You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Westmoreland on Tuesday, the eighth day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said West-moreland on Tuesday the eighth day of March, next at 7:00 p.m. (in the evening), to act on the following subjects:

POLLS WILL OPEN AT 10:00 A.M. and CLOSE NOT EARLIER THAN 8:00 P.M.

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to accept the budget as submitted by the Budget Committee under the authority of the Municipal Budget Act. This budget may considered item by item or as a whole but may not be increased more than ten percent in any item as a whole.
- 4. To hear the report of Agents and Auditors and take any action relating thereto.
- 5. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$710.00 as its fair share of the operating costs of Elliot Community Hospital.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote for snow removal and sanding on either Class V or Class IV roads, or take any other action relating thereto to raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote for Class IV or Class V roads construction, reconstruction or betterment aid, and raise and appropriate the sum of \$778.29, the State to contribute \$5,188.63.

- 8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate in addition to what is required by law for highways and bridges.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$183.42 (six cents per \$1,000.00 of the Town's equalized valuation to the Monadnock Region Association, an agency to advertise, promote, and preserve the natural advantages and resources of the Town in cooperation with the other 37 Towns in the Monadnock Region.
- 10. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$125.00 as requested by the State for white pine blister rust control.
- 11. To see what disposition the Town will vote to make of the income of the Jotham Lord Fund.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the support of the Library.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00 for the maintenance of the Police Department.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$175.00 for the upkeep of the cemeteries.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to accept from Glenn E. Britton the sum of \$200.00 to be held in Trust. The income to be used solely for the perpetual care of the Allen A. Barker and Glenn E. Britton cemetery lot in Westmoreland South Village Cemetery.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to accept from Glenn E. Britton the sum of \$100.00 to be held in Trust. The income to be used solely for the perpetual care of the Arby Barker cemetery lot in Westmoreland South Village Cemetery.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to accept from Glenn E. Britton the sum of \$100.00 to be held in Trust. The income to be used solely for the perpetual care of the Zenas Britton cemetery lot in the East Westmoreland Cemetery.
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to accept from Harley Sheldon and Ruby Sheldon the sum of \$100.00 to be held in Trust. The interest to be used for the perputual care of the John

- E. Sheldon lot in the South Village Cemetery, Westmoreland.
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,095.60 to install street lights as proposed by the Public Service Co.

Article No. 4. It was voted to approve the reports of agents and auditors as printed in the Town Report for the year ended December 31, 1964.

Article No. 5. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$703.00 for the Elliot Community Hospital.

Articles No. 6 - 7 - 8 - 9 were voted and approved under Articles No. 2 and No. 3.

Article No. 10. It was voted to take no action on this article.

Article No. 11. It was voted to approve the purchase of a Yourk Road Rake for the sum of \$800.00 for the use of the Road Agents.

Article No. 12. It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1500.00 for the repair of the bridge on the highway leading off Route No. 12 to the residence of John K. Aldrich.

Article No. 13. Approved under Articles No. 2 and No. 3. Article No. 14. It was voted to take no action on this article.

Article No. 15. It was voted to use the income from the Jotham Lord Fund for the support of the Library.

Articles No. 16 - No. 17 - No. 18 were approved under Articles No. 2 and No. 3.

Article No. 19. It was voted to accept a trust fund of \$1000.00 from the Estate of Everett Warner, the income to be used for the maintenance of the South Village Cemetery.

Article No. 20. It was voted to permit the Westmoreland Athletic Association, Inc. to play basketball in the Town Hall in accordance with the rules and regulations mutually agreed upon by the Association and the Selectmen of the year 1962 until the next Annual Town Meeting.

Article No. 21. It was voted to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Article No. 22. Mr. Donald Paine requested that the Town permit the Selectmen to appoint Surveyors of Wood and Lumber, and Fence Viewers annually instead of having them elected by ballot. The request was granted by a voice vote of the voters present. Mr. Donald Paine called attention to the 30 years of faithful service to the town by Mr. Charles D. Messer, retired road agent. A rising vote of thanks and appreciation was given Mr. Messer.

Mr. George Wildey, our Representative to the General Court, explained the problems facing the N. H. Legislator in determining the re-apportionment program now in process.

