To see if the Town will vote to authorize the establishment of the "Landaff Conservation Fund" for the purpose of depositing yearly conservation allocations (up to \$5,000 per year as voted under Warrant Article 21 at the 2008 Town Meeting) collected pursuant to RSA 79-A:25 and to be deposited in the said "Landaff Conservation Fund" in accordance with RSA 36-A:5, III, as authorized by RSA 79-A:25, II. (Majority vote required.) (Recommended by the Landaff Conservation Commission) (Recommended by the Selectmen). A motion was made by Brenda Dodge and 2nd by Phil Finkle to table Article 19. A show of hands vote was taken with 41 in favor and 22 opposed. ARTICLE 19 WAS TABLED.

Are you in favor of amending Article #10 of the existing Zoning Ordinance to add a new Ridgeline Conservation District including definition of areas above 1,600 feet, and permitted uses by special exception? SUBMITTED AND RECOMMENDED BY THE LANDAFF PLANNING BOARD. VOTE 3-2 in Favor. (BY BALLOT) YES – 52 NO – 168. ARTICLE 23 FAILED.

A big Thank You and standing ovation was extended to outgoing Selectman, Bruce Ulricson, for his 12 years of service to the Town. REQUESTING AGENCIES

GRAFTON COUNTY SENIOR CITIZENS COUNCIL, INC.

Grafton County Senior Citizens Council, Inc. is a private, nonprofit organization that provides programs and services to support the health and well being of our older citizens. The programs enable elderly individuals to remain independent in their own homes and communities for as long as possible.

During 2009, older residents of Landaff were served by either the Littleton or the Haverhill area senior services.

- 240 balanced meals at one or both of the facilities.
- 138 hot, nourishing meals were delivered to their homes.
- Landaff residents received assistance with problems, crises or issues of longterm care through 2 visits with a trained outreach worker and 14 contacts with ServiceLink.
- Landaff citizens also volunteered to put their talents and skills to work for a better community through 36 hours of volunteer service.
 The cost to provide services to Landaff residents in 2009 was \$3,654.70.
 Request for 2010: \$350.00.

TRI-COUNTY COMMUNITY ACTION

This agency is a private, nonprofit organization that provides assistance with fuel, housing needs, homeless programs, FEMA, and USDA surplus food.

In 2009, the Tri-County Community Action program was able to assist 134 Landaff residents with services including: fuel assistance were; weatherization program assistance; food pantry; state electrical assistance; and referrals for legal aid, clothing, health, budgeting, etc.

Request for 2010: \$700.00.

NORTH COUNTRY HOME HEALTH & HOSPICE AGENCY, INC.

Although many of North Country Home Health & Hospice's services are paid for through Medicare, Medicaid, and the State grant programs, the reimbursement under these programs continues to fall significantly short of actual expenses. Severe shortages in nurses, home care aides and other professionals continue to plague the home care field. Hard economic times are resulting in an increase in the number of uninsured and underinsured residents in need of home health and hospice care. In order to be able to continue to provide quality care so urgently needed by our community, assistance in funding is vital to our clients. Home care is critical to the growing health care needs of this country. It provides care for the sick, disabled and dying in their own home where they can be provided the highest quality of life, the greatest amount of freedom possible and the highest degree of human dignity. We assist people recuperating from surgery, individuals coping with chronic illnesses, and families and community members caring for loved ones and friends. Services provided to the residents of Landaff during 2009 89 nursing visits - 110 physical therapy/occupational therapy/speech therapy were: 6 medical social service - 24 visits for home health aide/homemaker/companion.

WHITE MOUNTAIN MENTAL HEALTH

The agency offers assistance to individuals with debilitating mental illnesses or situational crises. Our services allow individuals with disabilities to function as productive citizens. Assistance is given to the mentally ill through housing, jobs and all the functions of daily living. During 2009, White Mountain Mental Health provided 66 hours of services to residents of Landaff.

NORTH COUNTRY COUNCIL, INC.

North Country Council dues vary each year and are based on the latest population numbers from the office of State Planning and on the latest valuation numbers received from the Dept. of Revenue Administration. If your town would like the formula used please call our office.

During 2009, the members of the Landaff Conservation Commission, Richard Bronson, Sue O'Hearn, Richard Sagar, Bobbi Jo Brown, Marilyn Booth and alternate member Heidi Sagar, met monthly to discuss various conservation related issues.

Members made our annual physical inspection of the two LCIP easement properties for compliance with the easement restrictions. We maintained the hiking trail on the Tellman LCIP property opposite the Blue School. This trail is open to the public for hiking and is where the Blue School teachers take their students on field trips. Members also participated in the maintenance of the trail system at the Scotland Brook Audubon Sanctuary and trash pickups along the Town's roads. We reviewed construction project applications and wetland permit applications to determine if there would be any impact on the Town from the Conservation Commission's standpoint.

We continue to study and educate ourselves regarding environmental issues and attended the NH Association of Conservation Commissions annual meeting / seminar, and meetings on environmental planning at the Rock's Estate. The Conservation Commission hosted presentations on wild mushroom identification, current use issues and ways to improve wildlife habitat.

LANDAFF SCHOOL BOARD REPORT

Claire Cochrane continues with us as head teacher. She is assisted by Patricia Davis, Joanne Meachen serving as librarian, as well as a number of "specials." French continues as part of the curriculum this year.

We received a letter from the Department of Education that we have completed the Small School Review process for determining Annual Yearly Progress (AYP). This is a result of the federal No Child Left Behind program and is measured by NECAP testing. Due to the size of our school, our scores are aggregated over a 3 year period and we have passed their standards with flying colors.

