TOWN WARRANT

The State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Deering, in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Deering on Tuesday, the eighth day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To see if the Town will vote to pay the road agent a salary of \$2400 a year, or take any action thereto.
4. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate a sum of money to repair highways and bridges, reserving 50% for winter roads, or take any action thereto.
5. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$400 for interest and insurance, or take any action thereto.
6. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$250 to cover long term P.W.A. bonds.
7. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$300 for street lights.
8. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$300 for Blister Rust Control or pass any vote relating thereto.
9. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$48 for the Monadnock Region Association.
10. To see if the Town will vote to sell or trade the Ford truck, purchase a new truck and make arrangements for payment of same, or take any action thereto.
11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Se-

lectmen to deliver inventory blanks to residents when assessing, or take any action thereto.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$1000 for Old Age Assistance and Town Poor, or take any action thereto.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of for T. R. A. money.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$100 toward expenses of Old Home Day, which this year celebrates the Town's 175th anniversary, or take any action thereto.

15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money on short term notes in anticipation of taxes, or take any action thereto.

16. To see what action the Town will take in regard to price for labor and officers of the Town.

17. To transact any other business that way legally come before this meeting.

REPORT OF THE ANNUAL TOWN MEETING
DEERING, N. H., MARCH 9, 1948

A legal meeting of the inhabitants of Deering, N. H., was called to order at 10:45 in the forenoon by the Moderator, Carlton M. Sherwood. The warrant was read.

Article 1. Ballots were cast for all officers on the Australian ballot as follows:

Selectman for 1 year: Ernest Johnson had 109 votes and took oath of office. Selectman for 3 years: Carroll E. Greene had 51 votes, Stuart H. Michie had 60 votes and took oath of office.

Town clerk: Mabel R. Wood had 42 votes, Marguerite L. Dutton had 74 votes and took oath of office.

Town Treasurer: Mabel R. Wood had 44 votes, Marguerite L. Dutton had 70 votes and took oath of office.

Overseer of Poor: Arthur O. Ellsworth had 92 votes and took oath of office.

Tax Collector: Harold G. Wells had 24 votes, Joseph M. Carew had 91 votes and took oath of office.

Highway Agent: Winniatt K. Griffiths had 52 votes, Albert Johnson had 65 votes and took oath of office.

Auditors: Marjorie A. Holden had 108 votes and took oath of office. Eunice E. Willgeroth had 108 votes and took oath of office.

Library Trustee: Clara Rich had 38 votes, Catherine Carew had 62 votes and took oath of office.

Trustee of Trust Funds: Charlotte K. Holmes had 90 votes and took oath of office.

Chief of Police: William J. Dumais had 113 votes and took oath of office.

Constable: Gordon Rich had 103 votes and took oath of office.

Surveyor of Wood and Lumber: Everett H. Abbott had 111 votes and took oath of office.

Article 2. Upon a motion made by Ernest Johnson, it was voted to raise \$2400.00 to defray town charges.

Article 3. Upon a motion by Ernest Johnson, it was voted to raise \$4000; \$1000 to be used for summer roads and \$3000 for winter roads.

Article 4. Upon motion made by Arthur O. Ellsworth, it was voted to raise \$400 for interest and insurance.

Article 5. Upon motion made by Marie Wells, it was voted to raise \$250 for long term P. W. A. bond.

Article 6. Upon motion made by Ernest Johnson, it was voted to raise \$300 for street lights.

Article 7. Upon motion made by Rev. Charles Reidt, it was voted to raise \$300 for Blister Rust Control.

Article 8. Upon motion made by Marie Wells, it was voted to raise \$48 for the Monadnock Region Association.

Article 9. A motion was made by Winniatt Griffiths to sell Ford truck and purchase a tractor similar to an International T 6. After some discussion of the question the vote was in the negative.

Article 10. Upon motion made by Arthur O. Ellsworth, it was voted to raise \$1000 for Old Age Assistance and Town Poor.

Article 11. Upon motion made by Hobart Kiblin, it was voted to authorize the selectmen to deliver inventory blanks to residents while assessing.

Article 12. Upon motion made by Ernest Johnson, it was voted to authorize the selectmen to borrow money on short term notes in anticipation of taxes.

Article 13. Upon motion made by Ernest Johnson, it was voted to raise \$729 for T. R. A.

Article 14. Upon motion made by Arthur Ellsworth, it was voted to raise \$50 for Old Home Day.

Article 15. Upon motion made by Marie Wells, it was voted to raise \$1000 to pay for snow plow and the digging of the well for the town hall water supply.

Article 16. After some discussion it was voted to have the Road Agent plow the driveways.

Article 17. Upon motion made by Chester P. McNally, it was voted to print the inventories and amount of taxes in the next town report.

It was voted to adjourn without date.

