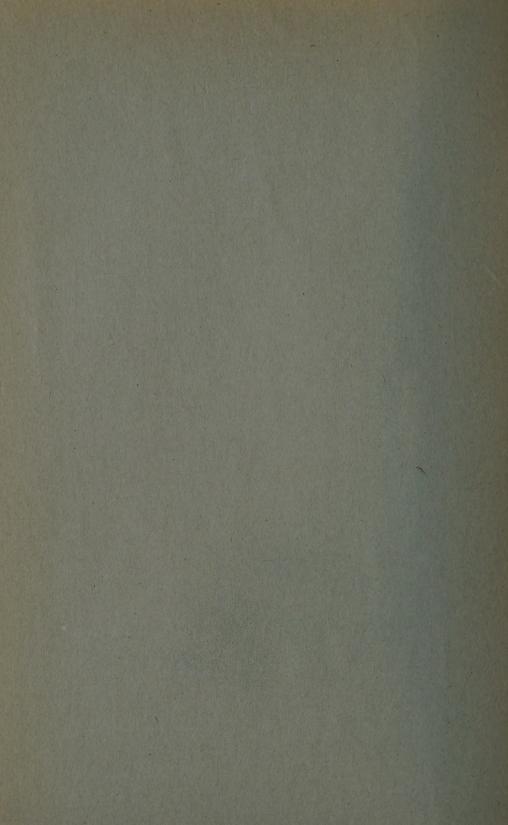

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of New Ipswich in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said New Ipswich on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To see if the town will vote to accept the budget to raise as estimated therein the necessary funds to transact the town's business for the ensuing year.
- 3. To raise such sums as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriations for the same.
- 4. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1200.00 for a resident physician.
- 5. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 6. To choose one member of the Electric Light Commission for three years.
- 7. To choose one member of the Trust Funds Committee for three years who will also serve as Trustees Spaulding School Fund.
- 8. To see if the town will vote to have the American Legion Post have charge of Memorial Day program.
- 9. To choose a committee of five for the New Ipswich Recreation Committee.

- 10. To choose a committee of three for the Baseball Field Committee.
- 11. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the town through tax collector's deeds.
- 12. To see if the town will vote to petition the State tax commission to have an Audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such Audit.
- 13. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$682.11 for T.R.A., by so doing the State will contribute \$2728.45.
- 14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of eighteen hundred dollars (\$1800.00) for the expenses of observing the Bicentenary of the town in August, 1950.
- 15. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1000.00 to be used in the development, maintenance and supervision of the recreation field or take any action therein.
- 16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$152.00 (1/100th of 1% of the valuation of the town) to the Monadnock Region Association of Southern New Hampshire for issuance and distribution of printed matter, newspaper and magazine advertising, and by other means calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the town, in cooperation with the other thirty-seven towns of the Monadnock Region.
- 17. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1500.00 to gravel and tar the road leading past the residence of Frank Raitanen, beginning at the Mason Town line. This road has been excavated several years ago.

- 18. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2000.00 to finish putting gravel and tar the road from the State Road to residence of Waino Maki or take any action thereon. This amount of money if raised and appropriated will complete this road.
- 19. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2500.00 to widen, gravel, and oil the road on Page Hill, continuing from where left off last year towards the Ashby line as far as said money will allow work to be done before November 1, 1950, or take any action thereon.
- 20. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2000.00 to gravel and oil the road where left off on Binney Hill road or take any action thereon.
- 21. To see if the town will vote to raise the pay of town laborers to \$1.00 an hour or take any action thereon.
- 22. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1500.00 to repair, gravel, and tar a portion of the road leading from the top of Town Hill to the Old Ashley Mill Pond Bridge (so called) or take any action thereon.
- 23. To see if the town will vote to pay the members of the Fire Department at the rate of \$1.00 per hour per man from the time the man reports at a fire until the man is dismissed from duty after the fire.
- 24. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to complete the repairs on the fire house and to build a hose dryer.
- 25. To discontinue as a Town Way that part of the Town Road running from a point on Academy Street,

so-called, near the residence of Alonzo Corthell, to the Union Hall Property.