The Moderator declared the Polls closed at 8:05 P.M. and the meeting adjourned.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

Most of us who live in New Hampshire and the thousands of vacationists that visit us every year love the State for the variegated woodlands that encircle our clean lakes and clothe the hills and mountains. Most of us appreciate these values, but still there were enough careless people among us to cause over 880 grass and woodland fires to start in 1965. True this was a much dryer than normal year but this should have meant the use of extra care. Fortunately the fire fighting forces have held the line against such careless acts. It is up to each one of us to be ever mindfull that a spark or flame is a potential fire.

WE MUST ALL BE CAREFUL:

- 1. To teach our children the danger in lighting matches.
- 2. To never discard lighted smoking material from a car or while walking through fields or woods.
- 3. To safely dispose of rubbish preferably at the town dump. If you must burn rubbish or brush:
 - a. Always get a permit to burn from the warden.
 - b. Start you fire late in the day after 5:00 P.M.
 - c. If burning a field or brush have equipment and adequate held on hand. The heat from your fire creates its own draft to spread fire.

Our carelessness with fire is costing our State and Towns thousands of wasted dollars in suppression and hundreds of acres of destroyed woodland. Yours never to enjoy.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the 12th day of March, 1966 at 2:00 o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary school district officers for the ensuing year. The polls will be open from 2:00 p.m. to 7:00 p.m.
- 2. To determine and appoint the salaries of the school board and truant officers, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 3. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees, or officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 4. To choose agents and committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 5. To see if the district will vote to accept the provisions of Title I, Public Law 89-10 (Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965), and to appropriate such funds as may be made available to the district under said Federal Act for such particular projects as may be determined by the school board. Further, to see if the district will authorize the school board to make application for such funds and to expend the same for such projects as it may designate.
- 6. To see if the district will vote to authorize the school board to make application for and to accept, on behalf of the district, any or all grants or other funds for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government or from the State of New Hampshire.
- 7. To see if the district will vote to authorize the school board to negotiate a tuition contract with the Fall Mountain Regional School District.
- 8. To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries for school district officials and agents and for the payment of the statutory obligations of the district.

- 9. To see if the district will raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$4,500 for the purpose of paying transportation costs for high school pupils.
- 10. To tranact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

SCHOOL MEETING

March 13, 1965

Agreeable to the foregoing warrant, the legal voters having met at the time and place mentioned in the warrant, the meeting was called to order by the moderator, John H. Terry, Jr., at 2:10 P.M. The warrant was read and then the articles were acted upon.

- Article 1. This article was left open until the close of the polls.
- Article 2. Bertha Staples made the motion which was seconded and voted that this article be passed at the present time and taken up with Article 9.
- Article 3. Marjorie Hudson made the motion which was seconded and voted that the report of the auditors be accepted as it appears in the Town Report.

Robert Moore, Jr., gave a report of the AREA school district planning committee. The motion was made, seconded and voted to accept the report and place it on file.

Bertha Staples made the motion which was seconded and voted to hear the report of the building committee under Article 7.

- Article 4. The motion was made, seconded and voted that this article be taken up after Article 7.
- Article 5. Wesley Staples made the motion which was seconded and voted that the district vote to authorize the school board to make application for and to accept, on behalf of the district, any or all grants or other funds for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government or from the State of New Hampshire.
- Article 6. Lois Delano made the motion which was seconded and voted that the district authorize the school board to negotiate a tuition contract with the Walpole School Disrict.
- Article 7. Bertha Staples made the motion which was seconded that the sum of \$45,000.00 be appropriated for constructing and originally equipping and furnishing an addition to the Westmoreland Elementary School, that to raise this appropriation the school board is authorized to issue \$45,000.00 bonds

or notes of the district under the Municipal Finance Act, and that the school board be authorized to take all action necessary to carry out the project.

Mrs. Staples showed two plans of the proposed addition to the school building. A lengthy discussion followed.

Mrs. Robert Ball showed a chart she had prepared relative to the costs of sending the 7th and 8th grades out of town to school.

Mr. Newell made the motion which was seconded that the words - "not to exceed" - be put in the motion before the amount of money.

