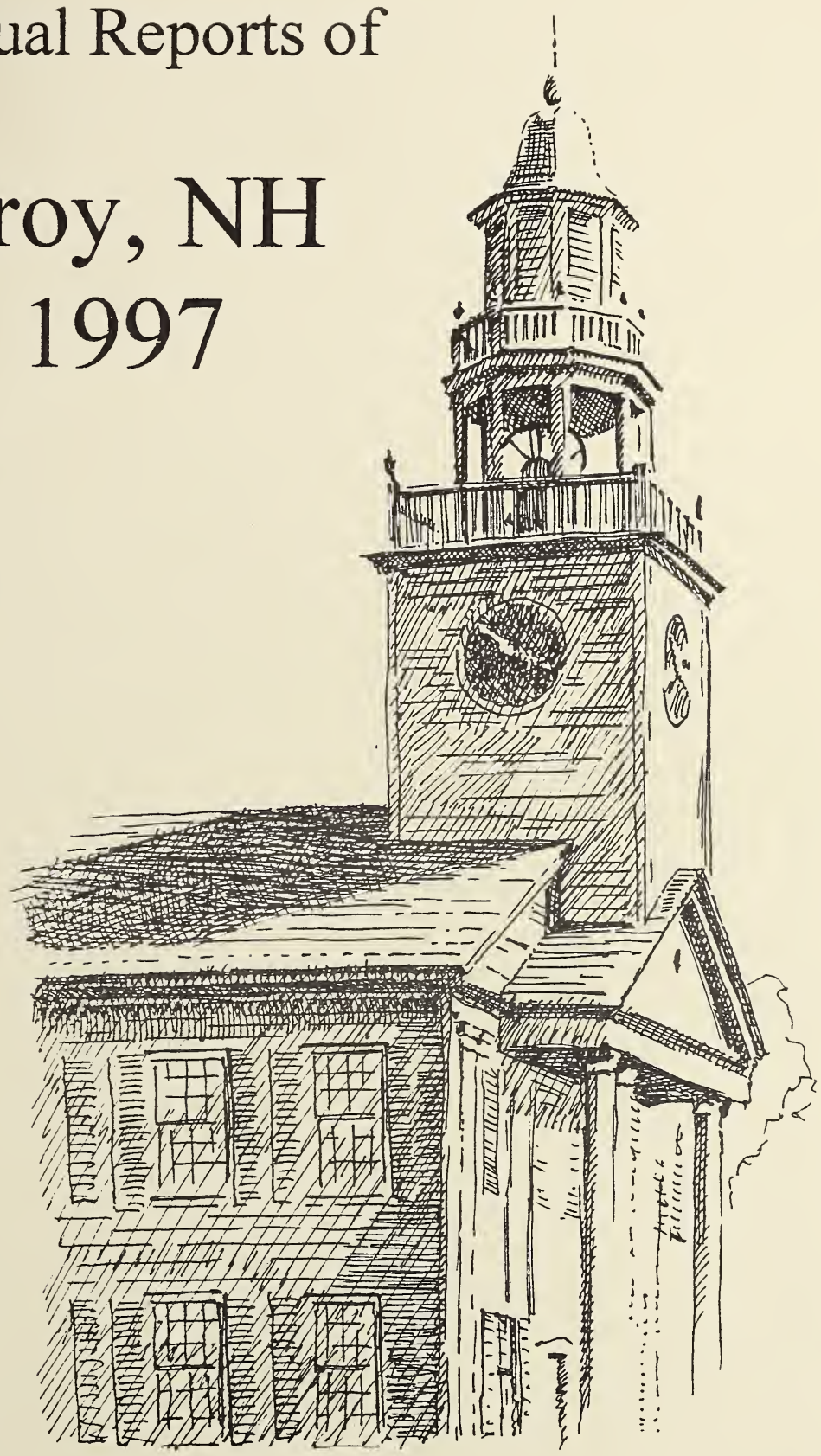

IN MEMORIAM
VICTOR MAGNANI
1910 - 1997

As a tribute to Victor Magnani's lifelong service to the citizens of this community and to the Troy Fire Department, we dedicate the 1997 edition of the Troy Annual Report.

Victor was born in Fitzwilliam on October 14, 1910; grew up in Fitzwilliam and then moved to Troy. He worked at Troy Mills until retirement. He was a firefighter for 70 years, first with the Fitzwilliam Fire Department for 16 years and then 50 years with the Troy Fire Department. He was Deputy Chief in Troy from 1965-1967, and Fire Chief from 1968-1969. He was a Forest Fire Warden for more than 50 years.

Victor never missed a meeting, a fire, or a firemen's breakfast. You would always find him peeling potatoes for the Saturday morning breakfasts and whatever else needed to be done.

He never missed the Firemen's Ball. He always attended with his wife, Norma, and after her passing, his sister, Pia, accompanied him in the Grand March, with his full dress uniform.

When Victor wasn't at the Fire Station, you could find him at home in his greenhouse where he raised tomato and pepper plants and flowers for his gardens and window boxes. It was Victor's pleasure to raise the plants to share with everyone.

Victor loved to go fishing in his spare time and when blueberry season was in, you could see his car at the best spots in town. He was always happy to show you where the best picking was.

New firemen were fortunate to benefit from his efforts in guiding them. Victor's commitment to the betterment of the Troy Fire Department and the Town of Troy and its residents will be difficult to surpass. Victor will be sadly missed as a caring, dedicated, and selfless man.

