PREVENTING FOREST FIRES IS OUR RESPONSIBILITY

Costs of suppressing carelessly set outdoor fires in New Hampshire in 1962 cost the persons responsible \$5,545. In the same period, the cost to the cities and towns for control of such fires for which no responsibility could be placed cost another \$24,634. What utter waste of tax money and what shameful and needless loss of timber and esthetic values in the 2200 acres burned. Residences, farms, and other business places were threatened with possible total dstruction.

Carelessly set man caused fires can be prevented if every citizen remembers his responsibility in regard to any source of fires in the open. We can help to keep our fire loss low by remembering these simple rules.

- 1. Dispose of burnable waste at the town dump.
- 2. If waste or brush is to be burned on the premises, obtain a permit from the forest fire warden. Seasonal permits may be issued for approved incinerators and sites.
- 3. Burn safely by picking a clean site, avoiding dry windy weather and preferably burning late in the day.
- 4. Have something to keep the fire under control pails of water, garden hose, sprinkling can, broom for grass fires or shovel will help.
- 5. Be sure your fire is dead out before you leave it.
- 6. If the fire gets out of control or if you see a fire out of control, report promptly to your warden or fire department. Continue to fight it until help arrives.

There is potential danger when matches fall into the hands of children. It is never too early for parents to install in the child's mind a respect for fire.

Keep our town safe from fire. In 1962 we had 0 fires.

We burned 0 acres.

TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Bennington in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Bennington on Tuesday, the 12th day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for highways and bridges.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid for Class V roads and raise and appropriate money for the same. The Town must raise \$242.29 and the State will contribute \$1,615.25.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow such sums of money as may be necessary in anticipation of taxes.
- 5. To see what action the Town will take in regard to real estate taken over by the Town for non-payment of taxes
- 6. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for tarring. (Selectmen)
- 7. To see what action the Town will take in regard to Memorial Day and raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$151.00 (1/100th of 1% of Town Valuation) to the Monadnock Region Association of Southwestern N. H. for issuance and distribution of printed matter, newspaper and magazine advertising, and by other means calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the Town in cooperation with the other thirty-seven towns of the Region. (Selectmen)
- 9. To see what action the Town will take in regard to painting the town garage and to raise and appropriate \$500.00 for the same. (Selectmen)

- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$950.00 for a new plow. (Road Agent and Selectmen)
- 11. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$300.00 for the purchase of hose by the Fire Department. (Fire Department)
- 12. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$150.00 for tree spraying. (Selectmen)
- 13. To ratify, approve and confirm the action of our Fire Department in joining our Town to the Southwestern N. H. District Fire Mutual Aid System in 1958 and in agreeing that our Fire Department may give and receive outside aid as provided in RSA154 as amended. (Fire Department)
- 14. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$150.00 for repairs to the chairs and sections of the floor of the Town Hall Auditorium.
- 15. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for Statutory requirements and to carry the articles and appropriations of the School District into effect.
- 16. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

FIRE WARDENS' REPORT

The Firewards wish to thank the townspeople for keeping the fires at a very low rate this year. We were called out for 1 brush fire, 1 dump fire, 1 grass fire, 1 automobile

accident, and 1 search party.

Due to the fact the dial telephone system started before Town Meeting, it was necessary for us to decide what course we would take in regard to telephone service in case of fires. The Selectmen and Firewards met with various other towns, telephone, and fire officials through this last year. We found that in most towns the red dial systems were not entirely satisfactory and could be costly.

Since a new dispatch center for the Mutual Aid System was set up this fail, we decided to go into this type of controlling our fire alarm. It is a modern system that is being

set up throughout the country.

The dispatch center is located at the Keene Fire Station and has the latest type of radio equipment and fire controls. It will work as follows:

(1) Dial Operator "O"

(2) Give Operator the number Keene 352-1100

(3) When dispatch center answers give:

1. Name of person calling

2. Location of fire

3. Description, such as home, chimney, or any other type of fire.

They will automatically ring our alarm, and we will receive the location on our radios. We believe that especially for a night fire this type of sounding the alarm will enable us to arrive at the fire sooner.

In case this system fails for you call: Paul Traxler, Tel. 588-6755; Philip Traxler, Tel. 588-6857; Robert St. Lawrence, Tel. 588-6359; or in the daytime call the Village Spa, Tel. 588-6631.

We welcome the townspeople to visit the fire station

and see our new equipment.

There is no doubt that many people are not acquainted with the present law in regard to the installation of power oil burners. It is necessary for the installer or contractor to first obtain a permit from the fire wards to install an oil burner in any building. After it is installed the Firewards are notified and will make an inspection to see if they have the proper switches and controls on the burner. If the installation is all right, we will issue a permit to the home owner to be placed near the burner. This is a good protection for everyone and we feel that if everyone would comply, they would be safer from oil burner fires. If anyone has had a burner installed and has not received

a permit, we will be glad to inspect it for you at no

charge. Please contact any of the Firewards.

There are several good fire detection systems on the market for the homes. There have been a few installations in town. The Firewards recommend this type of protection highly. These home alarms are set up with detectors that will automatically set the house alarm off at 120 to 130 degrees.

The Firewards recommend buying 100-ft. $1\frac{1}{2}$ " hose and 100-ft. 21/2" hose. Also transmitter for the base station.