General Report

To the Citizens of Deering:

Under the CONSTITUTION of New Hampshire, education of children within its borders is distinctly a STATE function. I have purposely ended that statement there to impress on all concerned that education in New Hampshire or any part of it is not supposed to be accidental or haphazard but rather a well planned program, operated on a local level with great responsibility to the State Government.

Through the years, the State Board of Education has delegated to local School Boards certain duties and privileges concerning this educational program. It has always retained the right to insist on certain minimum standards in every School District. It is my duty as Superintendent of your Schools and at the same time as an employee of the State Board of Education to help you and your School Board meet these minimum requirements and to improve upon them where possible. It was clearly evident about three years ago after examination by the State Board of Health that our school did not even come close to meeting minimum standards of health and safety. Your School Board then had no choice but to install some satisfactory type of plumbing and heating to meet these standards. This

work has now been completed, except for more lighting fixtures.

We have had installed at the East Deering School a new oil-fired air-conditioning heating system, a new flush closet in the boys' and girls' toilets together with an adequate sewage disposal system, a new dug well, new electric water pump and piping, a new drinking fountain, relocated the sink, and insulated with wall-board the old woodshed. There was also installed a new ceiling about three years ago and more recently a new chimney to replace the obsolete and unsafe chimney in use. It was also absolutely necessary to re-shingle the roof because of the poor condition of the old wood shingles.

All this cost your board many hours of anxiety and worry because they are extremely conscientious people who wanted to do a good job. The cost if pro-rated over the years when little was done to the school and into the future when little will have to be done, is NOT too great. Anyone who says it is, must be blind to reality. Since the type of installation at the school is relatively new in the area, we hope that it will always function perfectly, but in this machine age we have come to know that parts of any machine may stop working without warning. We have also come to realize that such breakdowns are part of the price we pay for enjoying such machine services. Intelligent people don't try to get the horse back every time the car breaks down and we hope the same people will realize that a red-hot stove and smelly, unsanitary toilets no longer have any place in a schoolroom. Deering can now point with pride to its school improvements.

The transportation problem has settled into a regular thing now, and your Board has continued the three year contract with the Whitney Bus Co. at an extremely advantageous price computed at twenty-five cents

a mile on straight runs. The State Board of Education and the Motor Vehicle Department are now working out stiffer transportation regulations but your Board has already provided for all necessary precautions and Deering will probably not be affected by the new regulations. Simultaneously it may be that a new law will be passed making high school transportation compulsory. Here again we have taken care of the future since we already transport High School pupils. We have had some complaints on the routing of the buses. That's our job, of course, to examine complaints. It is likewise our job and the job of all citizens to work for the good of citizenship everywhere. After careful examination of those complaints it seemed inadvisable to change the routes. We are attaching a map of the bus routes to this report so that all taxpayers may see how difficult it has been to provide maximum transportation at a minimum cost to the taxpayers. Our present system allows us to coordinate the Hillsboro and East Deering runs and yet limits any child riding, for more than a half hour. It covers about a hundred miles each day. It can be proved that by starting a series of visits to isolated dooryards, we would prolong the length of the total trip, increase the cost of the transportation, reduce the safety of all those on the buses because of getting the bus off the main roads, and we would do little to improve the health and safety of the very few youngsters who have to walk a short distance to the bus. While on the transportation subject, it still seems advantageous to have a committee made up of the School Board and the Selectmen to meet with State Highway and State Board of Education officials to see if we can have more black roads on the school bus routes. Since such a procedure has never been tried, we have no proof that it wouldn't work.

In our last report, we predicted that tuitions would

probably reach \$150 in the High School and \$100 in the Elementary School, and were labeled as an alarmist. Actually our predictions were modest because Deering is now paying \$158 in the High School and \$103 in the Elementary School. For next year we can expect smaller increases perhaps. Education is still a pretty important item in the life of a child and the costs are still at a minimum when compared to other cost-of-living items. Your tuition pupils are listed below. There may be slight variations because of people moving in or out of the town. These pupils are the ones to whom we must some day entrust the future of Deering. Their preparedness for such burdens is our grave responsibility:

After all the work your School Board has done and which educational programs now require of them in the interests of better educational facilities in Deering, all of which has taken many, many hours of work and travel, it is perhaps regrettable that the pay for the job is so very little. Your new budget provides for a slight improvement in this unfair situation and your attention is called to it here so that you may give it conscientious consideration previous to the meeting.

Last year, at your annual meeting, you agreed to participate in a study of the possibilities of a cooperative High School. Such a study is now in progress and needs another year at least before a report can be worked out.

We hesitate to issue too many tables but feel that the following are important for your information.

Deering's problems are the same as those of any community, namely, to improve the program constantly and to constantly guard against those who would with all sincere intention try, figuratively, to hitch it up again to the "Old Gray Mare." The year's work deserves your careful attention for we believe it has been so well done that it can stand up under your careful inspection.


