TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Andover in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs: (L. S.)

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall, in said Andover on Tuesday, the ninth day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same (Estimate \$3,900).
- 3. To raise and appropriate money for highways and bridges under the following items:
 - a. General town road maintenance (Estimate \$7,000).
 - b. General highway expenses (Estimate \$3,500).
 - c. Blacktop (Estimate \$2.500).
 - d. Town Road Aid.
 - e. Street lighting (Present contracts \$743).
- 4. To raise and appropriate money for the protection of persons and property under the following items:
 - a. Police department (Estimate \$100).
 - b. Fire department (Estimate \$250).
 - c. Precincts for fire protection (Suggest \$250 to each).
- 5. To raise and appropriate money for care of the cemeteries (Estimate \$400).
- 6. To raise and appropriate money for Memorial Day.

7. To raise and appropriate money for the use of

the town libraries (Estimate \$300).

8. To raise and appropriate money for defraying the expenses of the town health department, as follows:

- General expenses, dumps, etc. (Estimate a. \$200).
- District nurse and car.
- 9. To raise and appropriate money for taking care of the poor, including old age assistance and aid to soldiers (Estimate \$4,000).
- 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100 for the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region.
- To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50 for the observance of Old Home Day.
- 12. To see what action the town wishes to take towards remodeling the town hall, in order to comply with present fire and sanitation regulations, and to provide better athletic facilities and a vault for the safe keeping of town records.
 - To see if the town will vote to expend its Capital Reserve Fund of \$3,924.53 to partially defray the expenditures voted under the above article.
 - b. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate in the current year for the above purpose.
 - To see what sum of money the town will vote to borrow on long term notes, in addition to the funds provided in (a) and (b) above, to complete the work voted under the above article.
 - To determine the amount and tenure of said notes.
- To see if the town will vote to have the town accounts audited by the Division of Municipal Accounting.

- 14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400 for the control of White Pine Blister Rust.
- 15. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 16. To see if the town wishes to take any action regarding snow removal from private driveways.
- 17. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not exceeding \$200 to provide a flag and colors for the Crosby-Gilbert American Legion Post.
- 18. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

The financial status of the Town of Andover has changed little from one year ago. The budget surplus has increased \$500, which will be nearly offset when the town takes title to several unredeemed tax items in 1948. We have "held the line" in town accounts to a net overdraft of \$544 by transferring unused funds to departments which needed more than their appropriations.

A higher tax rate seems indicated for 1948 (see note at the bottom of the town budget). Your tax dollar buys materials and services of one kind or another, all of which are up in cost. Since most of these are beyond our control we must choose between paying more in taxes or asking less in the way of services from the town and school district.

Town Government. We call your attention to the new method of electing town officers at the coming town meeting. Under the non-partisan ballot system accepted last March every candidate for a town office who wishes his or her name on the printed ballot must file with the town clerk not later than Monday, March 1. Filing blanks may be obtained from the town clerk.

The program for Town Meeting Day, March 9th, is as follows:

Presidential primaries, polls open 9 A.M. to 6 P.M. Election town officers, polls open 9 A.M. to 12 noon.

Voting on appropriations, 10 A.M. School district meeting, 2 P.M.

The most satisfactory town and school meetings are those where all the voters attend and take part in the discussion. Plan now to be at the town hall at least by 10 o'clock and to return for the school meeting in the afternoon. Your 1948 tax bill is written at these meetings, not next summer by the selectmen and school board.

Highways and Bridges. 1947 highway expenditures exceeded revenues by \$1,400, and expenses in 1948 have already been heavy, as one snow storm has followed another in rapid succession. Bridge repair was a big item in 1947, nearly \$1,100 being spent for bridge flooring materials alone. The following performance

report shows briefly what was accomplished last summer and fall, in addition to the usual grading, turning water, cleaning ditches, and other maintenance.

Road Agent Lorden, town funds, west end:

New floors laid on Blackwater River, Bradley Lake and Mountain Brook bridges; repairs to Hame Shop bridge.

Bushes cut on Paterson, Bradley Lake and West Salisbury roads.

Gravel on Bradley Lake, Keyser, Currier and Lorden roads.

Two new culverts installed.

Road Agent Sheldon, town funds, east end:

New floors on Morey and Cilley Hill bridges; repairs to two others on Tucker Mt. and Robie roads.

Bushes cut—1 mile in Flaghole, ½ mile Wilson road, Emery road.

Gravel on Wilson road.

Seven new culverts installed.

Town Road Aid and Blacktop Funds:

Plains road, underpass to Barton's, graveled and tarred.

Beech Hill roads, both sides, asphalt surface.

Andover Village, asphalt surface on back street.

Taunton Hill, Stone's to Schnare's, asphalt surface.

New gravel on Hall, Keyser, Currier, Flaghole, Tucker Mt. and Keniston roads.

Bulldozer work on west side McKeag Hollow.

