STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

---

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Littleton, in said State, qualified to vote in Town and State affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall and Police Court Room in the Town Building on the 10th day of March next, being the second Tuesday of March, at eight o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE 1. To choose a Town Clerk, one Selectman for the term of three years, a Town Treasurer, a Collector of Taxes, an Overseer of the Poor, three members of the Board of Trustees of the Public Library, one Trustee of Trust Funds, a Constable, and Two Road Agents.

ARTICLE 2. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of Chapter 171-A of the Revised Laws relative to playing games of Beano in the Town of Littleton, and that the following question be placed upon the ballot to be used at said meeting, — “Shall the provisions of Chapter 171-A of the Revised Laws relative to playing games of Beano, be adopted in this Town.”

ARTICLE 3. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the laying out, construction and repairing of highways and bridges, for Town building maintenance, for election and registration expenses, for National Holidays, for Municipal Court expenses, for the Police Department, for the Health Department, for vital statistics, for the Community House, for advertising purposes, for miscellaneous expenses, for street lighting, for band concerts, for cemeteries, for Town Poor, for Old Age Assistance, for damage and legal expenses, for protection of the premises on the Ammonoosuc River from flood and other

water damage, for White Pine Blister control, for payment of the Town debt and interest, for the Community Nurse, for the Park Commissioners, and all other Town charges.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will vote that its Tax Collector, and Overseer of the Poor, shall hereafter be appointed by the Board of Selectmen instead of being elected.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to use fluorine in the Town Water supply.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the office of Constable.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will authorize its Selectmen to appoint a committee to investigate the costs of bringing the Town History up to date, and to spend an amount not to exceed \$250.00 to cover the cost of same.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will authorize its Board of Selectmen to make preliminary inquiries into the participation of Federal and State Aid in the rebuilding of Union and West Main Streets.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will authorize its Board of Selectmen to borrow monies, from time to time, for current indebtedness of the Town for the ensuing year, in anticipation of taxes to be collected for the year 1953, and to be paid therefrom.

ARTICLE 10. To hear the report of Agents, Auditors, Committee on Equalization, and Zoning Committees, or officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

ARTICLE 11. To choose any other necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year and to choose and elect any Agents or Committees which may be necessary to

carry into effect any vote that may be passed under this warrant.

ARTICLE 12. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual examination and audit of the Town of Littleton for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1952, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the Town. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

**Scope of Audit**

Included in the audit and examination were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Trustees of Trust Funds, Library and Municipal Court. The accounts of the Water and Light Department and the Village District were also audited and separate reports are being made for each of these divisions.

**Financial Statements**

**Comparative Balance Sheets — Dec. 31, 1951 — Dec. 31, 1952: (Exhibit A)**

Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1951 and December 31, 1952, are presented in Exhibit A. As indicated therein, the Net Debt increased by \$14,005.26 in 1952.

**Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit B)**

An analysis of the change in financial condition of

the town during the year is made in Exhibit B with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These were as follows :

### **Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures — Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits C & D)**

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1952, are presented in Exhibits C and D. As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit D), a net overdraft of appropriations of \$5,365.84, less a net revenue surplus of \$3,729.16, resulted in a net budget deficit of \$1,636.68.

### **Summary of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit E)**

A summary of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1952, made up in ac-

cordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit E. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of December 31, 1952, is indicated in Exhibit F.

**Parking Meter Account: (Exhibit H)**

A summary statement of the Parking Meter account is presented in Exhibit H.

**Statement of Long Term Indebtedness: (Exhibit N)**

A statement of long term indebtedness as of December 31, 1952, showing annual debt service requirements, is contained in Exhibit N.

**Audit Procedure**

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source insofar as possible and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements obtained from depository banks. Verification of uncollected taxes was made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpayers as indicated by the Collector's records.

**General Comments**

**Current Surplus:**

The Town remained in a current surplus position during 1952, as shown by the following statement:

**Town Treasurer's Surety Bond:**

The amount of the surety bond of the Town Treasurer in 1952 was \$10,000.00. Inasmuch as the funds handled by the Treasurer in 1952 totalled more than \$600,000.00, it is recommended that the surety bond of this official be increased to \$15,000.00 in 1953.

**Conclusion:**

The accounts of all town officials which we examined were found in good condition and the accounting procedure conformed to prescribed methods.

The provisions of Section 31, Chapter 211, of the Laws of 1939, require that this report or a summary of its essential features shall be published in the next annual Town report.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Town of Littleton for their assistance during the course of the audit.

## LIBRARIAN'S REPORT

---

Did you know that if all the books lent by the Littleton Public Library were laid end to end they would reach as far as Rock Pool? Or if piled on top of each other they would stand higher than Mt. Garfield? Useless information, perhaps, but it does give an idea of library use in concrete terms which might not be realized in a few visits to the library building.

Many people think of library books as providing primarily recreational reading. The error of this assumption is shown by the fact that in 1952 just 42% of the books lent were adult fiction. Books for children may be considered as instructive since they develop reading ability and broaden horizons as yet limited by age. The remaining 56% of the library circulation, then, was read for some practical purpose.