The motion voted on was that the sum, not to exceed \$45,000.00 be appropriated for constructing and originally equipping and furnishing an addition to the Westmoreland Elementary School that to raise this appropriation the school board is authorized to issue a sum not to exceed \$45,000.00 bonds or notes of the district under the Municipal Finance Act, and that the school board be authorized to take all action necessary to carry out the project.

By a ballot vote there were 39 yes votes and 40 no votes. Not having a two-thirds vote, the motion was not carried.

Mr. Lawson, Mr. Bigelow and Mr. Whippie assisted in counting the votes.

A rising vote of thanks was given to the school board for the work done in getting the figures.

Article 4. Robert Moore, Jr., made the motion which was seconded and voted that no action be taken under this article.

Article 8. Fenn Newell made the motion which was seconded and voted that no action be taken under this article.

Article 9 and 2. Robert Moore, Jr., made the motion which was seconded that the district vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$86,942.00 for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries for school district officials and agents and for the payment of the statutory obligations of the district.

Walter Dunn made the motion which was seconded that a sum of \$500.00 be added to item 1265 of the budget for working plans. There were 38 yes and 10 no votes. Motion carried.

The following motion was voted that the district vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$86,942.00 for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries for school district officials and agents and for the payment of the statutory obligations of the district plus \$500.00, added to item 1265 of the budget for working plans. Motion carried.

Article 10. Mrs. Frazier explained the reason for this article. Mr. Wildey said the school board had the authority already, although it hasn't been the policy of the school board in the past to give any recognition upon finishing the 8th grade.

By a voice vote it was the sense of the meeting that the school board present some kind of certificate to students upon graduation from the 8th grade.

Article 11. Donald Paine made the motion which was seconded that we adjourn until a later date, June 5, at 2:00 P.M., to hear a report of the school board regarding information they have found out concerning construction costs of proposed addition to the school.

Marjorie Hudson made the amendment which was seconded that the words be added - "and also to reconsider the vote taken under Article 7." Motion carried.

By a voice vote the following motion was voted that we adjourn until a later date, June 5 at 2:00 P.M., to hear a report of the school board regarding information they have found out concerning construction costs of proposed addition to the school and to reconsider the vote taken under Article 7. Motion carried.

The adjourned school meeting was held at the Town Hall on Saturday, June 5, 1965 at 2:00 p.m. The meeting was called to order by the moderator, John H. Terry, Jr.

Article 11 of the meeting was read:

"The motion was made, seconded and voted that we adjourn until a later date, June 5th, at 2:00 p.m. to hear report of the school board regarding information they have found out concerning construction costs of proposed addition to the school and to reconsider the vote taken under Article 7."

Discussion followed and Robert Moore, Jr., showed proposed addition plans and explained the figures used. More discussion followed with many questions asked. It was moved and seconded that the sum of \$38,000 be appropriated for construction and originally equipping and furnishing an addition to the Westmoreland Elementary School, that to raise this appropriation the school board be authorized to issue \$38,000 bonds or notes of the district under the Municipal Finance Act, and that the school board be authorized to take all action necessary to carry out the project.

By a ballot vote there were 55 votes in the affirmative and 25 votes in opposition. Needed to carry the motion were 54 votes. Motion carried.

Following the vote on the bond issue, voters discussed the question of providing transportation for Westmoreland students attending Keene High School. No action was taken, since the discussion was principally to get the ideas of the voters on the subject.

Meeting adjourned.

The following is my report for the year ending June 30, 1965.

Work of the School Nurse:

- 143 pupils received vision screening tests
 - 2 pupils received vision notices
- 70 pupils received hearing screening tests
- 145 pupils weighed and measured
- 137 pupils had health inspections
- 40 pupils appeared in need of dental care
- 16 pupils with parents attended Pre-Registration Clinic
- 20 pupils were checked for Smallpox Vaccination, and follow-up done
- 22 pupils participated in the Stern Testing Program

The duties and activities of the school nurse are many, varying in each community. Her professional services are used by each community as a resource person for each health problem that may confront an individual town. Routine filing, school records, and reports of what has been done, and aims for future years are also important. Follow-up of medical recommendations for visual and auditory disturbances, certain dental disorders and other handicapping conditions, contact with the pupil's home when indicated — all are important parts of the school nurse's work.