Project started to remove ledge, widen and straighten road from W. J. Lorden's to Bradley Lake.

Bushes cut on Beech Hill and Keniston roads.

Projects which are now contemplated for 1948, funds permitting, include the following:

Town Funds:

Three more bridges to be completely rebuilt and another floored.

Town Road Aid and Blacktop Funds:

Remainder of Plains road to be graveled and tarred.

Asphalt to be applied on Plains road constructed in 1947, on the remaining strip on Taunton Hill, and whatever else is indicated by the condition of the roads after the spring thaws.

Finish project on Bradley Lake road.

Straighten two dangerous corners on Flaghole road.

Bulldoze east side of McKeag Hollow.

New gravel where needed to the extent of available funds.

In the not too far distant future the town must consider the replacement of the two tractors used for plowing snow. With each added year of hard operation the cost of repair and maintenance goes up. Both units should be overhauled next summer. Probably both must be used at least one more year, barring unforseen emergencies.

New tractor and plow units of the same approximate size now cost roughly \$10,000 to \$12,000 each. Modern four-wheel-drive truck and plow units capable of replacing tractors, with more speed, run up to \$17,000. This is something to think about.

Community Beach. At the last town meeting a petitioned article to raise money for a board walk to the bathing beach at Highland Lake was tabled as inexpedient. We are glad to report that we could take advantage of an opportunity to build a gravel road to the beach last fall, using money from the sale of a tax title property. The cost was far less than a board walk, and with a little annual repair we hope that it will prove more satisfactory and permanent.

Health Department. The Nursing Committee reports it has no definite prospect of securing a new district nurse, and funds for this purpose are not

included in the 1948 budget. The school budget does include the sum of \$500 for necessary school health work.

If the town does not raise money to secure a nurse it might be logical to sell the car now in storage while prices are high, and to secure another if and when the service is resumed.

Town Hall Improvements. The question of what we should and must do about our "old town hall" is one which the town meeting must consider this year. While it has served its purpose well for several generations, the structure in its present condition no longer meets the requirements of modern safety and public health regulations governing public assembly halls.

The present heating arrangement is bad, and the "Chick" Sales toilet facilities worse. For use as a high school gymnasium, the only place we have, it is inadequate for lack of dressing rooms, toilets, and space for spectators. Lastly, it provides no protection for the town records stored therein.

It seems evident that we must do something to make the building meet minimum requirements, provide a substitute, or close it to all public gatherings, including athletics. The question is "What?" and "How much?" we should attempt.

One solution is a basement under a part of the hall to house a forced-hot-air or steam heating system and provide space for separate toilets and dressing rooms for men and women, all basic needs. A spectators' balcony over the two rooms and entrance hall is a possibility for increasing floor space, and a brick or concrete vault for records can be added on the outside of the building, opening into the selectmen's room.

Another plan suggests an addition on the west side of the hall containing bleacher seats, with heating unit, toilets and dressing rooms beneath.

Your selectmen will endeavor to have plans and cost estimates of the various items drawn up and available for discussion on town meeting day, to aid in the solution of the problem.

Present rough estimates add up to a total of around \$10,000. The Capital Reserve Fund started several years ago for this purpose now totals \$3,924.53; a good start toward meeting whatever expenditures we may vote to undertake. Article 12 in the warrant has been so worded as to leave the matter entirely open for any action to be taken.

Parent-Teacher Association. A local Parent-Teacher organization has recently been formed, with Stewart R. Morse of East Andover as its first president. This group meets at the Andover High School and everyone who is interested in the welfare of our schools is cordially invited to attend.

American Legion Post. As this report goes to the printer an article is added to the town warrant, by request, asking for a small appropriation to provide a flag and colors for the Crosby-Gilbert Post No. 101. This is not included in the budget.

REPORT OF VICTOR E. PHELPS FOREST FIRE WARDEN

We are grateful indeed that Andover was spared last fall from the disasters which struck so many communities during the long period of extreme drought and fire hazard. With all our surrounding woods and acres of tinder-dry lumber slash, it could easily have happened, here, perhaps from just one carelessly tossed cigarette.

Many of us are irritated at times by what may seem like too strict and unnecessary regulation of outside fires and brush burning. It is often a bother to get a permit for just one small fire, but our fire record in Andover over the past few years seems to show that the bother has paid us well.

You may be sure that for your patience and cooperation you have my thanks and that of all the deputy wardens.

Only two forest fires started up in 1947. The first, on the hill in back of the Davis residence, was quickly surrounded and soaked down through the combined efforts of both fire companies and the Proctor Academy unit, with no damage. The second, started by lightning in the slash on the Ansel Clay lot, was knocked down by the firemen and then drowned out by a timely downpour that few of us who were there will soon forget, also with no damage.

The same restrictions regarding burning are in force in 1948, and permits MUST be secured from the warden for all outside fires.

