

To the inhabitants of the Town of Derry, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Adams Memorial Hall in said Town, on the second Tuesday of March next, at Ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:—

1. To choose all necessary Town Officials for the year ensuing.

2. To elect four delegates to the Convention to revise the Constitution of New Hampshire to be held at Concord, beginning June 5, 1918.

3. To vote to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the support of schools, maintenance of the poor, for laying out and repairing highways, building and repairing bridges, for the suppression of brown tail and gypsy moths, for the police department and Municipal Court, for hydrant service and electric lights, for salaries and expenses of Town Officers, for the Board of Health, for the expenses of Adams Memorial Building and Town Hall, for the State and County Tax, and for any other necessary charges arising in said Town.

4. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the use of Upton Post, No. 45, G. A. R., to defray the expenses of Memorial Day.

5. To hear the report of agents, auditors and committees heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the improvement of highways in accordance with the provisions of Sec. 4, of Chapter 35 of the Laws of 1905, and pass any vote relating thereto.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for Maintenance of State Aid Roads and Trunk Line Roads, and pass any vote relating thereto.

8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purchase of books for the Derry Public Library and the maintenance of said Library, and pass any vote relating thereto.

9. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purchase of books for the Taylor Library and for the maintenance of said library, and pass any vote relating thereto.

10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to sprinkle and oil the streets and pass any vote relating thereto.

11. To see of the Town will vote to authorize its Board of Selectmen to enter into a contract with the Derry Electric Company, or with any other person or company, to furnish street lighting for one or more years, and pass any vote relating thereto.

12. To see of the Town will vote to authorize its Board of Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes on the negotiable notes of the Town, and pass any vote relating thereto.

13. To see of the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to appoint one or more Liquor Agents in accordance with Sect. 6 of Chapter 147 of the Laws of 1917, and pass any vote relating thereto.

14. To see of the Town will vote to appoint a Building Inspector, prescribe his duties, and fix his compensation, and adopt regulations for the construction and maintenance of all buildings in the Town, and pass any vote relating thereto.

15. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for a sinking fund for the payment of the Town bonds and pass any vote relating thereto.

During the past year the department has answered to 52 calls. Most of these were telephoned however and handled principally with hook and ladder truck. There were 12 bell alarms, 4 of these proved to be pretty hard fires. The total valuation of property involved being about \$220,000, and the loss about \$112,000.

We have installed the switchboard voted at the last meeting and the alarm system is working excellent. The engine house has had a new gravel roof and two coats of paint beside minor improvements, and considering the high cost of everything we believe we have done fairly well.

We extend our thanks to the business men and citizens generally for their hearty support and confidence. We also thank the members of the department who have stood the test and answered the calls so efficiently.

### REPORT OF BOARD OF HEALTH

There has been but little complaint of cesspools the past year as most of the owners have looked after them when needed. The Town has finally secured a good place for a town dump and if properly used will be suitable for a long time, as it can be burned over when necessary.

All persons are strictly forbidden to dump rubbish at any other place.

There have been 65 cases of measles, six of scarlet fever and 12 of diphtheria during the year.

Only three cases of tuberculosis have been reported which is considered a very small number for a Town of this size.

It is gratifying to report another year of successful operations. The high cost of coal and all materials, used about the water plant and its operations, has made a large drain upon the finances. Notwithstanding all this we are happy to report a good round sum upon the credit sheet. The unusually cold winter will also add largely to the running expenses, as the frost will be responsible for large repair bills. The detailed report of the superintendent fully covers the resources and the expenses of the past year.

TO THE BOARD OF WATER COMMISSIONERS :

I herewith submit the annual report of the Superintendent for the year ending December 31, 1917. With the exception of eleven new services, no new work has been done this year. Repairs that were necessary have been attended to; a new Corey hydrant replaces the old one at the corner of Pearl and Franklin St, four hundred feet of two inch pipe replaces the one and one fourth inch pipe on McAllister Ct., the four services on the Court were also relaid.

No repairs of any importance have been made at either the stand pipe or pumping station.

Two pieces of land adjoining the well fields have been bought for protection. This will prevent further building near the water supply.

At the office we have two new machines which are proving a great convenience, a Sundstrand adding machine and a Direx-All addressing machine.

We have done the customary work on the steam roller, tree sprayer and the sewer and also operated the stone erusher.

The first instalment, \$13,000, of the N. W. Harris Co.'s \$90,000 bonds came due July 1, 1917 and was paid by the maturing of \$6,000 worth of bonds held by the Town for that purpose with accrued interest and \$6,000 worth of our own bonds bought with earnings from the plant. This reduces the Harris bond to \$77,000.

We have paid all running expenses; \$1350.99 for extensions; \$4462.50 interest on bonds; and have a balance of \$6749.68, most of which is drawing interest.

LIBRARIAN'S REPORT.

To the Trustees of the Derry Public Library:

The thirteenth annual report is here presented, for the year ending January 31, 1918.

The library and reading room have been open every day except Sundays and holidays from 2.30 to 5 o'clock and from 6 to 9 o'clock. On Saturdays continuously from 2.30 to 9 o'clock. Your librarian has also been on duty from 1 o'clock to the hour of opening each day.

