THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Salisbury in the county of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

(L. S.)

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Salisbury on Tuesday, the 13th day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.

3. To elect one Selectman for three years.

4. To see if the Town will vote to accept the budget as submitted by the Budget Committee.

5. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the Town Budget.

6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow money on notes of the Town in anticipation of taxes.

7. To hear reports of agents, auditors and officers heretofore chosen.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the control of White Pine Blister Rust (Estimate \$400.00).

9. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit (Estimate \$200.00).

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of \$150.00 for the Franklin Hospital.

11. To see if the Town will vote to use \$1500.00 of the Capital Reserve Fund interest for road maintenance in the flood control basin.

12. To see if the Town will vote to accept and maintain the Oak Hill Cemetery as a Town Cemetery.

13. To authorize the Selectmen to accept a quit claim

deed to the Town of the Oak Hill Cemetery tract, subject to the rights of existing lot owners.

14. To authorize the Trustees of Trust Funds to accept the Trust Fund of the Oak Hill Cemetery Association upon acceptance of this article.

15. To see if the Town will vote to re-open the East end of the Oak Hill Cemetery Road, for summer use only.

16. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the annual election of Fire Commissioners, said offices to be abolished.

17. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to appoint a Fire Chief and any other officers for the Fire Department.

18. To see if the Town will vote to take over the Baptist Church on the Common in the Salisbury Heights village as a Town Building under certain conditions, or do anything in relation thereto.

19. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to investigate and draw up the conditions by which it could be acquired and submit their findings to the next regular Town Meeting, or do anything in relation thereto.

20. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

FIRE PREVENTION REMINDER

Watch for Ways to Stop Fires Before They Start

1. **Matches.** Keep in metal containers. Away from children. Put out and stamp out if dropped. Same for cigarettes, pipes and cigars.
2. **Papers.** Empty waste baskets. Don't leave papers under stairs or in the privy or anywhere. Papers cause many fires.
3. **Oil and Kerosene.** Don't spill and if you do, put sand on floor. Cover oil can. Don't leave near stove. Burn oily rags.
4. **Chimney and Stove Pipe** Keep repaired and cleaned. Insulate from wood. Clean out soot. Replace when rusted.
5. **Fire Extinguishers.** In barn, in attic, in cellar, in house. Be sure they are renewed regularly. Phone Art Schaefer to inspect.
6. **Hay and Straw.** Watch if put in damp. Don't use matches near. Clean up if loose on floor.
7. **Wiring** Watch for loose wires. Have them tested and inspected .
8. **Television.** Keep away from curtains and anything it could set fire to.
9. **Insurance.** The only way to replace your loss. Even a little will bring back something.
10. **Rubbish.** Paper, rags, paint cans, debris. GET RID OF IT.

Be A Good Citizen — Cooperate

Smoking and debris burning caused more than 50 percent of the forest fires occurring in the state of New Hampshire in 1955—235 fires out of a total of 463 originated from these two sources. Lighted smoking material and matches thrown from moving vehicles along the highway or dropped by fishermen, hunters, hikers, berry and flower pickers accounted for 26 percent; debris burning in the wrong place or at the wrong time by those who failed to heed all pleas for safety or refused to recognize the logical, sensible rules and regulations set up under legislative authority governing the use of fire in or near woodlands accounted for more than 24 percent. This is inexcusable.

Everything possible is being done officially to remedy the situation. Since 1909 there has been a statute on our law books which requires everyone to secure written permission from the local forest fire warden before starting a fire in or near woodlands or where fire can be communicated to woodlands, unless the ground is covered with snow. A never ending program of educational work is being carried on by your local warden and state officials to inform the general public both of the value and necessity of securing the required permit for such burning. Much progress has been made, but there are still many who fail or refuse to cooperate. The value of our permit system was definitely proven in this district during the 1955 calendar year. Local wardens issued 3,864 permits for debris burning fires. That's a lot of permits. The records show only 2 permit fires got out of control. This proves several things—while wardens were liberal in the issuance of fire permits, accommodating every applicant so far as possible, they were cautious, following closely directives outlining overall policy governing the issu -

FIRE WARNING (Continued)

ance of burning permits and thoroughly instructing permit users. The latter, too, fully appreciating their responsibility in using their permits, governed themselves accordingly. Result? Much burning done legally and safe.

But what of the smokers? Despite all the efforts of those officially charged with the responsibility of preventing fires, too many were careless or thoughtless in disposing of smoking material and matches. Why? It is difficult to say. Autos are now equipped with ash trays. Why not use them. The crushing out of a cigar, cigarette and the complete extinguishment of matches before being discarded is an easy chore.

If the costly habits of the careless and indifferent smoker and debris burner could be overcome, more than half of our annual forest fires would be eliminated.

Will you do your share to bring this about?

REMEMBER

1. Get a written permit from your local warden before starting your debris burning or camp fire. The law requires it.
2. Make certain they are dead out before leaving them.
3. Become a safe smoker by extinguishing smoking material and matches before discarding them.