SCHOOL WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the School District in the town of Andover qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the 9th day of March, 1948 at 2:00 o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
 - 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
- 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 8. To see if the district will vote to make any alteration in the amount of money required to be assessed for the ensuing year for the support of public schools and the payment of the statutory obligations of the district, as determined by the school board in its annual report.
- 9. To see if the district will vote to send and pay transportation of high school pupils to Franklin and to use the present High School building for the consolidated elementary school.
- 10. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Two Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$1,250.00) to install a stoker and insulate the attic at the High School.

- 11. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Two Hundred Dollars (\$3,200.00) for the purpose of adding a Commercial Course to the High School Curriculum.
- 12. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00) for high school athletics.
- 13. To see if the district will vote to make addition to the high school for housing grades seven and eight.
- 14. To see how much the district will vote to raise and appropriate to construct the addition at the Hield School and take care of any other incidentals pertaining thereto, and to authorize the School Board to issue notes or bonds in the amount raised, in the name of and on the credit of the district in accordance with existing statutes.
- 15. To see if the district will vote to authorize the School Board to make application for and to accept a funds from the Federal Works Agency or any other governmental agency and to make the necessary contracts for the preparation of plans and specifications for the addition to the High School in accordance with Title V of the War Mobilization and Reconversion Act of 1944.
- 16. To see if the district will vote to appoint a committee of three to work with the School Board to study the advisability of forming a Cooperative Highschool for this area.
- 17. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$1,500.00) to drill a well at East Andover School.
- 18. To conduct any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

January 19, 1948

To the School Board and Citizens of Andover:

I herewith submit my report on the education and policies in the Andover School District.

Today we find ourselves still in trying times. We are at the point of aftermath of war, during which time we find increased cost of materials, personnel, and an increase in the school population. These factors bring about conditions which seriously affect our schools. Costs of education have mounted with the rising tide of prices. Enrollments have increased due to an increasing birth rate during the past six years.

In spite of these increases, we still find ourselves in the position of having to maintain our schools. With the changing emphasis on education and the fact that we have become more "school conscious" we are demanding that our children have more.

It is with these facts and feelings that I suggest you give considerable attention to the following thoughts in order that the realization of our young people becomes a reality.

1. School Housing:

Our school plant, especially in the elementary field, is far from that which we desire. We are widespread and overcrowded. Considerable thought and study should be made in order that our elementary schools could be housed under one roof, giving Andover boys and girls a modern building in which to carry on their educational pursuits. In this way we will be making the offerings to the boys and girls more nearly equal to that given in other communities.

The high school plant could be expanded by the addition of rooms above the shop to accommodate the seventh and eighth grades in town, enabling all to take advantage of the facilities of the high school shop and home economics laboratory.

The need for a gymnasium and auditorium is being felt everyday. This could well be included in the plans for the new elementary building and be utilized by both high and elementary school pupils.

2. School Curriculum:

At the present time there is a demand for the teaching of Commercial subjects in the high school. The inclusion of this course would meet the needs of those boys and girls who have shown an aptitude for, and a desire to pursue, such a course in order that they may enter the business field. With the addition of this course of study we would have a well rounded offering for the boys and girls of Andover and the surrounding towns. I heartily recommend that you give approval to the article in the warrant calling for the fulfillment of this endeavor.

In the elementary field we must spread our courses of study "too thin" because of the combination rooms. Were we consolidated it would be possible for all pupils of a grade to be together and to enjoy to the fullest the pursuit of their course. One teacher, devoting all of her time to one grade, can accomplish more and give to your boys and girls much of the enrichment they need in order to become well-rounded individuals. I recommend to you the approval of the article calling for the consolidation of our elementary schools into one school plant.

3. Repairs and Needs:

It is as true today, as it has always been, that buildings are in constant need of repair and the longer you let them go the more it will cost to make those repairs. In order to bring our present plant to first class condition would cost a great deal of money. We have done considerable work in the past two years but are nowhere near reaching the ideal. I feel that good business calls for the making of a repair before that repair grows too burdensome to do in one year, hence the need of doing a little all the time.

The upkeep of our elementary buildings will continue to be great unless we decide to have a new modern plant. The efficiency of the high school plant can be increased by the installation of a stoker in the furnace in order to insure constant, even heat, and the insulation of the attic. These two items will, in the long run, pay for themselves out of the savings on fuel. I recommend you give approval to the article calling for the appropriation of funds for the installation of a stoker in the furnace and the insulation of the attic.

5. General:

We are making progress in the education of our youngsters. New textbooks and materials with which to work have tended to give to the boys and girls, as well as the teachers, that needed stimulus to go on to greater heights. To you I am grateful for making this possible.

I wish to express my appreciation to all who have made the work of the year smoother and easier by your splendid cooperation. I hope that we may continue in this spirit and work toward the aim of betterment of facilities and offerings for our boys and girls in the Andover schools.
