# TOWN WARRANT

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To the Inhabitants of the Town of Jackson in the County of Carroll in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Jackson on Tuesday, the tenth day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate as follows:

3. A sum of money for maintenance of summer highways and bridges.

4. A sum of money for snow removal and sanding.

5. A sum of money for street lighting.

6. The sum of \$2,145.00 to secure state aid to the amount of \$4,290.00 for reconstruction of highway between Route 16A and Eagle Mountain House.

7. The sum of \$171.63, — so-called Town Road Aid, — to secure state aid to the amount of \$685.52.

8. The sum of \$200 to finish reconstruction of road adjacent to residence of Carl Hayes.

9. A sum of money for poor relief.

10. A sum of money for old age assistance.

11. A sum of money for support of Library.

12. The sum of \$100 for repair of Hearse House.

13. The sum of \$150 for maintenance of cemetery.

14. The sum of \$500 for construction of cement sidewalk in Jackson village.

15. The sum of \$25 for Memorial Day exercises.

16. The sum of \$70 for support of White Mountains Region.

17. A sum of money for support of Eastern Slope Region, Inc.

18. The sum of \$300 for additional fire protection due to the war emergency.

19. The sum of \$100 for additional police protection due to the war emergency.

20. The sum of \$100 for health protection due to the war emergency.

21. The sum of \$100 for Red Cross work in Jackson due to the war emergency.

22. A sum of money in support of Civilian Defense.

23. The sum of \$100 for clearing ski slopes and trails.

24. The sum of \$75 to install Wormley stone trough at Perkins Spring.

25. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow upon credit of the Town not exceeding \$5,000 in anticipation of taxes.

26. To see if the Town will vote to continue to remove snow from private dooryard roadways.

27. To act upon any other business that may legally be considered.

The Library has been open 117 days; from July 1 to October 1 the hours were from 10:00 to 12:00 A.M. daily; for the remaining months from 2:00 to 4:00 P.M. every Saturday. In this time the total circulation was 3451 .

There have been added to the Library by gifts 77 volumes and by purchase 29, making a total number of volumes in the Library 2278.
