of the month following the end of the school year and statements and reports prepared at the same time.

As of this date the Treasurer's Report was not signed by the then school treasurer.

The provisions of RSA 71-2:21 require that this letter be published in the next annual school district report.

Routine physical exams including blood work were completed by all cafeteria personnel during the month of September, T.B. Tine tests were made available to all personnel requesting them as were blood pressure checks.

Pediculosis screening began in the schools on September 8 and has continued on a regular basis throughout the year. As listed in the health services report, the number of students screened is quite high compared to the number of actual students found with pediculosis. This is largely due to the constant attendance and support of the volunteers who not only assisted me, but in many instances, did the daily and teers who not only assisted me, but in many instances, did the daily and weekly checks themselves, allowing me to continue with the ususal health programs and duties. I have no doubt that the number of children affected would have been much higher and more constant without their help.

In October, students in grades 1-4 were presented with a film, "The Huffless, Puffless Dragon"; grades 4-6, the film, "Charlie Brown Clears the Air". These animated cartoon film strips use humor and satire to emphasize the health and environmental hazards of cigarette smoking. Individual programs of classroom instruction and discussion were also conducted at the respective grade levels.

In the health teaching area, topics and films on nutrition, drugs, alcohol, venereal disease and preventative health were also covered at their respective grade levels. The fifth and sixth grades were presented with a program on adolescence at the end of March which included films followed by classroom discussion.

Through the months of November and December, our Dental Program was once again offered to all preschool, elementary, junior and senior high students with a total of 147 students participating. Our dental hygienist, Mrs. Joyce Prowse was available these two months not only for cleanings, dental checks and fluoride treatments, but also for individual instruction for each student. Time was also spent in the classrooms discussing dental health. This year we were fortunate to be able to purchase the film, "Toothbrushing with Charlie Brown", in addition to a prevention-orineted school program on oral health covering levels Readiness through Grade 6. This program contains not only information but many activities centered around our dental program. The film and programs have proven to be quite useful to a number of teachers this first year and I'm sure will continue to be in the future.

A vision-hearing clinic was sponsored by the Sugar & Spice Kinder-garten and held on May 2nd at the Town Hall. A total of 45 children participated, 36 of which were registered for the first grade at that time

On May 15th, all incoming first graders were invited to spend a morning at the elementary school as guests of the present first graders. Forty children participated and enjoyed a bus ride to the school, short sessions in our gym and music programs, a first grade homeroom pertod and a visit to our library where they viewed the films, "Bus Safety", and "Pooh Meets A Stranger" - both films appropriate and hopefully, and "Pooh Meets a Stranger" safety to and from school.

We need at least one larger instruction area that could serve as a self-contained room for special needs students as well as a resource room. With the new minimum standards for New Hampshire High Schools and our increased population we will need, at a minimum, 4 additional classrooms. (Presently many of our students nain, 4 additional classrooms. (Presently many of our students have 2, 3, or 4 study halls per day because we don't have the space or staff to offer additional courses.) Our home economics room, industrial arts area, art classroom, and high school science toom, industrial arts area, art classroom, and high school science with safety standards. We should have a larger area for our guidance services. We could offer a better computer program if we had a separate computer lab, we need a teachers' lounge and work area. We need additional storage space for custodial and scholar supplies.

Music, physical education, and hot lunch are three programs that are housed in facilities shared by students in both buildings. Because of increased enrollment, we eliminated our music room this year so that we could create an additional fourth grade classroom. Presently the music teacher travels from room to room for elementary music, uses the cafeteria for junior high music, and has no place to offer high school music classes. There is no band or chorus. Our gymnasium is small, has very inadequate storage, productions. The downstairs toilet and locker room areas are in productions. The downstairs toilet and locker room areas are in need of renovation and are extremely difficult to supervise. Our cafeteria is too small. We have 4 servings each day from 10:45 to llocker are are in need of renovation and are extremely difficult to supervise. Our productions. We are at capacity.

The needs I have outlined above are real, exist today, and will not go away if we simply do nothing. The 1984-85 school year has been an extremely difficult one for parents, students, tackets, administration, and School Board. Parents have complained about overcrowded conditions; students and teachers have plained about overcrowded conditions; students and teachers have tion and School Board have analyzed needs, studied options, and will make tecommendations. We rely on you, the voting citizen, to make the decision you believe is truly in the best interest of the students in Weare Schools as we strive for excellence in education.

Principal Fred Roberts Our secondary school building houses 314 students in grades 7-12. The building as rated by the state has a maximum capacity of 279 students. We have no science classroom for our junior high program. We are holding classes in the cafeteria every period program it is not being used for lunch purposes. Our library is

Our elementary school building has exceeded the state's rated capacity. Our elementary library is smaller than state minimum standards prescribe. We need at least one full-sized classroom for our special needs population. We need a smaller room for special education services, such as speech and language, physical therapy, and psychological testing. We should have toilet facilities in the upper grade section of the building. There is inadequate space for storage, administrative offices, and a teachers' lounge and work area. All of these needs are and a teachers' lounge and work area. All of these needs are based on our present enrollment. With additional students we would need more regular classroom space.