Nearly half the people of Littleton have been regular library users over the past three years. The library is a part of their daily life. Obviously there are still many potential borrowers to whom the library is an unknown quantity who could benefit greatly from its use if they realized what it has to offer besides an evening's entertainment. The reference collection, for instance, including encyclopedias, dictionaries, atlases and books of quotations, is quite good and up to date. Among these books is a set that will locate articles in all the leading magazines for past years. Chances are you can find the latest information on almost any subject by its use. Few people know that the library subscribes to about thirty magazines and that any but the current issue may be taken home.

People who have very little time for purely recreational reading will find other books helpful in things

they do every day. There are fine books that help a woman decorate her home, small apartment or large house, which give ideas on colors to use, arrangement of furniture, directions for making slip covers and draperies, painting and papering. Couples who are thinking of buying or building a house will find books of plans, interiors and exteriors. A new book on gardening the small place suggests ways of making lawns and gardens more attractive. A number of cookbooks will help with meal planning and menus. There are books on hobbies of many kinds: information on how to hook and braid rugs, paint trays, do drawing and water colors. The library user can learn how to remake and refinish furniture, repair and service cars, assemble radio sets, build small boats, all of which will interest the man who likes doing things with his own hands.

The latest postage stamp catalogs are available as are books on woodworking projects and designs for the amateur carpenter. Club program planners can find games, stunts, monologs and skits, suggestions for toasts and other useful ideas. It really pays to ask for anything you need. If we haven't it we can usually get it within a few days by borrowing from other libraries.

The library belongs to the people of Littleton. Their needs and wants are reflected in the book collection. We try to anticipate demands but suggestions are welcome and we try to fill requests if possible by buying material the townspeople want and will use.

The library is open every afternoon and evening except Saturday evening, Sundays and holidays most of the year. We are glad to answer questions and renew books by telephone.

May I take this opportunity to thank the many friends of the library who made gifts, the board of trustees and the library assistants for their help during the year.

## REPORT OF PARK COMMISSION 1952

This year the usual maintenance of the areas were taken care of. Our appropriation was increased this past year for the purpose of helping to defray the expense of our recreation director. As usual Mr. Orr did a wonderful job and the boys from the Village District and the Water and Light Department helped us out many times.

## SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

---

To the School Board and Citizens of Littleton :

It is with pleasure that I submit to you my annual report relative to your schools.

Several changes have taken place in the faculty since my last report.

Mr. William E. Morris of Haverhill, N. H., a graduate of Plymouth Teachers College, was elected to teach English in the high school, replacing Mr. Leon A. Wiskup who transferred to Manchester, N. H.

Mr. John M. McNamara of Braintree, Mass., a graduate of New England College with a Master's degree from the University of Maine was elected to teach Mathematics and coach skiing and track, replacing Mr. Sheldon Varney who transferred to Claremont, N. H.

Mr. Foster H. Slayton of Tilton, N. H., a graduate of the University of New Hampshire with 22 years' teaching experience in private schools of New Hampshire and Vermont was elected to teach Social Studies and coach boys' athletics to replace Weston S. Root who returned to Springfield College to complete work for his Master's degree.

Mrs. Charlotte S. Sargent of Littleton, a graduate of the University of New Hampshire, with a year's experience in Newport was elected to teach Commerce to replace Miss Virginia L. Brown who resigned to get married.

Miss Aylmer E. Crafts of Concord, N. H., a graduate of Wheaton College, with a year's experience in Gorham, Maine was elected to teach English and coach girls' athletics to replace Miss Janet D. Tinker who transferred to Pittsfield, N. H.

Miss Evelyn R. Clark of Holderness, a graduate of Plymouth Teachers College was elected to teach Grades 5 and 6, to replace Mrs. Mavis W. Rutledge who transferred to the southern part of the state.

Miss Ruth A. Millar of Plymouth, N. H., a graduate of Plymouth Teachers College, was elected to teach Grade 2, to replace Mrs. Dina D. Williams who moved to Manchester.

Mrs. Ruth C. MacKenzie of Littleton, a graduate of Keene Teachers College, with previous experience in Candia and Littleton, was elected to teach Grade 3, to replace Miss Lyle E. Hood who returned to Vermont.

Miss R. Evangeline Bill of St. Johnsbury, a graduate of Lyndon Teachers College, with six years' experience in Danville, Vermont, was elected to teach Grade 4, to replace Mrs. J. Kenneth MacPherson who resigned at the close of the year.

Repairs in the various buildings since my last report include:

Painting the outside of the Kilburn School building  
Redecorating the high school gymnasium

The laying of slip-proof mats in the aisles in the high school auditorium

Mastic coating the entire flashing around the roof of the high school building

Installation of shelves in the stock room of the elementary school

The report of the school nurse shows that all children in Grades one, four, eight and eleven receive complete physical examinations each year by the school doctors. Miss Bryant examines all pupils in the system for weight, vision, hearing and condition of teeth. Miss Bryant also supervises and carries out

laboratory work on pupils in grades one, four, eight and eleven.

