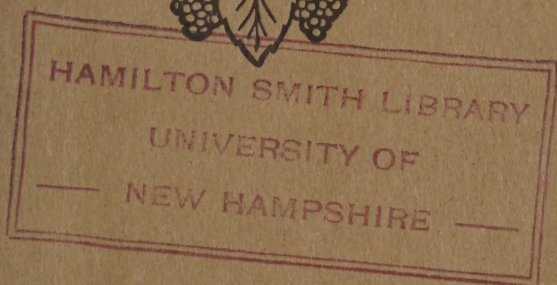

NEW DURHAM TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the town of New Durham, in the County of Strafford, in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said New Durham on Tuesday, the 14th day of March, next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to hire money on the credit of the town to pay its just debts.

Article 2. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the town through tax collector's deed.

Article 3. To see what per cent discount the town will vote to allow on property taxes and on what dates such discount shall be allowed.

Article 4. To see if the town will vote to accept the budget estimates as recommended by the budget committee.

Article 5. To see if the town will vote to accept state aid for construction of Class II roads and raise and appropriate for said purpose the sum of \$591.00, the state to give \$1,182.00, or will accept state aid for construction of Class V roads and raise and appropriate for said purpose the sum of \$571.04, the state to give \$2,284.16.

Article 6. To see if the town will vote to elect a road agent.

Article 7. To see if the town will vote to adopt a schedule of prices for the rental of the town hall and to provide for the free use of the same in certain cases.

Article 8. To see what regulations the town will vote to adopt for the care of the town hall buildings and adjacent grounds.

Article 9. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation of the same.

Article 10. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing, and 1 selectman for 3 years, 1 trustee of the trust funds for 3 years and 1 library trustee for 3 years.

GRAVE FOREST SITUATION FOLLOWS SEPTEMBER HURRICANE

Woodland problems of timber salvage and fire control created in many towns by the September hurricane are of the greatest importance. Good citizenship calls for personal and widespread action!

The salvage of every thousand feet of logs which can be sold means money for landowners, wages for workers, employment for trucks, teams and machinery, as well as reduced forest fire hazard for all. If owners of windthrown timber have not yet acted, they should communicate with those who can help. Town chairmen are fully informed; State Advisory Agents can help to start logging by suggesting names of operators and giving other useful advice; Federal Agencies are increasing the number of log storage places as rapidly as possible. Individuals must now cooperate!

Forest fire danger for several years will be greater than usual. So much work must be done by public agencies to reduce hazard along roadsides, near improved and other exposed areas that many places will remain hazardous for some time to come. Individual landowners must take a personal interest! Aid in clean-up work through the Agricultural Conservation Program is available to any woodland owner at \$4.00 per acre on areas up to 15 acres. The County Agent should be consulted.

Support your local Forest Fire Wardens and Deputies. They are planning, with State and Federal agencies, an intensive campaign to control fires. Help them by strict observance of the fire laws. Kindle no open fires without a permit from the Warden, except when the ground is covered with snow. Cooperate by reporting fires you may see and in other ways. Fire fighting tool supplies are inadequate and should be reasonably increased by many towns. You can help, and it will pay, to prevent forest fires!

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Part I. Educational Policy

Much is being heard these days about the prospects of the democratic form of government in the world continuing to exist. Probably we have become more conscious in the past few years than ever before of the tremendous significance of the term "democratic." The more we study it the more we realize that a democratic country is far more than just a country with a democratic form of government. A full appreciation of the liberties and of freedom of action, of speech and of thought come only with meditation upon the facts gained from the study of the life of peoples in every country of the world. Through the study of psychology we have come to realize that education comes only through experience so, if we are going to perpetuate the democratic form of life that we have in the United States of America, we must not only learn the facts of the true conditions of peoples all over the world and teach them to our children but we must also train our boys and girls in the democratic way of life by giving them a chance to practice throughout their childhood the democratic way of living. Students of political science are agreed that the greatest factor in the cause of the fall of the recent attempt at democratic rule in the countries of Europe was the lack on the part of the people of experience in governing themselves. Although they had studied the governmental machinery of other democracies, they had had no practice in handling or operating it and it soon got out of control. If our boys and girls are to make as few mistakes as possible in running our governmental machine when they become adults and take over the steering wheel, our schools must be so organized as to give them such practice with democratic methods as will enable them to make successfully the transition from their participation in their adolescent social and political life to their participation in their adult social and political life. We must keep in mind not only our obligations to train our young people in citizenship but also our obligations to train them in democratic citizenship, in the democratic way of living. This then, is the educational policy of the local schools.

Part II. Administration and Organization

There have been no changes in the general organization or administration of the schools during the past year. The plan initiated last year of having a special supervisor of music visit each class room once each week has been continued and the children are much interested.

The pupil record system set up four years ago is proving to be a great help in intelligently guiding the boys and girls through their school career. It is a tremendous task to report to the superintendent's office every mark received by every one of the thirteen hundred and fifty pupils each marking period and to record those marks onto the pupil's permanent record card but the power this information gives to teachers and superintendent to advise pupils into channels which make possible their fullest development well pays for the effort it takes.

(b) Textbooks

The basic textbooks have, in general, all been brought up to a reasonable minimum standard with a few exceptions. There is still a great unmet need for suitable books to supplement the fundamental texts. With the recent careful organization of a State Program of Studies in Safety, there should be made available a set of books for this subject and it is expected that it will be possible to meet this need before the end of the year.

(c) *Eighth Grade Tests*

Standardized Achievement tests were given in May and June, 1938, to all eighth grade pupils in the supervisory union. The table below shows some of the most interesting facts regarding the results of the tests.

Part VII. Auxiliary Activities

(a) Report of School Health Work

An epidemic of chicken-pox, although not serious, has been quite widespread this year in New Durham and has interrupted the attendance at school more than usual. There have also been a number of skin diseases prevalent, but these have cleared up promptly with proper treatment. Otherwise the children have been in good health.

Several clinics have eliminated many of the physical defects among New Durham pupils. The most important and successful clinic was the eye examination and the fitting of glasses to all those who needed them. This was financed by the New Durham Parent Teachers association, which is raising the money by putting on whist parties every Friday evening. Eighteen pairs of glasses were fitted and any parent who wished to do it reimbursed the organization for the glasses at clinic rates. Several parents preferred to do this.

A combined preschool and toxoid clinic was held in cooperation with Miss Dorothy Morse and the State Board of Health. Thirty-two children were examined and 33 received the toxoid treatment which protects these children from diphtheria for life. Two children had tonsil and adenoid operation in clinics last summer.

A deaf and dumb child was gotten into the New England Home for Little Wanderers in June for special study to determine just what educational capacities were present in the child and where it was best to continue education for his special needs. It was finally decided that the Portland School for the Deaf was the best available school for his special needs and he was enrolled as a pupil there in January, 1939.

Hot lunches were available for all the New Durham pupils needing them through the special fund appropriated for this purpose.

Close cooperation with the work of Miss Morse, the preschool nurse, has made it possible to supervise many problems in the homes where both school and pre-

school children were involved with the minimum of effort.
