State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Bath qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Bath on the second Tuesday of March next at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1 To choose a Town Clerk, one Selectman for three years, one Trustee of Trust Funds for three years, one Library Trustee for three years, a Town Treasurer, an Auditor, one or more Highway Agents, one Delegate to a convention to revise the constitution to be held in Concord on the second Wednesday of May, 1938, and all other necessary town officers and agents for the ensuing year.

Article 2 To hear the reports of officers and agents heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

Artice 3 To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the town officers' salaries and expenses, for repairs, maintenance and construction of highways and bridges, for the support of the town Library, for the support of the town poor, for the observance of Memorial Day and Old Home Day, and for all necessary town charges and expenses for the ensuing year.

Article 4 To see if the town will vote to accept State Aid for construction of Class 2 road known as Monroe Road and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of seven thousand dollars, or to accept State Aid for construction of Class 5 roads and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of six hundred sixteen dollars and fourteen cents. Article 5 To see what action the town will take in regard to oiling roads which have been constructed with T. R. A. funds, and raise and appropriate money for same.

Article 6 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three hundred dollars for the control of White Pine Blister Rust.

Article 7 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 to help defray the expenses of an Old Home Day celebration to be held in the summer of 1938.

Article 8 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed \$100.00, based on 1-100th of 1% of assessed valuation, to be paid as its share of the expense of carrying on an advertising and other beneficial program for the section of the state known as the White Mountains Region, of which this town is a part, in co-operation with the State of New Hampshire and other towns in this region, to be paid by the board of selectmen to the Treasurer of the White Mountains Region.

Article 9 To see if the town will vote to dispense with the delivery of inventory blanks until April 1st.

Article 10 To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired through tax collector's deed.

Article 11 To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 12 To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

As indicated above the enrollment is somewhat larger than last year. Because of the number to graduate and the small number in the eigth grade outside, it is probable that the number of tuition pupils will be less in 1938 and 1939 than it is this year. A resulting drop in estimated revenue together with added expense for transportation and tuition has caused a small increase in the amount recommended in the budget. I am glad to report that repairs in the water system have improved the supply for the drinking fountain. It has also been possible to pipe water to the laboratory as an added convenience, and a protection against fire and accident.

Further repairs have been made by installing better light fixtures upstairs and painting the downstairs rooms. I would like to recommend painting the rest of the hallways and the labortory. The furnaces are heating the building comfortably. There is some leakage of coal gas which goes to the primary room. This of course, should be remedied as such a condition is a menace to the health of the children.

For information regarding the work and other activities of the high school, I would call your attention to the headmaster's report which follows this. I am pleased to mention, however, that in the tests given by the State Board of Education last spring to all seniors, the record of Bath High School was above the state median.

The standard of scholarship is in general good.

The single session plan for the high school has been satisfactory. The earlier hour at which this session begins has caused some more tardiness. This is being corrected however. It has been found necessary to have a special afternoon period for those who have been absent or are failing.

The morale of the school is improving. The fundamental conception of any educational program is to prepare its students to meet life situations. With this principle in mind it has been the policy of the school to develop proper attitudes and appropriate conduct. A person who does not learn to be courteous, honest and reliable in school is apt to become a misfit in later life.

Last fall the athletic prgram consisted of tag football. This winter both boys and girls are playing in the Ammonoosuc Valley Basketball League. In spite of a small and somewhat inexperienced squad, the teams have made a favorable showing. The aim of the athletic program has been good sportsmanship. As in life, the players are learning that it is not victories, but how they play the game that counts.

Plans are being made for participation in the winter carnivals of neighboring towns. Our own winter carnival is scheduled for February 19th. The students and townspeople are to be thanked for their aid in preparation for the carnival.

I wish to thank the people of Bath who have supported our work and cooperated in making it effective.

May I also express appreciation to the superintendent, teachers, pupils and parents for their wholehearted cooperation.