The report of the school doctors shows that 242 children were examined, 43 were given toxoid immunization, 164 were given tuberculosis tests and four received chest x-ray. The following defects were found: Tonsils and adenoids 14, Heart 3, Nervous defect 1, Orthopedic 4.

The report of the nurse shows that 600 pupils were examined and the following defects found and reported: Vision 15, Skin 2, Posture 4, Speech 2, Teeth 151, and Tonsils 14. Of the 600 pupils examined, 595 were found to be successfully vaccinated, 4 were unsuccessfully vaccinated 3 times, and one was excused from vaccination. The number of children treated for defects are: Tonsils and Adenoids 3, Heart 3, Nervous defect 1, Orthopedic 4, Vision 8, Skin 2, Posture 4, Speech 2, Teeth 85. Seventy-four children were treated in dental clinics, 10 in vision clinics, 7 in tuberculosis clinic and 43 in toxoid clinic.

The above report should be a good indication that the health of your children is a major concern of the school.

The elementary school lunch program is one that is contributing to the health of our children. Over two hundred children participate in this program each day. A balanced meal is provided and is served and consumed under pleasant, wholesome conditions. Children are encouraged to eat all foods and many parents report that their children are gaining steadily under the program. This year a very generous amount of surplus foods have been received that have contributed greatly to the success of the program.

The first school safety program to be held in New Hampshire was held in Littleton this past winter un-

der the sponsorship of the New Hampshire Motor Vehicle Department. Approximately 700 elementary pupils from Littleton and neighboring towns attended the afternoon session and about 300 high school pupils attended the evening session. All phases of youth highway safety were touched on at the meetings. Commissioner Frederick Clarke of the Motor Vehicle Department was present and spoke at both sessions.

A two day music workshop was held in the elementary school during the fall term under the leadership of Dr. Alice Baumgarner, director of Art Education. Elementary teachers from the area were invited to participate in the program of instruction. The results of this program have already been reflected in the classrooms of your school.

The high school, under the able direction of Principal Arthur J. Kenney, continues to carry on a good program. His report will be found on other pages of the school report.

We were unfortunate to lose the services of Mr. Anthony G. Katsiaficas, principal of the elementary school, who resigned to accept a supervising principalship in Southwick, Massachusetts.

The teaching situation becomes more acute each year as more teachers seem to leave the profession than enter it. Higher salaries for teachers in the states to the south of us cause many graduates from our teachers colleges to go to those areas every year. Every effort is being made to attract and to hold good teachers in our schools. This can only be done by keeping our salaries in line with those of other communities of our size. We cannot get away from the fact that teachers will migrate to those areas where the salaries are highest and working conditions are good.

The Littleton schools do not intend to be content with the increased services of the past few years. With a forward looking school board, we shall continually strive to improve our offerings.

In closing, I wish to express my appreciation to the entire teaching staff and to non-teaching personnel for their cooperation this past year. I also wish to thank the school board and citizens for their cooperation and support.

School attendance has continued to improve this year. Our average for the first half year is 96.60 per cent which is very high. We are pleased with the cooperation we have received from interested parents which made this excellent record possible.

### CURRICULUM

In order to insure a maximum efficiency we have tried to place people of similar interests, abilities and needs together wherever possible. This has improved our instruction considerably. We have a class in Consumer Mathematics required of seniors who have not taken mathematics previously.

### RECREATION

The recreation program, under the direction of Mr. Arthur Chartier, a graduate of Boston University, has continued to make progress. This program reaches a very large percentage of our pupils and its effects are far reaching. Mr. Chartier has given a tremendous amount of time both in the community as well as in the schools.

### GUIDANCE

Our guidance program includes the Science Re-

search Associates Primary Mental Ability Tests administered by the University of New Hampshire Testing Service for the senior high school, Grades IX and XI, and the California test of Mental Maturity for Grade VII. These tests provide a basis for further counseling and help to make our program effective. A follow-up and placement service is also part of the program.

### MUSIC

The music program under the able direction of Mrs. Cushing for vocal music, and Mr. McLure for instrumental music and band has made excellent progress this year. Numerous public appearances, plus attractive uniforms, have received very favorable comment.

### THE TEACHING STAFF

We are pleased to report that the teaching staff here at Littleton compares very favorably with any of its size in the state and has cooperated with the administration very well.

### EXTRA CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

Our school offers a full program of extra curricular activities which include music, vocal and instrumental, dramatics, athletics, socials, parties, dances, and the school publication, "The Record" which is representative of our school and which we are making every effort to improve each year. An active sports program is conducted by Mr. Chartier every Saturday and after school whenever possible for sports in season.

### SERVICES TO THE COMMUNITY

We are pleased to report that the tradition of cooperating with our community established in the school is reflected in many worthwhile activities and services.

## CONCLUSION

It has been a pleasure for me to work with you, Mrs. Howland, the teaching staff, the school board and the people of Littleton. Your cooperation with our efforts and your interest in and support of our school is sincerely appreciated.