The Troy Meeting House was built between 1813 and 1815. It was modeled after the Federated Church in Templeton, Massachusetts. The Troy Meeting House was one of six copied from Templeton over a twelve-year period. A Mr. Sullivan did the framing and outside finishing. Samuel Morse of Templeton did the interior work. In 1856 the Meeting House was turned to face the common. The building has a shallow portico with pedimented gable end supported by two pairs of columns. The pedimented gable rests on paired corner pilasters and a frieze. The three front doors have a continuous lintel. A square clock stage with octagonal belfry, bell cast dome and weathervane may be viewed atop the Town Hall. It is thought that Elias Carter, builder of the Templeton church, may have worked closely in the Troy Meeting House.

**THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE
TOWN WARRANT**

To the inhabitants of the Town of Troy, in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs, you are hereby notified to meet at Kimball Hall, the 10th day of March, next at 10:00 AM in the forenoon for balloting upon matters specified in Articles 1 and 2, listed below, and you are hereby further notified to meet at the Troy Elementary School on Wednesday, the 11th of March at 7:30 PM to act upon the remainder of the listed warrant.

ARTICLE 1. To bring in your vote for one Selectman for three years and other Town Officers elected by ballot as passed by Town Meeting or State Statute for the specified number of years.

ARTICLE 2. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment #1 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Troy Zoning Ordinance as follows:

To add as a Special Exception use in the Village District, Housing for the Elderly, subject to the following conditions, as approved by the Board of Adjustment:

- 1) The review of any proposal for elderly housing shall recognize the desirability of locating such developments as close as possible to pertinent support services, including shopping, places of worship, libraries, etc.
- 2) When the development is proposed either within existing buildings or new construction, certain lot, yard and setback requirements may be waived provided there is no resulting threat to public welfare or safety.
- 3) In determining the number of required parking spaces, the ZBA may waive the standard requirements for the district.
- 4) A vehicular drop-off area may be permitted within the required setback or front yard area to facilitate physical needs of the elderly.
- 5) The maximum allowable dwelling units per building will be determined based on septic capability and the impact on existing land uses in the area.

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment #2 as proposed by the

Planning Board for the Troy Zoning Ordinance as follows:

To add the following definition to Article XX: Housing for the Elderly means "A building or group of buildings containing dwellings where the occupancy of the dwellings is restricted to persons 55 years of age or older, or couples where either partner is 55 years of age or older. This housing does not include convalescent or nursing facilities, but may include a congregate meal site and other areas for group resident activities".

ARTICLE 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Hundred Ten Thousand Dollars (\$410,000) for the construction of an addition and renovation of the Gay-Kimball Library in such a manner as to bring it into compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act and to authorize the issuance of not more than Two Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$200,000) of serial bonds or notes under and in compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated, Chapter 33), and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes, to determine the rate(s) of interest thereon and to take such other actions as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such bonds or notes as shall be in the best interest of the Town of Troy, and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to withdraw up to One Hundred Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$120,000) from the Library Building Capital Reserve Fund created for this purpose; to transfer the balance of the Bessie Haskell Library Fund to this purpose; and to apply the Library Building Funds held by the Gay-Kimball Library Trustees to this purpose, with the balance to be raised by donations. Recommended by the Selectmen and Budget Committee. (2/3 ballot vote required)

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ninety-Four Thousand Dollars (\$94,000) for a tanker body and pump needed for the chassis, motor, and transmission purchased in 1997, and to authorize the issuance of not more than Ninety-Four Thousand Dollars (\$94,000) of serial bonds or notes under and in compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated, Chapter 33), and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes, to determine the rate(s) of

interest thereon and to take such other actions as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such bonds or notes as shall be in the best interest of the Town of Troy. Recommended by the Selectmen and Budget Committee. (2/3 ballot vote required)

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray the following expenditures:

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of RSA 162-G, entitled "Acquisition, Development and Disposal of Industrial Land and Facilities", and to establish an Industrial Development Authority under the provisions of RSA 162-G:15-a, with a nine (9) member board appointed by the Board of Selectmen. Recommended by the Selectmen.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to support the Board of Selectmen in seeking grant funds for the potential Elderly Housing Project being considered for the southern portion of Central Square and Water Street. This will be a non-binding resolution. Recommended by the Selectmen.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate up to \$80,000 for purpose of purchasing property in the Town of Troy for the revitalization and to authorize the transfer of the December 31, 1997 fund balance in that amount for this purpose. This is to be done by the Selectmen, with the approval of the Budget Committee, after consultation with the Planning Board. Recommended by the Selectmen and Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of RSA 72:1-c which authorizes any town or city to elect not to assess, levy and collect a resident tax. Not recommended by the Selectmen. (By Petition)

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will vote to have the position of Chief of Police become an elected position for a term of four years. Not recommended by the Selectmen. (By Petition)

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$18,356 for the care of the cemeteries and authorize the withdrawal of \$17,356 from the Cemetery Trust Funds established for this purpose. Recommended by the Selectmen and Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to expend the Highway Block Grant of \$39,032 that the Town will receive from the State of New Hampshire during calendar year 1998 for the

maintenance, construction, and reconstruction of Class IV and V Highways. Recommended by the Selectmen and Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$75,537 for the payment of Sewer Bonds. Income from the State of New Hampshire will be \$22,977. Recommended by the Selectmen and Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$223,889 for the Water/Sewer Department operations. Incomes comes from collections of water and sewer rents. Recommended by the Water/Sewer Commissioners and Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the amount of money listed below to be placed in the Capital Reserve Funds specified for the purpose of purchasing vehicles or equipment when voted by the Town.

ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25,000 to be placed in the Library Capital Reserve Fund. Recommended by the Selectmen and Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$7,500 to be placed in the Reassessment Capital Reserve Fund. Recommended by the Selectmen and Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 20. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to expend \$12,500 from the Reassessment Capital Reserve Fund for the second payment on the revaluation proposal voted March 12, 1997, Article 12. Recommended by the Selectmen.

ARTICLE 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000 to paint one side of the Town Hall and to stain the Emergency Services Building. This will be a non-lapsing account per RSA 32:3, VI and will not lapse until the project is completed or in two years, whichever is less. Recommended by the Selectmen and Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000 for the Historical Society for operational costs. Recommended by the Selectmen and Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,497 for the second year payment on the lease/purchase agreement on the 1997 Ford Crown Victoria police cruiser. Recommended by the Selectmen and Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500 for the Police Department to teach the DARE Program at Troy Elementary School. Recommended by the Selectmen and Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000 to purchase a heart defibrillator for the Police Department. Recommended by the Selectmen and Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$45,000 to overlay High Street and to put a leveling shim on (11) streets; Dort, Barrett, Brook, Granite, Howard, Nelson, Prospect, Russell Avenue, Starkey Avenue, Thayer Avenue, and Derby Lane. Recommended by the Selectmen and Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$82,085 for the Highway Department to purchase a 1998 Caterpillar Loader Model 924, to be offset by up to \$30,000 trade-in allowance for the 1984 Caterpillar Loader Model 930; further, to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw \$22,085 from the Highway Department Capital Reserve Fund created for this purpose, with the balance of \$30,000 to be raised from general taxation. Recommended by the Selectmen and Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 28. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw up to \$10,000 from the Landfill Capital Reserve Fund to purchase a new baler. Recommended by the Selectmen and Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 29. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw up to \$20,000 from the Landfill Special Trust Account for the purpose of installing three phase electrical service to the Landfill Recycling Center which will be needed for the compactor after the closure of the landfill. Recommended by the Selectmen and Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 30. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of RSA 202-A:4-d authorizing the Library Trustees to accept gifts of personal property, other than money, which may be offered to the library

for any public purpose, provided however that no acceptance of personal property by the Library Trustees shall be deemed to bind the town or the Library Trustees to raise, appropriate or expend any public funds for the operation, maintenance, repair or replacement of such personal property.

ARTICLE 31. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to enter into agreement with Southwest Region Planning Commission and other state agencies, when money becomes available for feasibility studies, grants, and agreements in the best interest of the Town. This is to be done by the Selectmen, with the approval of the Budget Committee, after consultation with the Conservation Commission, Planning Board, and Industrial Development Committee.


ARTICLE 32. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, accept, and expend money from State, Federal, or other government unit, or a private source, which becomes available during the year in accordance with the procedures set forth in RSA 31:95-b.

ARTICLE 33. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to transfer tax lien and convey property acquired by the Town by Tax Collector's Deed by public auction, or advertised sealed bid, or in such a manner as determined by the Selectmen as justice may require.


ARTICLE 34. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money, and pay charges and interest thereon.

ARTICLE 35. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hear reports of committees, agents, or officers heretofore chosen and take any action relative.







We have audited the general purpose financial statements of the Town of Troy, New Hampshire as of and for the year ended December 31, 1997, and have issued our report thereon dated January 29, 1998.

We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards required that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the general purpose financial statements are free of material misstatement.


The management of the Town of Troy, New Hampshire is responsible for establishing and maintaining an internal control structure. In fulfilling this responsibility, estimates and judgments by management are required to assess the expected benefits and related costs of internal control structure policies and procedures. The objectives of an internal control structure are to provide management with reasonable, but not absolute, assurance that assets are safeguarded against loss from unauthorized use or disposition, and that transactions are executed in accordance with management's authorization and recorded properly to permit the preparation of general purpose financial statements in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles. Because of inherent limitations in any internal control structure, errors or irregularities may nevertheless occur and not be detected. Also, projection of any evaluation of the structure to future periods is subject to the risk that procedures may become inadequate because of changes in conditions or that the effectiveness of the design and operation of policies and procedures may deteriorate.

In planning and performing our audit of the general purpose financial statements of the Town of Troy, New Hampshire for the year ended December 31, 1997, we obtained an understanding of the internal control structure. With respect to the internal control structure, we obtained an understanding of the design of relevant policies and procedures and whether they have been placed in operation, and we assessed control risk in order to determine our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the general purpose financial statements and not to provide an opinion on the internal control structure. Accordingly, we do not express such an opinion.

Our consideration of the internal control structure would not necessarily disclose all matters in the internal control structure that might be material weaknesses under standards established by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants. A material weakness is a condition in which the design or operation of one or more of the internal control structure elements does not reduce to a relatively low level the risk that errors and irregularities in amounts that would be material in relation to the general purpose financial statements being audited may occur and not be detected within a timely period by employees in the normal course of performing their assigned functions. We noted no matters involving the control structure and its operation that we consider to be material weaknesses as defined above.

This report is intended for the information of management and the Board of Selectmen. However, this report is a matter of public record, and its distribution is not limited.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

The year 1997 will be remembered for planning Troy's future. The major changes being considered for the future are the final closure of the landfill, trying to bring more businesses to the town, what to do with Route 12, an elderly housing proposal, a future community center, and an addition to the library.

If the state and engineering firms can agree on final closure plans for the landfill we hope by the fall to have a transfer station in place for the disposal of our trash. The Landfill Committee has been meeting and should be able to present a plan at a public hearing before summer.

The Selectmen and Industrial Development Committee continue to meet with potential businesses, and with some good planning, we hope 1998 will bring some type of new business to Troy.

