TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L. S.)

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Sandown in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Sandown on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March, next at one of the clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. Shall the provisions of Chapter 287 of the Revised Statutes Annotated relative to playing games of Beano be adopted in this town.

4. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

5. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to administer or dispose of, at public or private sale, property taken through Tax Collectors Deeds.

6. To see if the town will vote to accept Town Road Aid, State to contribute \$2,220.12, Town to raise and appropriate \$333.02.

7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$3,900.00 for Black Topping the Chase and Rowell roads (so called) from Route 121 to the Hampstead Road.

8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the observance of the Town's 200th Anniversary and appoint a committee to carry out said observance.

9. To see what action the town will take as to the adoption of a Zoning, Building and Subdivision ordinance.

10. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Highway Agent to have charge, under the direction of the selectmen, of the care and maintenance of the Parks and Playgrounds.

11. To act on any other town business that may legally come before said meeting.

MUSIC TEACHER'S REPORT

To the Superintendent, School Board and Citizens of Sandown :

Once again, I am pleased to submit this, my second report, of the musical progress and growth in your school in Sandown.

The general objective of music teaching in the grade schools is to cause the original crude, native interest in rhythm and tone, which characterizes practically every child when he begins school life, to develop into a genuine love of good music based on an intelligent appreciation of its moods, its structure and its notation. Such development will take place only if a consistent educational plan is carried out through a series of years and it is with such a plan that I am attempting to deal.

The main avenues of creating a really intelligent love of music are by learning to sing, learning to play an instrument, training oneself in appropriate rhythmic response, learning to read music notation, and creating music.

The net result of this entire program seems to be that if one is to learn to appreciate music one must be a musician. The better a musician one is, the better one can appreciate music; therefore we must try to guide our pupils into a more extensive knowledge of music, at the same time making the whole experience of studying music so fascinating that they will love the art better and better as they master it more completely.

I am most pleased with the progress being made at the Sandown School, and wish to thank all of the students, teachers, parents and others who make my work so enjoyable.

GUIDANCE DIRECTOR'S REPORT

To the Superintendent of Schools, Members of the School board, and Citizens of Sandown :

The opportunity to present the guidance program for the year 1955-56 is welcome, as it is only with the understanding support, and help of the administrators and teachers of the school, and the parents and pupils of Sandown that the program can be successful.

The present individual record folders for each pupil will continue to be maintained at the school. A new form of individual pupil cumulative record folder will be considered and decided upon with the aid of the teachers. This record will help meet the felt need for a complete and efficient cumulative record of the pupil's physical, mental, and personal progress. The records are available to the teachers at all times ; they assist them to better understand and guide each pupil. These records follow the pupil throughout his school career.

The counseling and testing of individual pupils is being continued and expanded as much as the scheduled time permits. Counseling and individual testing are essential phases of guidance because they help determine: the pupil's capacity to do school work, the cause for behavior problems, the reasons for lack of interest in school work, and other educational, vocational, and personal matters that prevent a pupil from making a normal progress at school.

Mrs. Ella A. Allen administered the battery of tests to the eighth grade, while the guidance director tested the pupils in grades four and six. The following battery of tests was administered to the fourth and sixth grade pupils: reading, arithmetic, language, and mental maturity. Pupils in the eighth grade were tested in mental maturity, reading, interest, clerical speed and accuracy, and mechanical ability. The results of the batteries of tests administered in the fall will be discussed with the pupils of grade four, six, and eight. Each pupil will have an opportunity to study his own record in order to learn his strengths and weaknesses and where he may advance.

Individual interviews will be scheduled with the pupils of the eighth grade; the parents of each pupil will be welcome at the time of the interview to discuss the test results and their significance, and to assist in planning the courses for high school, which will lead to a happy and successful career.

Vocational talks by specialists in their respective fields were given to the students in the eighth grade to start the pupils thinking about their future life's work. The talks were started in January and continued at the rate of one or more a month. The vocations discussed by the speakers are those in which there is a great shortage of personnel in New Hampshire.

Students of Sanborn Seminary also had the advantage of hearing, and conferring with the speakers representing various occupations.

Sandown students presently enrolled at the Seminary were interviewed, counseled, and tested individually, as the need arose, and the scheduled time permitted.

Early in the New Year, plans were made for teachers' guidance meetings to be held at Sandown School. Questionnaires were provided to all teachers to ascertain their interest in guidance. As a result of the answers to the questionnaires, the content of each meeting was designed to meet the expressed needs and interest of the teachers in the field of guidance. The meetings should help the teachers attain a broader view of guidance, assist them in the daily problems at school, and the teaching of subject matter through a better understanding of the pupils and their capabilities.
