To the Inhabitants of the Town of Epsom in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Epsom on Tuesday, the Fourteenth day of March, next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon until six o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To see what action the Town will take upon the budget submitted by the Budget Committee.
- 3. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for the White Pine Blister Rust Control.
- 4. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 for the Concord Hospital, to help offset an estimated operating deficit for the year 1950.
- 5. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$620.38 for the maintenance, construction or reconstruction of Class V Highways, the State to contribute \$2,481.51 as provided in Chapter 188, Part 13, Laws of 1945 and Chapter 18, Laws of 1949.
- 6. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for work to be done on the Goborough Road, so called, said work to commence at the Gossville Cemetery. (By Petition)
- 7. "Shall the provisions of Chapter 171-A of the Revised Laws relative to playing games of Beano be adopted in this City or Town?"

- 8. To see what discount, if any, the Town will allow on all property taxes paid within fourteen days of presentation of warrant to Collector, or act in any way relating thereto.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow such sums of money as may be necessary in anticipation of taxes.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to distribute the inventory blanks at the time of taking the annual inventory.

### REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF THE EPSOM PUBLIC LIBRARY

The First Half of the Twentieth Century is finished. It is appropriate to take stock of our stewardship for the past 50 years and to plan for the final half of the century.

In the year 1900 Epsom had a Town Library located in "a room in the dwelling house of Nathan Goss."

In fact, our Library was opened officially on September 5, 1893 by a board of Trustees elected at the Town Meeting in March 1893, with 304 volumes in "the library room in George E. Warren's store building under the supervision of our efficient Librarian, Miss Elsie N. Warren." So runs the report of the first Trustees, John H. Dolbeer, Warren Tripp, Roscoe Hill.

Just nine years later, the same Trustees, acting as the building committee appointed by the Town, removed the library to our present building with appropriate ceremonies.

In the year 1901, the Town appropriated \$500 for a new library building. That Fall work began on our present building and \$529.39 was spent in construction. In 1902 the building was completed at additional expense of \$516.87. Total cost \$1,042.26. John Dolbeer of San Francisco, a native of Epsom, contributed the Red Wood lumber of which it is built. He also gave \$300 cash toward the cost of construction. The balance needed was contributed in small sums by citizens and out-of-town friends of Epsom. The land was given by Mr. C. S. Hall.

The new building was dedicated and opened in Old Home Week (probably in August) 1902. It had 940 books, most of them donated by friends.

Now, to look into the Second Half of our Century which we have just entered:

The immediate needs of our Library are not critical. The Trustees wish that the building could be better heated. Neither the book-shelves room nor the reading room is comfortable in Winter; both must be closed off to keep the main room warm. This condition is not new but continues to limit the use of our excellent facilities.

Three sides of the building were re-painted last year and the lawn had special care. The painting will be finished in the Spring.

We have considered the practicability and value of a separate filing cabinet within the Library, for the safe keeping of historical material concerning the Town of Epsom. Doubtless many interesting papers, letters, diaries, pictures, and other records, would be contributed for such preservation and for convenient reference.

The Trustees acknowledge with thanks a gift from Charles M. Steele, of Epsom Town Reports from 1933 to 1948 which will be bound to complete our handy volume series of these Reports from 1882 to date. Together, they comprise the most detailed history of Epsom readily available for the years they cover.

#### REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN

### Forest Fires — our Most Shameful Waste

Everyone apparently fears fire but too many are careless with it. This is particularly true of fires in and near woodlands. Official figures show that more than 98 percent of all forest fires result from human carelessness and can be prevented. Consequently, we may say "Forest Fires are our most shameful waste."

Annual forest fire losses are tremendous and their effects far reaching. Such fires destroy the raw products of the forests, the protection forests provide for game and the supply of ground water. They upset local economies by drawing men from gainful employment and requiring the expenditure of public funds to extinguish them.

Our forest fire organization is doing a good job in keeping the size of fires small but the number of fires is increasing. In 1949 there were 100 more fires in New Hampshire than in 1948, but they burned 500 acres less. For the warden and his deputies to do the job they are capable of, they must have the cooperation of the public — YOU!

The primary objective of all fire fighters is PRE-VENTION — fire stoppage. This is the goal toward which your local forest fire warden and his deputies are constantly working. It can be achieved ONLY if YOU and YOU and YOU cooperate with them. It is worth YOUR effort and can be accomplished by:

Being careful with fire in or near woodland, being particularly careful with matches and cigarettes.

- 2. Securing the required written permit from the warden when the ground is not covered with snow.
- 3. Insisting that others be careful and comply with burning requirements.
- 4. Calling the warden promptly when fire is detected and aiding him to extinguish it.

Let's reduce the number of forest fires and eliminate our most shameful waste.

Committees planning for a new school building in Epsom are still functioning. New buildings have recently been dedicated in Chichester, Derry, Pelham, Surry, and elsewhere in New Hampshire. Federal funds for advance planning are again available.

Short Falls School last year provided a unit of study on Epsom, at the request of the Merrimack Valley Regional Association. Epsom teachers participated in a "workshop" on Conservation education, held for three days in September at Barrington School. Groups studied problems of soil, water, wildlife, and forestry, with the aid of references furnished by the State Library and on field trips led by experts from other state departments. Teachers received new concepts of the vital importance of these subjects to the future of our country, and they received new experiences to share with their pupils.
