WARRANT.

State of New Hampshire.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Campton in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Campton on Tuesday, the ninth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation of the same.
- 3. To see if the town will vote to qualify for state aid for highways under the law passed at the January session 1905, with amendments.
- 4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the permanent improvement of highways for the ensuing year.
- 5. To raise and appropriate money for the maintenance of its trunk line highways as required by law.
- 6. To raise and appropriate money for the maintenance of its state aid roads, as required by law.
- 7. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of its highways and bridges.

- 8. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to hire money to defray town charges.
- 9. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Campton cemetery, also to clean up and fence other cemeteries in town.

To see how much money the town will vote to raise for Memorial Day.

- 11. To see what action the town will take towards erecting an honor roll for its soldiers in the recent war, also to raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 12. To see if the town will vote to accept reports of agents and officers heretofore chosen.
- 13. To transact any other business that may legaly come before said meeting.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT.

Mrs. Chairman and Members of the School Board:—

I have the honor to submit for your consideration my first report of the Campton schools for a period of five months ending January 31, 1920.

When I took over the supervision of your schools September 1st, as a part of Union No. 33, the teachers had all been engaged by members of the school board.

The three pupils found at the Branch school

are being transported to the lower village.

For a time the pupils from Pulsifer Hill were transported to the Blair school. Later a school was opened in this district with a registration of nine. Some have since moved so that now there are but four in the district and three in actual attendance.

The new building at Beebe River was not completed until some weeks after the opening of the schools. It was therefore necessary to unite the two schools in the small, insufficiently lightend and inadequate old building.

The schools have been organized on a grade basis with the State Program of Studies as a guide. A copy of the State Board's minimum essentials for grades one, two and three has been put into the hands of each teacher. These state that a pupil must have acquired the ability to perform certain tasks, but should be able to do much more, in order to be eligible for promotion.

At the close of the fall term Mrs. Richard Palmer, teacher of the Blair school, resigned. The winter term has been taught by Leifa Hill of Bristol.

Some supplementary reading has been purchased for the lower grades and much more is required. The other books purchased have been to replace those worn out.

A record has been secured of all books in the school buildings now in use.

The standard school record system has been adopted. One card gives a pupil's record from the time he enters school till he has graduated from high school. One card goes with the pupil from school to school and a duplicate is kept in the office of the superintendent.

The records are kept up to date by means of transfer cards.

Requisition blanks have been introduced that a record may be had of all supplies used.

Standard tests have been given in English, writing and spelling and other testing is to be done.

The school census shows 179 children in town between the ages of 5 and 16 years, 142 registered in the local public schools Sept. 30th, two are attending elementary and eleven high school outside of the district; 30 were reported as not attending school, 25 between the ages of 5 and 8, one between 8 and 14 years (later put into school), and four between 14 and 16 years.

Transportation routes have been maintained for more or less of the time since the opening of the fall term to the following school: the Center, the Bog, the Lower Village, the Pulsifer Hill and the Hildreth.

Owing to the difficulty of getting the teachers together, I have rendered assistance and given directions through personal conferences at times of visits rather than by teachers' meetings. During the five months, I have made 97 official visits to the schools and attended four meetings of the school board.

From the registration, I find that 41% of the pupils are precocious, in advance of where they should be according to age, 57% at age, and 32% retarded.

I suggest that a progressive program for remodelling the school buildings be adopted and that each year one or more be brought up to the standard by the State Board.

A survey has been made of the school houses in the district for the State Board and from this a summary sheet prepared for the school board with a more extensive report, but it is not printed on account of the cost.