- 26. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 (three hundred dollars) to gravel the road toward William Somero's, beginning at Nicholas Somero's, as far as the money will permit.
- 27. Will the town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) for filling and grading a part of the swampy portion of the Center Cemetery thereby making available more suitable burial lots, or take any action relating thereto.
- 28. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$300.00 to remove the high bank and straighten the curve opposite the site of the old Methodist Church on road from Bank Village to High Bridge or take any action thereon.
- 29. To see if the town will vote that beginning with the annual town meeting of 1951 and thereafter the transaction of all town business except the election of officers shall be adjourned to 7.30 P. M., or to take any action thereon.
- 30. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5000.00 to rebuild, cap, and oil a section or sections of highway within the town, selection of location or locations to be made by a Committee of five persons, consisting of the Selectmen, the Road Agent, and some impartial citizen chosen by the other four, this sum to be the only appropriation for such work this year.
- 31. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to commence the preparation of a Tax Map of the town for the use of the Assessors in determining the fair value of properties within the town.

32. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2000.00 to gravel and tar the back road to Greenville, beginning where the tar ends and gravel and tar it as far as the Stone Bridge; if any money is left to excavate it from there on. The graveling and tarring to be done this year and none of this money to be spent on any other road.

Given under our hands and seal, this eighteenth day of February, in the year of our Lord nineteen hundred and fifty.

During the greater part of 1949, the Recreation Committee focused most of its attention and a greater part of its energy on the Swimming Pool, which had been constructed in the fall of 1948 and which the committee insisted must be ready for use in the early summer of 1949.

There were many things to be done to prepare it for use. It was necessary to grade the bottom of the pool, install a valve at the discharge end, make and install ladders for entrance to and exit from the pool and divide the shallow and deep ends so that small children would not face the danger of getting into deep water.

However, these tasks were insignificant in labor and cost, since a good part of the work was contributed, as

compared with the other necessary details.

According to State law, and a State engineer, who came down to inspect the pool and its layout, it was imperative that we have at least two lavatories and two toilets near the pool. The type of each of these being left to the discretion of the committee, who felt that it

was in keeping with a modern pool to have modern rather than out-moded toilets, and, therefore, decided on modern flush toilets and modern lavatories with run-

ning water.

To save as much building cost as possible, the cabin given the Recreation Field by Mrs. Lena Taylor in 1947 and located at about the middle of the field since that time, was moved over to the northwest end of the pool, where it might serve as the entrance and exit from the pool, and an addition was made to it on its east end. This provided the toilet and lavatory space and water was piped into it from the nearby pool. Walfrid Maki contributed a pump to perform this service and the discharge was drained off into a sandy area which was fortunately located somewhat beyond the northeast end of the pool.

Then the ground around the pool was graded and a six-foot wire fence was put up around the pool with the two ends of the house serving as anchors for the wire. The iron pipes necessary to support the wire were given by Charles Firman and the task of erecting the fence was done by several men, who contributed their

services.

When at last all was in readiness, the pool was opened in the latter part of June, 1949, and John Anttila, a student at Springfield Y.M.C.A. College, was installed as Supervisor for the summer as a result of a contribution by two local men, which paid his salary for the season.

The pool was a success from the start and well over 2,000 people availed themselves of its opportunities.

During the summer, Mrs. Lena Taylor gave \$50.00 to be used in the purchase of a new diving board, which was installed as soon as possible.

After approval of our plant had been given by the State through its engineer, who inspected it and praised the complete lay-out highly, a second sample of water showed a slight contamination and it was necessary to chlorinate the pool. This was done by a very ingenious but primitive method and it may be necessary in the future, if the contamination permits, to install a small

chlorinating device.

Soon after the pool was completed, James Albree gave two regulation life-saving rings to be used at the pool in case of an emergency, and later in the year, we were given four heavy duty spotlights by Mrs. Beatrice Thayer and Mr. Philip Thayer. We are deeply grateful for all of these items.

Early last spring an area for small children was constructed with swings and teeter boards and these were used almost steadily throughout the summer and should

be used even more so this coming summer.

The committee purchased a power mower to be used on the field and it practically paid for itself in one summer since it was used by selected persons, who gave their services. If all the mowing had been hired, it would have cost within a few dollars of the amount paid for the mower.

Again this year, the committee is cognizant of the part played by the 1949 Street Fair in the development of the field. We are deeply grateful to the co-chairmen and to each member of the many committees for their splendid cooperation. We also wish to extend our deepest appreciation to any person who gave time, material or money to the field during the past year. We also want to commend the local organizations for their civicmindedness in contributing toward the permanent development of the Recreation Field.

This summer, the committee hopes to construct some tennis courts, a softball diamond, and with these, a greater part of the over-all project will have been

completed.