#### Circulation.

The past year has been one of unrest throughout our country and as the people of Derry have had their share in all the activities relative to the war there has been less reading by many. It is the first time in the history of the library that there has been a decrease in circulation. This decrease is not large, however, only about one--third of the gain we made last year. Worthy of note is the fact that the decrease is wholly in the fiction class and a gain has been made in the number of non-fiction books loaned.

#### War Activities.

The library has had its share in new activities occasioned by the war. Through its medium literature pertaining to "War Gardens," was circulated, many government bulletins concerning food conservation have also been distributed. Books pertaining to the war have been given a prominent place and have been much used by your patrons. Posters of Red Cross work and Liberty Loans have been conspicuously displayed and others, which have given information as to how we may "help win the war."

When the drive for the War Library Fund was in progress, this library took an active part and the \$257 which was raised in Derry was forwarded by your librarian to the State authorities. The hearty co-operation of the citizens. I believe, was in part a recognition ation of the citizens, I believe, was in part a recognition of the value of the library privileges which they and their children enjoy.

#### Accessions.

Our accessions are not as large as in former years, the price of books has largely increased and as no more money has been raised for this purpose the number of books added must of necessity fall short of former years. Our patrons are constantly demanding new books and in many cases more than one copy of a popular book should be provided to supply the demand, but as this would curtail the purchase of other books it is done only occasionally and sometimes one has to wait a long time before getting a desired book. We try however, to serve as best we can and if the desired book is not obtainable another of equal merit usually can be had.

## Care of Books.

Each time a book is returned to the library it is examined to see if in need of repair, and this is made before the book is allowed to go out again. But even with this close attention many o four books are wearing out and having to be discarded. Only a few of these are replaced as it seems best to put our available money into new books. With our circulation of nearly 38,000 the comparatively small number discarded readily shows the care taken.

#### School Loans.

Books have been sent each term to some of the larger rural schools. These are much appreciated by the children who cannot easily reach our library and are in some cases used by the families living near.

The teachers are granted extra cards for school use and many make regular use of this privilege.

The mounted pictures are slowly coming into use but at present so many subjects are inadequately represented that often the needs of the teachers cannot be supplied. I think it would be well, the coming year, to purchase a few pictures on those subjects most desired.

#### Library Meetings.

A neighborhood meeting was held by this library in September, and invitations were sent to all libraries in this vicinity. Fifteen guests were present represent ing nine libraries. Subjects pertaining to the work were discussed and an enjoyable afternoon spent.

Your librarian was invited to give a demonstration in mending before the Milford district, which she did last June.

The library was also represented at the New Hamp shire state meeting held in Manchester.

#### Gifts. . .

A number of gifts have been received of which a report is made elsewhere. Also we have received and forwarded a number of books and magazines for the soldiers and sailors.

## SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT.

To the Board of Education of Derry Town School District:

I beg to submit the following report on the work of the public schools for the past year.

The work continued from the time of the last report to the end of the year in June much as usual. It became necessary to make one change in the teaching force in the Spring. Miss Carlotta L. Damren was selected as teacher of the 7th grade room which had been for nearly a year in charge of Miss Tebbetts. Sixty-eight were graduated in June from the 8th grade, forty-four of whom were from the Oak St. 8th grade, and the remaining twenty-four were from the various district schools. On account of the industrial and economic conditions, a smaller proportion of these than usual entered the Academy.

When school opened in September, but few changes in the teaching force were made. It was necessary to have another 8th grade room, also another 3rd grade room. On the other hand it was possible to get along with four instead of five 1st grade rooms. Miss Christine Feinauer was selected for the new 8th grade, Miss M. Ethel Smith was transferred from first to third grade, and Miss Ethel Dudley was engaged to teach the first grade in place of Miss Gage, who resigned. In the district schools also the changes were few. Miss Murray at District 4 resigned and Miss Coult was transferred from District No. 8 to District No. 4, and Mrs. Augusta H. Pontius was engaged for District No. 8. Since the beginning of the year, Miss Proctor has been given leave of absence for whatever time she might need, and Miss Goodwin, who has formerly done much good work in our schools, was put in charge of her room as substitute teacher.

The opening of the Charles M. Floyd school gave relief from the formerly crowded condition. It madenecessary some readjustment. In the Floyd school six rooms are used, and the following grades are provided for there: two first grades, 2nd grade, a 3rd grade, a 7th grade, and an 8th grade. Miss Feinaeur, teacher of the 8th grade, is principal of the building. At the West Side school are the first six grades, while at the Oak St school are all the grades from the 1st to the 8th, inclusive.

On account of the business depression during the summer, some families moved away, and consequently the registration for this year is slightly less than that of last year. On the other hand the average attendance seems to be relatively better this year in spite of the extremely severe weather.

The last legislature changed the time of closing the financial accounts of school districts from Feb. 15 to Aug. 31, so the detailed statement of expenditures for the period from Feb. 15, 1917 to Aug. 31, 1918 will be published in next year's report. However, a summary of the receipts and expenditures to date, Feb. 15, 1918, is given this year.