We have worked hard to ensure that spending increases are kept to a minimum. Most budget areas have seen slight decreases or have been budgeted flat to the prior year.

The budget is proposed at an increase of approximately \$25,000. This is largely due to increased tuition headcount at the grades outside of the Blue School. As always, the wildcard is the number of students that move in/out of town and special education requirements that are mandated by law. We do our best to estimate the number of students attending the various grade levels and then budget for one extra for the year. This past year, we had fewer tuition students start at the beginning of the year than we had planned for and some additional special education requirements were mandated for some students. The surplus realized from fewer than budgeted tuition students will aid the beginning balance for next school year. Expenses continue to be scrutinized at both the SAU level and the Blue School level.

The board has been continuing to track the progress of our students as they go on to Lisbon. We meet with the Lisbon Board twice a year. We have been diligent in communicating with regard to student attendance and progress toward graduation in a timely manner.

SAU 35 has hired a new superintendent and continues to improve in their services.

The Board believes the children are getting an excellent education at the Blue School. The Blue School staff, the SAU, parents and community members all share important roles in the continued success of Landaff students.

We thank you for your support and involvement.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

It is my great pleasure to write my first annual report as the new Superintendent for the School Districts in White Mountains School Administrative Unit #35. First I would like to thank Dr. Robert Patterson for all of his help in transitioning into this new position. Dr. Patterson was the interim Superintendent last year and did an excellent job of working with all the different school districts in the SAU.

Coming here I have been very impressed with all the schools within the SAU. Our administrators, teachers, specialists, and support staff do an outstanding job in our schools. We are very fortunate to have such dedicated professionals who are very focused on personalized student learning. In the Report of the Principal they will share with you some of the wonderful things they are doing with students in their schools.

I would like to share with you some of the great things that are happening at the SAU level. As I was hired to be the CAO (Chief Academic Officer), a major area of focus this year is on curriculum. With so many changes in the Superintendent's position and the reorganization of the SAU office, this is one important area that has been pushed to the side. With the help of building administrators and teacher leadership, we are now beginning to focus on revising our K-12 curriculum. We have agreed to use a method called *Understanding by Design* which focuses on what every student needs to know before moving on to the next level in that particular subject area. This work will help teachers tailor their instruction to challenge each student's ability in that subject areas. This curriculum system will also insure there are no weaknesses in the subject areas your child is studying.

I am carrying on the work Dr. Patterson was focused on last year in regards to early childhood education. All the data tells us how important it is to focus our energies on how each young child learns in different ways. With this in mind we will be running a series of four or five workshops starting in April that focus on learning strategies for young children. We plan to invite pre-school providers, kindergarten teachers, primary teachers, special education teachers, our district specialists and have a session for parents in these series of workshops. These meetings will provide an opportunity for discussion on strategies we use in helping young children be better prepared to learn. We will provide more information on this series in March.

In these tight economic times we are looking at how we can improve our SAU budgeting practices. Sandy Stone, our Business Manager, has done a very good job of finding the districts the cheapest fuel oil for their buildings. She has also negotiated an agreement to lower copier costs which is a direct savings to each school. We are looking at ways to improve the SAU budget building process so we can have fiscally responsible budgets and plans to address future needs. We are looking at how we might share resources between schools and districts to reduce duplication and be more efficient.

These are just a few of the things we are focusing on at the SAU. In closing I just want to thank all the School Board members for the time and effort they put in watching over your Districts. I also want to thank them for all the help and support they have provided me in my first year of this position. I would also like to thank the SAU staff for their dedication and support. Lastly I want to thank all the people I have met here in the communities for their help and support. I look forward to meeting more people as I continue my work here in SAU 35. I would also like to offer to the community the ability to feel free to contact me directly if you have any questions, concerns or if I can help you in any way. Thank you all for the help and support you give to our schools and the SAU.

STUDENT ASSISTANCE PROGRAM REPORT

The Student Assistance Program continues to work successfully with both SAU#35 and SAU#84. With continued support from both SAU's this program is able to continue to provide services to both SAU'S. We currently have two counselors in SAU #35. Through grant and local funding, Bethlehem, Lafayette and the Blue School receive part time services from Arlene Soule, our education and prevention specialist and Cynthia McLaren, the director of the program and the Homeless Liaison for the district is available for services on an as needed basis.

The services provided by the Student Assistance staff are wide-spread and varied. The administration and faculty at each school, and the unique needs and issues of each student body, determine what services are provided. However, at all levels, services consist of a combination of individual and group counseling, crisis intervention, drug and alcohol education, special events promoting Wellness and an Anti-Drug message, staff or family workshops, and facilitation and encouragement of positive social and academic involvement. The S.A.P. provider brings their own special "flavor" to the programs they initiate and consummate. As always, we strive to ensure that the curricula and methods we use are research-based—that they have been proven to be effective.

In summary, the purpose of the Student Assistance Program is to work with administration, faculty, parents, and students to address the particular needs of each school in regard to the prevention of substance abuse, aggression and violence, eating disorders, and other self-destructive behaviors. Moreover, we aim to nurture self-esteem, effective communication, empathy for others, problem solving and emotion management. We encourage students to seek healthy alternatives and to realize their full potential. In short, whatever the needs are, the Student Assistance Program is ready and willing to lend a hand in order to ensure that each student in the SAU can learn, grow, and achieve in a supportive and safe environment. It is our privilege and pleasure to provide Student Assistance services within SAU 35!