Your committee sincerely hopes that with the coming of the Bi-Centennial celebration to be held in August, 1950, your Recreation Field assumes its proper stature and that you, as citizens, can take pride in the fact that your field is one of the first and one of the best small town projects in the state.

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the town of New Ipswich, qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the 13th day of March, 1950, at 8:00 o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
 - 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
- 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 8. To see if the district will vote to authorize the school board to purchase two 54-passenger school buses through the facilities of the State Purchasing Agent for the transportation of pupils, or take any action related thereto.
- 9. If the preceding article is adopted, to see if the district will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1170.00 for the partial payment of said school buses and authorize the school board to issue serial notes for an amount not to exceed \$9000 in the name of and on the credit of the district; said notes to be issued pursuant to Chapter 72 of the Revised Laws; and to authorize the school

board to determine the time and place of payment of the principal and interest, the rate of interest and all other matters in connection with the financing of this project

- 10. To see what action the district wishes to take relative to transporting all children, Academy pupils included, living $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles or more from the schools, and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3000 for the same.
- 11. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2000 for the purpose of installing and equipping a school cafeteria in the basement of the Central School or take any action thereto.
- 12. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town:
- 13. To see if the School District of New Ipswich will vote to elect its officers by an official ballot and to adopt the non-partisan ballot system as provided in sections 112 to 120 of Chapter 34 of the revised laws, for the election of school district officers, and to provide that this system shall be made effective for the election of 1951 and thereafter. The adoption of this article will provide for the school district the same electoral system now used for the election of town officers.

REPORT OF SCHOOL SUPERINTENDENT

To the School Board and Citizens of New Ipswich:

I respectfully submit my third annual report as your Superintendent of Schools.

I am pleased to report that your schools are progressing exceptionally well under the very capable leadership of Mrs. Pearl Thompson and her staff.

This year we have the pleasure of working in a school that through the interest and cooperation of the citizens of the town, has been enlarged to fit our needs. Two very modern and attractive rooms have been added, with auxiliary services, to relieve the crowded conditions we experienced last year. It became necessary to employ two full-time teachers to take care of our expanded plant. We were very fortunate in obtaining the services of Mrs. Dorothea Somero and Miss Nora Hurley. Both are experienced teachers and doing a very fine job.

Mrs. Corthell is teaching Grade 1; Miss Hurley, part of Grade 2; Mrs. Somero, part of Grades 2 and 3; Mrs. Eaton, Grade 4, and Mrs. Thompson, Grades 5 and 6.

Two years ago a new spelling series was put into the school, taking the place of a series that had been in the school for many years. This new series places emphasis upon word analysis and paragraph study rather than lists of words. The results of standardized tests in this area indicate that much progress has been made.

A new English and Language series has been placed in Grades 3 and 4, replacing an older workbook instruction system. Our experience with the new series indicates that the children are much more interested in using the material; the pages are attractive and stimulating, and the content is challenging but not so difficult that the child feels frustrated.

Our correlated art work has done much to stimulate interest in the areas of social studies and literature. This

is an activity that affords much enjoyment to the pupils and at the same time develops certain skills and attitudes of orderliness and creativeness.

The smaller groups in grades 1 through 4 have given our teachers an opportunity to develop their work around the abilities of the individual rather than the class as a whole. This is more difficult to do when the group is as large as the present 5th and 6th grades. However, every effort is being made to apply the same

technique to this group as the others.

Our testing program is prepared to assist the teachers in determining the individual abilities of the children and to determine their strengths and weaknesses. Intelligence tests are given each year to grades 3, 6 and 8. Achievement tests are given each year in May, to all grades. Thus, we are able to keep a constant check on the progress each child is making from year to year. Also we are able to re-check our methods of presentation and the success with which we are meeting the needs of the children in the various subject areas.

The instruction in grades 7 and 8 is being carried on, on a departmentalized basis, wherein, Mr. Meleones handles the greater part of the subject material, assisted by other members of the Academy faculty. This has worked out very well. The pupils and teachers become better acquainted and the adjustment becomes neg-

ligible when the pupil moves on to grade 9.

Mr. Meleones has given freely of his time in organizing an activity program for the pupils in the Central School. Last spring the work was carried on at the Athletic Field. During the winter months both boys and girls have access to the gym facilities at the Academy. Interscholastic contests have been arranged between schools in adjoining towns and much good spirit and morale has been the outcome.