Route 12 continues to be the biggest possible change for the Town of Troy. The state and town continue to meet to discuss all possible solutions to the Route 12 traffic problems. This winter there will be a public hearing to come up with a final solution as to if we should do nothing to Route 12, upgrade the existing road, or bypass the village. We hope everyone will continue to stay involved in the process to help determine what to do.

The library has spent the last three years planning a new addition. After many hours of planning, designing, and juggling figures we feel the library has come up with a well designed plan deserving of the town's support.

The Planning Board has a Steering Committee which has designed plans with Southwestern Community Services to renovate three apartment buildings for rent controlled apartments for the elderly. They have also designed future plans for a community center to allow for a youth center, senior center, Head Start program or whatever needs the town has. They are looking at land at the old train station building for this future site. We feel the elderly housing and community center are well needed and it can also clean up an area of Troy which has been a problem

area for years.

Some accomplishments of 1997 include the perambulation of the Troy/Fitzwilliam town lines, renovation and painting of the Town Hall bell tower, completion of the Highway Garage, and renovations to the TEASI building to become the Emergency Services Building, housing both TEASI and the Police Department, which was dedicated to the late Matt Smith.

Projects in progress we hope to complete in 1998 include the band stand on the common, new computer updating for better accuracy and efficiency, and the revaluation of the entire town.

The biggest decision the state and especially the Town of Troy have ever seen when it comes to funding for education was in December of 1997 when the Supreme Court ruled the present way of funding for education, mainly through property taxes, is unconstitutional. The Supreme Court ruled a change has to be completed within the next year. How the state will decide to address this hearing is anybody's guess, which can only be good news to the taxpayers of the Town of Troy. The only way the Town of Troy can loose is if the property rich affluent towns can succeed in changing the constitution to allow the state to keep the status-quo.

The Monadnock Regional School District meeting will be on February 7, 1998 to review the school district warrant articles and the proposed budget. A major article for the Town of Troy is a new tax formula of 50/50 for the district. Our present formula is based on the number of enrollment, a 50/50 formula is determined on 50% enrollment and 50% evaluation. The new formula would even out taxes for funding our schools more fairly throughout the district. Remember, almost 80% of your property tax dollars goes to funding the school, so please participate. The intent of the legislation commonly referred to as the Australian Ballot was to provide an opportunity for more voters to participate in decisions about school budgets. At the meeting February 7, 1998, all articles will be discussed, debated, and when moved to do so,


amended. The results of this meeting will appear on the ballot for voting on March 10, 1998 at Kimball Hall, which will help a number of voters who had been unable to attend the traditional school meeting, so please participate.

The Town of Troy remains in good financial standing as we continue to have a surplus. The auditors have given the Town of Troy a very favorable audit and our tax rate went down 1.15% in 1997.



There are many exciting things happening in Troy right now. Don't be afraid to step forward and be a part of it.



ANIMAL CONTROL DEPARTMENT







FOREST FIRE WARDEN & STATE FOREST RANGER

To aid your Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department, and State Forest Ranger, contact your local Warden or Fire Department to find out if a burn permit is required. Violations of RSA 227-L:17, the fire permit law of the State of New Hampshire, are misdemeanors punishable by fines of up to \$2,000 and/or a year in jail. Violators are also liable for all fire suppression costs. There are 10 Forest Rangers who work for the N.H. Division of Forests and Lands. State Forest Rangers are available to assist communities with forest fire suppression, as well as the enforcement of forest fire and timber harvest laws. There are 2400 Forest Fire Wardens and Deputy Forest Fire Wardens throughout the state. Each town has a Forest Fire Warden and several Deputy Wardens who assist the Forest Rangers.

The State of New Hampshire operates 15 fire towers, 2 mobile patrols, and 3 contract aircraft patrols. This early detection and reports from citizens aid in the quick response from local fire departments. This is a critical factor in controlling the size of wildland fires and keeping the loss of property and suppression costs as low as possible.





GAY-KIMBALL LIBRARY

1997 was a year in which the Building Committee continued its efforts to raise money and hired a new architectural firm, Tennant and Wallace, to produce a final design for the renovation and addition, and the staff further automated the circulation/catalog system.

The major change at the library involved purchasing a new software program and computer to fully automate the card catalog. Funds from a grant paid for half the costs involved. We now have a patron terminal instead of the old wooden cabinet with dozens of drawers. Most people find the new system user friendly and much quicker than the old one. At the end of the year we were able to purchase a device called a slip printer, which prints a receipt when materials are checked out, thus eliminating the need to stamp the date due in each item. If you haven't been in to see these improvements, we hope you will visit the library soon.


Library activities included the very popular book sales in June and September, as well as the turkey raffle in November. We had a small book sale and the teepee at the Troy Arts Festival in July. The staff went to the Troy Elementary School several times to talk to children about our programs and encourage participation. The summer reading program, *Take Us To Your Readers*, was popular, as were the several story/craft time series that were held. The Riply Reading Room was used by the Heritage Commission, girl scouts, and others for meetings and many of the library activities.

Dozens of volunteers help the library function smoothly by pitching in for a variety of jobs, including storytelling, changing light bulbs, baking, sorting and selling books, painting faces, organizing turkey raffles, and attending meetings. Dozens of other people help by donating used books and other materials for the book sales. Our thanks to all of you who have helped in any way, and special thanks to John Gove for his tireless work and interest in setting up our computer network, to Ralph Wentworth, Chairman of the Building Committee, to the faithful evening volunteers, Judy Mentzer and Lynn Smith, and to our fearless trustees, Patricia Condon, Gus McLeavy, and Bernadette Quinn who work so hard on all our fund raisers and on running the library.