Through continued cooperation of administrators, school boards, teachers, parents and pupils, the health service program continues to be both challenging and rewarding.

I wish to thank all who helped make the school year a successful one.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Westmoreland:

I herewith submit my annual report as your Superintendent of Schools:

Good teaching and good teaching facilities affect eternity; no one can tell where the influence stops.

The working drawings for the new addition are expected to be completed in the latter part of January or the first of February. The plans will be put out for bids so that the bid amounts will be known at the time of the annual meeting and it is expected that work can begin about May 1st. This should enable the contractor to have the addition ready for occupancy at the beginning of school in September.

The School Board arranged for the serial bonds in the amount of \$38,000 to be issued by the Keene National Bank at an interest rate of 3.8% which is the same rate as the previous bond issue.

The program of departmentalization in your school is continuing to produce good results.

The A.R.E.A. Committee (Authorized Regional Enrollment Area School) has been working diligently with the committees from Chesterfield, Harrisville, Keene and Nelson to prepare articles of agreement. Hearings have been scheduled in each community and the agreement articles are to be approved or disapproved by each school district on February 21st.

We were fortunate not to have any teacher changes this year.

The estimated June 30th balance at the time the budget was voted was \$7,000. The actual balance was \$7,330.63. The estimated sweepstakes income was \$6,052; the actual amount received was \$3,988.79, which is \$2,068.21 less. Foundation aid estimated at \$10,242; the actual amount received was \$9,852.25, which is \$389.75 less. The net result of these changes is that \$63,142.25 was raised by taxation as compared with the budget figure of \$62,125.

On October 1, 1965, the Charlestown Supervisory Union No. 5 ceased to exist and the school districts of Acworth, Charlestown and Langdon became a part of Walpole Supervisory Union No. 60. The Fall Mountain School District is also a part of the present Supervisory Union No. 60 for administrative purposes. It was expected that Chesterfield and Westmoreland would become part of the Keene Supervisory Union effective July 1, 1966; however, as a result of some objections expressed by districts involved, the State Board of Education voted to continue to study the situation for at least one more year. This means that Westmoreland will continue to be a member of Supervisory Union No. 60 with Chesterfield, Fall Mountain and Marlow.

Transportation of high school pupils continues to be a problem that is having to be solved by the parents of tuition pupils. The more difficult it is for a pupil to attend school, the less chance there is of continuing to graduate. I sincerely hope that the citizens of Westmoreland find it possible to provide transportation for their high school pupils.

To the citizens of Westmoreland:

September 8th, 1965 was the start of another school year here in Westmoreland. The enrollment this year started out with one hundred thirty-eight students.

The entire teaching staff returned this year with the grades being taught by the following: Grade I, Mrs. Geraldine Wilson; Grade II, Mrs. Jane Harris; Grade III, Mrs. Sandra Whippie; Grade IV & V, Mr. Richard Cate; Grade V & VI, Mrs. Virginia Hall; Grade VII & VIII, Mr. Robert Murray.

Our departmentalization was kept this year after having had such good results from last year. One thing that we did do this year was to have Mrs. Hall and Mrs. Whippie take all the Reading, Language, Spelling and Penmanship classes and Mr. Cate and Mr. Murray all the Social Science and Math classes. All youngsters in grade III through VIII are in the departmentalization program.

The library is growing with leaps and bounds through the hard work of our student librarians and all the generous reading material which different people have given to the school. This is a P.T.A. sponsored project and it has been one of great success. Under the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965 (Public Law 89-10) various programs have been proposed to the schools. Here in Westmoreland we are working on a program which will be an enrichment program to increase our library materials. We hope under this program to bring to the slow reader books of high interest level that will be written so that those children who have reading difficulties will also benefit from the joys of reading good books.

Other plant personnel are Custodian, Mr. Abbot Royea; Hot Food Manager, Mrs. Lois Leach, with Dorothy Hewitt as helper; Bus Drivers, Mr. Richard Delano and Mr. Richard Stoughton, Miss Vera McClening, Mrs. Caroline Hatt; Hot Lunch Administrator, Mrs. Nancy Staples. To all the above mentioned and for all persons who make our school a great success I want to at this time thank everyone.