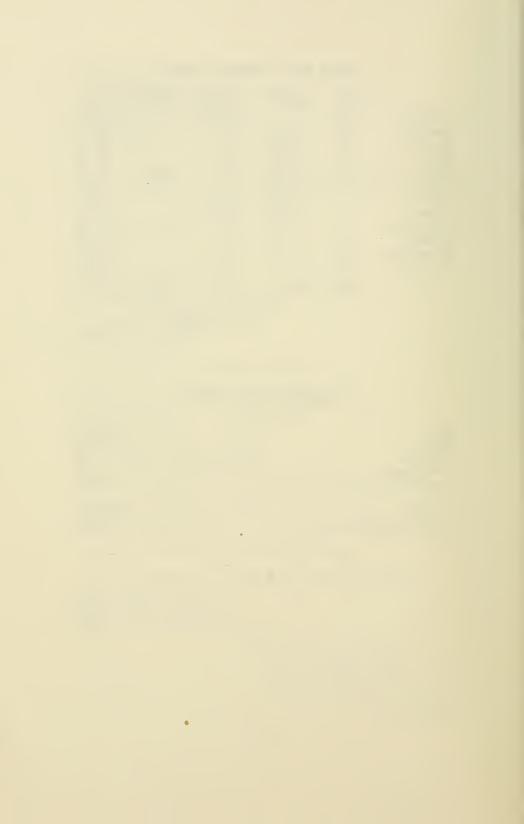

BENNINGTON SCHOOL DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Bennington:

It is a pleasure for me to present my ninth annual report for your consideration.

This year the district meeting will be unusual for two reasons. (1) The officers of the district will be chosen by ballot at the town meeting. Bennington will not only be the first district to choose their school district officers in this manner, but will be the only school district in the state to do so. I am not concerned this year because of other important matters being voted on at the school district meeting, but in future years I hope that this change in the election of officers will not reduce the number of people in attending the district meeting. (2) For the first time in any generation now living in Bennington, the district is being asked to appropriate money for a building program. At the present time this new construction is not needed for additional classrooms but it is entirely conceivable that such space requirements could become necessary in the near future. Unfinished classroom space is being provided in the proposed construction.

The Interim Commission on Education report has criticized rather severely the fact that school districts, while doing a good job of consolidation within their own districts, have been reluctant to cross town boundaries for the same purpose either through a cooperative effort or on a tuition basis. It would appear to me that Bennington is in an area where consideration of something of this nature would be in order and if facilities, which with a minimum of cost, to provide a teacher per grade per room, were available, then that community could well be chosen to become the area school.

It is always difficult to tell a community that it should provide additional space for which there is no immediate need to accomplish the things that it is accustomed to doing. The question is, should we be doing more to prepare our youngsters for the space age in which they are going to live or should we be content with facilities which were designed to fit the needs of the early automotive age. New facilities such as are proposed are not going to solve all the problems or even provide your youngsters with an education comparable with that now being afforded in many of the neighboring communities, but it will be a step in the right direction and many small steps are often easier to take than a "Giant" one.

The problem is yours. I have not attempted to influence your thinking, but I have attempted to give you

some food for thought.

It has been a pleasure to work with the Building Committee this year and again I wish to express to all who have been interested in education, my appreciation for their cooperation and understanding.

PIERCE SCHOOL BUILDING COMMITTEE REPORT

Your committee was reappointed by the Moderator at the last annual school meeting and instructed to carry out the wishes of the voters as expressed at that meeting which was to bring back at the 1963 annual school meeting a definite construction and financing proposal for an addition to the Pierce School. The committee consisted of two members from the public, two members from the P.T.A. and your School Board who met at various times during the year. Norman Hartfiel, Superintendent, and Ruth Cody, Principal, attended these meetings and gave their advice and assistance.

During the course of the year new circumstances arose which, had they existed at the time of the original study, might well have resulted in a different recommendation at that time. The committee felt that because of this they should reveiew these new circumstances and then attempt to outline the reasons both for and against the building program and await the good judgement of the voters.

Recently the interim study committee, at the state level, made public their study and recommended strongly that the future trend of elementary education in New Hampshire should be aimed at large regional schools and the gradual elimination of the small town elementary school. They felt that only in this way could an adequate education be offered in terms of a single teacher, to a single class, in a single classroom. This most all educators agree is an objective which we should strive for within the state. Probably because of this report the State Department of Education was not at all enthusiastic about approving these construction plans as qualified for state aid. In their opinion this type of construction does not give sufficient direct benefit towards increasing the quality of educational opportunity to be justified, but they did indicate they would approve the project for state aid.

The construction program was originally recommended by the committee not as a means of bettering the educational level, but rather to provide suitable space for school assembly, indoor recess and a possible hot lunch program all of which would, of course, improve the general school program. In addition, space would be provided for the possible future addition of two classrooms. It can be argued that this construction would then place the Pierce School in a position to serve as a nucleus of a possible future consolidated school — grades one to six — to

serve not only Bennington, but possibly Francestown and Greenfield. If not for a future consolidated school, then at least available on a tuition basis to serve those communities and possibly reach the ultimate objective of one teacher per grade in a single classroom. It does not appear that the Pierce School will ever have enough pupils from Bennington alone to justify such a teaching program.

The question before the voters is basically whether the undertaking of this construction program, which would provide an assembly hall, a kitchen with facilities for a hot lunch program and the space for two future classrooms, at a cost of \$85,000 would be a step in the right direction to meet the future educational requirements of this community. We have tried to briefly note some of the reasons both for and against this program and members of this committee will attend the annual school meeting and be available for questions.

Incorporated in this report is a schedule showing the estimated cost per year of both principal and interest payments (net of state aid). In addition to those costs it is estimated that the regular budget would increase approximately \$1,000 per year to provide for the additional cost of heat, lights, supplies and a hot lunch program. You will also find an estimate of the increase in the tax rate which would be necessary to cover these costs.