HELPING HAND CENTER

Helping Hand was established in February of 1991 by Sister Lucie Ducas, CSC, and Judy McCann. The purpose was and still is to provide supplementary and temporary help with food and clothing to those in need. Clothing is available to anyone since a donation jar is displayed. During the first year, the space at 1 Depot Street was rented courtesy of Golden Oak Realty for \$100. After a year and the continued need for a place, it was more feasible to purchase the building for the remainder of the existing mortgage. This was accomplished through fund raisers for the down payment of \$10,000. At present, the mortgage stands at \$9,082. Repairs to the building were recently made courtesy of the Gap Mountain Lions Club monetarily and volunteer help with cooperation of the Cheshire County Adult Diversion Program, a new roof was put on and the exterior of the building was painted.

Sources of revenue are from FEMA, the Towns of Troy and Fitzwilliam, individuals, church organizations and companies, the Annual Christmas Supper and Yard Sale. Food donations are from the area Catholic schools, individuals, churches, Troy Elementary Have A Heart Program, Scouting For Food, and the NH Food Coalition. Helping Hand served 79 families in Troy in 1997, ranging from one time recipients to once a week recipients. We prefer to refer furniture donors directly to recipients. Clothing is always in abundance except for baby and children's clothing which goes rapidly.

Volunteers are Sister Lucie, Ellen Foster, Harriet LaBrake, Judy Matson, Marge Patterson, Cindy Satas, and others who come in occasionally. Gil Hrisiko is our driver to Boston for clothes donations to Pine Street Inn. Our goals include updating the electrical service, computerized accounting, and continued service. Once the mortgage has been paid, we would like to update the van, if it lasts that long.

HERITAGE COMMISSION

The Village Cemetery is seen to have potential for inclusion in the Historic Register. In light of this, the Heritage Commission and Chet Priest are working together to begin restoration and to assemble a card file with photographs of each marker.

The Heritage Commission with the Gay-Kimball Library are planning to offer a winter lecture series with subjects of historic interest. On January 22nd, Lois Stabler will discuss her book "Very Poor and of A Lo Make: The Journal of Abner Sanger". February 26th Warian Hawkins will present an illustrated lecture "Restoring a Troy Home", and on March 26th, Jim Milani will discuss "Henry Thoreau and His Ties to the Monadnock Region".

HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT



We finished off the inside of the Highway Garage and put the fire truck, 34-M4, into operation as a sand truck.

In 1998 the Highway Block Grant is going to be used to put a leveling shim on the badly needed Gap Mountain Road. We are also asking for a special article to put an overlay on High Street to smooth it up and blend in the ditches and level shim eleven town streets.

HOME HEALTHCARE, HOSPICE & COMMUNITY SERVICES





INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

The outlook of the Industrial Development Committee was broadened in 1997 through support of a project by the Southwest Region Planning Commission to survey and define prospects for general community development from both business and social points of view. Based on community input suggested in public meetings, the survey has developed a plan focused on revitalization of the area of the Common and the Depot. Tangible results from this effort will be seen in 1998. In the conventional scope of industrial development, negotiations are under way to bring a manufacturer to a large town owned tract.

This committee was formed in the early eighties to aid the Selectmen in promoting Troy as a desirable industrial location. Now the state legislature has made it possible for the Town of Troy to form an Industrial Development Authority (IDA) having management and financial responsibilities as directed by the Selectmen. Voters will be asked to establish this IDA in 1998. The IDA will enable a more active and effective development program for Troy.



The landfill closure process moved along slower than expected in 1997 with the completion of the drum removal project and during 1998 the Town is in the process of finalizing the scope of the hydrogeologic investigation. The Department of Environmental Services (DES) has offered guidance to the Town regarding the remaining tasks which need to be performed. Mr. Thomas Sweeney of Dufresne-Henry, Inc., is the Town's environmental consultant for the landfill closure project.

The primary objective of the hydrogeological investigation is to define the impact of the site on local water quality. The next phase will be the installation of six monitoring wells to sample water quality. Installing monitoring wells may be difficult in some areas of this site because of many large pieces of granite from the quarry operation. Drilling will be difficult. We are looking at many changes to impact the landfill/recycling center in the months ahead; the placement of containers for trash removal, putting in three phase power, reaching our long term goal of 100% recycling.

\$9,727 was deposited in the Landfill Special Account during 1997 from the sale of recycled materials, and dumping fees. One example is the sale of mixed paper. We shipped out 21.6815 tons of mixed paper this year and received \$265 for it. Had it been put in a dumpster, at \$80/ton to have it hauled away, it would have cost the Town \$1,735. I can't stress enough to everyone the importance of recycling and the impact it will have on the Town budget once the landfill closure process is complete.

I would like to thank all of you who are doing your best towards 100% recycling and I would also like to thank my staff for a great year and a job well done. Please feel free to stop in and ask any questions you might have, and have a cup of coffee with us.

MONADNOCK ADVISORY COMMISSION

The Monadnock Advisory Commission is charged by the State of New Hampshire under RSA 258:1 to advise and guide the Department of Resources and Economic Development (DRED) on the management of their lands and leased lands of the Society for the Protection of New Hampshire Forests and the Town of Jaffrey. The lands located on Mt. Monadnock, Gap Mountain, and Little Monadnock Mountain.

