THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Columbia, in the County of Coos, in the State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town, on Tuesday, the eighth day of March, next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To vote and bring in ballots for the election of Town Officers to be elected by ballot for the Town of Columbia for the ensuing year.
2. To see if the Town will instruct its Selectmen to appoint all other Town Officers as required by law.
3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the support of the poor for the year ensuing.
4. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for Old Age, Blind and Disability Assistance for the year ensuing.
5. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the repairs of highways and bridges.
6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize its Selectmen to take such action regarding plowing or otherwise keeping winter roads open in said Town for the year ensuing, as in their judgment seems most conducive to the best interests of the Town, and appropriate money for the same.
7. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid for Construction of Class V roads and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$483.73, the State to contribute the sum of \$3,224.90.

8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply any surplus remaining in their hands at the end of the fiscal year 1959 to the defrayng of Town charges for the fiscal year 1960 in order to effect a proportionate reduction of the amount to be raised by taxes.
9. To see what sum or sums the Town will vote to fix as the price per day for hiring manual labor, equipment and trucks for work on Town roads.
10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$49.32 (being 1-100th of 1% of the assessed valuation) for the purpose of uniting with the 45 other towns in the White Mountains Region Association in publicizing and otherwise promoting the natural and commercial factors upon which the economy of the North Country is based.
11. To see what action the Town will take with reference to hiring the Colebrook Fire Precinct for the purpose of extinguishing fires in said Town, and in the event of favorable action to make necessary appropriation for the same.
12. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the upkeep of cemeteries.
13. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to incur debts for temporary loans in anticipation of the taxes for the ensuing year, and to pay such debts out of tax money when the same is received.
14. To see if the voters of the Town of Columbia will resolve by vote that the licensing and supervisory provisions of New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated, Chapter 322, shall henceforth be enforced and administered by the Selectmen within the Town of Columbia in accordance with said Statute.
15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's deeds.

16. To see whether the Town will vote to discontinue the public library now maintained in said Town of Columbia, in accordance with New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated, Chapter 202, Section 5, in the event of discontinuance the library property of the Town to be loaned or disposed of by the Library Trustees, subject to the approval of the State Library Commission.
17. To see what sum of money the Town will raise for the subject of Town Charges for the ensuing year.
18. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purpose of cutting and removing the bushes from the side of the highways in such places as the Selectmen think most expedient.
19. To see if the Town will vote in accordance with Chapter 59, New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated, to discontinue the non-partisan ballot system adopted at the annual town meeting for the year 1956, or in the event that such ballot system so adopted was therein designated an Australian Ballot system, to discontinue the same in accordance with said Statute, and said discontinuance, if so voted, to become effective at the annual town meeting of 1961.
20. To see if the Town will vote to accept the reports of agents, auditors, Selectmen and all other officers, and ratify and confirm the same.
21. To transact any other business which may legally come before the meeting.

1. To choose a Moderator for the ensuing year.

2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officer or agents of the district.
6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To choose Agents, Auditors, and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with such other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.
9. To see if the district will vote to transfer such balance of district funds as may be on hand June 30, 1960, to a capital reserve building fund.
10. To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate to transport high school pupils.
11. To see if the district will vote to authorize the school board to make application for and to accept, on behalf of the district, any or all grants or offers for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the State of New Hampshire and or United States.
12. To transact any other business that may legally

come before this meeting.

Superintendent's Report

To the School Board and Citizens of the Columbia School District:

Foreword

In all probability, the past year has witnessed more being attempted by our schools than has ever been done before during a like period, to more nearly measure up to what has been so voluminously said and written about what they should be doing. Yesterday's concern about the overlooked upper quarter, who and how many are doing what in what way in Mathematics, Science and Foreign Languages, and where and how do we get there in Guidance, is today being rapidly converted from the expressed to the action stage. This transition is taking place at all levels, national, state, and local with the last one presenting the initial performance in many instances. Here in our own state, ways of challenging marked ability, the use of the more effective conversational approach in the teaching of Foreign Languages enhanced by the use of electronic devices, daily broadcasts of educational television programs in a number of subject areas, for both elementary and high school, and much stepped-up guidance programs are already being capitalized upon in a rapidly increasing number of schools. Matching funds made available through the National Defense Act for the purchase of materials and equipment in certain subject areas at all grade levels have contributed not a little in stimulating the action which has taken and is taking place.

