#### WARRANT FOR THE ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L. S.)

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Webster, in the County of Merrimack, in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Grange Hall in said Webster on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the maintenance of highways and bridges.
  - (a) Town Maintenance.
  - (b) Plowing and sanding roads.
  - (c) Oiling town roads.
  - (d) General expense of Highway Department.
- 4. To raise and appropriate the sum of \$530.78 for Class V road construction.
- 5. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for Public Welfare.
  - (a) Town Poor.
  - (b) Old Age Assistance.
- 6. To raise such sums as may be necessary for the support of the Town Library.
- 7. To raise and appropriate sums as may be necessary for Patriotic Purposes.
  - (a) Old Home Day.
  - (b) Memorial Day.

- 8. To raise and appropriate sums as may be necessary for the support and maintenance of the Hy-Mar Fire Dept.
- 9. To authorize and empower the Board of Selectmen to borrow for the town by the issuance of notes a sum not exceeding \$10,000.00 in anticipation of taxes for the year 1952 said notes expressly payable from said taxes within one year from the date of issuance and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to determine the rate of interest on such notes and to provide for the sale thereof.
- 10. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for use in connection with the State program for the eradication of White Pine Blister Rust.
- 11. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of cemeteries.
- 12. To see what action the town wishes to take for the purchase of land and cost of removal of the Sweatt's Mills schoolhouse to a new location and make appropriation for the same.

#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the town of Webster, qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Grange Hall in said district on the eleventh day of March 1952, at one o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subject:

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year,
- 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
  - 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
- 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by the town.

- 9. To see what action the district will take in regard to disposing of the Sweatts Mills School house in case the town does not vote to accept it.
- 10. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$700.00 as a deficiency appropriation for interest payment on the bond issue for the school year 1951-1952.
