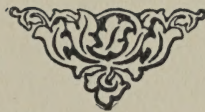

COMMISSIONERS' REPORT

To the Citizens of Sullivan County:

The Commissioners of Sullivan County submit their Annual Report for the year ending December 31, 1925, together with the reports of the Superintendent of the County Farm and House of Correction, Treasurer, Clerk of Superior Court, Sheriff, Solicitor, Chaplain, Physician and Auditors for the fiscal year ending Dec. 31, 1925.

We wish to express our appreciation for the faithful service of Mr. and Mrs. O. A. Putnam as Superintendent and Matron of the County Farm. To the other County Officers and to the Selectmen and Overseers of Poor of the several towns, we wish to thank them for service rendered the Commissioners.

On February 27, 1925, the Commissioners submitted to the County Convention, then in session, plans and specifications made by Hira R. Beckwith, architect for changes considered necessary at the Court House. The changes suggested in the plans provided for a new vault for the Register of Probate, enlarging the vault in the Register of Deeds office, providing a room for the Judge of Superior Court; one for the Judge of Probate and one for the Sheriff.

The Convention after considering the plans and specifications voted to raise and appropriate the sum of seven thousand dollars (\$7,000.00) to make the changes required. Mr. Hira R. Beckwith was employed to take charge of the work and carried it to completion in a very satisfactory manner.

My heartfelt thanks are due, and are hereby extended to Mr. and Mrs. Putnam and their helpers, for a cordial, even friendly reception as a stranger at the beginning, and unfailing good will and courtesy always, and also for their evident desire to make my duties as easy and pleasant as possible.

My desire has been, in this ministry, so to present the claims of the Christian life as to appeal to the highest, noblest aspirations of all who listened, and for the opportunity, thus to serve, I am indebted to you and and thank you.

Upon motion made by Mr. Etsler and seconded the following resolution was unanimously adopted.