On Saturday, June 25, 1997, the commission met at Monadnock State Park in Jaffrey. Business attended to: Bill Elliott was elected chairman and Betsy Harris vice-chair. A new parking lot on Old Troy Road in Dublin, to fit 40 cars, will be proposed by DRED. This lot will be on property owned by SPNHF and will replace one that accommodates 15 automobiles. A proposal; to improve signage and parking at Gap Mountain trail head was discussed. Concerns of the neighbors was addressed, as well as the problem of parking on Route 124 near the Jaffrey/Troy town line. Because the Royce Trail crosses the highway, more and more day hikers are using this area to park for the day. The commission asked that "No Parking" signs be placed on either side of the road. The state was in agreement.

The public is encouraged to contact their commission members with suggestions and comments.



PLANNING BOARD

In 1997 the Planning Board was fortunate to have been involved in a number of events critical to the shaping of this community's future. We typically concern ourselves with local land use concerns and questions, and a few zoning issues and revisions at public meetings. This year, however, the Board sponsored and coordinated a community wide planning effort which led to a solid and economically viable proposal for converting several properties on the south end of the common to elderly housing and constructing a community center. Working with about forty dedicated citizens throughout this process reaffirmed my faith in our town's ability to recognize a golden opportunity and rally efforts behind making it happen. I hope that we can keep up the momentum and participation level to see this project through to completion. It is one of the first steps towards making Troy a safer, more attractive place to reside, and an interesting destination for visitors to this beautiful area.

The architectural drawings for these projects that you will see on voting day and at town meeting are a community effort - the result of three public meetings, numerous steering committee and finance committee meetings and many hours of dedicated efforts by the staffs of the Southwest Region Planning Commission and Southwestern Community Services. We need your support for these projects in order to improve the quality of life in this community and the general appearance of our village district. The resultant vision of this whole planning exercise was to preserve the architectural and historic integrity of buildings in the depot area south of the common, to have a quieter, more stable population base there, to set aside land this year for a centrally located community center to be constructed in the future, and to create space for small entrepreneurial businesses to function in that neighborhood.

The Planning Board has continued its efforts to make land use information more accessible, and its interactions with the public less onerous and costly. Towards this end, it has published a user friendly "Citizen's Guide to Development in Troy" complete with a revised fee schedule insert. Copies are available in the Town Clerk's office. We also created a Minor Site Plan Review process to handle small changes of use of commercial properties in a more expedited fashion. The Site Plan



Review process is the only opportunity for the community to comment on the type and extent of commercial development which occurs here.

In addition, we adopted an Earth Excavation Ordinance, and will add elderly housing and a community center as permitted uses by special exception in the village district if the voters approve this amendment. We have also published Troy's 1998-2003 Capital Improvements Program.

Next year the Planning Board will draft an Economic Development chapter for Troy's Master Plan, and will focus on studying zoning impacts on and around the present (or future) Route 12 corridor. Work on these two planning projects will have a significant impact on how Troy plans for its future once the Route 12 decision is made later this year. Throughout the year, the extent of community participation in the Department of Transportation public hearings and field walks has been impressive. The Department often heeded the comments made by residents and improved on their concepts and proposals as a result. I urge everyone to attend the final public meeting on this critical issue.

I am grateful for the faithful attendance of Board members who volunteer their time to take care of Troy's land use affairs under sometimes difficult circumstances. Carol Ogilvie, planning consultant to the town from the Southwest Region Planning Commission, has provided indispensable help to the Planning Board on numerous occasions, and we appreciate her assistance. I would also like to thank Peter Davis, Jeff Porter, and Brian McMaster of the Planning Commission for their assistance on the Route 12 project and the economic development/elderly housing/community center proposal. Keith Thibault of Southwestern Community Services has also done so much to develop the financing scenarios for these economic development proposals. Finally, special thanks to Karen Wilber, our former clerk, and to Barbara Kinch-Hatch, our present clerk, for their administrative support.

POLICE DEPARTMENT

1997 was an extremely busy year for the Police Department. The TEASI building was renovated and became the Emergency Services Building housing both TEASI and the Police Department.

We voluntarily opened up our agency to the State in preparation for State Accreditation. A number of teams audited the department to check on our standards and professionalism. After a lengthy process the department was endorsed as in complete compliance with standards set nationally and will be given an accredited status and awarded a Certificate of State Accreditation. In the State of New Hampshire only eight other agencies have currently reached this level of achievement-Manchester, Nashua, Goffstown, Dover, Durham, Portsmouth, and Keene. This puts Troy in an elite position within the Law Enforcement community and enables us to meet standards and levels of performance that the town's people have come to expect.

Although incident numbers in 1997 increased by 1,776, criminal cases increased 57 and arrests jumped 19 higher than in the previous year, it did not tax the department as it had in the past. Our officers have been well trained and they are able to perform their duties in many ways that leave other towns envious. We have been able to provide 24 hour service and have been effective in getting restitution for victims of crime.

In 1997 we saw a decrease in juvenile problems and the department has started two programs in order to maintain this lower level of crime and hopefully reduce it further. The DARE Plus Program and the newly formed Police Athletic/Activities League (PAL) Program have officers and volunteers interacting with the youth of our town and offer them opportunities through clubs and athletic events that they would not otherwise have.

In 1998 we are planning to continue these programs, and to increase our interaction with the senior citizens in the town. The "55 Alive" Driver Training is just one example. In 1998 all officers will undergo training for "First Responder", a medical program that allows the officer to administer advanced emergency medical care, including use

of a heart monitor and defibrillator. This will allow heart attack victims a greater chance of survival. This service will be in conjunction with TEASI to continue to provide the best possible services to the citizens of Troy.



