Report of Electric Lighting Committee

The lighting system has been extended the past year to the W. R. Sawyer place including extensions to Welch Brothers place and G. M. Wilder's place. The net cost to the town for the new additions including a service to A. T. Wilson's house and a new pole set near Ella C. Ware's house, was \$2018.75. The hard digging and excessive trimming on this year's work made the cost of labor more per mile than on any line that this town has built but the New England Telephone and Telegraph Company paid us a larger amount per pole than in the past, for joint ownership so that the net cost per mile is about the same as in previous years. Nine meters have been added during the year. Rebates amounting to \$1,593.74 have been received during the year from the Public Service Co. of N. H. \$1509.27 being the amount figured on the regular 20% and 40% basis. \$84.47 being the rebate for two years account where we receive an extra 10%. On the gross income over \$3500.00 per year.

We herewith submit an account of the extension of the lighting system including one service and one new pole on original line, also account of the repairs during the year.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

TO THE SCHOOL BOARD OF HANCOCK:

We believe that the complete centralizing of the Hancock schools has sold itself in its merit, and that no further comment is needed.

Rearrangement of the schedule in the Hancock High School has resulted in a net saving of \$412.00 without lowering or impairing the efficiency of the educational privileges. Miss Harrison has full charge of the work in the seventh and eighth grades in the High School building, and her faithful work continually gains ground for the children's education.

State aid advanced from the zero level to \$1,034.25 for the

present year.

It is for the School Board and not for supervision to make suggestions to the District, but it is not out of place to comment on the fact that a very definite saving has been made possible.

Music has been incorporated into the actual teaching service at a considerable gain in savings. The fact should be squarely met that the teaching of two and three part singing and chorus work without a piano requires the services of a teacher of music whose salary would be far beyond the possibility of payment. We understand that the high school is to be provided with a piano to replace the useless one, and the money expended on music in the upper grades can then receive more than its full value in music training.

In the previous year achievement surveys were held, to arrive at the measure of accomplishment of the schools. During the present year, with still greater emphasis to come during April and May, diagnostic tests are and will be given for the discovery of individual aberrations from such expectancies as the children warrant following study of personal ability to perform.

In considering the cost of maintaining the desired educational system, combining grammar and high school privileges, it is quite necessary to admit at once that Hancock steps into a group of towns whose progressive spirit demands equal opportunity for all resident children to secure high school education. Nor is it at all to be expected that the cost of education in a 12 year system can be retained at the lower level, found where only 8 grades are maintained.

And in education, as in business, to be penny wise may result in pound foolishness. The total cost of current education in Hancock is exceeded by other towns out of the 250 school districts of the state. Careful planning of courses, combining of special departments, and the securing of teachers qualified to handle the regular education of children first, and the special subjects as a secondary matter, can and does reduce the cost to the district and keeps the cost within an exceedingly tolerable figure when costs are compared throughout New Hampshire.

If specialties are to be added they should be added only after district debt has been done away with. And in adding specialties to the curriculum one must expect to pay and pay well for them, where excellent results, beyond the level of the average teacher,

are hoped for.

In general, the worth of a school system is measured by the extent to which a school system meets the needs of a town in every day matters, and we believe that the citizens of Hancock take pride in the spirit found within the walls of her schools and extending to the social life and child welfare of the district.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BOARD TO THE CITIZENS OF HANCOCK

That all may understand the work we add a few items. There are 21 pupils in first three grades 20 in the next three, 19 in 7th and 8 grades and 21 pupils in the High School

Through the generosity of the Woman's Club we now have a fine set of scales with measuring attachment.

To obtain the best results some of the children ought to be more regular in their attendance. In October it was decided that Miss Stoddard teach music in the first six grades. She is doing very good work. Miss Freeman has charge of music in the sixth and seventh grades and High School. She has nad a good training in music. The results would be more noticeable if the piano was in better condition. All the grades are having splendid training in Arithmetic. And French is not being taught in the Junior High (or seventh and eighth grades.)

We feel that more help in explaining work in Arithmetic would be of great benefit to some of the pupils. The children are spending the time in school to thoroughly understand the fundamental principles not merely to attain the highest marks. We helped some of the familes last year, (1925-1926) in No. 7 to attend the Junior High at the rate of \$1.00 per week for each family. Cost was about \$140. This plus \$756.00 (salary of

teacher) equalled nearly \$900.00. \$900.00 is the cost of transportation from there this year. Approximately we saved \$36.00 for janitor, \$45.00 for wood, \$54.00 for transportation of music teacher or \$135.00 in all.

The State Board has notified us that this town will receive \$751.04, state aid next December. The \$5.00 tax on each \$1000. equalized valuation increases our tax this year from \$4,256.01 to \$4,739.66. If this valuation had remained the same as last year, State Aid in December this year would have been \$751.04 plus \$483.65 or \$1,234.69.
