TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

[L. S.]

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Barnstead in the County of Belknap in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Barnstead on Tuesday, the ninth day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same, as recommended by the Budget.

3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

4. To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount on property tax if paid on or before the first Saturday of July next.

5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to buy liability insurance on town labor and pay the same out of the Highway Department.

6. To see if the Town will vote to accept the following trust funds:

The sum of \$200.00 from Leighton E. Tasker; the income to be used for the perpetual care of the lot and the approaches thereto of Lot number 61, Riverview Cemetery, Barnstead, N. H.

The sum of \$300.00 from Harry L. Jenkins Estate for the care of Harry L. Jenkins lot in Riverview Cemetery.

7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to purchase a new adding machine and appropriate money for the same.

8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to purchase a truck snow plow and appropriate money for the same.

9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw the sum of \$2,800.00 from the Timber Tax Yield Fund to be used in improving town roads as suggested in Town Road Improvement Program. The voters to determine; (a) priority of road or roads to be improved; (b) manner of construction.

10. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF TOWN ROAD COMMITTEE OF BARNSTEAD, N. H.

Fellow voters of Barnstead, N. H., the time has come, when we the people must start a program of road building. With more cars on the road to-day, and the people getting away from farming in the more remote sections of town and working in mills, factories, and offices, some distance from home, they must report to work on time so we must have roads to travel on every day of the year. Truly this is a serious situation but it is a must. If we want to have a job, a home and a town, we must lay down a future program, that we the voters can afford. It must be a long term program. 20 years truly is a long time, but how can we appropriate 6 or \$8,000 per year without raising valuations or tax rates to a point of undue hardship on some voters of Barnstead.

Here is one probable solution that we recommend. To build 16½ miles of road of the hard surface type road, would cost approximately \$206,000 or \$12,500 per mile. With T. R. A. at \$7,500 per year by the state, and \$900 by the town, the town should appropriate \$2,800 per year to keep this program going.

It is also suggested that we continue with T. R. A. as we are now doing. But instead use the \$2,800 to gravel sections of roads that are very bad. This work to be done under the direction of the Selectmen, and Road Agents. And let out to bid to a contractor who has the proper equipment to perform this kind of work. By doing this way we can realize more gravel on our roads.

We the Committee recommend that when brush is

cut that the stubble be sprayed to stop growth, to save the town the expense of cutting again.

We further recommend that the \$2,800 or whatever amount decided on be taken from the timber tax surplus.

(B) REPORT FROM YOUR SUPERINTENDENT

Education is a complicated human enterprise. It should deal with the acquisition of knowledge and skills. Changing and improving the behavior of young American citizens so they can fully participate in our way of living for their own happiness, and the good of their neighbors is a major goal of the public schools. Each year we try to meet the needs of your boys and girls better than before within the limits of our finances and facilities. We need your constructive criticisms, your continued helpful interest, and your encouragement.

INSTRUCTION

The problems of what we shall teach, who will teach, how we shall teach, what materials shall we have to use, and what we can do to help each boy and girl most, are of greatest importance in the operation of our schools. None of us claim to have the answers to all of the problems encountered. We strive to give your boys and girls thorough training in the fundamental skills. Our yearly attainment tests show reasonable success, when related to the intellectual abilities our children have. We are not always satisfied with the effort or results. We want our children to know facts about history and geography, adapting themselves to classroom situations, respecting the rights of others, without the necessity of force and fear. We are disappointed at times, as I am sure parents are, but we try to remember that self-discipline is learned and improves with maturity.

We were able to retain the services of four experienced teachers: Mrs. Cotton, Mrs. Golden, Mrs. Alden, and Mrs. Grau part time. The lower grades are crowded. Considerable skill and patience is required to provide good training for varied capabilities. These

teachers have completed an extension course in social studies, so they may help your children even more.

Mrs. Mary Taylor was employed to replace Mr. Clarence Merryfield as Principal and teacher of grades 7 and 8. We are very fortunate in securing her services. She has had several years of experience in the schools of Detroit, Michigan.

It becomes more and more difficult to employ qualified teachers in any school, as the supply is far short of demand. Particularly is it difficult when a community has a large enrollment in multiple grades. A good staff is the first essential.

I am pleased that you amply provide new books, workbooks, and general supplies.

REPAIRS AND IMPROVEMENTS

We are very pleased to report a greatly improved water system for Center School. A new artesian well and pump were completely installed during the summer. Though \$1,500 was appropriated, the total cost was less than \$1,000. It was unnecessary to borrow any money. Minor repairs to lighting, toilets, porches were completed. Some painting was done, and the desks in one room were refinished. Some new shelving was built.

We must replace part or all of a roof on one of our schools next summer. The front wall at Parade School has developed quite a bulge over the years and we hope to restore it. Funds are needed for minor repairs. We can never be sure of their nature or extent.

COMMUNITY COOPERATION

I feel that it is necessary for every town to have an active Parent Teachers Association. This group should exist, not as a political pressure group, but for

mutual understanding and helpfulness. I am pleased that you have such an organization.

The special study committee to help determine answers to school problems, has given freely of time and thought. They have worked with your school board and superintendent to find practical answers to Barnstead needs. Their recommendations are incorporated in our budget.

BUILDING PROBLEMS

Barnstead is not now feeling the affect of national population increases. For the present year our elementary and high school population has reduced slightly. Some families have moved away. Yet, our four school rooms are filled to capacity. We cannot give as much individual attention as desirable to the pupils of the primary grades. I think the people studying this problem have agreed to get things in readiness for adding a room quickly when the capacity of our present buildings is exceeded. The addition of two or three new families, or a small increase in anticipated enrollment, will make such addition an immediate necessity.

FINANCES

The new budget provides for needed increases in salaries, transportation, and a special amount for land. Through increases in state aid, reductions in tuitions payable and a large balance, our taxes will probably not increase for the year 1954-55.

In expressing my appreciation again for your cooperation and friendliness, I would remind you that *all of us* should be involved in providing the finest education we can for our boys and girls.

(a) REPORT OF SCHOOL HEALTH WORK

To the Townspeople, School Board and Superintendent
of Schools of Barnstead:

The following is my third annual report of the
school health work of Barnstead.

With the approach of winter and the resulting
decrease in outdoor activities of children, an increase
in the number of certain communicable diseases may
be expected.

Since school started last fall we have had scattered
cases of chicken-pox, common cold, and the flu. There
has been one case of Infectious Hepatitis.

The annual physical check-up is performed by
our school physician, Dr. George Quinn, M. D. of
Farmington, each spring. It is hoped that every child
take advantage of it as a routine school health service.

The routine hearing and eye-testing have been
completed using the audiometer and Massachusetts
vision machine. Parents have been notified where de-
fects were found.

Dr. Carpenter, D. M. D., of Pittsfield completed
the dental clinic work before summer vacation.

Classroom visits and individual inspections have
been made for routine health work or to give individual
advice to pupils regarding personal hygiene.

I do believe we all appreciate the fact that the
Center School now has a sufficient water supply from
its new artesian well.

As I am reporting to the townspeople of Barnstead, I want to take the opportunity to mention that I believe a hot lunch program is an essential part of a health program. As we all are concerned about the health and welfare of our children, I suggest that we try to find an intelligent and practical way to do something to get a hot lunch program started. It is a long day for those children who have to get the bus early in the morning and arrive home late in the afternoon to go without any hot meal, especially during the cold season when we need more energy.