We can talk about population projections, anticipated enrollment, a cooperative school study with Henniker, inflation,
and local economy. Yes, more families are moving into Weare,
and yes we do have more students this year. True, there is a
beginning of a study involving the Weare and Henniker communities
and mavbe within the next year the citizens in each town will
vote to build a cooperative school which will house our high
school students by the 1987-88 school year. Certainly we all
know about rising costs and increased tax burdens on the local
property owner. BUT - given all these considerations - we would
be remiss to ignore the actual educational needs that presently
exist in our schools today. In this report, I would like to share

In my principal's report published in "Weare Town Report - 1983", I summarized the accomplishments and progress we had made since 1980. I wrote with pride and a feeling of satisfaction about our achievements, and tried to convey an optimism that we would attain the five goals I believed were our challenges during the immediate future. In this report, I would like to concentrate on Goal #2 - "We as a School District must support a master plan for expansion of the school facility. We have to acquire more space in order to adequately offer the courses and programs that the students in Weare deserve."

At the Weare School District Meeting in March, 1984, the Weare School Board and the Weare Building Committee informed the voters of the space needs that existed at the time in the Weare Schools. A master plan concept that would meet the projected needs for the next 15 years was presented, discussed, voted on, and defeated. We have been suffering with the consequences of that

This year has seen another larger than expected increase in the student population, with September enrollment increasing to 665 in 1984 from 618 in 1983. Much of this increase was concentrated in the fourth grade, causing both classrooms to exceed 35 students. To remedy this situation, the School Board hired an additional teacher and split the fourth grade into three classrooms. To make room for this additional class, we had to use the music classroom, making it necessary for the music teacher to move from to room.

We had a similar overcrowded situation in the high school, causing us to hire an additional teacher.

This year also saw an increase in Special Education students.

To help meet the needs of a portion of this population in the most cost effective manner, we hired an additional teacher and created a self-contained special education class rather than sending these pupils to a more expensive out-of-district place-ment.

This past year has been a difficult one for staff and students alike, due to the continuing problems caused by the lack, of space. Each day specialists come to the school, and teach students in a closet. Our industrial arts and home economics classes are generally overcrowded, and some periods must be used for academic classes. The seventh and eighth grades are taught science in a classroom without running water.

We have tried to make the best use of our existing space. In the high school, there is one classroom that is free for one period of one day during the week. With that exception, every classroom is used for teaching every hour of the school day. We have classes in the cafeteria whenever it is not used for lunch. As have classes in the library almost every period, limiting its intended use.

This past year the State Department of Education published its minimum standards for high schools, which should be met with-in the next several years. While these were generally consistent with our expectations, and within our planned curricular improvements, they cannot be met in our present facility with today's ments, they cannot be met in our present facility with today's student population, much less the larger one we expect next year.

To help address this problem, we appointed a broad based building committee to study many options of creating additional space, including renting or leasing trailers, renovating existing town owned buildings, expansion of the present facility, building a new structure on the present site, and building a new facility on a different site.

Once applications have been identified, specific skills that we wish our pupils to attain will be the identified. Attached to these skills will be the grade level of instruction and the degree of mastery expected.

3. Once applications and skill expectations have been identified, specific categories of software will be identified as those most effective in achieving stated learning objectives.

Based on identified software, hardware will be selected that can run the identified software. Hardware that is selected may vary depending upon the software application.

Because implementation will be costly, the district will establish an implementation schedule which allows for the distribution of costs over several years while guaranteeing that priority areas for staff training and pupil instruction are implemented first.

In the process of implementation it is certain that new applications will be discussed. Each of these can be routed through the above 5 step process so that computer education in Weare will remain up to date. We believe that the above approach is a sensible one that will long serve the above approach is a sensible one that will long serve the weare School District. This year's budget as well as future budgets will include allocations for computer education. We look forward to your support in preparing education. We look forward to your support in preparing our children for the future.

I wish to express my appreciation for the assistance and cooperation provided me by the administrators, teachers, School Board, and citizens of Weare. Without this assistance and cooperation, many of the things accomplished would have been left undone, and I look forward to another prosperous year-a year of continued cooperation.

SCHOOL BOARD AND THE CITIZENS OF WEARE THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS TO THE

I herewith submit my 1985 Report concerning the public schools of Weare.

The 1984-85 school year is significant because pupils entering school this year will complete their college educations in the 21st century. When the technological advancements which have taken place in the last 20 years are examined, it is easy for us to be awed by the responsibility of preparing youth to live in a century that will make educational demands we can only incompletely imagine. It therefore seems appropriate to report to the citizens of Weare on the efforts being made to develop curricula that will prepare our children for life in a high curricula that will prepare our children for life in a high tech society.

