To the inhabitants of the Town of Piermont, in the County of Grafton, in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Piermont on Tuesday, the 9th day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To raise and appropriate money to maintain Highways and Bridges.

4. To raise and appropriate money to maintain street lights.

5. To raise and appropriate money for snow removal.

6. To raise and appropriate money for poor relief.

7. To raise and appropriate money for support of Library.

8. To raise and appropriate money for Memorial Day.

9. To raise and appropriate money for ~~town~~ ^{at Aid} maintenance on Lake Tarleton Road.

10. To raise and appropriate money for Pine Blister Rust Control with State Aid.

11. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to distribute the inventory blanks at the time they examine the taxable property.

12. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's deeds.

13. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of the Municipal Budget Act.

14. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

15. Is it expedient to revise the Constitution?


16. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

We wish at this time to express our appreciation to our many friends and patrons for their continued interest and support of the library.

The circulation of books has increased both in adult and juvenile departments.

We have added 166 books to our collection during the past year; 87 of these were gifts, and we have purchased 79.

We also have 14 magazines; 7 of these are gifts, and 7 are subscribed for by the library.

There has been 3,928 books and magazines in circulation during the past year. Of this number 1,884 were adult fiction, 171 adult non-fiction, 1,144 juvenile fiction, 11 juvenile non-fiction, 559 adult magazines, and 159 juvenile magazines.

The per cent. of attendance for last year, 90.37, was quite a little below the State average of 94.75. In view of the way epidemics sometimes strike the schools, I would like to call the attention of all those having children in school to the following extract from the Public Law:

“The parent, guardian, or other person having the custody of a child who is infested with or who has been exposed to a communicable disease shall not permit him to attend either a public or a private school. Any person who violates any provision of the two preceding sections shall be fined ten dollars.” Careful observance of this regulation should help check the spread of sickness.

In addition to the regular school work, which is progressing well, the pupils engage in a number of worthwhile extra curricular activities.

Last spring the boys had a baseball team which played games with other grammar schools. This winter both boys and girls have basketball teams. Aside from the benefit of vigorous physical exercise, these sports have an educational value in bringing together young people from different communities, and in teaching them to play games under strict rules. Good sportsmanship and fair play make strong foundations for the wide calls of citizenship in later life.

Throughout the school year the children take part in exercises for special occasions. The outdoor entertainment last June was quite out of the ordinary and was an interesting exhibition. The work in music has been continued as formerly. We greatly appreciate Mrs. Goodwin's interest and help from time to time in the school music.