ROUTE 12 ADVISORY TASK FORCE

The Advisory Task Force to the Troy Route 12 Improvement Study met four times during 1997 to review research and design plans prepared by the New Hampshire Department of Transportation and consulting engineers. This year the ATF also held two field walks with NH DOT staff and personnel of state and federal permitting agencies. Two public informational meetings were also conducted by NH DOT.

Most of the work this year involved refining the layout of the bypass alternatives to satisfy the state and federal agencies, known as resource agencies, charged with protecting environmental resources. The ATF and most local bypass proponents favored three easterly alternatives. After considerable deliberation among NH DOT, ATF, and resource agencies, one of those easterly routes, Alternative #18, was selected as the preferred bypass route.

The ATF heard strong comments from residents both supporting and opposing a bypass. Reasons for opposition include disruption of rural life for people who purposefully live away from the highway today but would have their homes taken or otherwise have their lifestyles degraded by the construction of a bypass near their homes, re-routing traffic away from existing businesses on NH 12 in Troy, and stunting Troy's future economic development by re-routing traffic away from Troy on a limited access highway.

Residents supporting a bypass cited removal of through car and truck traffic from the village area as a major improvement for quality of life and economic opportunity for Troy by virtue of removing traffic pressure, safety hazards, and exhaust, and dust from traffic. Eliminating the negative effects of highway traffic may enhance residential property values.

NH DOT also continued to develop the upgrade alternative for NH 12 through the village. The upgrade concept does not have support from the ATF, NH DOT, or many residents. The changes proposed in this alternative were thought to damage the village and the traffic benefits insufficient to warrant the cost.

ROUTE 12 ADVISORY TASK FORCE

The ATF undertook their role in this project understanding that whether or not NH 12 continues to pass through the village, it will shape Troy's future in a way that few things can. The ATF also understands that implementation of the kinds of changes proposed in the study will create opportunity for some and hardship for others. Guiding change to benefit everyone is never simple. ATF members, local officials, NH DOT staff, and Troy residents who have participated in this study have accepted a difficult challenge.

The ATF's role in the project draws to a close this winter. The conceptual design phase of this project may or may not end with the Special Committee Public Hearing. The Executive Councilors may ask the NH DOT to revisit elements of the design that require public involvement. If not, and if changes to NH 12 are authorized by the Councilors, the NH DOT will proceed with work necessary to apply for environmental permits and complete engineering design of the changes. Construction resulting from this study is scheduled to begin in 2001.







SOUTHWEST REGION PLANNING COMMISSION

The Planning Commission, with a service area covering 35 municipalities in Cheshire and Hillsborough Counties, is one of New Hampshire's nine regional planning agencies established under RSA 36. We continue to provide planning related assistance to member communities and to represent the Southwest Region in state and federal programs. Our diverse work program covers activities such as local planning assistance, regional information systems & mapping, transportation planning, community & economic development, and natural resources planning. We are funded through multiple sources including local dues, various federal, state and local grants, and contracts. These resources provide the Commission the ability to assemble a professional staff which member municipalities have direct access to.

Highlights of Commission activities for the past year include establishing an economic development planning program; facilitation of a 10 year Transportation Improvement Program for the Southwest Region; participation in sponsoring several educational forums on planning related topics; and, use of a federal grant award to construct a mobile resource awareness center for educational purposes. As you know, we have provided assistance to Troy's Planning Board; have been involved in facilitating activities of the NH Route 12 Improvement Study, provided grant administrative services related to the Troy Affordable Housing and ADA accessibility projects, coordinated the Community Center Feasibility Study, and assisted in the Troy in the 21st Century community planning exercise.

TROY EMERGENCY AMBULANCE SERVICE, INC T.E.A.S.I.

1997 has been a year of many changes for your ambulance service, but still some very important things remain the same.

At the beginning of the year, the TEASI building became town owned, and the Police Department moved in to share the building. It was great to see many of you at the open house and ceremony to dedicate the building to Matt Smith. This reorganization relieved us of a tremendous financial burden and allows us to concentrate our fund raising efforts towards much needed equipment and furthering of education for our members, while still providing the town with the free ambulance service it has had for 20 plus years. While many of our neighboring communities charge for ambulance calls, we take a great deal of pride in remaining among the few, absolutely free of charge emergency care services.

This past year we provided care for 163 members of our community. Almost 40% of those emergencies occurred between 6:00 PM and 6:00 AM, meaning that dedicated volunteers left the comfortable confines of their homes at night to help those in need.

I'd like to tell you a little about the folks who provide your care, and are there when you need them. It costs approximately \$500 to obtain Emergency Medical Technician (Basic) Certification. This is a part of what our fund raisers and pledge letters help pay for. It is the pure dedication and a desire to help that gets the volunteer out two nights a week, four hours a night, for ten weeks to complete a course, not to mention the stress involved in studying for and taking the required written and practical exam. On top of this, there are yearly continuing education requirements to ensure our skills are the best they can be. This is what it takes for a basic EMT. The cost and time requirements get higher as we move up to the various advanced skill levels. This year we trained three new First Responders, three new EMT's, and two EMT-I Techs. The Town of Troy is very fortunate to have such a dedicated crew of volunteers who give their time and effort to be there for friends, neighbors, and strangers in need. It is a full time volunteer job, on top of the other full time jobs we all already have. We could all tell you stories of running

out in the middle of meals, leaving children's school functions, and jumping out of a warm bed, in the early morning hours; but one fact remains, we care about our town and the people in it.