It is significant that with the adoption and putting into practice of these new ways of presenting subject matter, and the utilization of the additional assistance that only a greater understanding of the scientific potential about us provides, our basic philosophy still remains the same. Although quality is receiving more attention, quantity has not been neglected. The recognition of the need to educate everyone up to the level of his ability is still compatible with the demand for the best at all levels in education. For, in so far as has yet been determined, ability is not the sole ingredient in superior performance. The indications are that motivation and character must also be present in this product if anything of lasting value is to result.

Teachers

The district is extremely fortunate, with the teacher supply continuing to be short, to have veteran teachers in all positions. Mrs. Isabella D. Spofford, who received her training at Bridgewater State Teachers College, Bridgewater, Massachusetts, and who has taught several years in that state as well as in New Hampshire, teaches Grades 1-4 at the Cone School. Mrs. Florence B. Hughes teaches Grades 1-4 at the Church School, and Mrs. Myra A. Holbrook teaches Grades 5-8 at the Grand Division School.

School Nurse - Health

As has been pointed out many times previously, the health services rendered year after year by Mrs. Ethel S. Sturgis, school nurse, to help pupils more effectively maintain that state of good health essential to a happy and successful overall school life, bespeaks the magnitude and importance of the work done. Clinics, immunizations, physical examinations, frequent check-ups on height, weight, hearing, and eyesight, and continuous supervision of the general health are included in the comprehensive program conducted.

As much as these services contribute to what is accomplished healthwise in our schools, however, one of the vital importance - dental care - urgently needs to be included. A dental clinic would provide an extremely valuable addition.

Repairs - Maintenance - Equipment

Outside of miscellaneous repairs most work done on the school buildings during the past summer has been of maintenance in nature. The classroom in each building was painted with bright pastel colors of different shades of blue trimmed with white which produces an attractive effect. Additional painting included entry-way between classroom and woodshed at Grand Division School, and the toilets at the same building. The purchase of new tubular steel chairs and all wood desk units, both in natural finish, to replace the old ones which had been in use for so many years, has meant much to both the teachers and the pupils. With the addition of these attractive movable units the overall appearance of the classroom is greatly improved, and opportunity is provided for greater flexibility in the conducting of the regular school work as well as for the different programs presented from time to time throughout the year.

ENROLLMENT AND ATTENDANCE

The enrollment continues to be about the same as it has been for the last five years, as there are 59 enrolled at the present time as compared to 58, 54, 54, and 49 for the respective preceding four years. The average percentage of attendance for the three schools for the past year was 94.87 and the average number of tardinesses per pupil was .05.

The number of pupils enrolled in schools outside the district, likewise, has changed very little during the same five year period, as there are 20 high and 30 elementary in comparison to 20, 21, 25, and 23 at the high school level and 36, 25, 26, and 23 at the elementary school level for the respective four preceding years.

NOTES ON THE BUDGET

The School Board's budget for 1960-61 is \$38,317.00 in comparison to \$36,884.00 for the current year. This amount is decreased by an estimated income of \$11,000.00 which leaves a balance of \$27,317.00 to be raised by taxes by the town. Provision for increases in salaries and transportation costs, for the most part, explain the increase in the budget.

As will be noted in the warrant, the amount asked for by the district for the support of schools may be more than that of the above budget dependent upon what action is taken under the article included by request which has to do with the provision of high school transportation.

CONCLUSION

May I again express my thanks to the members of the School Board, parents, teachers, and citizens for all the help and cooperation received as we have worked together in an effort to provide good schools. It is only with the assistance of you all that high standards can be achieved and maintained.