Miss Wheeler is to be commended for the excellent work she has been doing in music. Her performances have shown the effects of much thought and planning and her class work has been enjoyable and stimulating

to the young people.

Very fine health supervision has been carried on by Miss Sybil Beatham, school nurse. Teachers and parents are kept constantly informed of the health status of their children.

We have enjoyed excellent working relationships with Appleton Academy. The boys in the Trades and Industries Course have done many pieces of work for us and are always willing to oblige.

Budget

The budget presented for 1950-51 calls for an appropriation of \$42,598.54, a net increase of \$4,758.40 over that of last year. The increases are reflected in the following items: payments on principal of debt \$2000.00; interest on debt \$600.00; teachers' salaries \$850.00; transportation \$415.00; fuel \$300.00; teachers' retirement, \$349.50; insurance, \$280.00; repairs to old building \$300.00; janitorial services \$100.00; light and other expenses connected with the operation of school plant \$230.00; and miscellaneous items as increased administrative services, school lunch fund, etc., \$628.90. Certain reductions in anticipated expenditures were effected to the extent of \$1295.00, namely in the areas of improvements to buildings and equipment.

It will be noted that the greater portion of the increase is reflected in the fact that we are operating a larger school plant requiring more services. The increase in transportation is due to increased costs of operating feeder routes and transportation services in addition to the main bus route. The increase in teachers' retirement, and salaries is attributed to an increased staff and recognition of the excellent services rendered

by the teaching staff.

Your attention is also called to the fact that the estimated income has been decidedly reduced as the

result of a loss in state aid and retention of the dog tax in the Town Treasury rather than turning it over to the school district as has been the custom in the past. Both are the result of Legislative action. Consequently, the income has been reduced by an approximate amount of \$1824.07.

Therefore, the estimated assessment required to cover the school board's budget for 1950-51 will be \$40,355.98, plus any special articles the district wishes to consider.

Special Articles

The special article relating to the installation of a cafeteria in the basement of the Central School is incorporated into the Warrant as the result of the desires of many parents and interested persons. The advantages of such action are quite obvious. It is estimated that the cost will be approximately \$2000. This amount of money will cover such expenses as the following: adequate dish washing facilities, stove, refrigerator, furniture, cabinets and serving tables, plumbing, dry well and cooking and eating utensils.

The special article relating to the transportation problem is the result of a desire of the school district to have a report on same, and the result of many parents who feel that their children's school day is too long and that many have to walk too far to the school. The details are contained in a report submitted by the commit-

tee that was delegated to make this study.

I wish to extend my appreciation to the townspeople and School Board for the excellent and sincere cooperation that they have given me the past year.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SCHOOL TRANSPORTATION

It was recommended at the last annual School District meeting held in March 1949, that a committee be appointed to investigate the feasibility of a district owned bus to provide transportation for all of those children living $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles or more from the school center, including those pupils attending Appleton Academy.

A study has been made and the following is a report of the findings of this committee.

The policy of the school district has been to transport only those children who live two miles or more from the Central School in compliance with the state requirements, with the exception of first graders who are carried regardless of the distance, providing they live on one of the bus routes.

The present transportation is handled by the following contractors, with details of their routes. Time will vary according to weather and other variable conditions.

Nicholas Somero makes two trips in the morning and two in the afternoon, transporting approximately 35 pupils on one trip and 31 pupils on the other.

Toivo Heiskanen operates a feeder route to the

main bus route, where the children pick up the Somero bus and continue to the school.

Toivo Kolapakka transports his passengers from

Wilder Village directly to the public school.

Leon Russell picks up the New Ipswich pupils on his way to and from Greenville since they are right on his route to Appleton Academy.

The total approximate mileages covered per year

by each bus operator are as follows:

a. Nicholas Somero
b. Toivo Heiskanen
c. Toivo Kolapakka
d. Leon Russell
7200 mi. per year
576 mi. per year
3672 mi. per year

Perhaps the greatest disadvantage to the present transportation policy, and the one that has elicited the most criticism, is the length of the school day for many of the younger children. As will be noted from the information given in the preceding paragraphs, many children start their day $1\frac{1}{2}$ hours before school begins and do not return to their homes until $1\frac{1}{2}$ hours after the close of school. The second criticism, and one which is almost of equal importance to the first, is the matter of requiring children who live two miles or less from the school center to walk to school.