TROY-FITZWILLIAM YOUTH SPORTS ASSOCIATION

Motion made and seconded to accept the Budget Committee's Budget as presented. Chairman of the Budget Committee offered an **amendment** to increase the **Police Department Line Item** to **\$129,590**. The amendment passed. A second amendment was offered by the Landfill Superintendent to increase that line item by **\$26,000** for the purpose of having

Public Service run three phase power to the landfill site. **Amendment failed.** No further discussion, the vote to accept the Budget Committee's recommendation as amended was taken, the motion passed.

Motion was made by Carrie Mattson to separate the Emergency Services line item into two separate line items; one for the building operation costs and one for the ambulance related costs. **Motion passed.**

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will vote to modify the elderly exemptions from property tax in the Town of Troy, based on assessed value, for qualified taxpayers, to be as follows: for a person 65 years of age up to 75 years, \$12,000; for a person 75 years of age up to 80 years, \$25,000; for a person 80 years of age or older, \$50,000. To qualify, the person must have been a New Hampshire resident for at least five years, own the real estate individually or jointly, or if the real estate is owned by such person's spouse, they must have been married for at least five years. In addition, the taxpayer must have a net income of not more than \$13,400 or if married, a combined net income of less than \$20,400 which includes social security and pension payments; and own net assets not in excess of \$40,000 excluding the value of the person's actual residence and the value of a minimum single-family residential lot or two acres, whichever is greater. This article has been placed on the warrant because effective January 1, 1998 all elderly exemptions will be repealed and any municipality which has not adopted higher parameters, which can be done any time after July 23, 1996, for their elderly exemptions under RSA 72:39-b, will be required to follow the new minimum exemption, which is \$5,000 off the assessed value of the property, applied equally for all age groups. Recommended by Selectmen.

PASSED AS PRESENTED

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate up to \$225,000 for the purpose of purchasing property in the Town of Troy for elderly housing, industrial development, or a community center and authorize the transfer of the December 31, 1996 fund balance in that amount for this purpose. This is to be done by the Selectmen with the approval of the Budget Committee, after consultation with the Planning Board . Recommended by the Selectmen and Budget Committee.

(Majority Vote Required).

Motion was made to amend the amount stated to \$138,000. Motion Passed. A motion was made to Table the Article. Motion Passed.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$16,800 for the care of the cemeteries, and authorize the withdrawal of \$15,800 from the Cemetery Trust Funds established for this purpose. Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee.

PASSED AS PRESENTED

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to expend the Highway Block Grant of \$38,306.82 that the Town will receive from the State of New Hampshire for the calendar year 1997 for maintenance, construction, and reconstruction of Class IV and V Highways. Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee.

PASSED AS PRESENTED

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote a sum of money \$76,978.34 for the payment of Sewer Bonds. Income from the State of New Hampshire will be \$24,418.34. Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$219,189 for the Water/Sewer Department operations. Income comes from collections of water and sewer rents. Recommended by Water/Sewer Commissioners and Budget Committee.

PASSED AS PRESENTED

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,775 to purchase new computer equipment necessary to handle upgraded tax processing software. The Tax Program has been rewritten and support for the existing version is being terminated. Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee.

PASSED AS PRESENTED

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,026.85 to purchase five voting booths and a handicap

accessible voting booth to be in compliance with RSA 658:9 relative to handicap accessible voting booth specifications. Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee.

PASSED AS PRESENTED

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen as agents to expend from the Reassessment Capital Reserve Fund created for that purpose and to authorize the Selectmen to accept a proposal for \$44,500 over a three year period to do a complete revaluation and conversion to a computer appraisal system with a physical reinspection of all property and a valuation update in the third year to bring all values to 100% of fair market value. Payments to be made over the three year period; Year 1 payment \$10,500, Year 2 payment \$12,500, Year 3 payment \$21,500. Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee.

(Majority Vote Required).

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500 for the Planning Board to engage the services of Southwest Region Planning Commission for the development of a computer generated composite parcel map to be used for planning purposes. Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee.

PASSED AS PRESENTED

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000 to paint a portion of the Town Hall. This will be a non-lapsing account per RSA 32:3, VI and will not lapse until the project is completed or in two years, whichever is less. Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee. Amended to include painting the Town Clerk's Office.

PASSED AS AMENDED

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,015 to purchase a Mita DC-1856 copier for the Town Hall. Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee.

PASSED AS PRESENTED

ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the

sum of \$5,000 for the Police Department to teach the DARE Program at Troy Elementary School. Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee. *"It was noted by the Police Chief that this covers two school years, due to the fiscal year of the school and the calendar year of the Town".*

PASSED AS PRESENTED

ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to enter into long term lease/purchase agreement in the amount of \$30,000 payable over a term of four years at a rate of \$8,244.54 annually to purchase a 1997 Crown Victoria Police Cruiser and to authorize the withdrawal of \$8,244.54 for the first year's payment from the Police Department Capital Reserve Fund established for that purpose. Proceeds from the sale of the police vehicle it is replacing are to go into the Police Department Capital Reserve Fund. The Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this lease. (Majority Vote Required).

Amended to read, to see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to enter into a long term agreement in the amount of \$20,000 payable over a term of four years at the rate of \$5,496.36 annually to purchase a 1997 Crown Victoria Police Cruiser and to authorize the withdrawal of \$15,000 from the Police Department Capital Reserve, established for that purpose, to make the first payment and the difference. Proceeds from the sale of the police vehicle it is replacing are to go into the Police Department Capital Reserve Fund.

PASSED AS AMENDED

ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the amount of money listed below to be placed into the Capital Reserve Funds for each department for the purpose of purchasing vehicles or equipment when voted by the Town. Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee.