While it is the evident intention of the law that the appropriation to be made at the annual meeting in March be for the year ending Aug. 31, 1919, it may be wise to distribute the burden of extra taxation, caused by changing the fiscal year, over two or more years.

About a year ago a school savings bank was put

in operation. On account of the detail of work involved, it has been thought best not to attempt to extend it to the outlying schools. This movement has afforded an excellent opportunity to teach thrift, and teachers and pupils have responded splendidly. After making some study of systems in use elsewhere, arrangements were made with the Derry Savings Ban. for this work, the Bank supplying all necessary forms for carrying it on.

It may be of interest if a detailed account of the operation of the bank is given here. Every Tuesday morning the children deposit their money with the teacher of their room. Each depositor is given a pass book or card, and an identical record is kept by the teacher. A list of the depositors is made, and if any child's deposits amount to one dollar, his name is also put on the transfer list. The lists and the envelope containing the money are later collected by some one appointed to do this, the amount verified, and the envelope sealed. The lists and money are then sent at the close of school to the office of the superintendent. The money is deposited in the Derry National Bank, and checks are then drawn to be deposited to the credit of those whose names are on the transfer lists, and accounts are opened for them in the Derry Savings Bank. As often thereafter as a child gets a dollar on his school card, he is given a check to deposit on his bank account. In just a year, the total deposits have amounted to \$1251.68, and of this amount \$1107.00 have been transferred to more than three hundred individual savings bank accounts.

Many are saving regularly, and if this is continued, the habit will become fixed. I feel that this is among the important things that we are doing. The sale of Thrift stamps and War Saving stamps gives an opportunity during this year to do much the same work in all the schools, and we are trying to make the most of the opportunity.

The unusual demands upon the schools caused by the war must be met, but without seriously disturbing the fundamental work of the school. Last year the children quite generally had gardens, and this did not interfere with their work in school. This year the food situation is much more acute and it is desired that the children do very much more garden work. This will appeal to them, as to the teachers, as an economic need and as a patriotic duty. To do this it is not necessary for us to teach less, but rather make a better use of our time that there may be opportunity to do the work demanded by the present crisis. It is hoped that the parents will encourage the children in this work, and give them whatever help they may need during the Spring and Summer.

Last year I pointed out the fact that there was need of special rooms on account of the large amount of retardation in our schools. That need still exists. In September there were 53 in our three large buildings three years or more behind grade. These people need individual attention, and this can be given only in a limited way by the regular teachers. The special rooms would lessen, but not remove all of the retardation. I have from time to time urged three things, all of which are much needed. They are special rooms, practical arts work in the grades, and evening schools for the benefit of the adult foreign population. These should be provided for as soon as and as rapidly as the resources of the school department will warrant.

During the past year much needed repairs were

made at the school building in district No. 3. At other schools only immediately necessary repairs were made. I believe we should continue the plan of putting one building each year in thoroughly good condition. The Oak St., building should be painted if possible the coming season

The year's work has been going along very satisfactorily. The severe weather of the Winter has caused some interruptions, but in spite of these the work has progressed on the whole well. This is due in some measure to the fact that there have been no changes in the teaching force. The general health of the pupils has been good, and the spirit towards the school and work has been excellent.

In conclusion, I wish to thank the Board for generous support and hearty co-operation, also the teachers, pupils and parents for a spirit of helpfulness in all that pertains to the welfare of the schools.

## SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT.

To the Board of Education of Derry Special District No. 2:

I herewith submit my annual report as Superintudent of schools.

The work of the Grammar room was more or less interrupted last year by frequent changes of teacher. This was unfortunate, and caused quite a little interference with the usual good work of the room At the beginning of the Spring term, Miss Esther Lewis was secured as teacher, and since then the work has steadily improved. I feel that the school now is in good hands, and is doing consistent work. The primary room has made its usually good progress under the direction of Miss Howe.

The registration is somewhat smaller than usual on account of the fact that several families with children have moved away from the Village and few such families have come to us in the meanwhile.

The work of the several classes is, in the main,, along the lines pursued for several years, although our new State Program of Studies calls for some innovations. While we wish as far as possible to carry out the spirit, at least of the State Program, it seems best in our peculiar situation to be somewhat conservative. We wish always to adapt our program and our work to the best interests of the children.

The fiscal year has been changed to end August 31 instead of February 15. Consequently the detailed financial report for the period from February 15, 1917 to August 31, 1918 should be published next year. It is well to remember that the law evidently intends that the appropriations to be made at the meeting in March be for the period ending August, 31, 1919.

The food situation is acute, and it is desired that every child as far as possible cultivate as large a garden as he may be able to care for. Assistance and instruction will be given through the schools, and it is hoped that parents will encourage the children in this work and aid them ,if necessary, during the Spring and Summer.

The following facts were reported to the State Department for the year ending in June:

Per cent. of attendance		92.60

The per cent, of attendance is altogether too low. This is partly attributable to the severe Winter weather. It should have been much better.

The census of the school children in September, shows 68 between the ages of 5 and 16. Of these two between 5 and 8 are not in school and one between 8 and 14 is not in school. Eleven were in the Academy and 54 in the public schools.