Both problems can be solved in one of two ways:

a. A private operator purchasing and operating two buses under contract to the district.

b. The district purchasing, maintaining and oper-

ating two buses.

A careful study of the probable number of pupils who would be transported during the year 1950-51, if the 1½ mile limit is voted, reveals that we will have approximately 109 pupils eligible for school transportation, 18 of whom will be attending Appleton Academy, grades 9-12. There will be approximately 35 pupils on the Gibson Four Corners Route; 35 on the Finnish and

Smithville Route; 21 on the Wilder, Davis Village and Greenville Road Route; and 18 from the Highbridge area.

Thus, it would seem inadvisable to consider buses either privately or district owned that would have a capacity of less than 54 passengers. There are certain routes that probably should still be operated by present carriers, namely the Highbridge Route and the feeder route operated by Mr. Heiskanen. With an arrangement of this nature buses with a capacity for 108 pupils would be carrying 91, thereby allowing for an expansion of 17 pupils, which undoubtedly will eventually develop, if one considers carefully the enrollment picture of New Ipswich schools as revealed in the 1948-49 School District Report.

Some time ago the matter of operating two buses was taken up with a private contractor and his estimate for the two routes, namely the Gibson Four Corners, Finnish and Smithville combined with Davis Village Routes would be \$5000. In addition to this we would be operating the feeder route (Heiskanen) for \$315.00, the Highbridge Route for \$648, and Wilder Village

Route for \$360, making a total of \$6323.00.

The question arises — How much would it cost if the school district purchased, maintained and operated two 54 passenger buses? Following is an analysis of probable costs if the above should come to pass. All figures are based upon the costs for a Standard Ameri-Coach 54-passenger bus, purchased through the State Purchasing Agent and from data compiled in July 1949. The cost of such bus, body and chassis, was then \$4497.80. It is assumed that the cost of the bus will be amortized over a period of ten years, the value of the notes to be \$9000.00 and paid off at the rate of \$900 per year.

It is assumed that the feeder routes and Highbridge Route as previously mentioned would be operated on the same basis as under a private contractor. Thus, the total cost would approximate \$4959.85 as compared with \$6323.00 if privately operated. Consequently, the district would realize a saving of approximately \$1363.15 per year. If the Highbridge Route could be absorbed by the district owned bus as in all probability it could, \$442.80 could be added to the \$1363.15, making a total saving of \$1805.95 per year.

A program such as has been described above would shorten the school day for many children by as much as one hour; provide more services to more children including pupils attending Appleton Academy, and would make available buses for field trips and school functions at little additional cost.

However, there are certain problems that have not as yet been settled but have been considered. These are (a) the matter of storing the buses, (b) employing proficient bus operators, (c) supervision of maintenance,

(d) the possibility of combining the janitor work for the Central School building and Appleton with a bus operator's job. This man to be responsible for the two

buildings and maintenance of school buses.

It is hoped that all concerned will read the foregoing report carefully and come forth with suggestions that will be helpful in establishing a bus transportation policy, with the idea in mind of getting the best possible service at the most reasonable cost to the district.

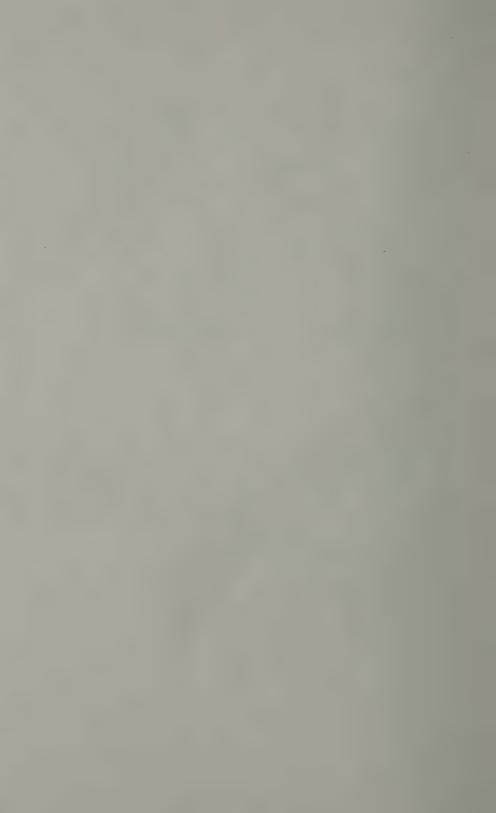