It is reasonable to speculate that there will be virtually no occupational endeavor in which individuals wirtually no occupational endeavor in which individuals will not in some way need to interact with computers. We have taken a careful approach to computer education so that sound educational decisions can be made that will not be influenced by fads that come and go. We believe that it would be irresponsible to leap into huge expenditures for computers before establishing an approach that is flexible enough to accomodate the rapid technological change that is certain to take place. At the same time it is equally irresponsible to be immobilized by caution and thus fail to meet our commitment to the pupils who will be graduating in the near future and who need to be prepared for a world in the near future are playing an important role.

It is with the above mentioned considerations that all 5 districts in S.A.U. #19 are working on a computer plan that will fulfill our responsibilities to both pupils and taxpayers. The plan encompasses 5 basic steps:

1. Identify the computer applications that will be necessary and relevant for successful entry into a high tech society. To this end, we believe that computers will continue to be used to manage data, to perform calculations and to make the editing process in writing more efficient. All of our pupils should be given skills in at least these areas. Many other areas are being considered. Some of these include the computer as an instructor, a communications network and a simulator.

Mr. Branscom then explained the changes in the line items of the budget which resulted from the defeat of Articles 1 and 2.

The Finance Committee voiced no objections to the proposed operating budget figure of \$1,690,414.00.

A motion was made, but NEVER SECONDED, to reduce the \$15,000 allocation to finance the study of alternatives to Articles 1 and 2 recommended by the Finance Committee to an allocation of \$7,000.00.

Thomas Clow then moved that we vote on ARTICLE 6. The motion was seconded and the Article was PASSED.

ARTICLE 7

Bob Bailey moved that the School District raise and appropriate the sum of \$3600.00 for the purchase of tablet arm chairs for the high school.

This motion was seconded.

Bev Colburn then moved to amend ARTICLE 7 to read \$5600.00, and to include the purchase of new swing sets for the elementary school play area. The amendment was seconded and passed.

A vote was then taken on the amended ARTICLE 7. The motion was PASSED.

There being no further business to come before the meeting, the meeting was adjourned at 2:50 p.m.

Stetson Hunt, speaking on behalf of the Finance Committee, recommended that the proposed renovations and additions to the schools proposed in Article I not be considered at this time, and that the School Board present a new proposal to the town at the 1985 School District Meeting. He cited as the primary reason for this recommendation that School Board growth projections have, historically, been high. The Finance Committee did not feel that there was a need for as much additional space as the School Board was proposing to add to the existing facilities.

Bill Herman, also representing the Finance Committee, then spoke on the impact of the proposed school budget, including the school building projected an average building project, to the Weare taxpayers. He projected an average intaxes of \$446.00 over the next two years.

Marilyn Carson, representing the School Board, then spoke in defense of the building project, reiterating the School Board's feelings that there is a definite need for the additional space proposed.

MINUTES OF THE WEARE SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING

March 10, 1984

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL DISTRICT

for the Year Ending June 30. 1984

PUBLIC HEALTH REGULATION #1

<u>Section 1</u>. Purpose: The purpose of this regulation is to protect public health and well being, and to insure that on-site sewage disposal systems will not create a nuisance, harm the environment, or contaminate either surface or groundwater.

Section 2. Definition:

- a. Health Authority shall mean the Board of Health of the Town of Weare, New Hampshire or its designated representatives.
- b. Sewage shall mean a combination of liquid wastes which may include chemicals, household wastes, human excreta, animal or vegetable matter or other solids in suspension or solution, and which is discharged from a dwelling, building or other place.
- c. Sewage disposal system shall mean an on-site installation comprised of a septic tank, or other sewage-containing receptacle and/or a subsurface effluent distribution system. Privies are also subject to this Regulation.
- <u>Section 3</u>. Procedures: Any person proposing to obtain a Building Permit for construction, modification, conversion or alteration of an existing dwelling shall submit a plan of the in-place septic system for review by the Board of Selectmen and/or the Health Authority. If no plan is available, a detailed sketch of the location of the sewage system's components will be submitted; these showing distances, in feet, to the nearest stream, river, or surface water, and the location and distance of the source of drinking water from the leaching area of the sewage system.

The Health Authority shall review each Building Permit involving a change in status of a dwelling for the purpose of determining if there is a possibility of the status change resulting in future contamination of surface or groundwater. The Board of Selectmen and/or the Health Authority shall utilize soils and slopes maps, and surface and groundwater maps, any other available materials as the basis for making their determinations.

If conditions indicate the possibility of present or future contamination, the Board of Selectmen shall require as a condition to any permit requested, such reasonable requirements as will insure that the proposed construction or change of use will not endanger the public health and welfare of the Town or the area.

Section 4. Standards: Nothing in this Regulation is to be construed as relieving the applicant of the standard permit requirements relative to the individual sewage disposal systems on each lot.

Section 5. Inspection: The Health Authority may make on-site visitations to ensure that its regulations formulated pursuant to N.H. RSA 147 are being followed.

Section 6. Penalty: Any person who violates any of the provisions of this Regulation shall be guilty of a violation and shall be punished in accordance with applicable State laws. Each day any violation of any provisions of the above shall continue shall constitute a separate offense.
